DEATH DUTIES COUNT

British Revenue Greatly Augmented by Them.

AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Shows a Flourishing State of Affairs in Imperial Finances.

Nearly £50,000,000 Received by the Exchequer in Six Months—Net Increase Over Two Millions—The Expected Crisis as Athens Did Not Eventuate—Ottawa Despatch to the London Times Says a Pro-British Tariff in Canada Will Follow the Expiration of the German Treaties—General News by Cable.

London, Sept. 30.—According to an official statement issued to-day, Great Britain's revenue for the six months just ended was £49,307,448. This is a net increase of £2,033,345 upon the revenue for the corresponding period of last year. Of the grand total, £7,634,982 was derived from death duties.

SITUATION AT ATHENS.

The Expected Crisis Averted by the Generalship of the Premier.

London, Oct. 1.—The Athens correspondent of The Times says: Mr. Ralli, who presiding to the Chamber the preliminary treaty of peace, took strong exception to its terms, and attributed to Germany all that had been done against Greece.

He declared that he would not sign a resolution approving the treaty, because it was execratory and, therefore, did not require approval, and also because such a step would be contrary to the sovereign rights of the state and the crown.

M. Delanyannis expressed his approval of the position, but blamed the Government for again asking a vote of confidence, as this had already been accorded. Therefore, presuming that the Government was acted by other reasons, M. Delanyannis said that he would withhold his support. The vote was then taken.

THE WAR IS OVER

As Far as Monarchs are Concerned, But There is Trouble Yet Elsewhere.

Simla, Sept. 30.—The campaign against the Monarchs has been successfully prosecuted, and nothing now remains but to collect the fines. The Upper Monarchs have been severely punished and the Lower Monarchs, by the success of the British troops, are accepting the terms of the British commanders.

Raiders are looting in the vicinity of Haug. A force of insurgent tribesmen attacked Sudda yesterday, but were easily repulsed. All the English women have been removed to places of safety in the Kurram Valley.

NOW RUSSIA BOBS UP.

Her Designs With Afghanistan Have Failed and She is Back About It.

Paris, Sept. 30.—A despatch to the Politique Coloniale from St. Petersburg says the Afghan mission to Russia has departed, bearing the promise of Russian support in the event of Great Britain's encroaching upon the Amur's territory. The despatch says negotiations between Russia and Afghanistan have with the object of establishing a league to oppose the British advance in Africa, and it is admitted that Russia aims to reach an understanding with the United States, with the view of arresting the extension of the British Empire in the Pacific.

A NEW COMBINATION

Newspaper to be Started at Moscow to Boon Anglo-Russian Trade.

London, Oct. 1.—The correspondent of The Times at St. Petersburg says: A new Anglo-Russian newspaper, printed in the Russian language, is about to be published at Moscow, as part of the scheme of promotion of commercial relations between England and Russia. The paper will also serve as the organ of the Imperial Russian Agricultural Society of Moscow, which will use its influence to increase the sale of Russian and English manufactures, especially machinery and agricultural implements.

A PRO-BRITISH TARIFF

To be Adopted by Canada & the German Treaties Go Out of Force.

London, Sept. 30.—The Times' Ottawa correspondent says, on the highest authority, that after the expiration in July, 1897, of the commercial treaties now in force, Canada will adopt a tariff that will be essentially pro-British.

Are Careful for Tuberculosis.

Berlin, Sept. 30.—Prof. Landner of Stuttgart, who has been experimenting for years in the treatment of tuberculosis, has treated 400 patients with a soluble salt of cinchona. He believes that almost all the patients so treated have been permanently cured.

Count Okuma Was a Head In.

London, Sept. 30.—The Manchester Guardian says that Count Okuma, the Japanese Foreign Minister, is likely to represent Japan in the Behring Sea Conference at Washington, not on account of the exceptional importance of the Behring Sea controversy, but because of other important matters between Japan and the United States, in the settlement of which he is doing a great deal of assisting. Among the questions in

the settlement of which he wishes to take part are those of immigration, the duty tariff and the Hawaiian dispute.

Great Falling Off Due to the Strike.—Glasgow, Sept. 30.—The Clyde Shipbuilding returns for August show that only 10 vessels, aggregating 8000 tons, were launched as against an average of 25 vessels, with an average tonnage of 45,000. The falling off is due to the dispute between the employers and the engineers, resulting in the strike of the latter.

British Subjects Want Relief.

Brussels, Sept. 30.—At a meeting held last night by British subjects to protest against the new Belgian law compelling foreigners to serve in the civil guard, resolutions were passed requesting the British Government to take steps to relieve British subjects in Belgium from liability to serve in either military or auxiliary service under any other than the British sovereign.

Italy's New Warship.

Rome, Sept. 29.—The new cruiser Emanuele Filiberto was launched at Castellone on the Bay of Naples to-day, amid the greatest enthusiasm on the part of an immense gathering. The launching took place in the presence of the Prince and Princess of Naples, Admiral Brin, Minister of Marine, and a large party of prominent persons, including a number of officers of the Italian navy. The new ship has a tonnage of 9750, is 365 feet long and 79 feet wide. She will be fitted with an exceptionally powerful armament.

Can Save His Soul Yet.

Vienna, Sept. 30.—The Pope, on the intercession of Cardinal Gruscha, Archbishop of Vienna, has telegraphed to Prime Minister Baden giving him authority for having fought a duel with Dr. Witzler, the leader of the German Nationalists in the Reichsrath, in which Count Baden was wounded in the arm.

Bank of England Statement.

London, Sept. 30.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes, as compared with the previous account: Total reserves, decreased £1,331,000; Circulation, increased £1,061,000; bullion, decreased £270,387; Other securities, increased £318,000; public deposits, decreased £371,000; notes reserve, decreased £1,290,000; Government securities unchanged. The proportion of the Bank of England reserve to liability, which last week was 50.10 per cent, is now 48.37 per cent. The Bank of England's rate of discount remains unchanged at 2 1/2 per cent.

THE BRIDE CAME NOT.

Her Father Heard of the Proposed Wedding and Took His Daughter Back to Her Canadian Home.

Holyoke, Mass., Sept. 30.—Miss Delina Dugos and Frank Degraff were to have been married to-day, but the ceremony was indefinitely postponed owing to the unexpected absence of the prospective bride. Miss Dugos was employed in the Lyman mills, and her parents reside in Canada. Her father heard of the intended marriage and was opposed to it. Her father appeared at her wedding last night, and, flourishing a revolver, demanded to see his daughter. When confronted by her father she fled, and her father was determined and the two boarded the train for Montreal.

CATTLE WITH LUMP JAW

Have Been Sold to Winnipeg Butchers and the Government Has Stepped In—Big Increase in Clearing House Returns.

Winnipeg, Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Dealers have been selling cattle suffering from lumpy jaw to city butchers and the Government has found it necessary to step in and prohibit the same by a special act of the Cabinet in council.

Winnipeg clearing house returns for the past week were \$2,900,000, or more than double those for the same period last year.

And Fell Between the Cars—He Was Fearfully Injured and Died in Great Agony.

Who Saw the Accident, Will Hold the Inquest to-night—Parres Was a Colored Man Employed as Wagon Car Porter—Sheep Slain by the Trolley—Another Life has been sacrificed to the trolley car and the victim is Donald A. Parres, a colored man, who has for some time been in the employ of the C. P. R. as wagon car porter on the run between Toronto and North Bay, and who boarded in Toronto with Capt. Jack at 1192 Queen-street west.

The fatality occurred a short distance east of Queen-street subway shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Parres left Capt. Jack's house to go to work and at North-bay-avenue he awaited an eastbound trolley car. The cars do not pull up at North-bay-avenue, there being a stopping place between North-bay and Beaufort-avenues.

Parres must have known this, for he walked along toward Beaufort-avenue and met Queen-street motor car 427 coming from the west, with two trailers attached.

How the Accident Occurred. Parres attempted to board the rear platform of the first trailer while the train was moving at a fair rate of speed. As far as can be learned he tried the railwayman's fashion of getting on to the car with his back to it. In some manner he missed his footing and dropped in the space between the trailer and the one behind it.

There was a shriek of agony from the unfortunate man beneath the wheels and he was crushed beneath the feet of the car, which bumped and left the track. Willing hands extricated the bleeding man from the wheels and carried the poor fellow into a store. He retained consciousness and suffered terrible pain.

Dr. Orr, who was upon the scene, saw at once the fearful condition of the man and summoned the police ambulance. Policemen Phillips, the driver and Roadmaster Greene of the railway company carried Parres into the ambulance and Capt. Jack sat by his side as he was driven with all haste to St. Michael's Hospital, where his injuries were examined by Drs. Dwyer, Sweetnam, Orr and Caven.

Fearful Injuries. The hurts were of a horrible nature, including a compound fracture of the right arm, compound fracture of the right thigh, fracture of the pelvis and many serious cuts and bruises, besides fatal injuries of an internal nature.

Parres lived in agony until about 6.30, when death put an end to his sufferings.

The train of cars on which the tragedy occurred was managed by Motorman H. Hoagwood and Conductor M. Keely on the motor car, Conductor W. Beale on the trailer from which Parres fell, and Conductor J. J. Downey on the trailer that crushed the victim.

What Eye-Witnesses Say. Maywood, the motorman, says that he thin Sanderson the man standing on the roadway, but he didn't motion the car to stop.

Conductor Beale stated that the man went to board the car, and missing his foot, swung around and fell under the wheels of the car behind.

Conductor Orr, who was a witness of the fatality, has ordered an inquest, which will be held at St. Michael's Hospital to-night.

Parres was a finely built man, about 30 years of age. He came originally from the Barbadoes. For the past few months he has been boarding at Capt. Jack's house while in the city. He was a quiet, unassuming fellow, and was very popular among his associates.

Sheep Killed by Trolley. Two sheep were slaughtered by Queen-street car 369 in Brewery Hollow at 8.30 last night.

Motorman Sullivan was running his car east, and some men were driving a flock of about 60 sheep west.

The sheep were taking up most of the road, but the motorman did not think he would strike any of them, until he was very close, and seeing an accident was almost inevitable he reversed power, but not before two of the sheep were crushed to death by the car. The sheep were the property of Butcher Puddy of York-street.

Minor Accidents. Yesterday morning C. R. Harris, 69 Elm Grove-avenue, tried to drive his milk wagon between another wagon and a street car. He was unsuccessful, and there was a mix up in which considerable damage, none of which was of a serious nature, was occasioned.

While alighting from Belt Line car 465 on Spadina-avenue at 6.30 last night Mr. Sanderson of 597 Spadina-avenue fell and sustained painful injuries to his nose, but he was not seriously hurt.

Strathroy, Sept. 30.—Premier Hardy and Hon. G. W. Ross held a meeting here to-night. They were enthusiastically received by a large crowd on the arrival of the train from the east. Accompanied by the I.O.G. band and a large crowd following the train, they were escorted to the Lyceum, where a full house greeted them.

L. H. Smith, President of the Strathroy Liberal Association, acted as chairman. The hall was appropriately decorated with banners and flags. The ladies were very much in evidence, the front seats and overtop seats on the platform being crowded.

Mr. W. S. Calvert, M.P., was the first speaker, and spoke for about fifteen minutes, followed by Mr. Taylor, M.L.A., who spoke briefly.

Hon. Mr. Hardy was the next speaker, and was enthusiastically received. The hon. gentleman dealt very explicitly with the timber license and export and alien clauses, the Sandfield Macdonald surplus and the Englede license, and vigorously defended his Government.

He took up the educational branch of the Government and concluded his speech with a pleasant reference to his twenty-five years of service to the constituency. YANTIC WOULD BE NOWHERE

In an Encounter With One of the "Modern Fighting Ships" Which Canada Has on the Lakes.

The Washington correspondent of The Detroit Evening News sends the following to his paper, dated Sept. 29:

A New York paper says definite orders have been issued for the shipment of a battery of rapid-firing guns to Erie, Pa., there to be placed upon the corvette Yantic, as she passes on her way to become the training ship of the Michigan naval reserve.

The paper attaches great importance to this, claiming that it will amount to a violation of the diplomatic agreement limiting the number of war vessels Uncle Sam and J. Bull shall maintain on the great lakes.
