

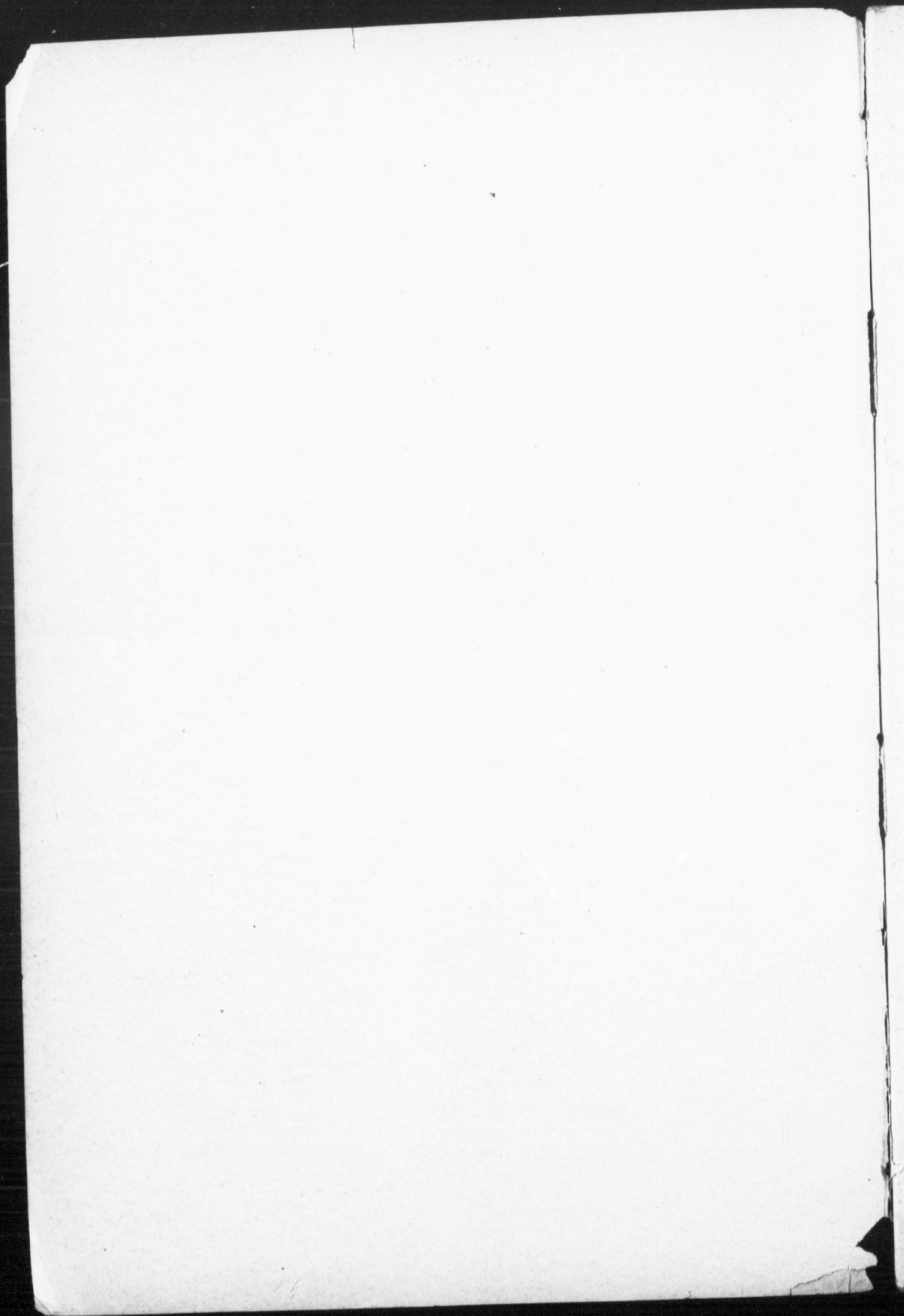

### 3. SACRAMENTS.

Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of each month. The Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of February, June, August, and December, in the morning, and on the first Sabbath of April and October, in the evening. Communicants are requested to bring their communion cards, as this is the only way of recording attendance.

### 4. SUPPORT.

Pews and sittings are free, although, as far as possible, allotted to the families and persons who attend the church. Any who have not secured sittings are requested to make application for them to the Treasurer, Mr. William Campbell, or to any member of the Seat-Letting Committee, on any Wednesday evening before or after prayer meeting service.

The congregational expenses are met by voluntary contributions, given for the most part weekly, by envelope. All who have not adopted this system are earnestly requested to do so, by applying to the Treasurer for envelopes. It is suggested that each contributor shall take his or her supply of envelopes home, keep them in a safe



place, use them regularly with due regard to the dates printed thereon, seal them securely, and write the amount enclosed in every case on the face. Each contributor who follows these suggestions can ascertain, by a simple examination of the envelopes remaining on hand, precisely how his or her account with the church stands at any time, and they are asked to make such an examination periodically, and supply any omissions which may have occurred by reason of absence or otherwise.

#### 5. MISSION SCHEMES.

All are expected to contribute to the Mission Schemes of the Church, such as Home and Foreign Missions, French Evangelization, etc. Envelopes for monthly contributions are provided, and may be obtained from Mr. Charles D. Gordon, 58 Nassau Street. Over and above the regular contributions, members of the congregation are supporting Rev. N. H. Russell, B.A., in Central India. These objects are commended to the generosity of the members.

#### 6. DISTRICTS.

The congregation being divided into districts, with an Elder in charge of each, members are particularly urged to make known to the Elder of their District any case of sickness or other circumstance requiring attention. Members are particularly requested to give notice of change of address just as soon as it occurs.

# ANNUAL REPORT

OF

## CENTRAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

For the Year Ending 31st December, 1898.

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### Synopsis of Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

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The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Monday, January 16th.

After devotional exercises had been conducted by the pastor, Mr. C. B. Petry was requested to act as chairman, and Mr. A. D. Crooks as secretary of the meeting.

The report of the Session was read by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Hamilton. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Creelman, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the report of the Managers was adopted.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations of the Church, were presented, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the members of the congregation.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers for two years:—Messrs. C. B. Petry, Wm. Campbell, Dr. R. Haslitt, J. M. Hamilton, R. S. Wilson, F. C. Jones, John MacKay, Duncan Donald; and for one year, Mr. Duncan McIntosh.

Votes of thanks were unanimously tendered to the members of the choir and to Mr. John Erskine, the acting auditor, for valuable services rendered during the past year; also to the ladies of the congregation for the pleasant social preceding the business meeting held under their auspices.

Mr. John Ferguson was reappointed auditor for the ensuing year.

## Report of Session.

Another year of our congregation's life and work has ended, and its record is on high. We take notice of such events as seem to us of importance, but there is much that cannot be revealed which is of inestimable value in the sight of Him who looketh not upon the outward appearance, but upon the heart.

So far as we can judge, all departments of the Church's work have been carried on with faithfulness, and, as the various reports will show, with some measure of success. In addition to the regular lessons in the Sabbath School, the memorizing of portions of Scripture has been taken up with a good deal of enthusiasm by the scholars, and the results have been most gratifying. The Bible Class continues the very interesting study of the Life of Christ, and we should like to see this class still more largely attended.

We have had continued pleasure and profit in the presence of our missionary to India, Rev. N. H. Russell, during a part of the year. He and his esteemed wife bade us farewell on the 10th of October, to resume their work, and letters have been received announcing their safe arrival at their home in Mhow. The Session has been strengthened by the addition of four elders elected by the congregation in October—Messrs. George F. Burns, Charles D. Gordon, David W. White, and Donald McEachern. The districts have been rearranged so that we believe the work of oversight can be more efficiently done.

At our December meeting, after long and prayerful consideration of the present position and prospects of the congregation, we unanimously decided to initiate an advance movement in our work. We have agreed to make definite and united prayer the basis of this movement. To aid in accomplishing this object, prayer cards have been prepared with a special topic for prayer each week. A large number have already taken this up very heartily, and we hope the numbers will increase till all the members are joined together in a golden chain of definite intercession. Plans have also been adopted for reaching those in our vicinity who are not regularly attached to any church. We are confidently looking for good results from these efforts. If we could have more of the regular members present at the Sabbath evening services, we believe they would be more effective in reaching outsiders. The social spirit must be increasingly developed in the best sense. We believe the Christian Endeavor Society has done much in this way among the young people, but it must be united and congregational to be



in the largest degree effective. The *unity* of the congregation in all its work we think supremely important.

The 8th of August closed the first ten years of the present pastorate. It was made the occasion for presenting some leading facts regarding the congregation's history during that period, which are very interesting. In spite of financial depression during a great part of the time, the congregation has made steady and solid progress in almost every part of its work. Death has made large inroads in our membership during the year. We have lost no fewer than fifteen members by death, and among these are several who have been connected with the Church from its commencement, such as Mrs. J. E. Mitchell, Mrs. Neil Currie, and Mrs. R. G. A. Paton. The removal of these and other valued members has left a large blank in our numbers. To all those who have been called upon to pass through sorrow and bereavement, we extend our deepest sympathy. Ere the year closed, news reached us that the Rev. Donald Mitchell, of Jersey City, had entered into his rest and reward. He was the first pastor of Central Church, a man of wide scholarship, of kindly sympathy, beloved by all those who had the privilege of an intimate acquaintance with him. To the members of his family we also tender our loving sympathy in their deep sorrow.

During the year 75 members were added to the roll—19 by profession of faith and 56 by certificate; 66 names have been removed, 15 by death, 36 by certificate, and 15 by retirement, leaving a net gain of 9, and making the present membership 677.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed five times during the year, and was very well attended.

## Report of Managers.

In submitting the report and accounts for the past year, the Managers have much pleasure in announcing that the Floating Debt has been fully paid off, and a reduction of five hundred pounds sterling effected in the mortgage on the Church property. These payments, so satisfactory from the congregational standpoint, were possible in consequence of the receipt, on the last day of the year, of the sum of \$3,500, part of the money coming to the Church under the will of the late Neil Currie. Throughout the year the Floating Debt had been reduced by the contributions of the congregation for that purpose, amounting to \$442, leaving \$1,056 as a balance, now paid out of the legacy in question. The payment on the mortgage already alluded to, leaves that liability standing at \$17,033, equal to thirty-five hundred pounds sterling.

Referring to the ordinary expense account of the congregation, it will be seen that the year opened with a balance on hand of \$20.68 and closed with a deficiency of \$275.30 after paying all the bills for the period in question. Doubtless this sum might have been secured, if a personal canvass of the congregation had been made, but as the situation was fully presented in a circular issued in November to members individually, it may be assumed that the response to the appeal therein made represented what each supporter of the Church felt able and willing to give as an additional offering. The amount so contributed, as shown in the accounts, was \$311.40, including \$100 given by one subscriber for District Mission work.

There are now on the contribution list the names of 218 members and adherents giving weekly the sum of \$82.12, against 231 members giving \$86.77 the previous year. The amounts contributed are as follows:—

The average receipts from the envelope and open plate offerings combined were, for the first time in a number of years past, less than \$100 weekly, the total amount so received in the year being \$5,115, as compared with \$5,220 in the previous year. It was hoped that with the revival in business there would be a marked improvement in the congregational income. Although the most scrupulous care was exercised in the expenditures, the sum of \$343 had to be spent for repairs and renewals. The item of \$100 for Treasurer's allowance, which appears for the first time in the accounts, deserves also a passing reference: The sum in question was granted by way of compensation for the clerical work connected with the weekly envelope system, pew records and Treasurer's accounts generally. In many congregations this work is done gratuitously, as hitherto in the Central Church, but in many others it is found necessary or expedient to make a pecuniary allowance to the officer responsible for its performance, and at the beginning of the year this necessity presented itself so unmistakably to the Managers that they were constrained to adopt the new plan.

It will be observed that the payments for interest are less than in former years: a still further saving will be effected hereafter owing to the reduction in the debt already mentioned. It will, on the other hand, be necessary to expend several hundred dollars during the ensuing year for renewals and repairs, and doubtless similar outlays may in future be counted on as a permanent annual charge.

In order to meet the adverse balance now reported in the accounts and all expenses for 1899 on the usual scale, the sum of \$5,900 will be required, demanding an increase equivalent to \$15 weekly in the offerings. Although the ordinary income has declined, the general financial position of the congregation is very satisfactory, having continuously improved for a number of years past, with the prospect of further improvement on the receipt of the remainder of the "Currie" legacy. In view of the large sum subscribed each year for all purposes by the congregation, including the contributions to the Missionary schemes of the Church at large, no doubt need be enter-

tained of the ability of the members to meet all current expenses. This may be done, too, without continuing the practice of making an urgent appeal, towards the close of each year, in anticipation of a deficiency. While the congregation is thankful that it has been able to render generous aid to the schemes of the Church, it is only reasonable that full provision should first be made for the current engagements.

The Managers suggest that as the Floating Debt has been fully paid, those who have hitherto contributed to that object shall continue their liberality, under the weekly envelope system, to the ordinary congregational account; and they also trust that the considerations, so plainly set forth herein, may appeal to the members generally and induce many, having the best interests of the Church at heart, to increase their offerings towards its support.

The following Managers retire by rotation and are eligible for re-election:—Messrs. Campbell, Donald, Hamilton, Haslitt, Jones, Petry, N. T. Wilson, and R. S. Wilson. Dr. William Graham having left the congregation before the expiration of his term, it will also be necessary to elect a member for one year to take his place on the Board.

## The Sabbath School.

This branch of the work has been carried on with considerable satisfaction in many ways.

Unlike the previous year, the officers elected at the last annual meeting have been able to remain with us throughout the entire year.

It hath pleased the Lord not to take any of our little flock to Himself during the year, though we note the death of Harold Leach on the 3rd April, who had been a scholar until early in 1897.

Our late Secretary, Mr. John Burgess, who required to resign his position early in 1897, "fell asleep in Jesus" on the 21st of May, and passed most triumphantly into the Kingdom. The letter received from his sister, thanking the people of this Church, and testifying to the beauty of his Christian character, was more than sufficient to repay this congregation for assisting him in knowing Him "Who is the way, the Truth, and the Life."

Ten of our scholars united with the Church on profession of their faith.

Four received diplomas for work done in connection with the Higher Religious Instruction—Carrie Mitchell, Marion Mitchell, Maggie Bayne, and Florence Hadley.

Forty-one won prizes for attendance and 23 for studies in the Shorter Catechism and Bible. Seven of the seniors took the first half of the Catechism, 11 of the juniors the 5th and 6th chapters of Matthew, and 5 from the primary class the 14th chapter of John. The work was most thoroughly done, and a great delight to teachers and Superintendent.

The attendance has been fair, an average of 123, or 137 exclusive of July and August. We have added 21 and parted with 28.

Teachers have been most faithful in work and attendance. Miss Mather and Mrs. Glover were present 52 Sundays, Miss Gowans and Mr. Fraser 50, Mrs. Crombie 49 and Mr. Crombie 48.

Five teachers have left—Mr. Marks, Mrs. Jeffrey, Miss West, Miss Little, and Mrs. Dingwall. Mr. Marks has left the city. The others have obtained temporary leave on account of other urgent duties, and it is expected will return to us as soon as practicable. Their places have been taken by Messrs. McMillan and Coates, Mrs. Helmer and Miss Anna Ross.

Nearly 100 volumes have been added to the library. These books have been selected with the utmost care, almost every un-

known one having been read by some member of the committee, and we feel that we know that all are not only good, but sufficiently attractive and entertaining to ensure their being read by all scholars desiring real benefit.

Macdonald, left us about the same time, and, to these and others who are no longer with us, we extend our best wishes for success in whatever work they have undertaken.

It is much to be regretted that our class is not considerably larger than it is. The average attendance—ladies 14, men 11, a total of 25—is not what might be expected from a congregation the size of ours. While there are, no doubt, many engaged in the Sabbath School and other branches of the Master's work, we are convinced that there are a great many others who might with profit to themselves spend an hour with us each Sunday afternoon. It must be remembered that while the class is of particular benefit to the younger members of the Church, it does not exist for them alone, and those of the older members who can avail themselves of this opportunity for studying God's Word will be heartily welcomed. We ought to have an attendance of forty or fifty at least, and earnestly hope that some of those not otherwise engaged will accept this invitation.

Let each one of us do his or her part in making the coming year one of richer blessing than ever before by attending regularly and by making a special effort to interest others in the Bible Class.

### The Ladies' Aid Society.

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As we draw near the close of the eighteenth year of the work of the Ladies' Aid Society, we cannot but feel that although there is much to call for gratitude, there is but little cause for comment.

Fifteen sewing meetings have been held. The largest attendance has been eighteen, the smallest nine.

Six tons of coal, also wood, provisions, medicine, and nourishment have been given out from time to time, among nine different families.

One member of the congregation nearly eighty years of age has been supported for some years at the Aged Women's Home.

The Mission work has been conducted in the usual way; a tea being given to the mothers every week, at which the garments made by the Ladies' Aid Society are sold for a very small sum.

This year a slightly new departure has been made in the character of our work, as the Society decided to assist in refurnishing the Church Parlor. Early in March Mr. George Anderson kindly gave us a lecture on "Japan," the proceeds of which were devoted to that purpose, forming the nucleus of a fund still slowly growing.

Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Currie, two members of our little band, who had long and faithfully worked with us, passed away early in the year. We miss them from our midst, and would take to our own hearts the lessons that lives such as theirs will ever teach.

Death has also taken away Mr. and Mrs. Dale, who for some time received a great deal of help from the Society.

While we regret that in a few cases our beneficent intentions have been imposed upon, we still rejoice that many otherwise desolate homes have been cheered. We cannot too heartily thank those good friends who have stood by us, assisting us from time to time with their sympathy and with their generous donations.

With the Christmas message of peace and good-will yet resting on our hearts, shall we not go forward to carry it with greater faithfulness into the homes of the poor and needy?

### "Jenings" Auxiliary, W.F.M.S.

In closing the eighteenth year's work of our Auxiliary, we feel grateful for the continued increasing interest manifested in the meetings and amongst our members.

We were privileged in having M<sup>rs</sup>. Norman Russell and Mrs. Byers, of the Leper Mission in India, with us during the year. The helpful addresses of these ladies gave us a new interest in India, as they recorded many events of dark heathenism which they themselves had witnessed. A number of very instructive papers on missionary subjects were prepared and read by our members, and it is gratifying to note the ready response of all to assist in making our meetings profitable.

During the year eleven meetings were held, with an average attendance of twenty-seven members; also a meeting for prayer in August. In October we had the usual Thank-offering Meeting, at which was contributed \$71.35. In August a valuable bale of clothing was sent to the North-West, besides \$23 in money.

The membership at present numbers 68, 39 of which belong to the General Society, 5 to the Auxiliary, and 24 are life members. We have twelve "Scattered Helpers," who, although unable to attend all our meetings, help us by donation, this year having contributed \$14.09.

"The Foreign Missionary Tidings" continues to give an interesting record of the work accomplished. We have 125 contributors, which is a considerable increase.

## Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

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In reporting the work of the year which has closed, the officers are thankful that the interest of the members has not lessened, and believe that the spiritual life of each has deepened. Some of our student members did not return this year, so at present our roll numbers 83 active, 1 associate, 9 corresponding, 10 honorary, making a total of 103 members.

The Elizabeth St. Mission has again proved to be a field of active Christian work for many of our members. The services are under the care of Mr. J. T. Taylor, one of our number, and, as formerly, open-air services were held on Centre Avenue during the summer months. In October a cottage prayer meeting was opened in a home on Centre Avenue, and is now conducted there and on Elizabeth Streets alternately. Other members distribute tracts, or carry the Gospel to homes whose inmates are too infirm to attend our mission services.

While so actively engaged in the home work, we do not forget those who labor "in the regions beyond." Every month special attention is given to missions, and definite prayer offered for those in charge. The envelopes for systematic missionary givings realized \$100, which is devoted entirely to Mr. Russell's salary. As a number of former contributors now subscribe through the Church, this sum exceeds the usual offering from the individual members.

The hand of death has again entered our midst. In May our beloved former Secretary, Mr. John F. Burgess, was called to higher service, after many weary months of painful suffering, which he bore with quiet patience. All whose privilege it was to labor with him were touched by his devotion to his Master's service, and the removal of this young life comes as a solemn lesson to each.

With the missionary work, temperance and good citizenship is also emphasized. Several temperance addresses have been given during the year, and a large quantity of literature was distributed during the recent Plebiscite campaign. Numbers of boxes of books and magazines have been sent to mission stations in Ontario and the North-West.

Owing to the untiring effort of our active committee, we have been enabled to retain the Toronto Christian Endeavor Union banner, our Society showing the best report of work done during the year.

The Society were again generously assisted by the congregation in the pound offering which they arranged on Christmas Eve. We were enabled to distribute forty baskets of provisions to the families in our Mission, all of which were gratefully received.

#### SABBATH SCHOOL.

The officers and teachers of Elizabeth Street Mission Sabbath School have much pleasure in presenting their eighteenth annual report. In God's providence we have been brought to the close of another year's work in the Sabbath School.

In presenting this report the teachers and officers are pleased to say the year just closed has been an encouraging one. Some of our scholars during this year made confession of Christ, and a greater interest is taken in the study of God's Word.

The following facts in connection with the school will, we think, be of interest to our friends:—

Our membership during the year has been:—Officers and teachers, 21; average attendance, 19; total scholars on roll, 105; average attendance, 97; total average teachers and scholars, 116; largest attendance, 127, November 27th; smallest attendance, 74, March 30th. Our collection during the year amounted to \$66.31.

## BOYS' AND GIRLS' MEETING.

The attendance at these meetings has been small. During the summer missionary charts were shown and explained, and much interest was manifested. The meeting has been changed to Friday evening and is conducted by Mr. Harcourt.

This, in all its various branches, is the work in which we are permitted to be co-workers with the Master. We believe these little ones have learned lessons which will tell on their future lives, and that the memory of the days spent in the sewing class will not only be a very happy one, but a very helpful one as well. Since last report we have had fifteen meetings, with an average attendance of twenty-eight; seventy-seven garments have been made by the children, and the work on these was remarkably well done. Each garment is paid for before being taken home.

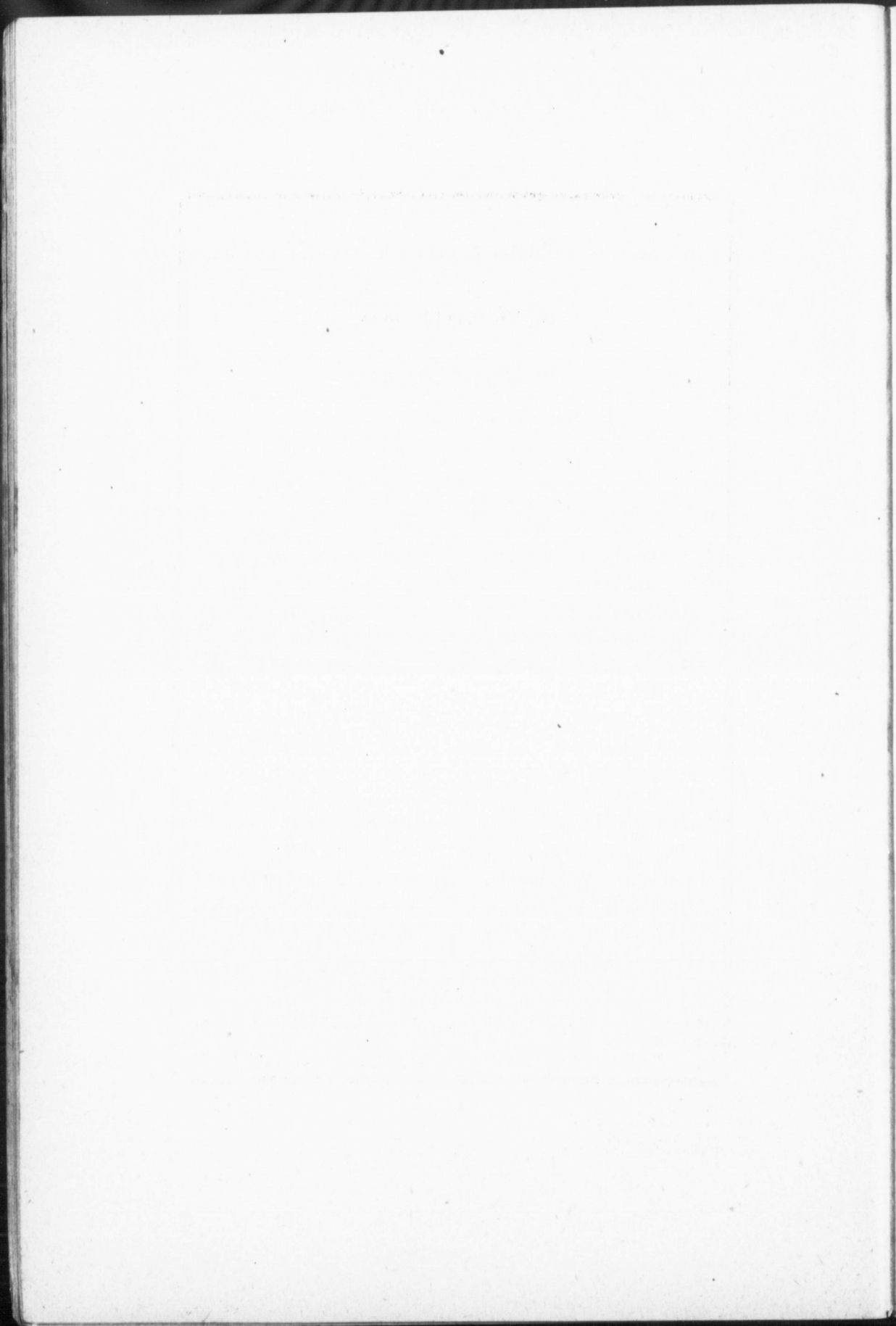
