The Ship is Almost Stranded. For weeks past it has been advertised that the Commercial Union would hold a grand demonstration on the 1st of July.

The day and the demonstration are now over, and what are the results? The following gentlemen spoke: Eugene Wiman, New York; Ben Butterworth, U. S. Congressman; Gen. Ward of Galveston, Texas; Jackson Wallace, New York lawyer.

The attendance at Dufferin Lake was under 2000 and much the larger half were ladies. Five hundred of the crowd was composed of boys and young men who got pretty full of beer and complained loudly about these things.

Commercial union failed to excite the gathering notwithstanding the most golden promises unfolded by Mr. Wiman in his beautiful oration. "Brothers (chickens) sold at \$2.50 a pair and better at \$1.50 a pound."

Now why was this grand demonstration left to four Yankee boys named, supported only by a retired Canadian politician (see Mr. Macdonald's speech)?

Where was Goldwin Smith? Where was Frances Fuller? Where was H. W. Darling? Where were the other lights of the movement?

Not a soul of them put in an appearance. The Yankees had to run the show themselves. Surely the Canadian contingent must feel ashamed of themselves in abandoning the ship in the way they have.

And a trust in sources of unlimited regret to the great Mr. Wiman to know that of all his Canadian friends only one could be found to go forth with him in his evangelistic mission, and that gentleman was the one who was the constant target of his early business career.

The great demonstration had turned out a great fiasco. The fakers have outdone themselves. The advance of free trade in general principles have for a long time continued to build a main argument of their own certain assumption, which is flatly contradicted by facts.

And what they assume runs somewhat as follows: Free trade is in harmony with political liberty, with progress, both moral and material, with enlightenment, and with the spirit of the age. It is destined to be the system of the future, while protection is clearly the system of the decayed past.

For now half a century, or say ever since the time when Cobden began to be a power in English politics, this has been a main plank in the free trade platform. Now, we make bold to affirm that it is not untrue merely, but that it is also in conspicuous contradiction to the facts of history. Let us put the case as briefly as possible.

It will be allowed that England leads the world in manufactures and commerce, to begin with. There she holds first place of all, while as regards enlightenment and progress generally she holds her place in the rank. If we look at what three nations are there that come nearest to her in manufactures and commerce? We get the answer at once—"France, Germany and the United States." It is upon the record that Cobden, before his great triumph came, gave this assurance to his admiring disciples: "That if England once adopted free trade, the rest of the world—the civilized world, as all nations would quickly follow her example. Over forty years have elapsed since this assurance was given; can free traders do point to even one indication of its fulfillment that is worth mentioning?"

Unhappy man, indeed. Nearly all along the border you have districts on either side of very similar character. These border districts are not natural allies in commerce and industry, but natural enemies.

The speaker points out that there is a quota, a tariff, a tax, on horses upon both sides of the line. Therefore, according to the Globe's argument, the removal of these duties would increase the price of horses all round, and the Americans would send their horses over here.

The Kingston Whig has hopes of commercial union "because Sir John is always ready enough to climb in with the majority." Evidently the Whig has a low estimate of the outwits of its own leaders.

BIG OREGON CAVES.

Just How Large They Are No One Knows, but They Are Said to be Wonderful.

For several months past there has been considerable interest in the two little known Cooper caves. Since the discovery of human bones in these caves last spring by some adventurous young men, several parties have visited them. Prompted by a desire to ascertain the truth regarding these caves, their exact location, characteristics, subterranean construction, etc., the Enterprise detailed a party, armed with torches, ropes, extension ladders, compass and scientific apparatus to prosecute a thorough search. The searching party started on Oakland last Sunday morning at 7 o'clock, and after a pleasant trip through the picturesque valley, a distance of four miles, a halt was ordered, the torches primed, water secured, etc. From this point to within 200 yards of the caves is a most beautiful though steeply ascending slope, which winds gracefully around the mountain side, with overhanging branches of green laurel, the tall, stately fir and shady oak. This lonely trail has been called Cooper's Caves.
