Death is supposed to have been caused partly from heat, which at one time during the afternoon was very great; partly from having partaken freely of cherries, and afterwards drinking milk and cold water. An inquest was held before Dr. Robinson, coroner, and a verdict returned in accordance with facts.—Journal.
