At the three celebrations there were 300 communicants, not including those who received privately and on Easter Tuesday. The offerings for the day, as will be seen from the statement above, were considerably in excess of last year.

Nevertheless, the financial statement of the Wardens, which was distributed before Easter, shows a deficit on the year's income. It was strongly felt at the Vestry meeting that an addition to the number of weekly envelope subscribers was necessary to bring the income up to the amount required for church expenses. It is only necessary to call attention to the matter, for there must be many who are under the impression that the Sunday offertory is sufficient for all needs. Let the Wardens know that you are willing to aid them in their responsibility by assuring them of a regular offering each week.

Mrs. Kenrick is sailing for England on the 26th inst. All our readers will wish her bon voyage! She will be accompanied by Mr. Kenrick, who has had no release from continuous work for over a year, and needs some rest. His place will be taken on four Sundays of his absence by the kindness of the Provost, Professors Jenks and Duckworth, and Mr. Hibbard. We wish him renewed health and strength for the autumn work.

EASTER VESTRY

The Easter Vestry meeting was held on Easter Monday evening, April 24th.

There were a resent the Rector and Messrs. L. S. McMurray, R. A. Baines, Wardens; C. R. W. Biggar, H. F. Wyatt, H. W. M. Murray, S. Bruce Harman, R. B. Street, J. E. Cameron, Garnet Vale, R. Renshaw, Fred. Allsop, Jos. Allsop, R. D. Bourne, H. L. M. Weller, G. F. Harman, Dr. Baines, J. Harry Smith, and R. A. Wilson.

After prayer by the Rector, Mr. Weller was appointed Secretary of the meeting. The minutes of the previous meeting having been read and confirmed, Mr. McMurray presented the Warden's report for the fiscal year ending 30th March. After discussion it was moved by Mr. McMurray, seconded by Mr. Biggar, and resolved that the report be adopted.

The Rector nominated as Rector's Warden for the ensuing year Mr. L. S. McMinray. It was then moved by Mr. Biggar, seconded by Mr. Bruce Harman, that Mr. R. A. Baines be the People's Warden for the year—which was unanimously carried.

Moved by Mr. McMurray, seconded by Mr. Renshaw, and resolved that Mr. Charles Heath be Vestry Clerk for the year. Moved by Mr. Weller, seconded by Mr. Baines, and resolved that Mr. Heath's honorarium for last year of \$25 be remitted to him, and continued for the year 1905.

Mr. McMurray nominated the following gentlemen as Sidesmen—H. W. M. Murray, Dr. Allen Baines, C. R. W. Biggar, J. E. Cameron, S. B. Harman, G. F. Harman, C. D. Heath, A. C. Bedford-Jones, F. B. Kenrick, G. de C. O'Grady, F. F. Payne, G. P. Reid, R. Rensfiaw, R. B. Street, Crosbie Street, Garnet Vale, H. L. M. Weller, R. A. Wilson, H. Winsor.

Moved by Mr. McMurray, seconded by Mr. Weller, and resolved that the above-named gentlemen be elected Sidesmen for the ensuing year and that the Rector have power to add to the number at his discretion.

Moved by Mr. Biggar, seconded by Mr. Wyatt, and resolved that Messrs. H. W. M. Murray, E. D. Armour and G. F. Harman, with the Rector and Wardens, be the Parochial Tribunal for the ensuing year.

The Rector reported the suggestion of several clergy and others to bring the question of a Canadian Church Hymn Book before the Synod, and their request for the concurrence of the Vestry. On motion it was decided not to favor the project.

Moved by Mr. Biggar, seconded by Mr. S. B. Harman, and resolved that the Vestry desire to welcome Mr. Kenrick as assistant minister of this Parish, and to express its appreciation of the work he has already done, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to Mr. Kenrick.

A vote of thanks to Mrs. Stewart Houston, was then moved and carried in the following terms:—

Moved by Mr. Bruce Harman, seconded by Dr. Allen Baines, that a special vote of thanks be tendered to Mrs. Stewart Houston and the ladies and gentlemen who assisted her for the successful series of musical services during Lent.

Copies of this resolution have since been sent to Mrs. Houston and to all who took part in the services.

Moved by Dr. Baines, seconded by Mr. Renshaw, and resolved that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Churchwardens, for their efficient and valuable services during the past year.

Moved by Mr. G. F. Harman, seconded by Mr. Wyatt, and resolved that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Mr. Heath for his valuable and faithful services for the past year.

Moved by Mr. H. F. Wyatt, seconded by Mr. Cameron, and resolved, that a vote of thanks is hereby given to Mr. Phillips and to the members of the choir for their valuable services during the past year.

Votes of thanks were also passed unanimously and heartily to the Woman's Auxiliary and S. Agatha's Guild, to the S.S. Teachers and Officers, to the Sanctuary Guild, to the Chairman and Sidesmen; and warm appreciation expressed of their valuable work, by which the efficiency of the church in the Parish is maintained and increased.

The business of the Vestry being ended, the Rector closed the meeting after a few words expressive of the general harmony and good feeling.

The election of Lay Representatives to the Synod then took place.

It was moved by Mr. Weller and seconded by Mr. McMurray that Messrs. C. R. W. Biggar, H.

W. M. Murray, and G. F. Harman be re-elected. There being no other nominations the Rector declared these gentlemen as being unanimously elected to represent the Parish. The meeting then adjourned.

THE CONFIRMATION

The day of the Confirmation was fixed for Tuesday, 2nd May, but as our own Bishop could not be with us, the Bishop of Ottawa most kindly came to confirm our candidates at St. George's, and with ours the young people from the Church of St. Mary Magdalene. Altogether there were fifty-four confirmed, of whom thirty-two were The church was filled by the candidates and their friends, and all were greatly impressed by the solemn service. It was in the month of May, just ten years ago, that the same dear Bishop confirmed our candidates, and therefore we were prepared to welcome him again. We were not disappointed and we can only feel thankful, in the absence of our own Bishop, that our young people had the privilege of listening, we doubt not, and taking heed to his earnest and helpful words. On the Sunday following, almost all who were confirmed received their first communion.
