



Estimates of Mr. Carnegie's wealth put it at possibly \$500,000,000. When he retired in 1901 he sold his securities of the Carnegie Steel Corporation for \$303,450,000 in bonds of that company. He was possessed of large interests in addition to those bonds. When he started in 1901 to endow his great benefactions he made inroads into his capital for several years in gifts to libraries for peace propaganda, and to other philanthropic causes.

The fortune of \$808,450,000 in 5 per cent. bonds, if allowed to increase by the accumulation of interest and reinvestment since 1901 would amount to about a billion dollars today, but his numerous benefactions prevented this. 

"Among the members of the O. M. F. C. recently repartiated on the S. S. Regina were some fifty officers and other ranks who were attending various British universities during the period of demobilization. These men arranged a meeting at which the following resolution was unanimously adopted: (a) That this body wish to place on record an acknowledgment of their great debt of gratitude to Colonel Tory and to those associated with him who have made it possible for them to secure this opportunity of studying in the great centres of learning in the British isles; (b) That a letter be written to the leading Canadian nowspapers in order to bring to the attention of the Canadian people the work of inestimable value performed by the Kducation Services, O. M. F. C. "We do not intend to outline the work undertaken by the Khaki University of the canadian soldiers. We have been specially benefited, and we wish to refer only to one branch of their endeavor, to the location of Canadian soldiers in the universities of the British Isles; (b) That a letter be written to the leading Canadian army were selected by the Khaki University of the Canadian soldiers. 




