




Baldwin Much Concerned.

## Mrs. Louis Sherwin **Evicted**, Homeless

Turned Out of Old Mill, Where She Lived a Year With Her Three Children.

Oyster Bay, L. I., Aug. 4.—Alter-iately defiant and resigned, Mrs. Louis Sherwin, wife of a former New York dramatic critic, and three children were evicted from an old mill on the North Shore Road which she had made her home for a year. The vacation of the premises, which are owned by the Beekman estate, had been ordered by the courts.

Mrs. Sherwin, without a roof, re-fused all offers of help and declared she had no idea where she would live She would not stay at the mill, cr with friends or in the woods. Her children—a boy of 11 and two girls, 13 and 14 years old—were being well cared for by a neighbor she would not name, but she declared she did not know where she would spend the night. The next minute she said she would stay at the mill. Sympathetic persons offered her money or to provide for her at the Oyster Bay Inn. All were re-buffed and to none would she con-fide her plans.

The furniture in the ancient struc-ture, which Mrs. Sherwin had convert-ed into a studio and living apartment in accordance with her ideas of artistic decoration, was removed by Constable Russell Ebbetts and his helpers to a storage warehouse in Cold Spring Har-bor. Mrs. Sherwin rode on the last load, leaving her children at the mill. On her return she found that the structure had been boarded and nailed up, with the children inside. It ap-peared that the constable, after the household goods had been removed, knocked to see if any. one remained and, getting no answer, had closed the place.

She returned to the mill, and still declared her intention of starting to clean the place. To all starting to clean the place. where she would sleep even if she where she would sleep even if she knew. Earlier in the day she had said it looked as if she would go to jail or live "next to nature," but she was con-fident, she maintained, that she could provide for the children. "I do not intend to expose them to any danger, even if their mother sleeps in the woods or in the jail in the Town Hall," she said. Mrs. Sherwin moved into the remod-eled grist mill in July, 1922. She paid one month's rent. After that she de-clared it an unhealthy place in which


