



No such action can be taken until the president returns from his vacation. It is expected that to-morrow gold shipments will amount to about half the amount which was previously bulletined. It is probable that not more than \$2,000,000 will be shipped. Some of the houses which were to have exported gold on Saturday have p ostponed their shipments until next week.
