TO ARBITRATE ON ISLAND LEASES

The Property Committee discuss the question of considerable length. Yesterday's meeting of the Property Committee lasted more than four hours.

Messrs. David Walker and John Wright of the Walker House appeared before the committee and requested that the present ground rental on their property of \$3500 per annum be temporarily reduced to \$1500.

Ald. Scott and Oliver opposed such a reduction, as it would also involve the principle of increasing rentals where property had had its value enhanced.

The chairman, Ald. Dunn, pointed out that the city really had no dealings with Mr. Walker, as he was a sub-lessee from Mr. James Smith.

On motion of Ald. Burns, the assessment commissioner was asked to report on the values of property in that locality, with a view to equitable readjustment.

Electric Lights for the Market. Citizens John Kelly and a number of market lease-holders appeared with a request that the market be lighted with electric lights.

Representations of Pedlars. A deputation of pedlars appeared before the committee to protest against Inspector Aude's action in summoning pedlars before the Magistrate.

Defective at the Cattle Markets. On representations that sheep and bullocks were being stolen from the western cattle market, it was decided to put on a detective to find out the thieves.

The matter of Island leases was under consideration for a considerable length of time at the last meeting of the council.

Ald. Oliver moved the re-adoption of the report. Ald. Frankland, in most decided language, declined to railroad through a scheme which would give a 21 year renewal to property growing more valuable all the time.

Ald. Joffille said that certain aldermen were interested in lots and Ald. Scott urged that he withdraw such a statement.

Ald. Scott, Oliver, Sheppard and Saunders wished the report sent on to the council unchanged.

Ald. Burns opposed the scheme of renewing any lot at a depth of 300 feet. He intimated that half the committee were acting in the interest of tenants, not the city.

Ald. Scott's motion to re-affirm the previous report was defeated.

Ald. Oliver moved that the previous sub-committee be dissolved and a new committee composed of Ald. Burns, Frankland, Joffille and Davies, be appointed to deal with the matter.

Ald. Burns and Frankland protested and said that though they might disagree with the conclusion reached by the sub-committee, they had not lost confidence in them.

Ald. Saunders and Ald. Oliver pointed out that the committee had worked out to its utmost and the tenants had said give us an arbitration, or a fair lease. They had tried to give them a fair lease and could do no more.

In connection with the arbitration motion to arbitrate with a view to getting a test case, Assistant Solicitor Drayton pointed out that they were already committed to arbitration in 15 cases, any one of which might prove a test case.

Ald. Scott thought that a motion removing all leases was too comprehensive, and asked that the depth of the lots on which renewals were to be refused, be stated.

Ald. Davies then changed the motion to specify the lots on which leases will not be renewed. The motion was defeated.

Ald. Davies then moved that to make a test case the renewals be delayed until an arbitration on Mr. J. T. Small's lease. The motion was withdrawn, as it is covered by a previous motion.

The original report was amended so as to delay the renewals on leases in dispute, and \$1000 was appropriated to cover expenses on arbitrations.
