THE FIRST SESSION of the BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE opened in Picton, by appointment of the GENERAL CONFERENCE, on Thursday morning, June 19th, 1884.

The Rev. ALBERT CARMAN, D.D., General Superintendent, occupied the chair. The 1st Psalm and part of the 1st chapter of St. John's Gospel were read. The 1st hymn was sung, after which prayer was offered by Rev. G. J. DINGMAN. The Rev. JOHN S. CLARKE was appointed Secretary *pro tem*.

It was moved by Rev. G. J. DINGMAN, seconded by W. H. SLOAN, and

*Resolved*,—That this Conference do now adjourn, to meet in the Methodist Church, East, in the town of Napanee, at two o'clock this afternoon.

The doxology was sung, after which the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Dr. CARMAN.

---

The Conference met, according to adjournment, at 2 o'clock p.m., in the Methodist Church, East, in Napanee—the Rev. Dr. CARMAN, General Superintendent, in the chair.

Two Scripture lessons were read, the 117th hymn was sung, and the Revs A. BROWNING and J. J. RICE led in prayer.

After an appropriate address by the General Superintendent the Minutes of the Morning Session were read.

Mr. GEORGE W. WEHR was appointed Assistant Secretary *pro tem*.

It was *Resolved*,—That the records of the Provisional District Meetings, subject to correction from the Annual Conference proceedings, be taken as forming the roll of this Conference.

The Districts were called over, and the members answered to their names as follows :

The Secretary nominated the Rev. J. J. RICE as Assistant Secretary, and the Rev. WM. H. EMSLEY as Journal Secretary, the Conference confirming the nominations.

On motion it was *Resolved*,—That a Nominating Committee be appointed, to consist of one minister and one layman from each Provisional District Meeting.

It was *Resolved*—That the Examiners shall meet the candidates and probationers for examination in Brighton at nine o'clock a.m. on the last Wednesday in April, 1885.

The full value of each paper represents 100 marks. The standard of qualification in the preliminary course shall not be lower than 50 per cent. From 30 to 50 marks secure a Third Class, from 50 to 75 a Second Class, and above 75 a First Class Certificate.

## REPORTS OF COMMITTEES, ADDRESSES, &c.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE ARRANGEMENTS.

We recommend that the Conference of 1885 be held in the town of Port Hope. That each delegate pay two dollars towards the expenses of entertaining the Conference. That the Secretary of the May District Meeting collect this amount from each delegate, and forward it, with the names of the delegates, to the Secretary of the Billeting Committee, stating who have paid. That the Billeting Committee provide a home for each delegate, either in private families or in hotels or boarding houses. That any delegate declining to pay the two dollars required shall be responsible for his own accommodation. That in case of a surplus arising it shall be handed over to the Contingent Fund Committee. That the ministers in charge where the Conference is held shall be the Billeting Committee. That the President of Conference, the Superintendent of the District, and the ministers of the town where the Conference is held, be a Committee to arrange for the public services of the Conference.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

#### MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

1st. This Society shall be known as the Auxiliary Missionary Society of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church.

2nd. The object of the Society is the support and enlargement of the mission work under the direction of the Methodist Church.

3rd. Every person paying annually the sum of four dollars and upwards, and every person collecting annually ten dollars and upwards for this Society, shall be deemed a member and entitled to a copy of the Annual Conference Report; and every person paying annually twenty-five dollars, or collecting for the Society thirty dollars or upwards, shall also be entitled to a copy of the General Report.

4th. That the Missionary Board shall consist of the Superintendents of Districts, with an equal number of laymen, as provided for in the Discipline.

5th. That each Superintendent of District shall be the Treasurer of all moneys for Mission purposes collected on his District.

6th. That each Superintendent of Circuit or Mission shall be the Treasurer of the branch Society of his own Circuit or Mission.

7th. The money raised on any Circuit or Mission shall be transmitted as soon as collected to the Superintendent of the District, deducting only what has been disbursed for necessary, incidental, and local expenses; and the District Superintendent shall in turn remit promptly to the General Treasurer. All moneys from the General Treasurer to a District shall also pass through the hands of the District Superintendent.

8th. The Superintendent of each Circuit or Mission shall prepare annually, not later than the first day of the Annual District Meeting, a list of all subscribers of two dollars and upwards, also the aggregate of all collections and sums under two dollars, such lists to be sent without delay to the Mission Rooms for insertion in the Annual Report, together with a statement of the gross receipts, local disbursements, and remittances.

9th. We recommend that the Annual Missionary Meetings in every locality be held during the autumn months where practicable, and the taking up of contributions be proceeded with immediately after.

10th. We suggest that those Districts which have failed to elect their lay members of the Missionary Committee be directed by Conference to elect such representatives by said Provisional Districts, to be called immediately for such election.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report that, in their opinion, the educational work of our Church is one of its most important schemes. We would therefore urge upon all our ministers the importance of bringing the question distinctly before our people once a year, according to Discipline, and in every legitimate way of awakening an interest in the subject.

We recommend that the President of Conference and the Superintendents of Districts be instructed to correspond with the General Superintendents and the Secretary of the Educational Society, to arrange at the Financial District Meetings for a combined effort to advance the income of the Educational Societies to at least \$2,400 for this Conference; and to hold, for that purpose, a series of meetings in each District, at such date as the Financial District Meetings may determine. Provided always, that such meetings be held in every case where practicable before the close of the present calendar year.

We have heard with great satisfaction the Report of the Board of Albert College. We expect from the College, with its present organization and equipment, very important aid in the great work of religious education. We commend it very earnestly to the confidence and support of our people. With its important adjunct, Alexandra College, it supplies a desideratum not otherwise provided for in our country, in which we hope to solve the question of co-education in the only possible form, *i.e.*, under the fostering care of the Church.

#### REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

---

Your Committee beg to report that in consequence of the imperfect returns at present available from the various bodies coming into the Union, the Report for the present year can only present an approximate idea of the state of the work. From the facts presented, however, your Committee are pleased to note the evidences of prosperity in all departments of our work.

The number of conversions reported through the year is very encouraging. The largely increased circulation of our Methodist literature throughout our schools is specially gratifying, and the hope is cherished that in all the schools of our united Methodism our own Church papers will more largely supplant the "other papers" now circulated in our schools.

Your Committee would respectfully recommend the formation of Juvenile Missionary Societies in connection with our schools, and that all our scholars be expected to contribute not less than one cent per month, that thereby the funds of the Missionary Society may be largely increased and a thoroughly missionary spirit be developed in our children.

We would also respectfully urge that during the present year increased attention and labour be given to our Sabbath-school work, and that care be taken to secure full and correct returns for the next Conference.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We cannot emphasize too strongly the oft-repeated sentiment of our common Methodism, that the traffic in strong drink is one of the most fruitful causes of all the misery and crime in our midst, and one of the most formidable hindrances to the extension of Christ's kingdom.

The attempt so long made to lessen the evils of the traffic by licensing it we regard as unsound in principle, and in practice utterly unsatisfactory. Regarding as we do the liquor traffic as a crime against God and humanity, we feel that nothing less than its total prohibition can satisfy us or meet the necessities of our country in this regard. We view the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 as the best available means for its legal suppression, and urge all our people to vote for it when it is submitted. We also think that all candidates for municipal or parliamentary offices should be thoroughly committed to total abstinence and prohibition principles, and that our people should be true to the great temperance cause in the exercise of the sacred right of the franchise. In this crisis of the temperance question let us, as a united Church, firmly adhere to the teachings and traditions of Methodism.

We regard the legislation permitting the separation of the sale of intoxicating liquors from all groceries and other stores as a step in the right direction, and would urge on all municipalities its immediate adoption. We also hail with great satisfaction the work of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and heartily wish them God-speed in their noble work.

We recommend that our ministers, as in times past, preach frequently and specially on the subject of Temperance; also that the provisions of our Discipline respecting the total abstinence from all intoxicating drinks of our members should be more strictly enforced, so that the great Methodist Church may ever be in reality what it is designed to be—a true Total Abstinence Society.

We deeply regret that fermented liquors are still used in some of our churches at the Lord's Table, and strongly recommend that in future only the unfermented fruit of the vine be used in that sacred ordinance.

We consider it a matter of immeasurable importance that the children and youth among us should receive all the careful training that it is possible to give them on this vital subject of Temperance. By means of Bands of Hope, Sabbath and day-school instruction through standard text-books, the circulation of our own excellent temperance literature, and, above all, making each home a true temperance society, we feel that, with God's blessing, a mighty army of thorough temperance men and women may be raised up, who will carry forward to final triumph the great and noble end we have in view.

We recommend to our people a greater liberality in aiding in the present struggle with the liquor traffic; also that the most fervent and united prayer be offered continually that our efforts may be crowned with complete success.

We recommend that the Financial District Meetings be instructed to elect a Temperance Secretary for their several Districts.



We further recommend that this Report be read by the minister at each appointment at as early a date as may be convenient.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Committee met in the East Methodist Church, Napanee, on Saturday, June 21st, at 3 p.m., and thenceforward by adjournment. The Rev. J. C. Ash was appointed Chairman, and Rev. W. Tomblin, Secretary.

After due consideration of the cases brought before them, the Committee made the following recommendations:—

##### BELLEVILLE DISTRICT.

*Sidney Circuit*.—Permission was asked by the Trustees of Case Church, through the Rev. George Leach, to sell their church property, the proceeds to be applied to the extinction of the debt on said property.

The Committee recommend that permission be granted.

##### COBOURG DISTRICT.

*Cobourg*.—The Trustees of the late Bible Christian Church in Cobourg, through Mr. Gilbard, ask permission to sell their church property, proceeds to be applied in accordance with the Discipline of the Methodist Church.

It was recommended that their request be granted.

*Port Hope*.—The Trustees of the late Bible Christian Parsonage in Port Hope request permission to sell said property, the proceeds to be applied according to Discipline.

It was recommended that permission be granted.

*Grafton*.—The Trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church, known as Mallory's Church, request leave to sell said church.

Their request was recommended.

*Smithfield*.—The Trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church in Smithfield, through the Rev. J. Kilgour, ask leave to sell their church site.

It was recommended that their request be granted.

*Campbellford*.—Application was made by the Rev. A. Browning and D. A. Crossley, in behalf of the Trustees of the late Methodist Episcopal Church and Parsonage, to be allowed to sell the said property and apply the proceeds according to Discipline.

Their request was recommended to be granted.

Application was also made by Rev. Messrs. Browning and Rice, in behalf of the Trustees of the late Bible Christian Church property in Campbellford, for leave to sell said property.

Their request was recommended to be granted.

2. No claim for Circuit supply shall be entertained unless such supply be seconded or consented to by the District Superintendent, and at a salary not to exceed that of a Probationer.

THIRD CLAIM.

Assistance to weak Circuits.

RESTRICTIONS.

3. No claim under two and three shall be entertained by the Committee without the recommendation of the fourth Quarterly Official Meeting and the Annual District Meeting.

4. Superintendents of Circuits or Missions shall be required to pay directly to the Financial Secretary all sums raised for this Fund.

SOURCE OF INCOME.

See Discipline, section 481.

COMMITTEE.

See Discipline, section 482.

REGULATIONS.

The Committee shall elect a Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer from among its members.

Two Auditors shall be appointed—one by the Committee, the other by the Conference.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a correct record of all business transacted by the Committee, and to sign all authorized orders on the Treasurer.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON A CONSTITUTION FOR THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

3rd. Your Committee recommend that the Rev. D. F. Gee be appointed Secretary-Treasurer of this Fund.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee recognize with thanksgiving to Almighty God the success which has crowned the efforts of our labourers during the past year in every phase of the work.

1. For the Holy Ghost who, according to promise, hath gone forth with His ministers, giving power to the word, not letting it return void, but accomplish the wonders of His most gracious designs. Our souls swell with gratitude at the divine condescension and fulfilment, "Lo, I am with you." On most of our Circuits and Missions during the year wonderful awakenings and glorious revivals have attended and crowned the preaching of Christ our blessed Saviour. We cannot but feel it to be but the divine acknowledgment and approbation of this our more perfect union of forces and consecration of powers in His service. Our people are rising to higher possessions of love and spiritual power. Duty and privilege are being better understood, and very many are pressing into the higher life. God is setting His seal upon our consecrated offerings. Holiness and meetings for its promotion are becoming the order of our Zion. The Captain of our salvation is evidently leading on His ranks to mightier conquests. The triumph of the divine kingdom is by the strength of love in us and its projection in all the activities of our life. We only want love divine in all its fulness to crown the entire Church and bring the world to Christ. The attraction of the Cross, acting upon our spiritual waters, shall raise higher and still higher tidal waves of gospel salvation, until the world shall be borne back to God. What must be the secret of our power? Consecration, *consecration*, CONSECRATION. This, our secret of power in the past, shall be our power in time to come.

2. We hail with joy the revival in our midst of evangelistic effort, which proved such a blessing to the early Church, but at the same time would warn ministers and people to guard against that very natural tendency to step aside and give up the work into the hands of strangers. The evangelist comes to help, not to supersede the powers that be. The evangelist must not be waited for in his coming to get up a revival, but must come to supplement a work already well begun. As for Praying Bands, under judicious direction they have certainly proved a blessing to many a weary labourer, and been blessed of God in their singing faith and prayer, to the bringing home of many wanderers, as well as in the stimulus and building up of believers.

3. We most heartily commend the submission of the Scott Act to the most early possible consideration of our Church and country in its each and several constituencies. An earnest stroke now will be more effectual than many by-and-bye. We hope we see in this Canada Temperance Act an advance guard of the mightier forces which, sure of victory, are pressing on not far behind, under the leading of the Captain of the world's salvation.

4. It is most gratifying to hear from our Missions, Home and Foreign, of the providential opening of gates; and we thank the Head of the

Church, who opened the gates, that He is calling and qualifying men of all colours and climes to enter them.

5. Of worship and the house of God. That in our new Church we should make something of a new departure in retaining these sanctuaries for holy purpose, the worship of God; and that our Trustee Boards be guarded in throwing open the doors of the house of God for entertainments of less sacred nature. And finally would we urge upon our ministers and people to aid in carrying out that seemliness so becoming in the house of God—(1) the being present at the opening exercises, thereby avoiding much unpleasantness from disturbance; and (2) that the whole congregation remain for the benediction, thereby securing that uninterrupted attention so essential to the worship of God.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE CENTENNIAL OF METHODISM.

---

[The Special Committee on the affairs of Belleville Tabernacle was associated with the Centennial Committee.]

Moved by Mr. Aylsworth, seconded by Rev. J. B. Clarkson,

1. That the Memorial Fund be applied to the relief of embarrassed Churches, and also to relieve Ministers who may be placed in circumstances of need, arising out of the union, in addition to the Superannuation Fund, as directed by the General Conference.

Moved by A. Campbell, seconded by George Leech, and

2. *Resolved*,—That the sum of \$25,000 be raised within the bounds of the Bay of Quinte Conference during the present Conference year—one half payable during the year, and the remaining moiety the year following.

3. Whereas, the General Conference has recommended that a Convention, in the interests of the above funds, be held on the St. Lawrence Central Camp-ground, in the month of August, in connection with the Centennial celebration, this Conference respectfully urge upon the ministry and laity of the Church the propriety and necessity of sustaining the above Convention by their influence and presence, especially as these grounds are under the direction of our Church and within our own territory.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee, in the first place, recognizes with deep gratitude and delight the wholesome legal restrictions placed upon private enterprises, avocations, amusements, and all violations of the sacredness of the Sabbath, as we regard these restrictions as all-important with respect to the general morality of the country.

Your Committee recommends that this Conference engage in concerted action with other Conferences, Synods, and Assemblies of clergymen and laymen in memorializing our Governments to extend the same legal restrictions imposed upon private individuals to all companies, whether operating upon the water or on land, especially in reference to railroads, canals, shipping, unloading vessels, opening public gardens, museums, etc.

What your Committee particularly recommends is that pressure be brought to bear upon the Government of the Dominion and of Ontario, showing the immense advantage of framing such a Sabbath observance law as shall confine all public companies, railroads, institutions, etc., exclusively to works of necessity on the Lord's-day.

Your Committee would also urge upon the Conference the more uniform observance of the General Conference law which makes it obligatory upon every minister to preach definitely upon the subject of the scriptural observance of the Sabbath-day; and your Committee would suggest that in each discourse there would be some notice taken of the too common practice of Sunday visiting for the mere purpose of social amusement.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE BAY OF QUINTE  
CONFERENCE :

DEAR BRETHERN.—We, your pastors and fellow-labourers in Conference assembled, deem it a fitting opportunity to address to you some words of brotherly greeting and exhortation. "Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

First, we "give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers, remembering without ceasing your work of faith and labour of love." It is most fitting that we offer thanksgiving to Almighty God for the abundant blessings of His grace during the Conference year now closed, and for the exceeding riches of His grace provided and promised for the future. We exhort you to unite with us in joyful thanksgiving for the multiplied blessings, civil, social, educational and material, which we share as citizens of this favoured Christian country; for the continued life, health and prosperous reign of Her Majesty the Queen; for the large opportunities we enjoy for Christian labour, sacrifice and achievement; for the continued triumphs of Christianity in our country and in all lands; for the unimpaired power and adaptation of Methodism to still achieve its mission of "spreading scriptural holiness over these lands;" for the prevalence of powerful revivals in our churches; and lastly and especially for the Providential leadings which have resulted in the happy consummation of the union of the four Methodist bodies of our country. It is also a matter of special thanksgiving that, amid all the inconveniences, as well as the joys, of union, so much of kindly forbearance and goodwill has been manifested.

Now, we beseech you, brethren, suffer the word of exhortation :

1. Our first duty in present circumstances, as in all circumstances, is full and joyful consecration to duty and to God. There are many and supreme reasons why the happy inauguration of Methodist union should be followed by a universal revival of the experience of holiness from ocean to ocean. We do well to remember that Methodism was meant to be an organized revival, and its mission, in the words of its founder, is to "spread scriptural holiness over these lands."

2. As zeal without knowledge is of little avail, we exhort our people to provide themselves with our excellent books and periodicals. Our Book Room and Publishing House in Toronto offer books of untold value, which should be in all our families and read by all our people, young and old. The *Methodist Magazine* and the

*Christian Guardian* should be introduced into every household as a means of grace, entertainment, instruction and Christian culture.

3. In this same direction of Christian culture we cannot too earnestly advise our people to patronize our Church schools, two of which are found within the bounds of our own Conference. Victoria University continues to furnish the highest culture to undergraduates under the most favourable Christian influences. We are happy to be able to say that the consolidation of Victoria and the University of Albert College has been most auspiciously accomplished. According to the terms of the consolidation, as formulated in the United General Conference, Albert College, the educating body, remains in Belleville as an academic institution of high grade. We confidently recommend Albert College to our people for matriculation work, commercial college training, musical education for both sexes, full courses in Alexandra Ladies' College, and partial, special and elective courses for non-matriculated students generally, including young preachers who are preparing for Conference examinations. Our people, perhaps, need not to be reminded that Albert College has a special claim on their patronage, being the property of the General Conference, and under the exclusive control of the Church.

4. Our happy union of competing Churches, while saving expense in some directions, does not exempt us from the duty of liberal contributions for our connexional enterprises. We can scarcely exaggerate the importance of prayerful, generous and *systematic* giving for our Mission work, our educational institutions, and our benevolent enterprises generally.

5. We advise our beloved people to be ready for every good work, and to avail themselves of every Providential opening. Avoiding as alike mischievous the two extremes of formalism on the one hand and fanaticism on the other, our laymen will, we hope, emulate the example of some of their brethren by forming "Praying Bands" under the advice and direction of the pastors, and engaging in the great work of soul-saving as opportunity is presented. To the same end we exhort our people to engage heartily in our class and prayer meetings, Sunday school, protracted meetings, camp meetings, Sunday school parliament, and every other good work that contemplates the saving of souls and the edification of the Church. We would exhort you also, dear brethren, to neglect no opportunity to advance the great moral reforms of the day, among which we count the present temperance movement as chief, which has for its object the total suppression of the traffic in intoxicating drinks.

6. We remind you, beloved brethren, of the need of "faith, hope and charity" in bearing the temporary inconveniences, burdens and frictions incident to the first practical working of our newly organized Church. While we would not disguise our joy and gratitude for the brotherly kindness thus far manifested, we must not forget

that it will require much grace and wisdom to complete what has been so successfully begun. To this end let united prayer be offered for the spirit of grace, of wisdom, and of a sound mind.

Finally, brethren, "the Lord of peace Himself give you peace always by all means. The Lord be with you all." Amen.
