PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a Bill will be presented for enactment at the next session of the Provincial Legislature, entitled "An Act respecting public streets in the City of Saint John." The objects desired to be attained by this Bill are:

- (1) To authorize the City of Saint John in Common Council to make By-laws regulating the making, maintenance and closing of openings through the surface of public streets by the abutting owner, tenant, or other person.
- (2) To authorize the City of Saint John to impose charges for such use.
- (3) To provide for the enforcing of such By-laws by fine, or imprisonment in default of payment of any such fine.
- (4) To relieve the City from liability for any injury caused by the making or maintenance of any such opening by reason of any permission granted.

It has been well said that the thought of every new era is hampered by the opposition of its predecessor. It is the custom of every age to express itself in laws which it regards as permanently binding on posterity. But today the thoughts of men run counter to the hoary traditions and precedents of bygone years. Humanity stands on the threshold of a new order, in which the ex-

treme individualism of early Victorian times no longer prevails. The struggle for national existence has promoted unity of effort and community of sentiment. Never again can the nation turn back without loathing to the mad competition and struggle for individual existence that characterized pre-war industrialism. Economic reconstruction, when it comes, must proceed upon less individualistic lines. The fight with Germany has shown the necessity of the national mobilization of both labor and capital, with the state as the predominant partner. What has proved so successful in times of war cannot be set aside as altogether imprac-

"At this moment," says Mr. Robbins, "the European conflict has had a unifying effect, lifting labor service to the Empire is the ruling fact; not the ruling ideal, or the aim of pleasant after-dinner talk, but the ruling fact of industrial England, and by which it justifies and vindicates industry in the life of the people." The human factor, not profit-making, must predominate in the future. As Mr. Robbins contends, the brains and hearts of modern workers, as well as their hands, must be taken into account in any plan of reconstruction after the war. The new wine of this better era cannot be put into the old bottles. The common welfare, not the aggrandizement of the selfish few, is the industrial gospel of the twentieth century. Service is the ruling principle. The old order is passing, giving place to the new.

"A Declaration of War Against the United States"

was Germany's answer to President Wilson's address to the United States Senate on world peace, remarks the New York World, an organ very close to the administration. After thus characterizing the German note establishing a "war-zone," or submarine blockade on February 1st, the same organ added that "if Germany wants war with the United States, let Germany have war with the United States." While outbursts of indignation come from many of the leading newspapers there are others which caution a "sit-tight" policy. The German-American press takes the news calmly, an exceptional attitude being that of the St. Louis Amerika which regards the move of the Berlin Government as "a mistake," and questions "whether it was wise to answer in such a way the suggestion of the President." Quite as exceptional, and perhaps more significant, as showing the German government's present feeling, is the expression of George S. Viereck, of the "Fatherland." "This country being honestly desirous for peace cannot but approve a measure which we know Germany has only decided upon as a last resort and which promises to bring the hostilities to a close before Easter." ### THE ONE GREAT ISSUE.

There is but one great issue in the present political campaign in New Brunswick.

It is not roads, or crown lands, or agriculture, or immigration, or farm settlement, or the public debt, although related to all of these.

The great issue is the question of honesty in public life, and whether men are to have one code of honor in private business and another in their capacity as administrators of public affairs.

We have arrived at a stage in the political history of this province where men do not hesitate to buy their way into office and use the resources and the business of the province for their own profit and that of their friends.

When we apply the test of public honor and faithful service to the ruling party in this province today, what is the answer? It is—

J. K. Flemming.  
J. K. Pinder.  
A. J. H. Stewart.  
M. J. Robichaud.

And others. Were the whole story told—if royal commissions asked for and refused could have added their testimony—the list would be longer. But it need not be lengthened for the purpose of judging the whole group of government candidates, from the premier down, for the simple reason that they all endorse Flemming, and that Pinder and Robichaud are candidates today. Mr. Flemming was billed to speak from a government platform in Andover last night.

Is not that enough? Why talk about roads or crown lands or anything else until the unfaithful stewards have been sent about their business and honor has been restored to public life? Let the Murray government be given such a defeat as will be a warning to their successors and to all future governments that honor in public life is the only key to public favor and support. It is quite useless for any man to make lofty professions of political virtue while he allows himself with men who are unfaithful servants of the people.

In Manitoba and British Columbia the leaders of the government were as loud in their professions of purity as Premier Murray, but the people swept them aside as unworthy of further support. The people of New Brunswick have the same duty to perform, and if they fail to do so now they will simply be giving the grafters and rake-off men another five years' opportunity to ply their trade at the public expense.

### WATCHING NEW BRUNSWICK

The eyes of the other Canadian provinces are fixed upon New Brunswick. Manitoba and British Columbia have cleaned house. Will New Brunswick follow their example or give graft and corruption a new lease of life?

The people cannot dodge the issue. So long as the Flemming conception of public duty and responsibility dominates the minds of the rulers of the province, just so long will graft and corruption prevail.

The government which was defeated in 1908 is not now on trial. It is a glaring attempt to deceive the people when the government speakers and press try to divert attention from the misdeeds of the present administration by talking about one that was defeated nine years ago.

If Premier Murray cannot gain support for his government on its merits he has no right to ask for such support. So long as he and his friends have the brazen effrontery to defend Flemming and take him into their councils they do not deserve any consideration from the people who want cleaner politics and better government.

New Brunswick, to be true to herself, should turn down the Murray government so hard that there could be no possible doubt in any mind regarding the attitude of the people toward political humbug and fraud. The opportunity has come. It is up to the people. The eyes of the people of the other provinces are on New Brunswick.

### KEEP TO THE ISSUE

The people of New Brunswick are not called upon to compare the Murray government with that which was defeated in 1908, but to compare it with the kind of government they know this province should have. That is the test. Only if they are convinced that the government we have had for the last five years is good enough would they be justified in returning Premier Murray and his colleagues. They are not called upon and cannot make comparisons with a government which has not yet been formed. All they can do, if they are not satisfied with the record of the men who have been in power, is to turn them out, and thus warn the new administration that they will not stand for graft and corruption. The people would be very foolish to listen to anything the government party have to say about the old government, upon which judgment was pronounced nine years ago, or any criticism of a government that has not yet been formed. The Murray government should be confined to a discussion of its own record and policy, for that is the real issue in this campaign. Premier Murray, for example, should explain Mr. Flemming, and Mr. Pinder, and Mr. Robichaud, and the varied activities of these, his bosom friends and counselors. So far as the people are concerned they ought to strike a blow for good government by turning out a bad government. The issue would be salutary, and it is more needed in New Brunswick today than in any province in Canada.

### MR. W. E. FOSTER.

The opposition party in this province is to be congratulated on the fact that Mr. W. E. Foster has accepted the position of leader. He is a young man, of unimpeachable integrity, successful in business, well informed in public affairs, and one who commands public confidence and esteem. Under such a leader the friends of good government can appeal with confidence to the people, feeling that a new government, led by Mr. Foster, and having before it the humiliating record of the old one, would restore honor to public life and extricate the province from a situation which all friends of good government must deplore. Mr. Foster has not sought the leadership, which was conferred on him a year ago. He would have been well content to serve under another, and it is only at the insistent request of the leadership committee, and in response to a sense of public duty, that he has now accepted a position which brings grave responsibilities and much hard work. The citizens who want a better state of affairs in the politics of this province should rally to the support of the new leader. It is their fight. Some people are disposed to assume a detached position, as onlookers, when matters vitally affecting the political welfare of the country are at stake. No good citizen can afford to pursue such a course. Especially must those who welcome Mr. Foster as their leader endeavor to give him valuable support. The campaign will last but two weeks. That is not too long a time to devote to an effort to secure for New Brunswick the boon of better government. Especially should strong and influential men in the constituencies where candidates are still to be nominated feel it their duty to accept nomination and aid Mr. Foster in the fight for cleaner politics and a more faithful stewardship in public life.

### AT IT AGAIN.

In its report of Hon. Mr. Baxter's speech of last evening the Standard says: "Hon. Mr. Baxter pointed out that after this government had passed prohibition the opposition had made a run for the temperance people and sought them to come in and give them some assistance. Then the opposition had adopted a policy which provided that they should pass a law after they were returned to power, and within three months submit it to the people and if approved of bring it into operation within a year."

Editorially the Standard says:—"In other words the opposition will not give New Brunswick prohibition before July 18th, 1918. The government party has already placed a prohibitory act on the statute books and it will be enforced nine weeks after election day. As Premier Murray plainly stated 'a vote against the government is a vote against prohibition.'"

Mr. Baxter knows and the Standard knows that this is all buncombe. The people also know it. The opposition adopted their platform on prohibition before the government did anything. They forced the hand of the government. Now they will enforce the prohibition law and if necessary strengthen it.

There has been a slight lull in German submarine activity during the last two days. They must do much more before Britain is seriously threatened with the loss of supplies of food.

In such land fighting as is now in progress the Entente Allies have the advantage, but no large operations are in progress.

The week-end finds the United States ready and waiting for the overt act on the part of Germany which would mean war.

"Baxter and Carson" pushed the war off the front page of the Standard this morning. That's some compliment.

Count von Bernstorff has been given his passports there is nothing else to do. Germany intends to starve us. The answer must be a blow straight between the eyes which will beat the enemy down and bring him to his senses. The national service can deal that blow.

Arthur Henderson, labor leader and member of the cabinet in the British war cabinet, presided at the meeting, and Premier Lloyd George and Mr. Chamberlain were also present.

On opening the meeting, Mr. Henderson said the nation's demand for labor would be met only when every man, woman and child in the army or navy was employed in some work of national importance.

Mr. Chamberlain said the recent action of Germany was interpreted as a sign that she was in a desperate situation, but that if the Allies were to win an early victory and save themselves from the misery of another winter's war it would be necessary to supply the needs of Germany at once.

The question was, Mr. Chamberlain continued, where labor was to be found. Nonessential trade could not be suddenly destroyed. Destruction of capital would interfere with credit. The necessary industries, he said, should recuperate as quickly after the war. The government had no intention of suppressing any trade, but if labor and material had to be rationed, the shortage must first fall on the less essential trades.

The premier had pointed out, Mr. Chamberlain said, that in proportion to her population Great Britain had sent fewer men to the army and navy than any other of the great powers of the west. This was not because she was shrinking, but because she was making a larger contribution in other respects. If it was impossible to get the necessary men by voluntary means, the nation must save itself by resorting to conscription.


## W. E. FOSTER ACCEPTS LEADERSHIP OF THE OPPOSITION PARTY

### Explains His Reasons for Heading Movement for Better Government

To issue an Address to the Electors Dealing With the Issues Before Them—Appeals to People of Province to Unite With Him in Effort to Give New Brunswick an Honest and Fearless Administration—Less Partizanship and More Businesslike Government Needed.

W. E. Foster, discussing yesterday the plans of the provincial opposition party in the present campaign, made the important announcement that he had consented to accept its leadership.

"In January, 1916, when the party leadership was first offered to me," he said, "I did not think that my experience and acquaintance with provincial affairs were sufficient to warrant my acceptance of so important a position. I did, however, accept the chairmanship of a leadership committee, and since that time

have had more occasion to study the responsibilities of the office and the need for better government for New Brunswick.

"To give the necessary time for the leadership of the opposition party which should, and I believe will, after the general election, direct the affairs of New Brunswick, required much personal sacrifice. My political associates and the committee entrusted by the provincial convention with the leadership decision have again urged upon me so strongly the need of my acceptance of the leadership and, in view of the fact that the government and its friends are endeavoring to make capital by calling the opposition party 'leaders', I have consented to accept it.

"I do so with the hope that I may be able to do something to improve the conditions of the province. I am entrusted with the conduct of affairs I will surround myself with men who are of known probity and ability.

"I have never, I hope, been a partizan in politics. My interest in fact, in political affairs in New Brunswick does not date back farther than 1911. Myself, these conditions have grown worse instead of better, and today the province of New Brunswick needs business men more than politicians. We must have less partizanship if we want improvement, and I appeal to men of both parties to unite with me to this end.

"In this campaign I do not propose to defend the government before 1908. The people gave their verdict then, and in 1912 sustained the government. The record of the government of the day—the government since June 20, 1912—is what I want the electors to consider when casting their ballots. If the electors are satisfied that the affairs of the province have been conducted properly; if they believe there were no reasons for the appointment of two important Royal Commissions and no reliance to be placed upon their findings; if the electors are disposed to approve of the actions of the government since that time, then they should support Premier Murray and his administration. But, on the contrary, if they desire a better business administration of their provincial affairs; if they want the utmost publicity concerning public transactions, then I ask them to support the opposition party and to elect a government which will endeavor to remedy its affairs I would not undertake this task. We cannot succeed without the assistance of the best independent men of New Brunswick. This task is theirs as well as mine. The need for economy was never so great. Tens of thousands of our men, women and children are showing every day the spirit of sacrifice in the interests of the Empire. Why is it that both parties are with difficulty getting men to come forward and offer themselves as candidates? Every man owes a duty to the state, and those who do not recognize it are neglecting one of the first obligations of citizenship.

"I propose, during the next few days, to issue an address to the electors dealing with the issues before them."

Sackville may have a new industry, and one of the best, backed by a large American manufacturing firm, if negotiations now under way are carried through to the satisfaction of all concerned.


The Detroit Chassis Co., of Detroit, Mich., wrote Mayor Wood on Jan. 10, as follows:

## Did Turks Kill Grand Vizier?

"Ill Health" Given as Reason for Resignation May be Polite Term for Assassination—New Cabinet Not Pro-German

Berlin, Feb. 10.—Formation of a new Turkish cabinet was announced by the Official Press Bureau. The Turkish Grand Vizier Said Halim Pasha, resigned on account of ill-health, and Minister of the Interior Talat Bey was charged with the formation of a new cabinet. His ministry, as formed, is as follows: Grand Vizier, Talat Bey (also minister of finance); Minister of war, Enver Pasha; Minister of marine, Djemal Pasha.

"The cabinet change," said the Official Bureau, "means no change in policy. The new cabinet decided to continue the war on the side of their allies with the utmost energy until a final victory was achieved. The retiring grand vizier, Prince Said Halim, belongs to the family of the Egyptian khedive."

"Resigned on account of ill-health" is a pleasant Turkish phrase which may often be translated "assassinated." Talat Bey was mixed up in the assassination of the Turkish commander-in-chief, Hussein Nasir Pasha, in 1913, and his present preference may be a reward for getting rid of his esteemed predecessor in the grand viziership, whose "ill-health" would thus take the form of a pain in the stomach caused by a scimitar. Enver Pasha, who retains the war portfolio, is an ambitious "young Turk" only 36 years of age. Djemal Pasha, who becomes minister of marine, is a man who distrusts Germany and Austria, and whose heart is set on the conquest of Egypt. Talat Bey is by no means a bosom friend of the Kaiser, and if Turkey had heeded his advice she would not have entered the war. The new ministry is, therefore, pro-Turk rather than pro-German. Only a few days ago Swiss despatches recorded the arrival of a Turkish ex-minister there, allegedly to get in touch with the allies.

## \$500,000 TO ASSIST AMERICANS ABROAD

Lansing Asks for Appropriation—\$2,750,000 Already Turned Over to Relief Work

Washington, Feb. 10.—An emergency appropriation of \$500,000 for the relief, protection, and transportation of American citizens in Europe was asked of congress by Secretary Lansing.

The secretary did not mention specifically the situation in Europe, but Americans in the Teutonic countries were seized by the break with Germany, merely calling attention to the continued extraordinary expenses of the state department on account of the war, and suggesting that the necessary money be provided immediately, "in view of the important developments in the international relations of the United States within the last few days."

When the European war began, congress appropriated \$2,600,000 for relief of the thousands of Americans stranded

**WERE DINNER IS REALLY AN EVENT.**

A good dinner anywhere is an event worth remembering. But in Belgium, where the people are without means of feeding themselves, thanks to the German administration, it is a daily epoch-maker.

The accompanying photograph, taken at Bergen op Zoom, is representative of the food situation throughout the occupied parts of Belgium. The refugees act the time of day by the hour when the dinner soup is distributed. Though the distribution is always punctual, the people are always waiting for it.

Since this photograph was made these men and thousands of others have been torn from their wives and babies to be transported to Germany, to give the product of their labor to the Germans.

The first reason given for this brutal course is, as usual, military necessity. In order to give themselves an excuse the Germans announced that they would take the unemployed on the ground that they might as well be employed where they would be useful. But who is "employed" in Belgium? That is, who has steady employment? In general, of course, there is no such thing to be had, and so the Germans found plenty of "unemployed."

Already they have deported more than 100,000 Belgians, and they are continuing to drive the pitiable procession into an alien land at the rate, according to latest estimates, of 4,000 a day in Antwerp alone.

Thus deprived of what protection their men folk could give them, the women and children are more completely than ever dependent on the Belgian Relief Committee.
