



# TURKISH SHELLS FALL NEAR KING

Nicholas of Montenegro and Numbers of Russian Royalty Under Fire—Montenegrins Rout Turks.

RIEKA, Nov. 18.—(Can. Press).—King Nicholas, accompanied by his son-in-law, the Russian grand duke, Peter Nikolaievitch, and the grand duchess, embarked Friday on a lake steamer to view the operations in front of Scutari. The steamer immediately became a target for Turkish shells, which fell unpleasantly close to the boat.

His majesty, on the steamer, followed the work of the Montenegro centre column on the plain before Scutari. At noon a heavy bombardment opened on all sides. Montenegrins several times struck the highest point of Mount Tarabosch, dense clouds of smoke arising.

At 3 o'clock in the afternoon a Turkish battery occupying an exceedingly strong position at Golez was silenced. The Turks evacuated the position amid the cheers of the Montenegrins. Subsequently shells struck a magazine in the town and flames were seen to shoot up. After this successful bombardment, fourteen battalions of infantry crossed the Karl River to the northeast, and joining hands with the troops on that side, made a united assault on the Turkish positions to the east of the town, driving the enemy out.

Heroic Defence Futile. Meanwhile a division, under command of General Martinovich, had great success on the opposite side of the Boyana River, in the direction of San Giovanni di Medua. The division encountered three thousand Turks, who occupied the slopes of Mount Barabusch, overlooking the Drin River. A severe engagement ensued, lasting all afternoon. The Turks defended the position heroically, but were unable to withstand the stronger Montenegrin artillery fire and gradually withdrew. The Montenegrins followed this up by attacking the whole front and driving the Turks in headlong flight towards Alessio. The enemy left many dead and wounded on the battlefield. The Montenegrin losses also were heavy.

# EAGER TO HEAR NAVAL PROGRAM

Intense Public Interest in the House Opening on Thursday—Seating Capacity Overtaxed.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—(Special).—There was no cabinet session on Saturday. The entire cabinet took a day off and Premier Borden, Hon. W. T. White, Hon. T. W. Crothers and Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes went out to Lansdowne Park and watched old McGill defeat Varsity for intercollegiate honors.

Practically everything is in readiness for the opening on Thursday next. "The cards are stacked for what I believe will be a great session," was the way one of the ministers summed up the situation today. Not very often in the past has such interest been awakened on Parliament Hill in an approaching session. "Standing room only" signs are hung around the corridors of the house of commons, every available seat being taken for the opening day.

Enquiries as to the probable date of Premier Borden's announcement of his naval proposal are pouring in from all parts of the country, and it is being predicted that when the prime minister rises to make his much anticipated naval speech he will have the biggest and most representative audience that has ever greeted any speaker in a Canadian Parliament.

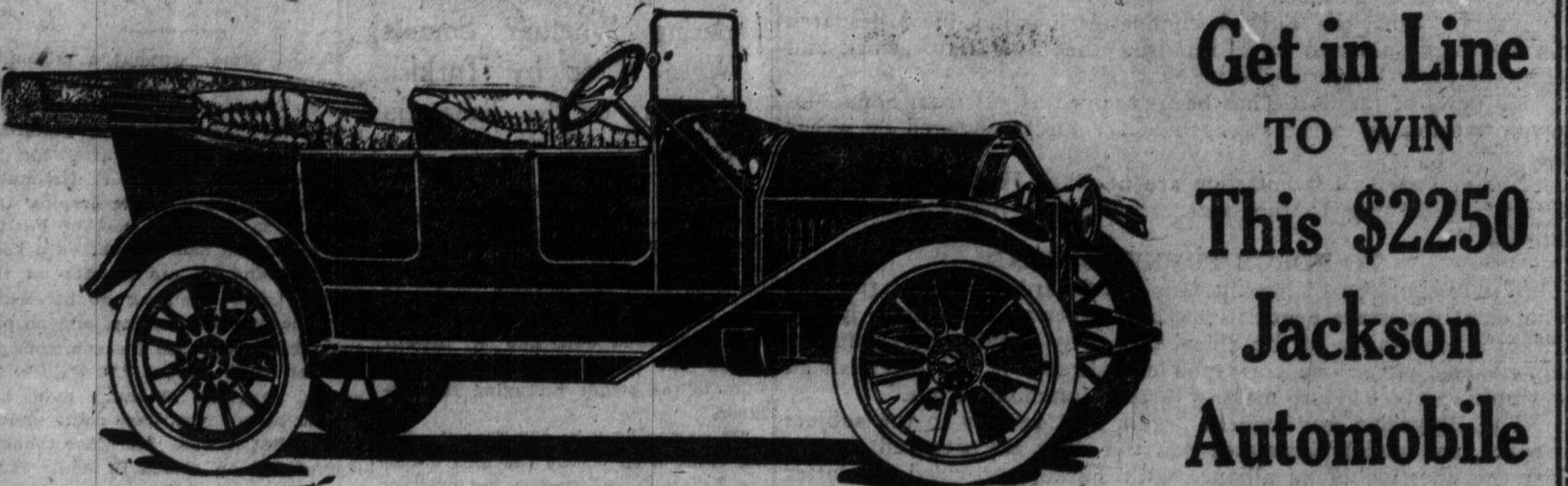

THE HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF DYING BOYS

Postal Cards Written to Buffalo Police Lead to Discovery of Remains of Child Who Disappeared a Year Ago—Had Mania for Killing Children.

BUFFALO, Nov. 16.—(Can. Press.)—Confession of at least three murders and admission that there are still more, is the startling disclosure contained in postal cards from a modern "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," in the person of the murderer of a 9-year-old Joseph Joseph, received by the police and made public here tonight.

The murderer of the Joseph boy, whose entire body in decomposed fragments was found today in a cesspool near his home in Lackawanna, after a search of over a year, is believed by the police to be out of a long series of similar crimes committed through the country by the man who, according to his own confessions, has an irresistible mania for killing boys.

Young Josephs disappeared about 4 o'clock on the afternoon of Oct. 12, 1911. His father, George Joseph, prominent merchant of Lackawanna, insisted from the start, that the boy had been kidnaped and a country-wide search was instituted.

The case at the time attracted widespread attention, as the father from time to time received anonymous letters warning him to discontinue the search on pain of having his son murdered.

Another card, dated Boston, Mass., Nov. 9, 1912, and written apparently by the same person, and also unsigned, states that the murderer lately had too much money, that he was a prominent fraternity man of a high degree, "honored and respected."

The first postcard received was postmarked Boston, Oct. 17, 1912. It was addressed to Supt. Michael Regan of the Buffalo police department.

CHOLERA AND DYSENTERY TERRIBLE BRIDGES

Thousand Cases of Disease Reported Daily and Utter Neglect of the Afflicted Is Shown—Demoralized Army Takes No Precautions Against Spying.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 16.—(Can. Press.)—(By indirect route)—There are now about a thousand cases of cholera daily in and around Constantinople, and the death rate has reached 90 per cent. The authorities are powerless to cope with the situation.

On Thursday last 3000 cholera patients arrived by train at San Stefano. They would have been brought here but for the protests of the railway company and the Austrian ambassador, who asked that they be sent to the Lazarets of the Bosphorus.

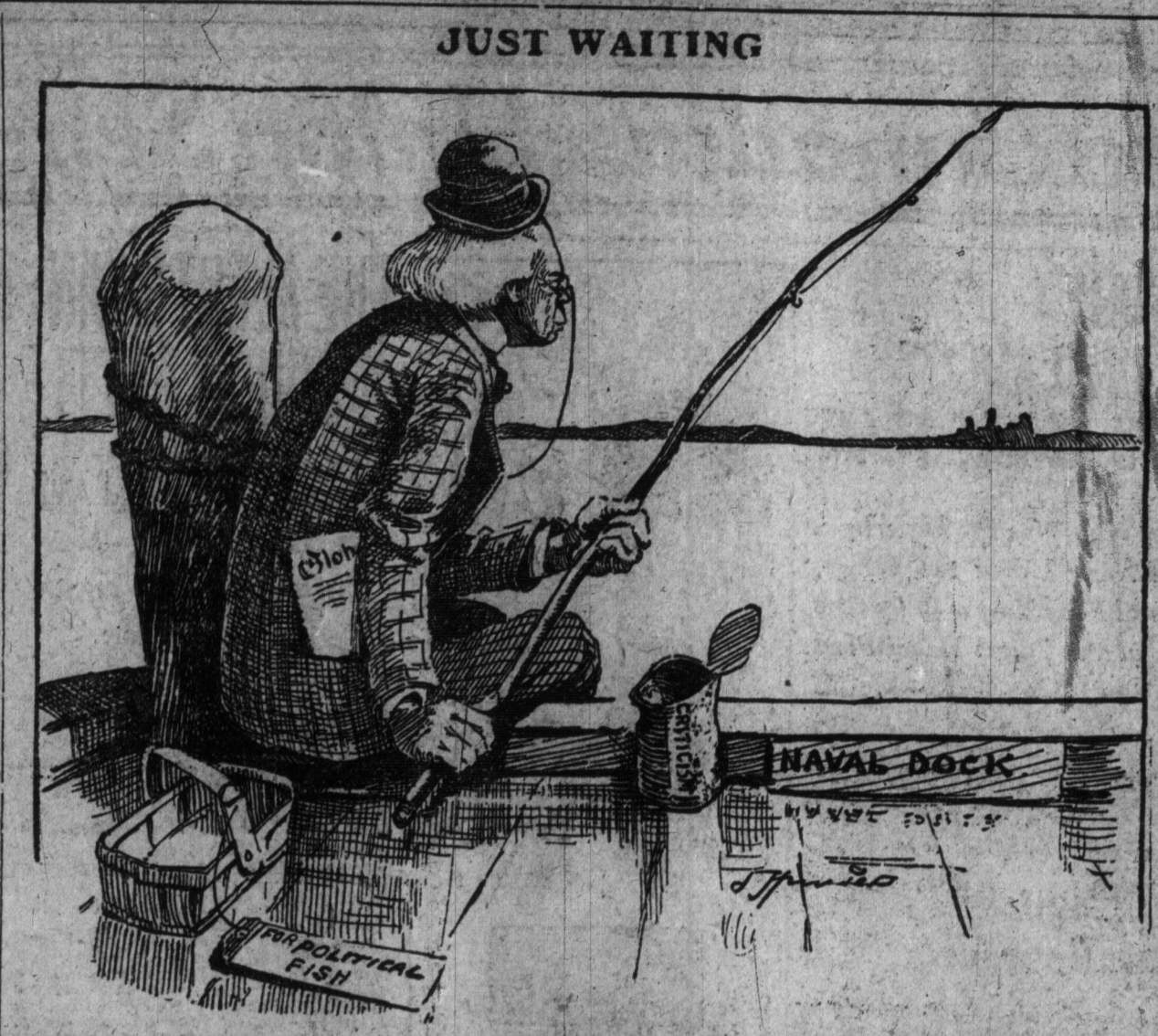
For 22 hours the patients remained in the train on a siding at San Stefano without water, food or any medical attention. Then they were shipped to the quarantine station.

Discipline Utterly Lacking.—An outbreak of cholera is behind the Turkish lines at Thessalonika, the indifference of the army to the presence of unauthorized visitors, any foreigner wearing a hat, any European hat may hire a vehicle and the most part of the Turkish army is in the mud for an hour, generally and the authorities are utterly demoralized.

Several foreign officers who visited the lines on Thursday and Friday reported that the situation was very dangerous. The troops are only partly dug. A huge pile of bodies was stacked near the front line.
