SEVENTEENTH YEAR

TO PAY THE LITTLE BILLS

LIBERAL LEADERS IN CAUCUS AT OTTAWA

Arranging a very necessary matter in connection with the coming federal election—Will they get \$100,000 in one chunk?—Dr. Montague's return—Capital topics.

Ottawa, April 17.—(Special).—There was a great caucus of Grit leaders here to-day to talk over the plan of campaign for the coming elections, and to arrange for getting in the necessary staff. Among the chief speakers were Hon. J. M. Gibson, Charles Hyman of London, S. H. James of Toronto and Thomas Mackey of Pembroke, who is to be the speaker's opponent, and who is likely to contribute it. It is said that the special object of Mr. Gibson's visit has to do with the retirement of both Messrs. Mowat and Ross from the Provincial Government, so that they can take a hand in the federal fight and lend prestige to Mr. Laurier's discredited cause. Col. Gibson, however, denied the report of Sir Oliver's retirement from the Provincial Premiership.

Safety of Railway Employees. Mr. Casey's bill to require railway companies to make provision for the protection of their employees was killed by the House to-day. The bill was introduced by Mr. Casey, and was supported by Mr. Tupper. The bill was defeated by a vote of 18 to 12.

A return brought down to-day contains an order of the Council of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which went into effect on the 1st of June. The order provides for the payment of \$100,000 to the company for the use of the railway for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the order.

Personal and General. The statement of the unclaimed balances in the banks was brought down to-day. It shows that the total amount of unclaimed balances is \$2,408,448. This is a decrease of \$100,000 from the previous year.

A BATCH OF WELL-KNOWN RIDERS TURN PROFESSIONALS.

The initial C. W. A. Dominion Racing Board's bulletin was given out yesterday by Chairman Orr, and is as follows: In answer to the question concerning the section of the Amateur definition, the board has decided to announce the following as their interpretation of this clause: "If you are employed or concerned in any manner whatsoever as agent, clerk, or place where bicycles are sold or handled, and wish to ride on the track in amateur races you must ride some make of wheel other than the one sold or handled in the business you represent or are engaged in."

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THE SAILING SEASON.

Royal Canadian Yacht Club Making Preparations—About the Queen's Cup.

A large number of applications for membership in the R.C.Y.C. have been received, and it is expected that the numerical strength of the club membership in 1896 will be considerably in excess of that of last year.

Notice of motion has been given proposing the formation of a bicycle club within the R.C.Y.C. and at a large number of present and prospective members are enthusiastic bicyclists, the movement will not doubt be favorably considered. It is also proposed that resident members shall be admitted to the club up to July 1 without payment of an entrance fee. Both these motions will be voted upon at the annual meeting of the club, which will be held at Stratford on Saturday, April 25, at 8 o'clock p.m.

The total membership of the club is now 555. Last year's receipts were \$2034 and the expenditure \$259 less. The assets are placed at \$28,000 and the liabilities \$14,155. 

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

THE BREEDERS' PROTEST.

DOMINION CATTLE MEN ARE ON THEIR METTLE.

Canadian Breeds and Herds Have Not... The annual meeting of the Dominion Cattle Breeders' Association was held yesterday in Shattlesbury Hall.

Prof. James Mills of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, read a paper on the purpose and work of the association.

Prof. Mills regarded the idea that there be an annual exhibition of beef and dairy stock as a good one.

Prof. Mills moved a vote of thanks to the Lieutenant-Governor for his presence and remarks, eulogizing the general interest he took in all affairs pertaining to the welfare of the province.

Police Interrupted a Process of Skeleton Manufacture at Hudson.

Poughkeepsie, April 17.—An overpowering odor that came from a building in the village of Hudson, led the police to make an investigation yesterday.

Transportation of Live Stock. This was the subject of an able and interesting paper prepared by Mr. A. Johnston of Greenwood and read by Mr. Robert Miller of Wingham.

That while this association desire to express their appreciation of the courtesy of the authorities of the two great railroad companies in according to the request of the breeders and other interested parties to return to the old estimated weights for animals shipped over their roads, we are convinced that an estimated weight of 2000 lbs for a bull between the ages of 1 and 2 years is excessive.

Strong Protest. A discussion of the present quarantine regulations led by Mr. Hobson resulted in this resolution moved by Mr. Johnston, being carried: "That this association wish to enter their earnest protest against the publication to the world by the authorities of Great Britain that pleuro-pneumonia exists among cattle in this country, which statement is without proper investigation of the facts in this country, although our Government have recently offered to bear the expenses of a full investigation of the matter, while we know that the said disease does not exist and that it never did exist in this country."

Sheep and Swine Interests. Mr. D. G. Hamner of Mount Vernon read a paper on the present quarantine regulations and Railroad Rates Affect the Sheep and Swine Interests.

Referring to the question of quarantine, Mr. Hamner saw no reason why it should be maintained, as it causes vexatious delay in the exportation of live stock, and there is no reason why it should not be allowed to pass to its destination.

Representative, G. E. Day, B.S.A., Guelph. These vice-presidents for the provinces were elected at Quebec, H. D. Smith, Compton; Manitoba, John East-smith, Brandon; N.W.T. and British Columbia, G. G. Guelph, Winnipeg; Nova Scotia, Col. Blair, Government Experimental Farm, New Brunswick; Prince Edward Island, F. E. Island, F. G. Bovier, Georgetown.

Minister's Speech. The election of officers had barely concluded when His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick arrived. He was introduced by the chairman to the meeting, and opened a good address with a few witty remarks regarding his limited knowledge of live stock. He could not, he said, but feel a great interest in the Dominion Cattle Breeders' Association. He had been greatly struck by the recent large increase in the export of Canadian cattle, and had risen from five or six millions to about thirty-two million dollars per year. Of all the exports it heads the list. His Honor also remarked with pleasure at the enormous increase in the production of cheese and the handsome returns that were being received. It is gratifying, said he, to Canada to know that they are sending 50 per cent of the cheese which is imported into Great Britain. The improved system of manufacture was undoubtedly accountable for this. There is no reason why a great deal more ham and bacon should not be shipped to Great Britain, as Canada's contributions in that respect to-day are only an insignificant item in the great quantity that is yearly imported into that country. Then, regarding butter, Australia sends 10 times more than Canada to the Old Country. His Honor did not see the reason why in England the estimate for each cow was 400 gallons of milk per annum, while in Canada it is only 200, while in Canada to know that efforts were being put forth by the Minister of Agriculture to improve this state of affairs. He thought that farmers who had good herds and fed their cattle well should

have good milk 10 months in the year, and his hopes the Dominion Cattle Breeders' Association would do a great deal toward showing farmers how to increase the returns from their cows. His Honor looked upon the restrictions on our cattle for export as a good thing for Canadian farmers, if it would compel them to fatten their stock on the farm instead of shipping them away as stockers. His Honor concluded with a hope that the association would be even more successful than in the past and that their meetings would tend to further prosper the interests of the agriculturists throughout the country.

STEWING A HUMAN BODY.

Police Interrupted a Process of Skeleton Manufacture at Hudson.

Poughkeepsie, April 17.—An overpowering odor that came from a building in the village of Hudson, led the police to make an investigation yesterday.

The men at work about the place denied that anything unusual was going on, but Sergt. Cruise found steam turned on in a barrel through a pipe which came from a boiler. In the barrel covered by a carpet was the skeleton of a man, with the flesh still clinging to some of the bones.

One of the men then said that the skeleton was given to him to steam by a chemist in the drug store and that it came from the dissecting-room of the Albany Medical College.

The students afterwards appeared and admitted that he was part owner of the subject. Coroner Lisk and a jury will look into the matter.
