## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

## ontario.

IT looks as if the fall season would close with only a very limited business in lumber. Stocks at the mills are still large and prices are such that mill men do not care to sell unless they have to. Of course so much money is locked up in stocks that many would rather sell at a sinall profit, if they can, than carry over, yet those who do not absolutely require the money for this winter's operations, think that by holding on they will realize so much better prices in the spring as to warrant them in holding. Any activity at present is only temporary, in view of the closing of navigation. In eastern Ontario there is little more activity than in the west. Dimension timber, which was fairly brisk in the early part of the season, has become dull. Thoug. there is a corsiderable falling off in the Ottava cut, large stocks will remain over. It is an unusual feature to have so much dullness at this season. Even a cut in price will hardly tempt buyers. Lath is a third lower than at this time last year. Shingles are a drug.
quabec and new brusswick.
Spruce orders seem to be plentiful in the east, and the principal mills have no dufficulty in getting $\$ 14$ to $\$ 14.50$ for dimension stuff. Cargo lots are not plentiful, but there are a few to go forward yet from Nova Scotia. There is, perhaps, an over supply of low grade lumber, but the better qualities sell readily. Laths seem to have taken a start, and the accumnlations of the summer are being worked off. While $\$ 2.15$ was considered a good pricea few days ago $\$ 2.25$ is nowasked, and even $\$ 2.50$ for December delivery. There seems to be a disposition in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to make less lumber for 1896 for the markets where competition is keenest. The decision of the Board of Appraisers in the dressed lumber case is baving the effect of transfering a preat deal of the dressing from the Canadian mills to the New England mills.
britisil columbia.
There is not very much activity here at present, though the outlook both at home and abroad is hopeful. Present activity in mining will result in a largely increased influx of people, which will give an impetus to business. Advices frem Sydney, Australia, are more favorable than for some time. There is more enquity for all lines in connection with the building tiade and a better demand for timber generally. Douglas fir is firm at $\mathcal{L} 5$ los
per 1,000 for assor ed lines. Shipments will only supply wamts. A reduction in duty in Australia on tin, texiz and over, to take effect Jan. 1 , will give an impetus to the shipment of timber, at the expense. perhaps, of smaller s:uf, butstll welcomed. The slangie trade for the year is practically over. The cunput is about the same as last year.

## inired states.

There are some strong enntrasts to note in the condtuon of trade this week. There is stagnation of movement in Northern pine from the mills, and the wholesale trade has not been quite so brisk, while the 'emand for ronsumption is enlaging. Agan, while northern white pine is depressed, southern yellow pine is active. There is a good demand for milroad material and car stock. This has existed since a large crop was assured, and is likely to continue. In the Saginaw Valley trade is quiet. At Buffalo and Tonawanda, trade in pine is looking up. In the east spruce sells readily on arrival and prices are firm. The supply of oak is scarce, and there is a strong demand at froL. $\$ 3$ to $\$ 5$ per thousand better than in the spring. Building is active in all the large cities, and the demand for lumber for this purpose is large. One reason for the low prices which have prevailed is that wholesalers, and retailers too, have not been inclined to buy freely, and im. portunate salesinen have sought to tenipt them by bargins. As trade improves prices will begin to stiffen. While there has not been the movement anticipated thic fall, the volume of business done this year is considerably larger than last year, and the prospect is good for a further in: crease. In hardwoods generally, the consumption is increasing. The Buffalo market is active and strong. Birch is in demand in the east, and is to some extent, taking the place of cherry. Mason \& Co., of New York, in their last circular, anticipate a brisk demand the coming winter for both mahogany and cedar. West coast shingles are in better demand in the west, and the supply is scarcely equal to the demand.

## foreign.

A strong upward tendency is shown in prices for lumber in the United Kingdom. This was shown at the last auction sale in London, at which, as foreshadowed in last weeks report, prices ruled strong. Pitch pine, which made the low avelage of 43 s 6 d in June and July, and has fluctuated greatly throughout the season, showed the most marked rise. Nearly every description of deals shared in the advance, which in some cases reached 205 a standard on the late summer sales. To low stock and the falling off in sup. ply is to be attributed the satisfactory state of the market. Spruce deals in third and fourth quality have also jumped up. A large sale of pitch pine from the docks is reported at 9756 d . Battens have also gone up. A sudden rise in fieights from the Baltic hats helped to run up the price of deals and sawed goods trom those parts, and the formation of ice at some of the ports indicate a cessation of shpments. The yards are all well supphed, but dock stocks are lower that last year, so that the firmness in prices is likely to continue. Timber rates from the St. Lawrence and New Brunswick remain at 48s 9d. In Scotland the yards are not well filled. The wood consuning indus-
tries are prosperous, and spruce and white wood are in demand for packing ceses. From timber ports generally throughout the United Kingdom a yood trade is reported, whth prices tending up ward. From Ausimian we 'earn that imports have been small, but a good volume ports have been small, but a good volume
of husmess ex sard has been done. The demand for lumber from Soulh Afries continues. Cape buyers have been in London making purchases. It is a trade, however, in which much caution has to be exercised.

## STOCKS AND PRICES.

The intercolonial Railway will require 340,000 ves for renewals this winter.
Mr. H. Hart has 15 men getting the pulp mill at Ellerhouse, N. S., ready for operation.
Mr. J. S. Fairley, of Bolestown, N. B., will get out about $4,000,000$ feel of logs this wintet, which is a litte more than last year.

A war in lumber rates is in progress at Brandon, Man., a combination which esisted for some time having been broken up.
Murney \& Co., Sarnia, Ont., aregetting out the timber for their new mill, which will be a single band mill and will cut 10,000 feet per day.
The coinpany that owns the water power at Sault Ste. Maric have also acquired that at Kakabeka Falls, and will erect large pulp nills there.
Messrs. Rourke, ot St. Martins, N. B., have 50 men in the woods and are making preparations for a larger cut than last jear.
Messrs. J. \& R. Richic, of Bathurst, N. B., are putting in a new turbine wecel and making other improvements which will inciease their capacity for next season.
W. H. Murray's mill at Marble Cove, N. B., finished culting $2,000,000$ feel of pine and will run on spruce logs untul the first of December, cutting English deals.
Messrs. Mason \& Co., of New York, announce their first anniversay salo of mahogany, cedar and other imported woods for the 14 th Nov. The next sale will take place on Dec. jth.
The Bronson \& Weston Co., Ottawa, have to shut down their saw mills at $;$ o'rlock p.m. instead of 6 o'clock on account of low water. To make up for this they start an hour earlier, so that their cut is about the same.
Messrs. Thos. Marks \& Co., of Port Arthur, Ont., will have about 60 men lumbering at Nepigon this winter. They are also in the wood pulp business, and recently loaded 4,800 cords of pulp wood inside of five days.
The Department of the Interior at Ottawa is asking for tenders for permission to cut imber on berth $K$, being a tract of land south of the C. P. R. beiween Darwin and Rennic stations, in the province of Manitoba.

The United States lumber firm of which Mr. A. A. Buell, of Ottawa, is the head, has sent up two gangs of seventy-five men each to the Kippewa limits, which the firm recently purchased from the Drvid Moore Lumber Co.
Messrs. Randolph \& Baker, of St. John, N. B., have let a contract for a cut of 3 , $\infty \times, \infty \infty$ fret of spruce and pine, to D. H. Keswick, and Gico. R. Burch will cut 2 , $\infty, 0 \infty$ for the same firm. The cut this year will be an average of not larger.
Mr. Wm. Rogers, of Bathurst, N. B., will again lumber on the Tabusimatac for Mr. J. B. Snowball, of Chatham. He has also a large contract for sleepers for Messrs. Suminer $\&$ Co., of Moncton, and has a gang of men at work in Red Pinc.
Messrs. Hale \& Booth have sold their comins: winter's cut of square umber to Messrs. J. Sharpiess \& Co., of Quebec. The zmount is expected to be 550,000 cubic feet, and the price is understeod to be about 40 cents per foot. The timber is to string 18 inches and to average 24 feet long. The larger proportion of the cut, $+\infty, 000$ fect, will come off the firm's limits on Serpent River, Ont., the other

150,000 feet being taken off their Michigan limits.
The saw mills at Fredericton, N. B., have cut more lumber this senson than last year. The Aberdeen and Victoria nulls will shut down soon, but Morrison's and R . $\Lambda$. Estey's mills will rum all winter. The cut this summer has been about as follows: Victoria (Hale \& Murchie), ten millions; Aberdeen (Donald Fraser \& Sons), six millions; R. A. Estey, four milhons long lumber and six millions miltons long lumber ind six miltions
shingles. The Phoenix mills cut shingles only. Their oupput was about thirty millions.
All hope has been practically abandoned among the lumbermen of St. Joinn, N. B., of being able to bring down the $2,000,000$ feet of lops which are scattered in the St. John river, from Bristol to the limits of the Fredericton Boom Company, as the rains have raised the water very little, and the prospects are that the river will frecze carly. The logs will probably come down with the ice next spritg. This means an extra expense of $\$ 1.50$ a thou. sand, as well as a loss of 20 per cent. of the logs.

## SALE OF LIMITS IN QUEBEC.

A special sale of Crown timber limits was held at Quebec on the 71 h Nov. 180 miles in various parts of the poovince were offered. Those in Gaspe, Lake St. John, and Rimouski districts brought the upset price, and most of the others a large advance, so much so that the total amount vance, so much so that the total amount
yielded by the sales was $\$ 7,300$, ne an yielded by the sales was $\$ 7,300$, nr an
average of $\$ 40$ a mile, though the highest average of $\$ 40$ a mile, though the hiphest
upset price was $\$ 25$ a mile. Limits in the Lower Ottawa district put up at $\$ 25$ per mile brought $\$ 110$ in Harrington township, paid by W. Stanitord, and $\$ 205$ in Wentworth, paid by Jos. Rogers. Theselimits are only $21 / 3$ and $31 / 3$ miles respectivelv. Campbell Bros., of Toronto, got the River Hedrwick limits in Rumouski, 53 miles in all, for $\$ 16$ per mile, the upset price, and paid $\$ 51$ per mile for $22 \frac{1}{4}$ miles on the Patapedta river, put up at \$iG. M. Yuild gave $\$ 75$ and $\$ 100$ respectively a mile for 10 and 14 miles at Troutbronk and Whitebronk in Bonaventure . and prices illustrate the rapid increase in the value of umber lands.     Shipments of lumber from Puget Sound to forcign points by steamers seem to have received an impetus this year. Never in the history of the lumber trade of the Pacific Northwest have so many steamers cleared with lumber as this year. While the majority of the steamer =learances have been for South Africa, a departure was made last month by steamer De Bay, which carried a cargo to Callao, Peru. There areso many tramp steamers in the Chinese waters out of a job at present that it would not be surprising if steimer charters would be quite frequent in the near future. What is lost in high freights, etc., is more than made up nigh freights, etc., is more than made up
    in quick despatch and excessive loading capacity. It is not out of the way to predict that in the near future the majority of the foreign shipments will be carried by steamers. Sailing vessels will, however, hold the coastwise trade.
