KING GEORGE URGES CZAR TO STAY HIS HAND; BUT **GERMANY MAY LET LOOSE DOGS OF WAR ANY TIME**

HE HAS STRIVEN HARD FOR PEACE

Only Hope Now Is In Efforts Being Made By The British Sovereign

Situation Regarded as Desperate and One Report Says Czar Has Already Ordered Mobliization of His Forces on Sea and Land -- British Cabinet in Session Over Situation

HE COMMUNICATES ALSO WITH

London, Aug. 1 — King George of England today threw his full support to the cause of peace. He sent an urgent message to Czar Nicholas of Russia. It was reported in diplomatic circles that the message was an appeal for the Czar to stay his hand and avert the war catastrophe that threatens. As a member of the triple entente, England may be able to wield an in-fluence that will curb Russia, and at the eleventh hour prevent the terrific clash to which all nations have been rushing for a week. News that Germany had sent an ultimatum to Russia and had demanded from France a statement of her position, is believed to have been the cause of King George's action. Premier Asquith dashed from his home to Buckingham Palace in an auto-mobile at two o'clock this morning, after receiving the latest reports from the foreign office. The king had not gone to bed, and the premier was immediately received. The conference of the king and premier, who is also minister of war, was brief, and Asquith then returned to his home.

The hand drier is, of ocurse, absolutely sanitary, as it is un-necessary to touch any part of the ap-paratus when using it. London, Aug. 1—The big lockout of builders which has held up building op-erations in London for months, is slowly crumbling without any definite settle-ment, and the army of ironworkers, masons, carpenters and other men are re-turning to their work. The lockout arose from a number of sectional strikes, the men demanding better wages and shorter hours. Nego-tiations went on for week after week without any result, except for the mem-bers of the big and wealthy trades unions, who secured better terms and have now returned to work, leaving the smaller unions, which refused all terms offered by the contractors, to shift for themselves. As these smaller unions are nearly bankrupt, the members are ex-pected to follow the example of the more wealthy unions. The story of the struggle shows how the men are revolting against the old leadership system. Three times the men refused terms agreed upon by their leaders.
