



DEACONS' REPORT.

In the Providence of God we are permitted to meet again in our annual roll-call. The statistics of the Church are as follows: No. of Members at the last roll-call, 318; received during the year by letter, 12, total 330; dismissed to join other Baptist Churches, 10; died during the year (Mrs. F. J. Spicer and Mrs. W. D. O'Donnell), 2; at present on the roll, 318.

The number on the roll now remains the same as that reported last year. Two young sisters werereceived for baptism and church membership at the Conference on Friday last, February 2nd. Twoother candidates were present at the meeting last evening, who will offer themselves to the Church next Wednesday at the prayer meeting; these four candidates will shortly follow their Lord in the ordinance of baptism. Others, we understand, are expected to come shortly.

The various branches of the Church work have been carried on as usual and with little change. Our Pastor continues faithfully laboring to sow the seeds of divine truth to attentive hearers. We do believe that this "labor will not be in vain in the Lord." The promise of God's word is sure: "In due season ye shall reap if ye faint not." The attendance at our morning services is very good; we wish the same could be said of the Sabbath evening services. We fear too many content themselves with coming out but once on the Lord's Day. Brethren and sisters, this ought not so to be; let us not forget our covenant obligations to our Father in Heaven, and to His visible Church with which we are connected. Our Prayer and Conference Meetings are fairly well sustained, but there is room for improvement here. Many of our church members are but seldom seen at the place appointed for prayer, and are thus depriving themselves of these Christian privileges which should be highly prized by all.

We are glad to note that our Conference Meetings will, in the future, be held on Friday evenings as formerly. This is in compliance with a generally expressed desire, that the meetings for prayer on Wednesday evenings remain as heretofore; that the monthly Conference Meetings be not disturbed, and that they be devoted largely to individual testimony and Christian experience. The Church has recently introduced the individual communion cup. While a few of our churches in the Convention have been using them, this church is we believe the first to adopt them in this city, and we understand some of our sister churches will soon do likewise.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

In our last annual report a plea was made for increased strength in our School by closer co-operation of parents and adults—by their personal attendance when possible; by a uniform co-operation to secure regularity and thoroughness on the part of all whom they could influence. We now have to report that while interest has been shown in many ways, we are still without an adult class, although in the Home Department we must recognize a good substitute, and in this department a fair degree of interest has been manifested, and a proportionate moral support given to the School.

Do parents fully realize that the Sunday School is an important factor in the education of their children?

Does the Church realize that the richest field for its development is found in the Sunday School; and that therefore its best qualified members should give their strength to the enlargement and efficiency of the School?

One pleasing feature of the year has been the continuation of the young ladies' class with an enrollment of over 30 members, who have kept up a good attendance, excepting on some stormy days. The Primary Class has maintained a good record throughout the year, and begins the new year with a membership of 51. This number will soon have to be reduced by the "swarming" process. A new teacher is ready for the new class.

We are yet a long way off from the ideal Sunday School. And indeed it is difficult to state concisely what the ideal is. Should the aim be to impart Christian knowledge, or to inspire Christian life? In discussions of recent years the two plans, viz., of personal influence and persuasion, and of imparting Bible facts, have almost been looked upon as two separate methods, and there has perhaps been danger of sacrificing efficiency to uniformity. It is proper to apply the principles of secular instruction to Sunday School teaching; but perhaps the ideal would be more nearly reached by seeking to secure the wisdom necessary to the proper use of the knowledge acquired in the public schools. The aim of Sunday School work, we must agree, is to bring the scholar into relationship with Christ as a personal Saviour.

An outlook on Sunday School work generally gives evidence of far fewer conversions than is desired; and the question has been raised as to whether such results have been really looked for. This has created the desire to bring in some special manner the claims of the Gospel home to the hearts of the scholars, and the schools of the province have been asked to join in a season of special prayer and effort, and at a time convenient to each school, in the near future to have a day of Decision for Christ. May we not hope that this will be but the beginning of continuous persevering effort put forth to lead the scholars to an acceptance of Jesus Christ as their Saviour and their Lord?

B. Y. P. U.

In looking back over the past year's work of our Union, thankfulness fills our hearts, for we see that we have existed for some specific purpose. The object of our organization is "to secure the increased spirituality of our young people; their stimulation in Christian service; their edification in scripture knowledge; their instruction in Baptist doctrines and history; and their enlistment in all missionary activities through existing denominational organizations." We are assured that the spirituality of many of our members has been increased—the deep feeling manifested in many of our meetings and in personal conversation proves this.

All of our committees have done good work. The work of the Visiting and Flower Committee perhaps is all that need be particularly mentioned. They visited the sick and needy in our congregation, also in the Hospital and Poor House, distributing flowers, reading matter, fruit and other delicacies, as far and a little farther than the money placed at their disposal would purchase. The good done in this way cannot here be told.

Among all the other good things done by our Union has been the organization of a Junior Union, with an enrollment of sixty four members. Are there any little ones in your homes who are not members of this Junior Union? If so send them here next Friday. This Union is under the supervision of the Senior Union. Miss Beckwith is Superintendent, Miss Kennedy, Miss Ackhurst, Miss Elsie Shaw, Miss Burgoyne, Mrs. Crowell, and Miss Stewart Vice-Superintendents. Pray that God's rich blessing may rest upon these sisters in their work.


