OBITUARIES.

THE REV. JAMES DEGEER

Was born at Queenston, in the Niagara District, October, 1805, and died at Minesing, Vespra Township, January 29th, 1893. Our late brother was converted to God at the age of fifteen years, and united in membership with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, under whose ministrations he had been led to the Saviour. The Church, discovering in him the necessary gifts and graces, licensed him in 1834 as an exhorter, and subsequently as a local preacher. In the year 1841, he united with the Methodist Episcopal branch of the Church. In September of that year he received ordination as a deacon, and two years subsequently he was ordained an elder. In 1845, owing to domestic circumstances, he was compelled to ask permission to locate, which request the Niagara Conference regrettably granted. Subsequently he continued to preach as opportunity offered and health permitted.

As a Christian, Brother Degeer lived a consecrated and exemplary life. His piety was manifest to all who knew him. "He wore the white flower of a blameless life." As a preacher, he was characterized by deep earnestness and fidelity; he was a typical preacher of the type of the earlier Canadian Methodist preachers. His death was a triumph. While able, during his last illness, his voice was frequently uplifted in magnifying the God of his salvation. He appeared to literally see the invisible; and, as his voice failed, his whisperings were of "Jesus and His love."

THE REV. JAMES CURTS.

A busy, honorable and useful career closed to eyes this side the flood in the death of the Rev. James Curts, at Belleville, October 26th, 1892. James Curts was an earnest, laborious and successful Methodist preacher, and has, with a wealth of toil, patience and sacrifice, gone to his reward in the heavens. God give us men like-minded to fill his place! Loving Methodism with his whole soul; in the simplicity of his heart true to her doctrines, usages and polity; rejoicing in the fellowship of her people; coveting not what we sometimes call "the high places," but her fields of work; true up to the measure of his best ability to the demands of every position into which his brethren thrust him; genial in his spirit and always preferring concession to strife; all alive with the Gospel and presenting it, and it alone, for the salvation of men, he has demonstrated the power of the Christian religion, the excellency of the Christian character, the divinity of the Christian ministry, the infinity of the abounding goodness and grace of God, and the possibilities, even in a sinful world, of a humble, holy man, and a faithful preacher of the Word of Life. He was born near Preston, York County, July 25th, 1829; at twenty years of age he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, Canada; entered the ministry in 1852; was married to Miss Adams, Utica, N.Y., in 1855; has served his Church as presiding elder for several years, as Secretary of the old Ontario Conference during the years of its existence, as delegate to General Conferences both before and since the union, as a member of Book Committees and College Boards, as a member of the Committee formulating the basis of union, and as the first President of the Bay of Quinte Conference after union. His brethren much respected, highly esteemed and truly loved him. But more than these church offices and honors, our brother departed valued his circuit ministry and preaching to the people on the fields God and His Church gave him. Hamilton, Dumfries, Vienna, Malahide, Palermo, Brooklyn, Queensville, Newmarket, Orono, Brampton, King, Belleville, Newburgh, Oakwood, and Keene all shared in the benefits of his ministerial service and pastoral care, and on all are fruits of his ministry, witnesses that he walked with God, and lovers and admirers for his works' sake and the sake of Christ his beloved Lord.

At the time of his death he had entered the agency of Albert College, Belleville, with a determination and a hope to remove its debt, if God spared him. His sickness was not protracted, and his death at the last came much more quickly than had been at all expected. An abscess of the liver likely precipitated the crisis, and brought the end. With his usual perseverance, amounting almost to an obstinacy in the performance of what he considered duty, he had continued his work till he actually fell in the pulpit. Always mild to others, he was exacting upon himself. We say, "He ought not to have done it," and, "perhaps might have lived longer," but we do not know. We know neither as to the fact, nor as to what is best for the godly man under the circumstances. It is enough that he served his God to the end and is now with his Lord. God gave him a large and a good family, and for them his sacrifices were cheerful and immeasurable. They have the infinite consolation that they had a devoted husband and a noble, irreproachable, generous and loving father. We can but pray, "God comfort them in their affliction," and "The Lord God favor His Church, our Church, with many men like the diligent, honest, kind, cheerful, triumphant James Curts." Earth is richer for his life and labor, society is richer, the Church is richer, the country is richer and better; and heaven is enriched, through the blood of the Lamb, by his character, fellowship and service throughout the endless ages.

THE REV. DANIEL F. GEE,

The second son of William and Hannah Gee, was born in the township of Scarborough, on the 26th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1840, and died in Newcastle on the 6th of February, 1893. When but nine years of age he was converted to God, at a prayer-meeting held in his father's house. In the early dawn of budding man there came into his soul a richer, fuller, baptism of spiritual life and light. Then it was he heard the Master's call to go and bear His message of mercy to dying men. He at once entered upon a course of literary and theological training in Victoria College at Cobourg. He entered upon his probation for the Methodist ministry in 1864. The years of his probation were marked by earnest and efficient toil, proving by gifts, grace and fruits that his call was divine. On the 7th day of June, 1868, by the late Dr. Punshon, he was ordained to the office and work of the Christian ministry. Shortly afterwards he was united in marriage to Elvira D. Crosby, of Markham, who with two daughters and three sons mourn the loss of a kind husband and a loving father.

During these twenty-five years Brother Gee has labored successively on the following charges:—Stouffville, Alliston, Bondhead, Aurora, Thornbury, Norwood, Millbrook, Trenton and Newcastle. As a preacher, our brother was clear, logical and instructive; as a pastor, kind and sympathetic. While he ever ought to win the hearts of men to God, and build up true Christian character, he was also successful in church and parsonage building and improvement; and on many of the circuits where he labored, there are standing to-day beautiful and commodious church edifices—sacred monuments of his ceaseless energy and unremitting toil. It was while thus engaged in extensive church improvements that he was summoned to his eternal rest. On the last Sabbath in January he preached his last sermon. That night he was stricken with a fierce and fatal disease that neither medical skill nor ministry of loving hearts and hands could stay or cure. The call was unexpected, but found him prepared. Responsive to inquiries respecting his hope beyond, he said, "All is well, all is well, if God should call." But he would gladly linger with the dear ones in the home-circle a little longer. But as the unseen messenger drew nearer, he whispered "Christ was never sweeter and heaven never dearer than now." At 3 o'clock on Monday morning, Feb. 6th, with a heaven-lit smile, that lingered on the face of clay, he passed from death into life.

The funeral services were held in the Methodist Church, Newcastle, on Wednesday, Feb. 8th, when the Rev. T. W. Jolliffe, Chairman of the District, preached a most impressive and comforting sermon from Rev. xxi. 4, after which the Revs. President Roberts and Wm. Buchanan delivered appropriate addresses. The remains were taken to the residence of P. P. Crosby, of Markham. On the following morning, after an appropriate memorial service, conducted by the Rev. Jos. Young, and assisted by the Revs. Messrs. Chambers, Anderson, Stewart, Real and Brown, all that was mortal of our departed brother was placed in the silent tomb and there awaits the resurrection of the Just.

REV. WALTER W. LLOYD.

Walter Wilbur Lloyd was the son of the late J. B. Lloyd, and was born in the Township of King, County of York, in the year 1847. His boyhood was not marked by anything out of the ordinary experience of boy life. After attending the public school he continued his studies at the high school until he became fitted for the profession of school teaching, in which profession he successfully engaged for a number of years. Although he had been reared in a home that was not devoid of Christian influences, his conversion did not take place until he was twenty-one years of age. This important event, which not only brought a new experience to his own heart, but also decided the future

course of his life, took place under the labors of the Rev. T. Argue, in King City. Soon after his conversion the new life began to manifest itself in a desire to be the instrument of good to others, and in efforts for their spiritual well-being. The question of giving up his secular calling and devoting himself entirely to the Lord's work began to press itself upon him. The conviction that this was his duty grew upon him until there was no room for doubt that a call had come from God to enter the work of the Christian ministry. The Church soon recognized in him gifts and graces that could be used with advantage in the Master's work, and she opened the door to her ministry and invited him to enter. This he did, thus settling a question that for some time had been giving him painful anxiety. He was received on trial as a probationer for the Methodist ministry in 1875, and was appointed to the Utterson Mission, where he labored faithfully for one year. At the end of that year, feeling his need of a more thorough equipment for the work upon which he had entered, he asked permission to attend college. This request was complied with, and he attended for a full term as a theological student at Victoria University. As a student he was diligent and painstaking. After three years spent at College he went back to active work better prepared to discharge the duties and bear the responsibilities of a Christian minister. Two years spent on Thornbury and Scarboro' Circuits completed his probation, and he was received into full connection with the Conference, and ordained in 1880. He was united in marriage to Miss Bella Hunter, who, with three children, are left to mourn the loss of a kind husband and loving father. Subsequently he travelled the following Circuits: Victoria Road, Warsaw, Plainville, Manilla and Epsom. On these charges he served well and faithfully the interests of the Methodist Church and the cause of Christ. At the close of his first year on the Epsom Circuit he found his health giving way. He sought, through a short period of rest, to re-establish it, but in this he was only partially successful. Resuming his work again, disease more firmly fastened itself upon him, medical skill being unavailing to check it. His decline was rapid; but during that decline the divine presence was his comfort and the grace that fails not his support. On the morning of November 3rd, 1892, Brother Lloyd peacefully closed his eyes and "ceased to work and live." Brother Lloyd, as all who knew him will testify, was a man of beautiful spirit, and was earnest and devoted to his work.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

The Statistical Committee beg to report as follows :—

We rejoice to note that the statistical returns generally show signs of progress and prosperity, and especially in a reported increase of membership amounting to 1,011, making a total of 37,506 for the Conference.

The Connexional Funds reported are as follows :—

The grand total for all purposes, \$282,231.18 ; increase over last year, \$10,784.64.

We find that the average salary for ministers is \$676.40, being increase of \$20.78 ; and probationers average \$253.23.

We regret to find that the deficiencies in ministerial salary amount to \$1,420, being an increase over last year of \$666.

We further respectfully recommend :—

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund, for the year ending July 31st, 1892:

We have pleasure in being able to state that the income for the Annual Fund has increased from Circuits, \$1,443.16, and from Ministers' subscriptions \$435.41; thus enabling us to meet the claims in full, notwithstanding the increased expenses, as shown in the financial statement, and yet keep within the estimates for the year.

There has also been an addition of \$12,373.91 made to the capital account in the item of legacies, being an increase over the preceding year

of \$5,936.66. This shows a very commendable disposition on the part of our friends to contribute in this way for the permanent benefit of the Fund.

It has been found very difficult to secure safe investments for our funds at present rates. We have therefore been under the necessity of keeping a larger amount in the bank than we thought to be desirable. It was, however, considered better to do this than to invest in doubtful securities. This has led to a falling off in our interest account of about \$340.

On account of the unusual mortality among our aged ministers, the expired claims will about balance the new claims placed on the Fund.

REPORT OF SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have carefully examined the matter submitted to them, and make the following recommendations:—

1. That a fund be established to be known as the Sustentation Fund of the Bay of Quinte Conference.

2. The object of this fund shall be to augment the salaries of all ministers and probationers in the active work in the Conference who receive less than the following amounts: ordained married men, \$600; ordained unmarried men, \$350; probationers, \$300. These amounts in every case to include salary, board, fuel and horse keep.

3. The income of the fund shall be the amounts received from offerings and special collections taken on all our Circuits and Missions.

4. The general management of this Fund shall be entrusted to a committee composed of one minister and one layman elected to the Annual Conference by each Annual District Meeting when the laymen are present, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Annual Conference on the nomination of the Committee. This Committee shall transact all necessary business in accordance with the following regulations:

(a) In making grants from the fund the Committee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned scale of allowances. No claim shall be entertained which has not been recommended by the Annual District Meeting, and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims for recommendation shall declare their inability to meet their net deficiencies.

(b) Should the income of the fund in any year prove insufficient to meet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to make up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to the aforementioned scale. Should there be a surplus over the said claim, it shall be carried forward and included in the total income for the ensuing year.

(c) A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference annually while in session, including a summary of the business transacted, and audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary to the interests of the fund, said report as adopted by the Conference to be printed in the Minutes.

5. Your Committee recommend the appointment of Rev. W. R. Young B.A., as Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee respectfully report as follows:

We hereby reaffirm our uncompromising hostility to the liquor traffic, and our determination to give it no countenance or quarter. Further, we deem it unwise, unpatriotic and unchristian to afford such business any legal status; and that, as a moral and Christian people, enjoying constitutional government, the electorate must be held largely responsible so long as legal sanction is given to this destructive business. And our people are hereby entreated, in the interests of God and humanity, to use the franchise for the extirpation of a traffic the very existence of which is a standing menace to the well-being of the individual, the home, the state, and the Church of our God.

The Provincial Government having determined that there shall be a plebiscite on the question of prohibition, we hereby pledge ourselves, as a Conference, to earnest effort toward securing the largest possible vote in favor of annihilating the liquor traffic; but, in doing so, we would strongly affirm our conviction that our first duty should be to look carefully after the election to all positions, municipal and legislative, of men in proved and pledged sympathy with prohibition.

That we recommend all our ministers to preach a sermon, as early in December as possible, with a view to securing the largest possible vote of our people in favor of prohibition, when the plebiscite is submitted.

Your Committee would recommend that Revs. E. D. Lewis and G. W. Dewey, and Messrs. W. W. Chown and R. Moment be the representatives of this Conference to the next annual meeting of the Dominion Alliance.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Sabbath School Committee would beg leave to report as follows :

Number of preaching appointments, 548 ; increase, 14. Number of schools, 490 ; increase, 6. Officers and teachers, 4,572 ; increase, 181. Scholars, 36,500 ; increase, 943. Conversions, 2,332 ; increase, 537. Members of Church, 9,591 ; increase, 1,975. Learning catechism, 4,171 ; increase, 227. Pledged to total abstinence, 9,604 ; increase, 1,390. Volumes in library, 39,081 ; increase, 5,753. Contributions to Missions, \$2,602.49 ; increase, \$267.82. Raised for School purposes, \$17,149.10 ; increase, \$272.20. Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund, \$374.71 ; increase, \$41.84. Teachers' meetings held by 47 Schools ; increase, 4. Schools open all the year, 284 ; decrease, 9.

Your Committee regret to find that some of our Schools are without our own Sunday School publications, and would earnestly urge upon our people the importance to our Church and country of patronizing only such publications as will build up our people in loyalty to Methodism and the country in which they live.

We also find that many of our Schools are closed during the winter months, and would urge upon all Superintendents of Circuits to use their best efforts to prevent the continuation of this evil.

While we rejoice that so many of the children have been converted to God during the year, we would recommend and emphasize the importance of forming catechumen classes where possible.

We would recommend that not only the children, but also the officers and teachers, abstain from the use of alcohol and tobacco, and that the pledge found in our Discipline be signed by them.

We regret, as in reports of former years, that that grand treasury of Methodist doctrine, the Catechism, is studied by so few in our Schools, and would urge its adoption by all.

We would all call to mind the fact that in many of our Districts there are no regular Sabbath School Conventions held under the auspices of our Church, as ordered by the Discipline (Section 311), and heartily recommend that the disciplinary requirement be carried out.

We further recommend that there be a Children's Day, and so far as practicable, it be held on the first Sabbath in September.

We would nominate the Rev. C. L. Thompson to be the Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year, and that he be Conference delegate to the Provincial Sabbath School Association.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report :

1. That there has been an increase in the number of Leagues during the year of 31, with an increase in membership of 1,222, and that there are about 60 circuits or 400 congregations that report no organization. The total number of Leagues reported is 129.

And we would recommend :

2. That, in order to secure uniformity throughout our Church in the organization and work of our young people's societies, and co-operation with Christian Endeavor Societies in conventions, and such other ways as may be desirable, the name and constitution of the Epworth League of Christian Endeavor be adopted by all Epworth League, Christian Endeavor, and other young people's societies, by whatever name they may be known.

3. To facilitate and secure the organization, in all our Churches, of the Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, we recommend, in harmony with the action of the Methodist Young People's Provincial Association, that a brother in each District be requested to act as secretary of his District, and who shall be in correspondence with Rev. C. W. Watch, representative of the Executive of the Provincial Association.

(a) It shall be expected of each secretary to inform himself thoroughly of the organization and work of these societies.

(b) To learn where societies have not been formed throughout his District.

(c) To assist in the organization of societies wherever he may be desired by the pastor of the circuit to do so, and to give any and all information respecting young people's work that may be needed by the societies of his District.

The following names are suggested by the Committee:—Belleville, C. P. Holton; Napanee, J. J. Rae; Picton, S. G. Rorke; Brighton, J. G. Lewis, B.A.; Cobourg, J. F. Mears; Bowmanville, D. S. Houck; Uxbridge, E. D. Lewis; Cannington, F. Brandon; Lindsay, N. Hill; Peterboro', S. T. Bartlett; Campbellford, C. N. Callender; Madoc, G. Brown; Tamworth, G. R. Clare.

4. Your Committee are of the opinion that League conventions could be held in connection with the District Sunday School conventions, and recommend that a trial be given to this plan.

5. We also recommend the formation of the Junior Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, and, where junior societies are organized, the adoption of the above name.

6. Feeling the importance of having our Methodist young people brought into closer relation with and more directly interested in the educational work of the Church, and recognizing the great need of providing some means for more systematic training in methods of Christian work and the study of the English Bible, and rejoicing to learn that steps are being taken by the General Board of the Epworth League and Executive of the Methodist Young People's Association to devise some scheme whereby these ends shall be attained, we heartily endorse the plan so far as it has been presented.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

A review of the work of the past year cannot fail to extort from every heart the grateful exclamation, "What hath God wrought!" The past year has been marked by many signs of the Divine approval. The Holy Ghost has been richly poured out, and signs and wonders have been wrought in the name of the Lord Jesus.

An increase of 1,011 in the membership of this Conference proves that the word preached has been with power, accompanied by the demonstration of the Holy Ghost. The great work of building up Christian believers and their perfecting in holiness has occupied a great deal of the careful attention of our Ministry.

It is greatly to be desired, that in this matter, care should be taken in the employment of a certain class of evangelists, who, in the presentation of this precious truth, make division, cause sad havoc, produce a feeling of distrust, and even antagonism between pastor and people. Let our brethren preach, exhort and live this great scriptural doctrine, and great will be the blessing.

It is a matter for congratulation that the missionary cause still holds a foremost place in the hearts and affections of our people, the income showing a slight increase on last year.

The work of God amongst our young people in connection with our Epworth Leagues is a matter of thankfulness. Your Committee would urge upon the pastors of this Conference the desirability of such a Society in connection with every Church. These are the hope of our Church, whence our workers, either in the pulpit or school, or as officials, are to be recruited.

Your Committee desire to put on record, that in order to develop an intelligent love and loyalty to our Church, its institutions and great connexional enterprises, the *Christian Guardian* should, in some way, find an entrance into every Methodist home; to accomplish this should be the great object of those who in this matter "are in authority over us."

We have no way of ascertaining what is the average attendance upon the various means of grace, that are peculiar to us as a people. It is desirable that nothing should be allowed to take the place of the class-meeting. It is certain that the greater the attendance of our people on the class-meeting, the greater will be their spirituality.

This Committee would repeat the recommendation of last year, viz.: That when the state of the work is before the Annual District Meeting, some facts be embodied in a resolution and forwarded to the Annual Conference for the consideration of the Conference Committee. Only one District—Cobourg—complied with this request.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg leave to report:

That while devoutly thankful for the loyal adherence of Canadians to the laws touching the Divine institution of the Sabbath, we nevertheless deeply regret that in our land there seems to exist still a restless disposition to violate its sanctity.

And we desire to offer our emphatic protest against all such pleasure or profit seeking, which tends to weaken the convictions of our people of the hallowed nature of the day of rest.

Your Committee, believing that in education very largely lies the perpetuation of the Sabbath as God ordained it, wish to urge that greater prominence be given to a careful teaching of the young, both in the home and Sabbath Schools.

We further report that it is with regret and indignation we learn of the persistent and unholy efforts made to throw open the gates of the Columbian Exposition during this summer, thus flagrantly violating the laws of a Christian nation, demoralizing the thought and sentiment of a visiting public, and outraging the consciences of deceived exhibitors. And we do most heartily concur in the earnest and solemn protests unananimously made by the various Conferences now in session against the dishonorable and dishonoring course pursued by the Exposition directors, and do join with said Conferences in recommending that all our people decline from attending the Exhibition until such steps as are necessary be taken by its directors to respect the sacredness of the Christian Sabbath.

6. That permission be given the Trustee Board of the Lemonville parsonage property to sell their parsonage in Stouffville, proceeds to be applied in providing a new parsonage within the bounds of the circuit.
7. That permission be given the trustees of the Carmel and Devitt's churches upon the Cartwright Circuit, to sell the said churches, the proceeds to be used in rebuilding the Cadmus church on said circuit.

Further, we recommend that there be greater definiteness in the wording of the resolutions handed in to the Church Property Committee by the several district secretaries.

4. That the expenses of these Conventions be met by collections taken up thereat.

That Rev. G. Edwards be the treasurer of the Billeting Fund, and that the treasurer be required to report at the ensuing Conference.

ALBERT COLLEGE.

Rev. Principal Dyer, M.A., B.Sc., presented the report :

There has been 227 students enrolled during the present year. There are 10 senior matriculants, 3 senior leaving candidates, 34 junior matriculants, 4 junior leaving candidates, and 7 primary candidates—so that every class of High School and Collegiate work is represented. There were 23 students who wrote on the Conference preliminary examination. There can be no question that Albert College offers just the opportunity that these men require.

The following resolution was adopted :—

Moved by Rev. J. S. Clarke, seconded by Rev. O. R. Lambly, M.A.,

That this Conference having listened attentively to the report of Albert College, offer their congratulations to Principal Dyer and the Faculty of the College in view of the great success of the past year, and we hereby pledge ourselves to give the institution our heartiest sympathy and support.

WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

Rev. Dr. Shaw, of the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, addressed the Conference in the interests of that institution.

The whole equipment of McGill University is available to this institution in Arts.

In Theology some students confine themselves to the ordinary course for probationers. Provision, however, is made for a much heavier course for licentiates in Theology, requiring three years' attendance at lectures, and including one-half (the most useful part) of the pass work in Arts, viz., Logic, Mental Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geology, Hebrew (two years preparatory to the B.D. course), and French (obligatory on Montreal Conference students). These are taken in McGill University. In addition the student takes Algebra, Geometry and three years in English. Accompanying this Arts work there is a full course in Dogmatics, Apologetics, Greek, Latin, History, Homiletics, Church Polity, Elocution and Vocal Music. There is also the higher course in Divinity leading to the Degree of B.D., which is thought to be as extensive and serviceable as the B.D. course of any other Theological College in Canada.

Total number of students, 72. The assets are over \$120,000 in buildings and endowments.

Moved by Rev. W. J. Crothers, M.A., seconded by W. E. Tilley, Ph.D.

That this Conference has heard with great pleasure the report of Rev. Dr. Shaw, Professor in the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal. We desire to recognize the very important work which that institution is accomplishing in the theological education of our young men, and are profoundly thankful for the prosperity that has marked the history of the institution during the past year. We beg to assure the professor of our hearty sympathy with his work, and earnestly pray that still greater success may attend the institution in the future.

ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Secretary read the report. There are 150 resident students and 26 day pupils; 33 students came from various parts of the United States. The Churches were represented as follows: Methodists, 100; Presbyterians, 33; Episcopalians, 27; Baptists, 13; Friends, Disciples, and Roman Catholics, each 1.

Nearly 20 students and inmates of the College have professed conversion during the year and united with the various Christian Churches.

Moved by Rev. O. R. Lambly, M.A., seconded by Rev. E. Roberts,

That we have heard with pleasure the report of Alma Ladies' College for the past year. We rejoice at the progress made in the higher intellectual culture of the young ladies of our homes. It is to us a matter of special rejoicing that the true spirit of missions is fostered, and is yearly producing such practical results as indicated in the report.

ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE.

The annual report was presented by Rev. Dr. J. J. Hare, M.A., Ph.D., Governor of the College.

Pupils have been prepared for second and first class departmental examinations, junior and senior matriculation, the Freshman and Sophomore years of the University, with some of the modern language classes of the junior or third year of the University course. Two of the pupils have this year taken high standing in Victoria University. The Fine Art Department still maintains its high character of efficiency, under the able direction of Prof. L. R. O'Brien, for ten years President of the Royal Canadian Academy. There is also provision made for a thorough commercial course, embracing Telegraphy, Phonography, and Typewriting.

Resolved,—That this Conference, having heard with pleasure the report of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, desires to express its satisfaction with the present work and equipment of the College, rejoices in the prospect of improvement and progress, and heartily commends to the confidence and patronage of the Christian people of this Province an institution where the highest type of instruction in literature and in art is combined with the most careful nurture of morals and religion.

Rev. A. B. Demill, of the Demill Ladies' College, was introduced, and addressed the Conference in the interests of the Children's School conducted by him in the city of Toronto.

Resolved,—That the Conference has been deeply impressed with the statements of Rev. A. B. They related their Christian experience and call to the ministry. It was moved by Rev. R. Duke, Secretary of Conference, and seconded by Rev. Professor Wallace, M.A., and

Resolved.—That these young men whose names have been read, be now received into full connexion, and on Sabbath morning next they be ordained to the office and work of the Christian ministry.

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE CONGREGATIONS UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—“Grace be to you and peace from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.” “We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you always in our prayers; remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father.”

With devout gratitude we acknowledge the presence of God in all our Conference sessions, giving spiritual refreshing and business efficiency. The mercies of the year have been very great.

Upon almost every field of toil there have been outpourings of the Spirit, leading to the conversion of souls and the quickening of the Church. The sower and the reaper have rejoiced together, and hundreds of churches have participated in the gladness of the Harvest Home. A kindly Providence has brooded over our country, and our Methodist families have shared largely in the bountiful material blessings which God has poured upon the land.

There are many subjects demanding attention in our annual address, because of their far-reaching influence upon our life and growth as a Church. First, a higher type of Christian life is the great need of the Church to-day. Christians are to impress the world with the truth and blessedness of Christianity by their holy living. The eye of the world keenly discerns the life of the Church. Men of the world see us as we are, and to vindicate Christianity before them we must “put on the Lord Jesus Christ,” and “have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness.” Our Methodist banners bear the Bible insignia, “Holiness unto the Lord,” and this demands of us the highest spiritual life and the purest moral character.

Let us be men and women who hold the truth and are held by the truth; who live in Christ and for Christ, filled with the Holy Ghost and faith unfeigned; then shall we be “living epistles known and read of all men,” and God shall be glorified in us. A Church thus equipped shall be “Fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners.”

The unit in the Bible is not the individual, but the family. Since the hour when “God saw it was not good the man should be alone,” and planted amid the bowers of Eden the foundations of the home and the family, He has dealt with the race with marked reference to the organic unity of the household. The home is an institution of God’s planting, and every home should be formed with the clearest divine sanctions. A sanctified home and sanctified parent-hood furnish the greatest conditions of a hopeful future for the Church and the race. Back of the covenant relation which forms the home, and back of parental training or neglect, there lies the law of heredity. If character be not inherited aptitudes are, and they give a strong bias in a good or bad direction to the whole life of our offspring. With what an awful dignity is wedlock invested. “Know ye not that your bodies are the temple of the Holy Ghost,” and “if any man defile the temple of God, him will God destroy.” Closely allied to this responsibility is that of child culture and training in the home.

The family altar, with its offering of praise and prayer and Bible reading, is a potent factor in character building. Frequent personal conversations with our children on experimental religion, and regular fellowship with them in

public worship, the prayer meeting and testimony meeting, cannot fail to bring great spiritual blessings to them. Let us have for our children a sanctified ambition that will tower above all desires for honor, pleasure, wealth and power, and seek for them an intelligent cultured, holy Christian life, that will eminently bless the world and glorify God.

We ask your earnest interest for our *missionary work*, which lies very near to the heart of the Church, and we entreat that it be made a subject of daily prayer. Never was this work so pressing as now, and never so full of encouragement. The vast fields of our operations, the great number of noble men and women engaged in the work, the vast multitudes of many tongues and nations reached by our agencies, and the magnificent results already obtained, give inspirations of hope and conquest. But this work is only begun. Fields unmeasured and unmeasurable are white unto the harvest, and God calls for reapers. What is the duty of the Church? First, Prayer. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into His harvest." Second, Faith. "If ye had faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye would say unto this mountain be thou removed and be thou cast into the sea, and it would obey you." Third, Self-sacrificing liberality. If we "love our neighbor as ourselves," we shall delight in giving our money to save the sons of China and Japan from darkness and despair. The opportunity is ours to-day. Let us grasp it and "work while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work."

Another great responsibility which presses our hearts and hands is the *educational work* of our Church. Every Church educates its own ministry. If the demands of all our congregations for an able, educated pastor be met, it must be by the liberal equipment and generous support of our colleges. As is the sympathy and support bestowed upon our colleges, so will be the intelligence and culture of our Methodist people. We are proud of our colleges, and thank God for them and the grand work they are doing. Of three of them we make special mention here. First, Victoria College, with its increased facilities and its large staff of consecrated Christian professors, whose personal influence upon the students must be a life-long benediction. Second the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, affiliated to McGill University. The growing influence, attendance and resources of this institution attest its importance in the education of the ministry of our Church; and Third, Albert College, whose work each year proves its growing power and efficiency. We ask you who send your sons and daughters away for education, to send them to Albert College, believing its home-like influence, its Christian supervision and its thorough teaching will reach the highest possibilities for your sons and daughters. The Church needs an immediate increase of thirty per cent. in the Educational Fund to meet the pressing necessities of the work. Will not the loyal congregations of our people supply this need this year, and relieve the embarrassment which so heavily presses the Church?

We have reached a crisis in our *temperance work*. All great moral and social reforms originate in and are fostered by the Church of God. True to its imate spirit, and wise to discern the Master's guiding hand, she has sought to relieve the burdens, stimulate the virtues, and correct the evils of humanity.

The Church exists, not only to smile upon the right, but also to frown upon the wrong; not only to "top off the mouldering branches" of the tree of evil, but to tear it up by the roots. In pursuance of these principles, Methodism has not ceased, and must not cease, to wage a vigorous warfare against the liquor traffic.

That is but an ephemeral manhood that wilts when under fire. The best type of character is not developed in the hot-house of self-indulgence. Thus, the best conditions of the religious life of the Church are determined by, and manifested in, uncompromising conflict with evil. As the Church is but the aggregate of the individuals composing it, so its concerted action must be inspired and directed by the same principles that should govern individual actions. These are the eternal principles of truth and righteousness

The liquor traffic maintains its existence in violation of these principles. We exhort you to continued steadfastness in pursuing this traffic to its death. The bow of promise already girdles the heavens. Never before in the history of Ontario was the outlook so hopeful to the friends of prohibition. It has been forced into the arena of practical politics. We would urge you to regard the Plebiscite Act only as a tentative measure. Make the result of your voting on this test question prophetic of the final victory, as the first grey streaks of the morning are prophetic of meridian splendor.

There is a compound called religion in politics, that will effectually heal this "running sore of humanity," the blighting drink curse. Apply the formula. Vote and pray the traffic down. Designing political tricksters and interested partisans entertain no fear of men who pray heavenward and vote hellward; but they fear the power of the ballot. Why? Because they know full well that though

"The ballot fall as soft
As snowflakes fall upon the sod;
It executes a freeman's will,
As lightning does the will of God."

The most effectual way of closing the flood-gates of intemperance is to fill them with ballots bearing the mark of intelligent piety.

We ask your attention to the question of *Christian beneficence*. We can address you on no subject fraught with greater interest and importance than this. A misconception of its nature, as involving both duty and privilege, will surely lead to barrenness both in the field of the material and spiritual. Be reminded that Paul exalts Christian beneficence to a place among the graces of the Spirit. After commending the liberality of the Macedonians, he exhorts the Corinthians as follows: "Therefore, as ye abound in everything, in faith, and utterance and knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also."

No Christian virtue can be matured without familiarity with the spirit of the Word of God. We, therefore, call upon you to study to know the Bible idea of this, as of all other graces. We, your pastors and teachers, commend to you the tithing of your increase for religious and benevolent purposes. The adoption of this scriptural method would open a fitting channel for the flow of proportionate giving. It would also aid in the development of all Christian virtues, by requiring the practice of Christlike self-denial. The world's needs are pressing for redress. These cover the entire stretches of man's complex nature, and can only be met as the Christian Church expands the area of its benevolence and love. These are inward principles which must be cultivated, out of which will grow an enlarged liberality. Our advantages are vastly superior to those of former epochs in Church history. The legitimate demands of world-wide, human brotherhood are greater than ever before. Ought we not then to give at least as large a proportion of our means for the purposes of Christian beneficence as was divinely required under less favored conditions?

We fear that some of the methods adopted for replenishing the exchequer of the Church are not only perverting and misleading as to the true spirit of giving, but are also inimical to godliness. All outward acts acceptable to God must be divinely inspired. We, therefore, urge upon you the necessity of investigating this matter with the Word of God before you, and the Spirit of God within you.

We feel that we cannot too strongly impress upon you the *importance of the means of grace*. The Church is a divinely appointed institution, and as such should be honored in the observance of those commands relating to public worship. In olden time, God's people had the tabernacle with its solemn services, afterwards the temple at Jerusalem, and thither the tribes went up to render homage unto God.

The royal Psalmist says, "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord." And again, "How amiable are Thy tabernacles, O Lord of Hosts. My soul longeth, yea, even fainteth for the courts of the Lord, my heart and my flesh crieth out for the living God." Surely, then, in this broader and better dispensation we should value our privileges, and show our attachment to the sanctuary by a regular attendance upon its worship. No little thing should ever keep us from the house of God, neither the presence of visiting friends in the home, slight indisposition, unfavorable weather, or anything else that we would not allow to keep us away from our week-day business. The same law that binds the minister to be in his pulpit binds you to be in your pew, viz., the law of duty.

If we be true men and women we shall find it a joy to assemble with God's people. A special blessing is promised unto those who thus meet together, and the admonition is, "Not forsaking the assembling of yourselves together as the manner of some is, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as ye see the day approaching."

Let us keep in touch with Christ. His indwelling presence will enable us to say, "Lord, I have loved the habitation of Thy house, and the place where Thine honor dwelleth." Your absence from church is always a disappointment to your pastor and a loss to yourself.

Our Sunday School work. When we look at the magnitude to which our Sunday School work has grown, we have much reason to be grateful to God. We have more scholars under our care than are to be found in all the other churches in Ontario. This, we say, not boastingly, but gratefully, and with the consciousness of the tremendous responsibility involved. The late Cardinal Manning said, "Let me have the training of the children up to twelve years of age, and England will soon become a nation of Catholics." The possibilities that are wrapped up in our Sunday School work are infinite. Let us endeavor to fit ourselves for the privilege thus afforded. Commentaries and lesson helps are within reach of the great majority of teachers. Use these freely at home, do not bring them before your class. Teach the Scriptures, not from a leaflet or fragment alone, but from the Book itself. Instil a love for the Bible in the mind and heart of the child. Keep your own hearts pure and peaceful by close contact with the truth. Seek not merely the entertaining or the instruction of the children, but endeavor to compass their salvation.

And now, beloved, we exhort you to know the verities of the things that cannot be shaken. Amid intellectual and spiritual unrest "hold fast that which is good." Keep your anchorage secure. Suffer not your faith to become a mere experiment. Follow not the false lights that hover over the marsh-land region of dishonest doubt, but, true to inner voices, and looking toward "The Sun of Righteousness," move ever forward in the upward faith that terminates close by the throne of God.
