

AN ADAPTATION OF THE VARIO COUPLER.

AN ADAPTATION OF THE VARIO COUPLER.

The usual form of vario coupler having a ninety degree variation from maximum coupling to minimum coupling is in common use and has already been described. The receiver to be described here makes use of a vario coupler which has 180 degrees variation between maximum and minimum coupling. This feature is obtained by tilting the primary of the coupler from a position in which the plane of the coil is parallel to the panel of the set to an angle of forty-five degrees with the panel, in which position it is securely mounted. The secondary coil is made small enough so that it may be rotated inside of the primary coil. Figure 1 shows the method of mounting the vario coupler in this manner which permits a finer adjustment of coupling value.

This receiver has a range sufficient to cover the amateur stations and the broadcasting stations. The aerial circuit consists of the aerial, the primary of the variocoupler having fifty turns of wire on a four inch tube with tops every ten turns, and a variable condenser in series with the primary and ground having a capacity of about .001 microfarads.
