BOY BRUTALLY MURDERED.

ATTACKED BY LION.

Side Blown Out of Elevator—Man Hurled Fifty Feet—Accident Caused by Puffing of Dust Accumulations — Fire Adds Horror and Death Toll May Reach Fifteen.

Buffalo, June 24.—Two men are known to be dead, fifty were injured, some fatally, and four are unaccounted for as the result of an explosion late today in the elevator and grain storehouse of the Husted Milling Company, at Elk and Peabody streets. Fire followed the explosion and destroyed the wooden section of the elevator. The dead: Michael King, 41 years old; Henry Vetter, 45 years old; unidentified boy, 12 years old (run down by automobile.)

Fifty were taken to various hospitals, some in a serious condition from burns, and broken legs and arms. At the scene of the accident a priest, administered the last rites to twenty-five men who were believed at the time to be mortally hurt. 





In Jehovah's might they trusted and hough their wanderings precluded the possession of a fixed city they were everywhere at home for in every city they dwelt and all dwellings were open to them as welcome guests.
