

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—Why do boys and girls, blessed with kind parents who provide well for them, leave home?

I know a girl whose father and mother lavished every luxury upon her, but who left them heartbroken to go out into the world, where she met with grievous disappointments, but was finally prevailed upon to return home. Is this sorry state of affairs caused by our carefree, jazz-mad, modern age?







# Too Low Air Pressure

In recent years the comfort of Balloon tires has created a tendency on the part of those still using high-pressure tires to very materially reduce their air pressure. 

In addition to driving with reasonable care, the way to avoid these mishaps is to buy tires of a size adequate for the load to be carried and then to keep them inflated in accordance with the maker's recommendation. This information regarding tire size and inflation can be obtained from good tire dealers.

To guide you in maintaining the desirable inflation it is necessary that you have a pressure gauge. As our first united work the New Brunswick chapters forwarded through their Provincial Chapter almost \$10,000 for the hospital ship fund. In 1915 the individual and charter members of the Provincial Chapter formed the Governor Carleton, primary chapter. Since 1910 the order in New Brunswick has raised about \$250,000. A large percentage of this money has been expended in war work. The chapters were generous in their contributions of work and money for soldiers and sailors comforts, the Red Cross, Navy League, Maple Leaf Club, Y. M. C. A., and the many overseas organizations for war work and relief. The military hospitals and convalescent homes have been well remembered by all chapters. Colors were presented to New Brunswick regiments by two chapters, the Royal Standard, Saint John, and the Lord Chatham, Chatham. Special dinners, comforts, magazines, entertainments and extras were provided for the men in training camps here and quantities of field comforts were sent to the front. Gifts were presented to men leaving for overseas and the Daughters of the Empire were on hand to welcome those who came back.

LOCAL WAR MEMORIALS. Many chapters have assisted in the building of local war memorials and one chapter, the Lieutenant-Colonel Boyd Anderson, has given to the city of Moncton a fine monument in honor of the Moncton men who gave their lives in the war. Almost all the chapters contributed to the support of the Victorian Order nurse, child welfare work baby clinics, nurses' homes and in hospitals in their own community. The educational work, too, is being well done. Some \$21,817.22 has been contributed to the war memorial. Prizes, libraries, pictures, flag charts, and flags have been given to the schools. Patriotic and Empire Day programs have been arranged each year.

SOME PROVISIONS

The new by-law provides for a scale of fees for permits and gives the building inspector power to vary the requirements of the law, under spectial conditions. It also makes provision for an appeal from the decision of the building inspector if he refuses to grant any permit, such appeal to be to an arbitration board of five members, two to be appointed by the city, two by the interested parties, and the fifth by these four: all to be architects, engineers or four; all to be architects, engineers or master builders, and a finding of a ma-jority to be binding on both parties.

DEALS WITH SIGNS

The new by-law makes it obligatory for owners of property to secure a permit before they can place any sign-board or advertising device, and they must file with the application a plan of the sign. It also deals with the erection of signs on buildings and the provisions under which they can be erected. All applications have to be made to the building inspector.

FIRE DISTRICTS

Under the fire department by-law the districts remain as they are at present, but provision is made for certain concessions in each of the districts. All business premises over three stories in height are required to have a sprinkler system installed.

Violators of the by-laws are liable to a fine of \$50 and a further fine of \$10 for each day such infringement of the by-law continues. The scale of fees is as follows:

Permits expire if active work is not commenced in six months from the date of granting, but may be renewed at the discretion of the building inspector.
