The act which is to be known as the Dominion Lands Act, and which received its first reading on Dec. 10, last contains the following clauses relating to pre-emption.

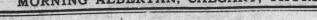
A person who has obtained entry for a homestead and who continues to hold has not acquired or does not hold a pre-emption, may pre-empt any available quarter section lying alongside such homestead or separated therefrom by only a road allowance, and upon the payment of a fee of ten dollars. 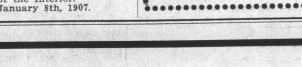

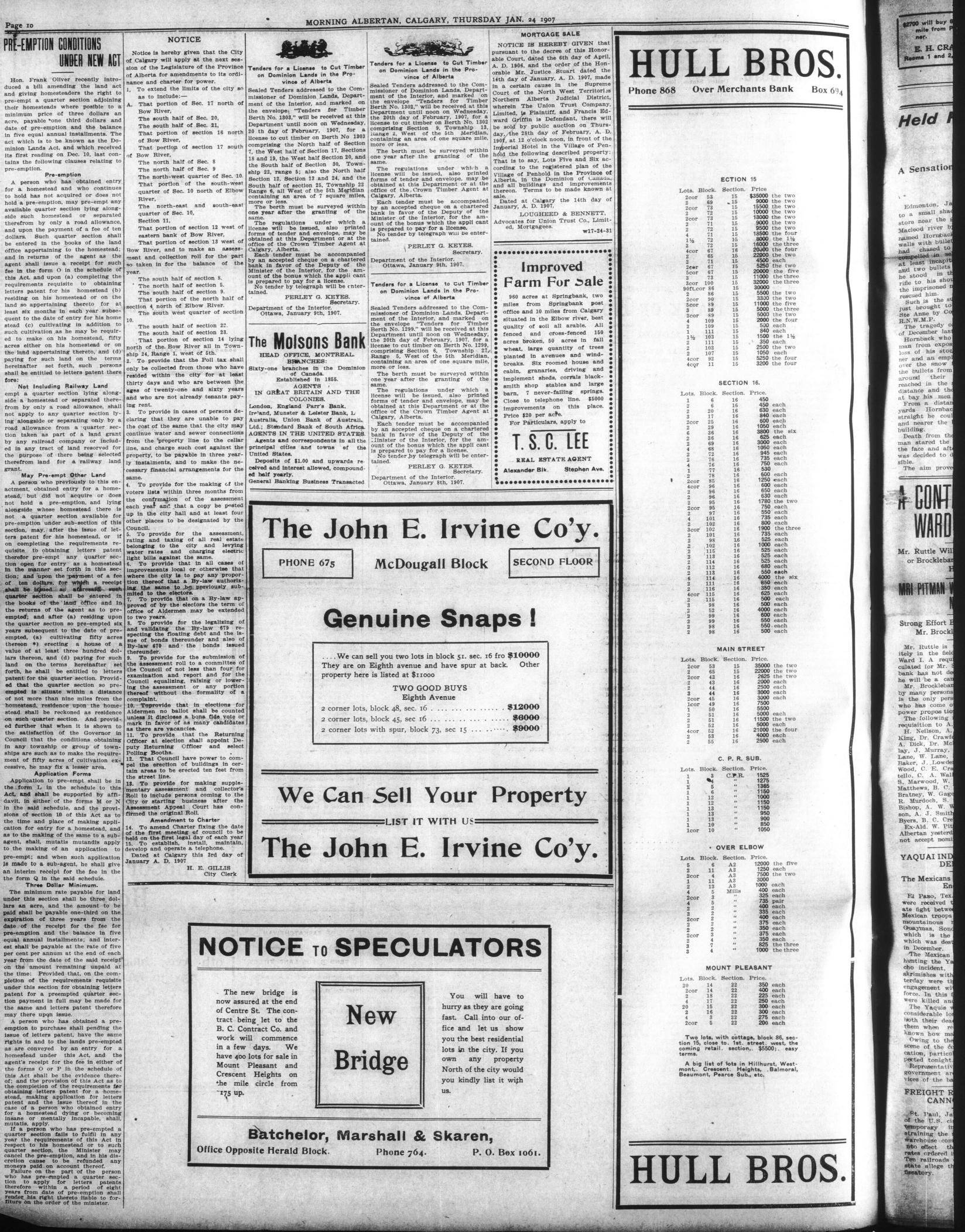
