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

CHINESE LABOR.

The boycott of American goods by he Chinese commercial guilds, with it.—Sun. its alarming effect on American exports to the Orient has developed another one of contention between the capitalistic and laboring classes in the United States and has created a problem which demands careful and intelligent states nanship to solve.






