THE TRANSIT TELESCOPED TENUS CURIOUSLY VIEWED FROM ALL PARTS OF THE GLOBE.

The Observations Not Satisfactory in Toronto-Nor in Canada Generally-Fav-orable Weather at Many Stations and Accurate Observations Taken.

 At Toronto no observations could be taken of any of the four contacts in the transit of Venus. At the observatory only one or two passing glimpses were got of the transit, and these of the shortest duration.
 The sun was completely enveloped at the time of the contacts of the planet, and Mr Carpmael was unable to ascertain any data as to the time of ingress and egress. The observations here consequently will count nil. At many of the other points the weather was more favorable and satisfac.

THE THIRD WERK DAY ANGLICAN MISSION MEETING.

Peter's Church the Scene of Operations-Some Practical Remarks by Cierical and Lay Gentlemen-To-Night's

The third week-night meeting in connec. ion with the Church of England temperance mission, was held in St Peter's church choolhouse last night. The attendance was not as large as at the previous meetings. Venerable Archdeacon Boddy occupied the chair. He stated in his introductory remarks that people did not think enough about the evils of intemperance. The first speaker was Rev J Cayley, who remarked speaker was Rev J Cayley, who remarked that intemperance was one of the greatest evils with which the church of England had to deal. He described several typical cases of intemperance to show the evils of the vice," and thought that if they could do away with liquor, they could also close two-thirds of their jails The remedy proposed for this evil is combination and organization. All the schemes of the church, such as missions, were conducted by organized bodies or, committees. The Church of England has created an organiza-tion for this purpose. As a temperance

the United States there are 70,000 persons who go to drunkards' graves every year. Rev. O. Aslachson told a number of in-teresting anecdotes connected with his career as a temperance worker. He had once thought it would be unmanly to sign a total abstinence pledge, but his views were different now. Mr. W. H. Howland, the last speaker, compared the movement to a rope, one half of which was held by the temperance peo-ble and the other by the liquor sellers. The partial abstainers held the middle of the rope. It was necessary that some should

He said that there were very few tamilies in Toronto who could stretch families in Toronto who could stretch out their hands and touch a relative or friend who did not exemplify the evils of intem-perance. on. OBSERVATIONS AT OTTAWA. A good deal of interest was manifested in the transit of Venus in astronomical circles to-day, and many observations were taken. At Nepean Point battery, Mr. Blake and Mr. Weber of the Toronto ob-servatory, were detailed to time two phases of the transit, the internal at ingress, and the internal at egress. The weather was cloudy up to 8.30 o'clock, local time, when with his wonted brilliancy, raising the hopes of those who were lamenting the condition of things. Old Sol, however, did not expose himself for any length of time, and before many minutes had passed was again hidden from view behind a skulking cloud. 
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
