Forty Men are Asked From St. John for Finest Force in the World.

St. John young men who have a hankering after life on the plains, have now an opportunity of achieving their ambition. Major Rutledge and Sergt. Marthur of the Royal Northwest Mounted Relies come to the city Sergt. McArthur of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police came to the city today for the purpose of securing recruits for their force. It is their desire to enroll a total of seventy-five men to make up for vacancies caused by time expired members taking their discharges and in order to enable an increase to be made in the number of men sent to the northern territories.
