The regular annual communication of the R. W. Grand Encampment of the Province of Ontario, met at the City Hall, in the City of Kingston, at 9 a. m.

- To the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

PATRIARCHS:

In pursuance of the requirements of our Constitution, it becomes my pleasing duty to present for your consideration and approval the Fifth Annual Report of our Grand Encampment, "exhibiting the condition of the Order in this jurisdiction, the date of the institution of subordinates," and such other matters of interest and importance to this branch of our Order, as have occurred since the date of our last Session. The Official year just closed has truly been one of Peace, Harmony and Prosperity. No new appeals to be presented for settlement, no misunderstandings or differences of opinion agitating or disturbing the harmony of the Patriarchs, but our twenty-five subordinates, with the chain unbroken, daily exemplifying that beautiful sentiment—" Behold how good and how pleasant it is for Brethren to dwell together in unity. It is like ointment upon the head, which ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard, that ran down to the skirts of his garment." The true spirit of Odd Fellowship is abroad in our land, and the spirit of good-fellowship finds a resting place in every tent.

NEW ENCAMPMENTS.

(1)

Since the Annual Session, August, 1873, the Executive Committee, under the authority of Sec. 2, Article 8, of the Constitution. have issued dispensations for the institution of five new Encampments.

UNITY ENCAMPMENT, No. 21, INGERSOLL, was instituted on the 6th Oct., 1873, assisted by M.E. G. High Priest Gibson, Grand Scribe Dawson, Past Grand Patriarchs McAfee and Purves, and visiting Patriarchs from London and St. Catharines. The Charter members numbered seven, and fifteen candidates were admitted and

advanced to the G. R., and eight exalted to the R. P. Degree. There never was, and is not now, a doubt as to the bright future of Unity, No. 21. In Ingersoll, Odd Fellowship means work and progress. The report for 1st July shows a membership of fifty-four. Patriarch E. Beltz, of London, accepted the position of its first D. D. Grand Patriarch, and has most satisfactorily performed the duties of the office.

Guiding Star, No. 22. Manilla, instituted 8th December, 1873, assisted by D. D. Grand Patriarchs Warriner and Male, and a goodly number of visiting Patriarchs from Port Perry and Whitby. There were nine Charter members, and eleven candidates admitted, advanced, and exalted to the R. P. D. The membership is now reported at twenty-five, with excellent prospects of a good increase during the current term. Guiding Star will draw "supplies" from the subordinate lodges located at Manilla, Sunderland, Cannington and Lindsay. This is the fourth Tent firmly planted in Ontario County within three years. Patriarch R. Warriner was appointed D. D. Grand Patriarch, and has ably performed the duties of the office.

NIAGARA FALLS ENCAMPMENT, No. 23, CLIFTON. Assisted by Grand Scribe Dawson, Past Grand Patriarchs Purves and Dolson, D. D. Grand Patriarch Cuff, and many visiting Patriarchs from St. Catharines, the Tent of Niagara Falls, No. 23, was placed in position on 11th March, 1874. This Camp started with ten Charter members, thirteen candidates admitted and advanced, and six exalted to R. P. D. Under the skillful guidance of its presiding officer, Past Grand Master Murray, strangers will find hospitable quarters and not be sent empty away. Patriarch J. E. Cuff, of St. Catharines, has efficiently acted as the first D. D. Grand Patriarch. The membership on 1st July stood at twenty-five.

FRIENDSHIP ENCAMPMENT, No. 24, PETROLIA. Again assisted by Grand Scribe Dawson, Friendship Encampment was instituted on 31st March, with seven Charter Members. The three degrees were conferred on eleven candidates. I am deeply indebted to Patriarchs Telford and Chamberlain, and D. D. G. P., Clarke, all of Strathroy, for valuable assistance and acting as Grand Officers protem. The Officers of Friendship are the right men in the right place, and the Odd Fellows of Petrolia know their duty to the stranger—and do it. D. D. Grand Patriarch Clarke has charge, and reports a membership of twenty-five. For three month's work, the result is satisfactory.

VICTORIA ENCAMPMENT, No. 25, PORT HOPE, instituted 7th May, 1874, with seven Charter members. M. E. Grand High Priest Gibson and Grand Scribe Dawson were present, and occupied their proper chairs. Several visiting Patriarchs rendered brotherly aid and assistance during the institution, installation and admission of

new members. Thirteen candidates were admitted, and received the G. R. and R. P. D. That old and highly esteemed Patriarch, Bro. C. S. Male, of Whitby, assumed charge as D. D. Grand Patriarch. Victoria, No. 25, gives promise of great future usefulness and prosperity.

It will now be necessary to confirm the action of the Executive Committee in granting the dispensations, by the issue of Charters

in the usual manner.

OFFICIAL VISITS.

The commendable example of former Grand Patriarchs. in visit ing during their ter, of office each of the Subordinate Encampments. I have been able to continue. I have to thank the Officers and members of several Camps for their ready and favorable response to my request for special meetings, in order to assist me in the performance of this portion of my duties. Without exception. the visits, to myself personally, were of the most enjoyable character, and. I have reason to believe, that in a measure they have been of service to the Camp, and of benefit to the Order at large. On each occasion my reception as a Grand Officer has been becoming and dignified, to the Grand Encampment, and to myself as a Brother and a Patriarch, most hearty and flattering. I am under heavy obligations to numerous warm and generous-hearted Patriarchs for brotherly courtesy and boundless hospitality. These visits enabled me to witness the Patriarchs "at work" under the shadows of To partake of food and rest with the Patriarchs their own Tents. by their own Camp fires, to hear the command given and the response received: "Do unto others as you would have them under similar circumstances do unto you," and to listen to the cheerful music of the Patriarchs always so pleasant and acceptable to the toil-worn traveller, is indeed a privilege to be highly prized, and a realization of the precepts and teachings of our Order, never to be effaced from my memory.

During the year it has been my privilege to join with my brother Odd-Fellows on many public occasions, such as Anniversary Demonstrations, Concerts, Excursions, Dedication of Halls, and Institution of Lodges. Most sincerely I thank the brothers who had the management of those gatherings, for an opportunity of being present, and joining with them in their pleasures and duties.

1873—Avoust 12TH. With a large number of I. O. O. F. from Whitby, Oshawa, Bowmanville, Port Hope and other points, and with a goodly representation of Grand and Past Grand Officers, visited the City of Rochester, on the invitation of the combined lodges of that City. The reception of the Canadian Brotherhood by our American Brothers, was warm, hearty, and magnificent beyond precedent. The arrangements for the comfort and edification of the visitors were made on the most extensive and liberal scale. American Odd-Fellows never do things by halves, but on this occasion they fairly outshone and outdid themselves. The visit and reception partaking somewhat of an international character, I think it well to put on record the sentiments offered, and responded to in speeches, brotherly, eloquent and interesting.

Sentiment given by Rochester Odd-Fellows:

"England's Queen, and the Queen's Dominions pre-eminent among Sovereigns in the maternity of her reign."

By Ontario in reply:

"President Grant, the chief magistrate of the United States, whose rule rests on what monarche cannot grant, the Sovereign will, the intelligence and virtue of a free people."

By Rochester :

"The Odd-Fellows of Canada fringing with the golden beams of our Order the horizon of the Queen's Dominions, as the gray of the morning is fringed by the rays of the rising sun."

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By Ontario in reply:

"The Odd-Fellows of the United States, an universal Brotherhood based upon the eternal principle of Friendship, Love, and Truth, whose sun-lit unity their Brethren of Canada fraternally greet and turn to, as the sun-flower to the God of Day."

Grand Representative Woodyatt was the Orator of the day on the part of the Canadians, and fully sustained his well earned reputation as an earnest, eloquent speaker. The whole Demonstration was carried to a successful issue, and by the untiring exertions of the Rochester Brethren every wish was anticipated and every

want supplied. 1874—FEBRUARY 3RD. I accepted the polite invitation of D. D. Grand Master Harper Wilson, of St. Catharines, to be present at the dedication of the Hall of Niagara Falls Lodge, No. 53, Clifton. The ceremony was pleasingly and correctly performed by Brother Wilson, ably assisted by visiting Brothers. The Hall is of comfortable size, conveniently situated and tastefully furnished. The Odd-Fellows of Clifton have good reason to be proud of their success in firmly planting the Order in that thriving town.

1874-FEBRUARY 4TH. Had the honor of assisting our distinguished Grand Master, Dr. Wright, in dedicating the Hall of Unity Lodge, No. 47, Hamilton. The large attendance of members and their families at once prove that Odd-Fellowship in Hamilton has struck congenial soil. The Hall is elegantly furnished, decorated and carpeted. In all its appointments, neatness and utility are everywhere observable. The Grand Master conducted our beautiful Dedication Service in an impressive and orderly form, and at the close gave a lengthy and eloquent speech on Odd-Fellowship. Our Hamilton Brethren richly deserve their new and comfortable Lodge Room, and long may they live to enjoy it, and carry out the noble commands of our Order.

1874-MARCH 25TH. I had the good fortune to be able to join with a number of Brothers from St. Catharines in instituting Orient Lodge, No. 134, in the town of Welland. The work was under the direction and supervision of D. D. Grand Master Wilson, which of itself is a guarantee that it was both correct and impressive. The leading men of Welland have taken Odd-Fellowship by the hand, and Orient will speedily take a high position in our rapidly increasing army of subordinate lodges.

1874-April 27th. Was kindly invited to preside at the Anniversary Odd-Fellows' Concert in Oshawa, under the auspices of Corinthian Lodge, No. 62. The reputation so richly earned of giving the best and most acceptable concerts of the year, was on this occasion fully sustained by Corinthian. The Lodge having no need of special funds the concert was given in aid of local charities. and thus brought prominently before the citizens of that thriving town our imperative command to relieve the sick and distressed.

1874—MAY 11TH. Met with the Standing Committee on appeals in Hamilton to consider and decide on the question of appeal, (mentioned on page 108 Grand Encampment Journal, 1873). The Committee, Past Grand Patriarch Dolson, of St. Catharines, Past Chief Patriarch Weir, of London, assisted by the valuable advice and counsel of Grand Representative Purves, arrived at an unanimous decision on the question at issue. The result of their investigation will be presented for your approval at this session by the Chairn.an of the Committee.

1874—June 12th. On the invitation of the Managing Committee I was present at a concert in the Town Hall, Strattord, given in aid of Brother Bloss Corey, under the direction of Avon Lodge, No. 41. The concert was a complete success in every particular, in number of patrons, in amount realized for Brother Corey, in the admirable arrangement of the programme, and the successful carrying out of the same, thus giving to the public another striking proof that our Order at all times and at all hazards "relieve the distressed and visit the sick." The whole affair was worthy of Brother Corey, worthy of Avon Lodge, and worthy of the generous hearts of the people of Stratford.

During the year I was forced to forego the pleasure of accepting many pressing invitations to be present at social gatherings of our Order. In all these cases, I endeavored to explain fully the cause of my absence, and that nothing but imperative public duties prevented me from joining my Brother Odd-Fellows on those happy

occasions.

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STREET UNIFORMS.

(6)

Toronto Encampment No. 8, under date of Sept. 4th, 1873, submitted the following questions for my official answer on the subject of Street Uniforms:

1st—Can the new Uniform, adopted at the last Session of the Grand Encampment, held at Stratford, Aug. 5th, 1873, be worn by a Patriarch while in his own Encampment? Answer—No.

2nd—Can a Patriarch wear it while in his own Subordinate

Lodge? Answer-No.

3rd—Can a Patriarch or Patriarchs wear it while visiting a Sub-

ordinate Lodge? Answer-No.

4th—Can a Patriarch or Patriarchs wear it while visiting an Encampment? Answer—Yes; when visiting as a body? Answer—No; when visiting as single members?

5-Can a Patriarch or Patriarchs wear it while attending the

funeral of a deceased Brother? Answer-No.

6-Can it be worn at the funeral of a deceased Patriarch?

Answer-Yes, as a body.

7th-Or if at none of these, or any of them, can the Grand Patriarch, if he sees fit, grant a dispensation to allow it to be worn on any of the occasions, answers in the negative? Answer-I would not assume the responsibility of granting a dispensation without further legislation on the subject.

At the Session of the Grand Lodge of the U.S. held at Baltimore, in September, 1872, (See page 5527 and 5549, Proceedings 1872) the following report was presented and adopted : " Resolved-That Encampments be permitted to wear such style of Street Uniform on parade as may be sanctioned by the Grand Encampments of their respective jurisdictions, but under no circumstance shall the funds of an Encampment be appropriated to meet any

expense incurred thereby."

Under the authority granted in the above report this Grand Encampment at its Session held in Stratford, Aug. 5, 1873, (See page 116 proceedings) adopted the following resolution: Resolved—
That the Uniform now submitted by Representative Blain, or something similar, be adopted by this Grand Encampment, but it is understood that no Encampment is compelled to adopt the Uniform."

It is evident that the intention was that the Uniform should be "Street" Uniform for Encampment members, to be worn only on "Parade." For such purposes I understand that the Uniform has been successfully introduced in some of the older Grand Jurisdictions, and where introduced it is claimed to have had a beneficial

effect on both branches of the Order.

STATISTICS.

As a matter of record, convenient for future reference, herewith is briefly submitted the yearly leading statistics of "number of subordinates" and "number of members" in the Patriarchal branch, commencing with the year of the institution of this Grand Encampment, August 6th, 1869:

The rapid annual increase of "Tents" and "Patriarchs" must be hailed with lively satisfaction by the early workers, the "advance guard" of the Order in this Province. Year by year, not only are our cords lengthened by the institution of new Encampments, but

our stakes are strengthened by largely increased membership. For the past year the increase in numbers has been from 768 to 1192; an increase equal to the two previous years combined. Indeed, we may well say, "a little one has become a thousand, and a small one a mighty nation."

HISTORY OF ODD-FELLOWSHIP.

At the last Session of the Grand Lodge held in Baltimore, September, 1873, it was resolved: "That a work should be prepared containing a complete history of Odd Fellowship, treating of its popular, moral, practical, general, local, legislative, judicial, executive and biographical details." The R. W. Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary, Brother James L. Ridgely, of Baltimore, U. S., was appointed Historiographer for the above purpose. Grand Encampments are now requested to aid in the work by furnishing all information, books, papers, charts, plates, records, &c., in their power, or within their custody and control. It is also desired that a State Historiographer or Annalist be appointed for each Grand Body. The interesting communication of Grand Secretary Ridgely on this subject, I am sure, will receive your warm approbation. It is important that Odd-Fellowship in Ontario should be fully and correctly reported for a work of such magnitude, and a history of the Order that will be handed down from generation to generation.

CAMPS OF INSTRUCTION.

I think the time has arrived when Camps of Instruction could with advantage to the Subordinate's and without expense to the Grand Encampment, be organized at a few central points. Our members are fully alive to and carry out the "written work" of the Order, but it is desirable to have greater uniformity in our secret work. To secure this end, Camps of Iustruction could be organized at such points as would give convenient access to surrounding Subordinate Camps. The meetings for one or two days, if attended by our Grand Officers, Grand Instructors, and as many as possible of Patriarchs, would truly be interesting seasons, and could not help being in many ways most beneficial to both branches of the Order. It would bring members together from distant points, and enable the Grand Patriarch and Officers to see that the "word" was correctly rendered and the "instructions" properly given. Uniformity in this branch, as well as in the Subordinate Lodges, is of the first importance, and I keenly feel that some course should be adopted to secure so desirable an object.

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OFFICIAL REPORTER.

The proceedings of the Grand Encampment not only interest ourselves, and the ten thousand Odd-Fellows in Ontario, but the reading and thinking portion of the community throughout the Province. Heretofore no efficient or systematic plan has been Province of the public through the press reliable and full adopted to give to the public through the present day the world proceedings of this Grand Body. At the present day the world moves fast; what is news to-day, to-morrow is old. Therefore, to keep up with the spirit of the times, and to give to the Order at keep up must authentic reports of our proceedings, in my judgment, large prompt authentic reports of our proceedings, in my judgment, it is advisable to appoint an Official Reporter specially charged with the above duties.

CONCLUSION.

In retiring from the high and honorable position of your Chief Officer, permit me to return to you, one and all, my grateful acknowledgment for your many acts of kindness and thoughtful consideration during the year. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE R. W. GRAND SCRIBE AND TREASURER.

To the Officers and Representatives of the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

PATRIARCHS: -

Another year of Odd-Fellowship has just closed, and I have much pleasure in presenting you with a detailed report of our sta-

tistical and financial progress for careful perusal.

In giving an account of my stewardship it is quite unnecessary to preface it with any remarks outside of the work placed in my charge, and the commissions entrusted to me by this Grand Encampment, save to say, that our advancement has largely exceeded my most sanguine anticipations. We have now twenty-five healthy Encampments, exhibiting a total membership of 1,192, an increase of 424 over our record of last year, and I feel assured that the addition to our tents and ranks is composed of the best material in Odd-Fellowship.

In accordance with your instructions and in conjunction with Past Grand Patriarchs Woodyatt and Purves, an appropriate letter of condolence and sympathy was drawn up and sent to P. Gd. H. P., John Hunter, of London, who expressed himself deeply grateful for the kind and thoughtful consideration of this Grand Encampment. I have much pleasure to report that, though still deeply afflicted in body, he is somewhat better, and was unanimously elected by his Encampment as a Representative to this Grand Encampment, hoping that the trip to Kingston might assist in restoring his shattered health.

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Not considering the Grand Lodge Charters suitable for the use of this Grand Encampment, I communicated with the R.W. Grand Scribe of Michigan, as I learned the Grand Encampment of that State had had their Charter Stones destroyed by the disastrous fire in Chicago, and were about procuring new ones. They made two offers, either to share with us the united expense, which would be about \$300, or sell us copies in blank at a reasonable profit. making inquiry, I found that we could procure one drafted and designed to suit ourselves, engraved in Toronto for about the same price, or at a very trifling increase on the offer made by the Michigan friends, and then it would be entirely our own. I have much pleasure in submitting a drawing of the proposed Charter, which can be engraved and 100 copies supplied for the sum of \$150 00. I thought it advisable before incurring so large an expense to receive the sanction of this Rt. Worthy Grand Body.

In compliance with your resolution of last session, I had 250 copies of the Journal of Proceedings of last session printed and circulated in the jurisdiction, and transmitted copies to sister Grand Encampments throughout the United States. In return, I have received journals from a large number of State Grand bodies, as well as the Journal of Proceedings of our own R.W. Grand Lodge.

STATE OF THE ORDER.-Five new tents have been added to our number during the year, viz.: Unity Encampment, No. 21, Ingersoll, organized October 4th, 1873; Guiding Star, No. 22, Manilla, organized December 6th, 1873; Niagara Falls, No. 23, Clifton, organized March 11th, 18'4; Friendship Encampment, No. 24, Petrolea, organized March 31st, 1874, and Victoria Encampment, No. 25, Port Hope, organized April 30th, 1874. Each one of them are in thriving and prosperous towns, and already bear abundant evidence of a successful future. The December term of every Encampment in the Province exhibited an increase in membership, while Burlington, No. 7, Hamilton, nearly doubled its membership, having increased from 40 to 75, while Harmony, No. 3, London, jumped from 87 to 126, and Toronto, No. 8, from 82 to 105. The increase in the others has not been so large as they have not so good a field to draw from but all are flourishing and not a single complaint or appeal has been registered.

STATISTICS. - Returns from Subordinates for the year are all received, and I may be allowed to thank the D. D. G. P.'s for their promptness, and particularity in carrying out the instructions given

The Certificates of Representatives, in nearly every case. accompanied the Returns, which will be a saving of trouble and delay to this Grand Encampment. Some of the Scribes of Subordinates are not particular enough in their Returns, as in some instances names of Patriarchs are returned as suspended for nonpayment of dues, and in a following return, the same names are again produced as expelled for non-payment of dues, which is sure to make a statistical error. Our membership, at the present time. from 25 Encampments is 1192, an increase of 424 over last year. The total revenue is \$5034 56, an increase of \$1062 13 over the pre-371 have been initiated, 47 admitted by card, 7 rejected, 41 withdrawn, 8 reinstated, 44 suspended, while 4 have been expelled and 10 have died. The dues to this R. W. Grand body amount in sum total to \$554 00, an increase of \$216 75 over last year. The following is a detailed statement of the semi-annual Returns for the past year :-

Rep. Woodyatt, from the Committee on Appeals, made the fol-

The Committee on Appeals, to whom was referred the appeal of John H. White, against the action of the Grand Encampment of New York, have considered the same, and find that the appeal is made from the answer to a question as follows, viz:

"Has an Encampment the right to assess its members a specific sum for necessary expenses in fitting up a hall and procuring neces-

sary fixtures."

Answer in the affirmative, unless prohibited by special local

legislation." "Your Committee are of the opinion that the answer is incorrect. Encampments are authorized to adopt certain rates of regular dues necessary for providing funds with which to pay their legitimate expenses." They may not demand more from their members, unless Your committee submit the authorized by special local legislation. following:

Resolved, That the appeal of John H. White be sustained, and the decision of the Grand Encampment of New York be reversed.

PAST HIGH PRIESTS.

On this subject the following were passed:

Resolved. That this Grand Lodge will not interfere with the right of State Grand Encampments to determine the question as to whether Past High Priests shall or shall not be members of its

body. Resolved. That a member of any Grand Encampment under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, shall, if in good standing, on due proof of such membership under existing laws, be entitled to visit any other of the Grand Encampments of the Order, anything to the contrary in any local law notwithstanding.

MERGEMENT.

Representative Porter, of California, proposed certain amendments to the constitution of the G. L. U. S., looking to the abolition of Encampments as a separate branch of the Order. The main amendment was this.

Add to Article I. the following:

SEC. 10. "The number of degrees pertaining to Subordinate Lodges shall be nine, and shall be designated as follows: The Initiatory, the First or White, the Second or Covenant, the Third or Blue, the Fourth or Remembrance, the Fifth or Scarlet, the Sixth or Patriarchal, the seventh or Golden Rule, and the Eighth or Royal Purple, and all Subordinate and Degree Lodges are authorized to confer said degrees."

The amendment will come up at the next session. The Encampments were never so flourishing, and I think never less likely to be

blotted out than now.

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FINANCIAL SCRIBES.

Grand Encampments are authorized to permit their subordinates to elect Financial Scribes, if they so desire, and the new Encampment Charge book will contain the proper obligations, &c., for said officer.

Dismissal certificates hereafter must be authenticated by the signature of the G. O. and R. Secretary, the same as cards.

FUNERAL CEREMONY.

A committee of five, Grand Chaplain, J. W. Venable, Chairman, was appointed to prepare a form and report next session.

STREET UNIFORMS.

Resolved, That a special committee of five be appointed by the Grand Sire, whose duty it shall be to report to this Grand Body at its next session a suitable uniform which may be used by subordinate Lodges and Encampments on parade, in order that street uniforms for Lodges and Encampments be the same in all jurisdictions.

NEXT SESSION.

The next annual communication of the Grand Lodge will be held in the city of Atlanta, Georgia, a resolution to that effect being unanimously adopted in response to an invitation from the Grand Lodge of that State.

Your Committee appointed at last Session of the Grand Encampment to investigate the matter of Appeal by Patriarch Wettenhall against the decision of Burlington Encampment, met at the City of Hamilton, on 11th May, 1874. After due notice to all parties concerned and carefully considering the facts touching said Appeal, your Committee have arrived at the following conclusions which are respectfully submitted for your consideration.

The refusal of Burlington Encampment to grant Withdrawal Card as requested by Patriarch Wettenhall was contrary to law and without precedent. At the time of application for such Withdrawal Card there were no charges whatever pending against Patriarch Wettenhall. The question of defrauding a brother was brought before the Encampment subsequent to the decision refusing to grant the Card, and appears to your Committee to be a business matter of dispute beyond their province to investigate and cannot therefore be sustained.

Your Committee would recommend that Burlington Encampment be instructed to reconsider their decision and grant the Withdrawal Card applied for by Patriarch Wettenhall from date of application.

The Committee on the State of the Order presented the following Committee Rooms, Kingston, 4th Aug., 1874. Report:-

To the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario.

The Committee on the State of the Order to whom was referred certain paragraphs of the Grand Patriarch's Report, the Report of the Grand Representative to the G.L., U.S., and portions of the Grand Scribe and Treasurer's Report, beg leave to report :-

That the rapid increase in the membership of the Order, is a matter for congratulation and pride, as the large addition to our ranks during the past year, must show progress in ratio to that of any State under the jurisdiction of the G. L. U. S. We have now attained a membership which entitles us to representation equal to any other jurisdiction in the supreme body, and this year will be privileged to elect another representative to attend the session in Atlanta, Georgia.

The Most Worthy Grand Patriarch is deservedly entitled to the sincere and hearty thanks of this Grand Encampment, for the time and attention given by him to the interests of the Order, in visiting the various Subordinates, the institution of New Encampments, and in the discharge of the large amount of correspondence which

devolved upon him.

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In relation to the decisions of the Most Worthy Grand Patriarch, in answer to questions submitted to him by Toronto Encampment No. 8, we approve of the decisions numbered 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6.

We dissent from decision numbered 4, as we are of opinion that the new uniform mentioned is not such regalia as is decided to be worn in the meeting of Encampments. As the matter of the uniform has been referred to a Special Committee of the G. L. U. S., in all probability the subject will be finally decided at the approaching Session. Commenting upon the Report of the Grand Representative, we would recommend that our Representatives to the G. L. U. S., be instructed to oppose the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Rep. Porter, of California, tending towards the mergement of the Lodges and Encampments.

In accordance with the legislation adopted at the last Session of the G. L. U. S., we would recommend that Article 5, Section 1 of Constitution of Subordinates be amended by inserting "Financial

Scribe, if desired," between Scribe and Treasurer.

Special attention is again called to the great desirability of having all Returns in from Encampments promptly, and that they should be made in a correct manner.

This Body is to be congratulated upon the harmony which prevails throughout the Province, as well as the great prosperity which has attended us during the whole year.

Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives should be furnished with a duplicate Certificate by the Scribe in order to avoid any possible inconvenience arising out of the miscarriage of the original. Especially should this be the case when Past Chief Patriarchs represent themselves for admission to the Grand Encampment some time after they have passed the chairs.

The per Capita Tax is twenty-five cents for each member upon the roll at the last stated meeting in the term.

Charge Books cannot be delivered except upon the special order of an Encampment signed by the Chief Patriarch and Scribe, and attested by the seal, and the old Charge Books must in all cases be returned to the Grand Scribe.

When old Charge Books cannot be returned by the hands of a Patriarch, they should be sealed up and sent by express.
