SAYS HE DID NOT BLOW UP PRESIDENT

Fossey Indignant at Treatment Accorded Him by Haitians, Will Seek Redress from British Government.

Kingston, Jamaica, Aug. 23--The individual, attired in the robes of a priest who arrived here yesterday on the steamer Sira, and who was refused permission to land by the Jamaican authorities on the ground that he was a pauper and an alien and because he was suspected of being the organizer of an explosion resulting in the destruction of the presidential palace at Port Au Prince and the death of President Leconte, was permitted to come ashore today.

The man claims to be a British subject named Ernest William Fossey. In an interview he denied any connection with an alleged plot to blow up the Haitian presidential palace.

His private papers were seized but he recovered them through the intervention of the British Consul.

Fossey declares he will appeal to the British government in an effort to obtain redress for the indignities he suffered at the hands of the Haitian officials.

DISCOVERS GOLD BLOODED ATTEMPT TO WRECK TRAIN

C. P. R. Sectionman Finds Spikes and Angle Bars Removed and Rails Spread--Stops Train in Time.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 23--The discovery of a deliberate attempt to wreck Canadian Pacific passenger train No. 118 on the Stony Mountain line was made by a sectionman early this morning.

It was discovered that spikes were at eight and between six and seven feet apart, and that the rails had been extracted and angle bars removed from both lines of steel, the removed ends of the rails being pulled out until they stretched outside the ties.

Marks indicated that men had been working on the wrecking job some hours, probably since morning, and the displaced material had all been carried away.

The wrecking crew has been unable to discover either the names or the names of the men who were working on the ground with a body of men, and it is hoped that the wreckers will be rounded up.

JAPAN'S PROBLEMS CONSIDERED IN LIGHT OF MODERN DEVELOPMENTS

Division of Sentiment in Regard to United States' Attitude in Regard to Immigration—High Cost of Living and Burdensome Taxation—Religious Unity—Reduction of Subsidies is Urged.

(Christian Science Monitor.)

In an article prepared for the annual bulletin of the American Bar Association, Dr. Masuji Miyakawa, of Washington, D. C., discusses conditions in his native country with thoroughness and circumspection. He touches upon matters but little understood outside Japan and sets up points of comparison with them in a manner that is highly enlightening. The article is herewith reproduced in part.

(By Dr. Masuji Miyakawa.)

The most important legislation in the 28th Imperial Diet included a bill introduced by the administration to reform the laws regulating the election of national representatives; a resolution outlining the administrative policy with reference to the immigration and one announcing the government's attitude on Japanese immigration to and naturalization in the United States; the 1913 budget including an appropriation for the expansion of the army and navy; and last, the administration's resolution looking toward the amalgamation of the Christian, Buddhist and Shinto religions.

The budget which the administration submitted to the Diet called for expenditures amounting to 571,000,000 yen. In view of the depression existing in both international and domestic markets, the representatives requested an accurate, definite statement of the administration's plan for the year, and the minister of finance. They asked where the specific resources were which were necessary to meet the nation's domestic and foreign indebtedness. The Diet arranged the premier, alleging that the administration had resigned the previous autumn because of its incompetency to handle the financial situation, and the present cabinet is constituted, as it is, largely because the premier is the president of the leading political party, and made his cabinet appointments largely from among the leaders of that party, which among its members includes the majority of the financial barons.

"The trouble with the present administration," urged the representatives, "is due largely to its indecisiveness and inability. They maintain that the administration is to make the income taxes as well as to increase the income tax, and should at once discontinue borrowing money from foreign countries."

Later the government committee introduced a bill in the house of peers to revise the income tax law. This step was met with a strong objection by the peers. "The administration in introducing the bill," insisted the peers, "has first of all used the definite resources which are available to compensate for the decrease in taxation. In introducing the bill, the administration has not only withdrawn from the peers were merely antagonistic, alleging that the administration is to make the income taxes as well as to increase the income tax, and should at once discontinue borrowing money from foreign countries."

The debate on the budget reached the limits of partisan patriotism and the administration in question. At that time the 1,000,000 men, including both active and reserve forces, 1,200,000 being the required footing.

Military Expansion.

Some one in the Diet urged that in view of the enormous amount of ship building going on in the country the government might transfer some of its work from the government shipyards to the yards of private concerns. The minister of marine said that the government had always kept that in mind and had done so to a certain extent, in a business which meets the competitive ship building of the world and where the importation of many things from Europe and America is constantly necessary it is often too extravagant an enterprise for private concerns. The appropriations for the army and navy amounted to 146,000,000 yen, forming one-third of the entire budget, and the largest item of appropriation ever asked for. What a strange situation! The people all united to cut down expenses in every way, they keenly feel the pressure of the high cost of living and the unbearable burden of income taxes manipulated under every conceivable name and pretension, and yet for the army and navy alone, the people took the opposite point of view and insisted upon military expansion. Japan seems to agree with the proposition accepted by all the first-class powers of the world, that the competitive maintenance of armies and navies is essentially the best guarantee of the world's peace.

When Japan would have cause to fear that something other than peace would fall to her lot, now what is this fear? The greatest victory which is yet to be achieved is the victory over fear in the individual consciousness of every human being.

EXPECT TO FIND SOLUTION OF WAR TROUBLE IN EAST

Paris, Aug. 23.—The discovery of a formula for the suspension of the Russo-Turkish war is confidently expected in diplomatic circles to result from the unofficial peace "conversations" now proceeding between Turkish and Italian representatives in Switzerland. Should this occur diplomatic negotiations will be opened up through the regular diplomatic channels.

Constantinople, Aug. 23.—Although nothing has yet transpired with reference to the instructions given by the government to the Turkish delegates entrusted with the semi-official peace negotiations with Italy, nevertheless it is believed the Ottoman delegates will propose that the Hintersland of Tripolitania, with an outlet to the Mediterranean, shall be left to Turkey, the rest of the territory, including the coast line, remaining in the possession of Italy.

In diplomatic circles here, however, the success of this scheme is seriously doubted. Indeed, it is the belief of persons conversant with the situation that peace is not yet in sight. In any case, nothing definite is expected to be done by the Porte until the forthcoming parliamentary elections.

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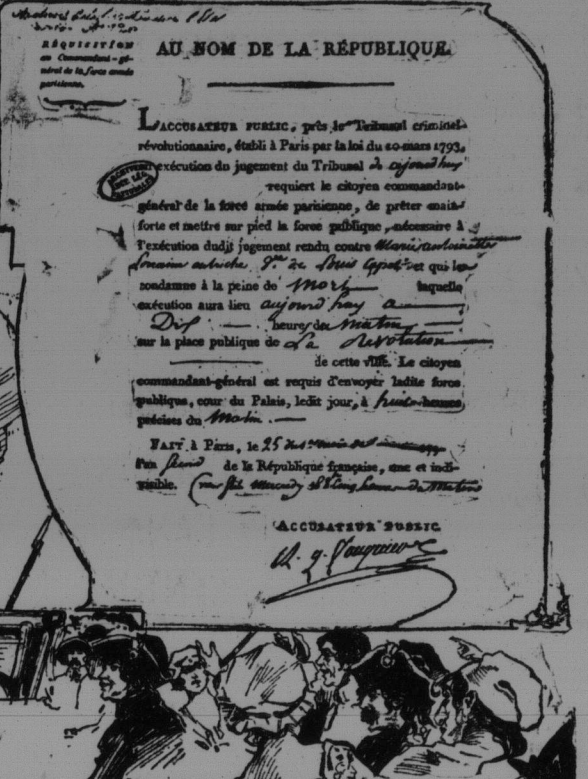
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DEATH WARRANT OF THE GAY QUEEN MARIE ANTOINETTE IS FOUND IN A MUSTY OLD WASHINGTON GARRET--TRAGIC RELIC OF ROMANCE AND TERROR



THE DEATH WARRANT IN ENGLISH.

Requisition to the commanding general of the Parisian armed force:

IN THE NAME OF THE REPUBLIC.

"The prosecuting public attorney of the Revolutionary Criminal Court, established in Paris by the act of March 10, 1793, in execution of the judgment of the court of this day, requires the commanding general of the Parisian armed force to give assistance and to put on foot the public force necessary for the execution of the said judgment rendered against Marie Antoinette Lorraine Autricque (Austrian), widow of Louis Capet, and which condemns her to the penalty of death, which execution shall take place today at 10 a. m. in the Place de la Revolution in this city. The commanding general is required to send the said public force from the courthouse yard on the said day at 8 a. m. precisely."

Given at Paris on the twenty-fifth day of the second year of the French Republic, one and indivisible. (Old style, Wednesday, October 16, 5 o'clock in the morning.)

Public Prosecuting Attorney, (Signed) A. L. FOUQUIER.

Despite its age, the death warrant is in excellent condition. It is about 6 by 10 inches. The first line of writing above the printed word "Requisition" is blurred. But close examination discloses the words "Archives de la... letat." Below is the file number (carton No. 12).

One of the smaller slips bears the signature of the "Comtesse Valois de la Motte," concerning whose varied career the elder Dumas wrote the romance of "The Queen's Necklace." The signature is firm and determined.

The writing appears to breathe character. The autographs on the other slips include those of Louis Charles Capet, the young Dauphin; Therese Capet, his sister, and Elizabeth Capet, his aunt, and sister to the king.

Marie Antoinette, wife of Louis XVI of France was executed October 16, 1793, charged with causing the reckless expenditure of the national finances and fomenting civil war. By many writers this remarkable woman has been depicted as the victim, the sainted martyr, almost of the revolution. Others have taken an opposite view, dealing sharply with her character and her role in French history.

Marie Antoinette was the youngest daughter of Emperor Francis I. and Maria Theresa of Austria. She was born at Vienna November 2, 1755. At 14 she was betrothed to the French Dauphin and married him a year later at Versailles.

The queen's unpopularity originated in her personality, which soon aroused the ire of the populace. Her levity of disposition, selfish love of fun, the dress, banquets, etc., added to a legitimate incapacity to see the actual misery of France, were fatal to her.

DIES FOR GIRL WHO DIED FOR HIS RIVAL

Army Drillmaster Kills Himself on the Grave of the Girl Who Took Poison.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 22.—For the love of a girl who had killed herself for another man, William Toennes, a drillmaster in Recruit Company, No. 16, at Jefferson Barracks, ended his life on her grave in St. Peter's Cemetery today.

The girl was Pearl Leroy, who died July 2, from carbolic acid, swallowed because she feared she had lost the love of Frank B. Kehoe.

Policeman Killeb received a letter by special delivery, shortly before ten o'clock this morning from Toennes. The letter read:

"Dear Mr. Killeb—I guess I will surprise you, but I can't help it. I have been waiting for some time. I will go to the sweetest girl in the world, and I will thank you very much, if you see that my remains will go to Jefferson Barracks right away. I will die at St. Peter's Cemetery, at my dear girl's grave, number 766, Section 12."

A policeman was hurried to the cemetery, where the body was found.

NEW ENGINE MAY SHATTER RECORDS

Inventor's Belief is That His Turbine Will Enable Steamships and Locomotives to Go Faster than Ever.

The latest turbine engine invention, which is said to produce 95 per cent. of efficiency, meets the expectations of its inventor, transportation by land and sea will be revolutionized and speed records will be broken, says the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Captain Louis S. Flatau, secretary of the Babcock Manufacturing Company of St. Louis, who has 120 practical inventions to his credit in the United States Patent Office at Washington, has completed and obtained letters patent on a new turbine engine.

The Flatau turbine engine looks like a fly wheel with all the driving mechanism inclosed within the vessel itself. An electrical generator is attached to the end of the driving shaft of the engine and revolves in a field that is fastened to the housing, and with an eighty pound pressure generates electric current sufficient to supply sixty thirty-two candle power incandescent lamps.

Captain Flatau asserts that this small engine is capable of developing eight horse power, with one hundred and fifty pounds steam pressure, and that a similar engine sufficient to drive the propellers of the Lusitania could be constructed for one-tenth the cost and stored in one-tenth the space occupied by the turbine now in use on that vessel.

Evermann, formerly of Terre Haute, who is chief of the division of Alaskan fisheries, United States Bureau of Fisheries. Mr. and Mrs. Alvin G. Twelve hours before Dr. Evermann took a hand in the matter they were hundreds of miles apart, and were not thinking of getting married.

It became necessary for Dr. Evermann to find a man and a woman to accept places as government teachers for the Aleuts on St. Paul Island, Alaska, which is one of the Seal Islands group. He realized that it would be better for him to find a man and wife, but the vacancies would occur soon, and quick action was necessary.

Dr. Evermann asked all the young married folk he knew in Washington if they did not wish to take a trip to Alaska. None of them did. He mentioned the trouble he was in to Dr. C. Hart Merriam, formerly chief of the bureau of biological survey of the department of Agriculture. The scientist could think of no scheme and Dr. Evermann was in despair.

Miss Zenaida Merriam went to visit her father at his office, and while there she and Mr. Whitney, a man about twenty-nine years old, arranged to play a game of tennis the same afternoon. The game over, they strolled over to the house, and Dr. Merriam told of the plight of his friend, Dr. Evermann.

"I'll take the job," said Mr. Whitney.

"But you are not married," said Dr. Merriam.

"If Dr. Evermann will help me, I think I can get married," replied the young man.

The problem was put up to Dr. Evermann. He authorized Mr. Whitney to offer the other place to Miss Elsie J. Gibson, who was studying in the summer teachers' school at Dartmouth. Sure enough the answer came back at once—"Accept both places."

When Mrs. John Robinson, of Mucklow, died, her friends went to the funeral. During the services the guards swooped down and threw the furniture out of the cabins of the mourners, arriving at the cabin next door to the church just as the body was being carried out.

"You won't have any more funerals here," a guard shouted, "that church belongs to the company." And to the tune of the tolling of the bell they finished their jobs and cleaned out the Robinson cabin thoroughly while the hearse was at the cemetery.

Every miner in the field has been evicted and unlawfully, because not an hour or a single minute's notice was given. Women and children often were pushed out into rains and into the night, to walk down the creek to the only spot of land not owned by mine companies. Even the roads are owned by the companies, and mine folks have been arrested for walking on them. The miners can't even swim up the creek without trespassing, for the water belongs to the companies.

In front of one little church, the guards put up their machine gun, pointed toward the church door. That was early one Sunday morning. When the children began coming to Sunday school they were frightened and ran back home. They went for Miss Katie Winfrey, the teacher, and she came with them to the church.

"Please take the gun away until after Sunday school," she begged.

"These haven't been any services in that church since then."

"Why didn't the miners appeal to the law?"

SOME COWS FAIL TO EARN THEIR BOARD

Owners of Herds Are Advised to Get Rid of Animals That are Inefficient by Professor of University.

Another champion dairy cow has been discovered and she lives at East Claridon, Ohio. In one year she yielded 27,404 pounds of milk, which, the experts estimate, is equal to more than 1,300 pounds of butter.

The latest record in Kentucky has been kept some records of dairy production. In a bulletin lately issued it is stated that in one dairy of twenty-five cows it was found that the entire profit was \$642 in one year, the best cow yielding only 247 pounds of butter fat and the average being 200 pounds apiece. One cow yielded only 105 pounds. Another herd of eight cows showed a profit of \$457 in one year, the best cow yielding 322 pounds of butter fat and the herd average being 287 pounds.

This leads the dairy specialist of the university to say that "one dairyman milks and cares for sixteen cows to get the same money that another milks eight cows for," and that "wasteful feeding and inefficient cows lose years of their lives and thousands of acres of good grain."

There is a great deal of difference in the quality of milk, and it is a herd of world beaters like the champion that has been discovered in Ohio, but every dairyman can improve his herd. It was found that can get rid of the cows that do not earn their board and keep.

The dairy specialist of the State University can show the average dairyman how he can increase his earnings and get better results from his work in every way. Information is given for the asking and the Kentucky dairyman should avail themselves of it.

RENTS IN MADRID ARE HIGHER THAN HERE

Consular Report Has Its Own Vital Cost of Living Problem.

Only a general idea of the cost of living in Madrid can be given, as practically everything depends upon the standard maintained, say a consular report. Large modern apartments cannot be had under \$1,200 per annum, and there are few at that price. Modest apartments may be had as low as \$750, and the most luxurious cost about \$6,000. Excellent ones may be had at \$1,800 to \$2,000. Salaries of servants vary here according to the class employed. Housemaids command from \$4 a month for untrained peasants to \$10 the best, cooks get \$10 to \$20, butlers \$10 to \$20, lackeys \$10 to \$20, chauffeurs from \$30 for poorly trained drivers to \$75 for skilled mechanics, but board and lodging are not usually furnished to chauffeurs. Living is more expensive in Madrid than in any other city in Spain. Rents are about 50 per cent. higher and other things about 25 per cent. This is easily accounted for by the fact that nothing is raised in the vicinity of the city and that it is the home of practically all the wealthy persons of the kingdom.

SIGNIFICANCE OF RETIREMENT OF SIR MAX AITKEN

Montreal, Aug. 22.—The retirement of Sir Max Aitken from the presidency of the Royal Securities Corporation means more than the ordinary change in the executive head of a big financial corporation.

It was organized by Sir Max in 1903, and was among his first financial ventures of importance, and he naturally took a keen pride in its growth and development.

His retirement from the active management at this time foreshadows his gradual withdrawal from active participation in Canadian financial affairs. The allotments of English public life have drawn him away from the land of his birth, and it is likely Canadians will see him but seldom in the future, although they may hear a good deal about him.

Seek Burglars, Find Deer Near New York

Surprise Greets Posse of Searchers in Hackensack Meadows—Animals Will be Captured Alive.

New York, Aug. 23.—Within five miles of the New York City Hall posse seeking two heavily armed burglars have found four and possibly more wild deer. The animals were uncovered in the thicket of swamp woods almost in the middle of the Hackensack meadows and lying between the main line of the Erie Railroad and the plank road leading from Hoboken to Passaic and Paterson.

In a fierce fight with burglars in his clothing store, in East Rutherford burglar had one or more weapons. Escaping, they were traced to the plank road and it was believed they sought refuge in the woods in the middle of the meadows, because they were passing there, had seen two, which men enter.

Chief McClelland organized two or three parties of men to surround the thicket and work in toward its centre, hoping to uncover the hiding place of the robbers. There is a dense overgrowth in these woods and few persons have penetrated to the centre in many years.

Chief McClelland's men started working their way into the thicket from three hundred feet of twisted and ugly trees fifty or sixty feet in height, and which afforded cover for birds of passage in crossing the wide meadows. The buck deer was first sighted and narrowly escaped being shot, as several men mistook the rustle in the underbrush for the moving of a man. He was a fine, big specimen with quite a broad and immediately into double harness.

The two met in Stockton and were married, April 12 last. They went on an extensive honeymoon trip. In the course of the trip Wright invested heavily in bright plumage for his new bride, when the pair arrived in San Francisco with something less than \$3000 with which to begin life.

How the deer got into the wooded spot passed daily by hundreds of trains and skirted by scores of teams, auto mobiles and trolley cars, is a mystery. They had not been seen before, but the searchers found unmistakable evidence that they had been there for many years. It is believed that the buck and doe escaped from a preserve in the northern part of the State, but how they worked their way down to within five miles of the New York City Hall is a puzzle.

The two smaller deer are believed to be progeny of the buck and doe. Several of those in the searching party believe there are more than four deer in the place, saying they found indications of at least eight.

Deer in any part of New Jersey are very scarce and these will be a valuable addition to the herds which the State is trying to encourage in the mountains. The game wardens have arranged to spread nets in the thicket and drive the animals into them, make them scarce and then transfer them to crested cages. In these they will be sent by train and wagon to the mountains of Sussex county and there liberated.

Following the finding of the deer in the wooded oasis in the meadow desert a guard was placed upon the place to prevent any one from trying to enter and capture the animals. This guard is maintained by the Game Commission.

TRACTS ACQUIRED FOR USE OF BIRDS

Audubon Societies Act on the Belief that the Game Laws Are Ineffectual and Unenforced.

The National Association of Audubon Societies has adopted a policy of buying lands and waters for nesting places and rookeries and preserves for animals and birds. Naturally, it is devoted almost wholly to birds, though it may later assume some relation to animal life. It has bought properties in Maine, the Carolinas, Florida and Louisiana, and is desiring for still others.

There is no way to protect wild birds, either land or water, by law alone, says the Buffalo News, for one. It will neglect their duty and poachers will get past them by cunning or bribery, and the result is about as bad as it can be in such cases.

It is a sound policy which has been adopted, and it will be effective the more fully the society is able to carry it out. In foreign countries where government is more highly consolidated and reaches the individual more effectively and where public opinion sustains the government there is little difficulty in protecting wild life by the ordinary officers of the law—that is, guardians of forests, and so on.

PREFER TROUSERS TO HOBBLE SKIRTS

Women in One Part of the World Smile at Recent Fashion as They Walk in Bifurcated Garment.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 23.—Suffragette fashion devotees and spinsters always become deeply interested when Miss Emily Bissell, of No. 509 Bartmer avenue, a missionary from Western India tells of the customs of women in that country. Bissell is in St. Louis for a visit with friends. First, the women in India wear the trousers, she says, and she has solved the hobble problem before they had it. And best of all, there are no old maids.

"I have known only one unmarried woman in all India in the 25 years I have been there," she declared. "and folk thought she was so strange they came for miles just to look at her. She was an educated girl about 25 years old, and she refused to sink herself into the obscurity and almost slavery of Indian matrimony. Girls are married there at four and five years and boys at ten. Widows are considered worthless. They think it absurd because a straight laced British government will no longer permit them to burn the useless creatures. Even when they are made widows at 4 or even younger, their term of usefulness is over, and there is nothing left for them but to become household drudges in their parents' houses."

"Indian women, and men, too, do not think American and English women have any good looks whatsoever. They scornfully call us 'white faces.' They think there must be something monstrous the matter with us because we are at the time of our life when we will have us. And worst of all, they don't think we are as clean as we might be. In fact, the high caste Hindus will not eat at the same table with us, and the dishes we use must be purified by a special process before or they never will use them again. Before each meal they go through a ceremonial process of taking a bath and changing all their clothing, and no one dares touch them until the meal is ended. I am sure they announce and the touch of an 'unclean' person's finger would pollute them and they would have to do it over again."

"Only the very poor women who are not respectable and missionaries who are in need of a teacher at one of the rare girls' schools since 1888. She has passed so little time in this case that she speaks with a slight accent. When asked what the American women wear in India she just turned around for inspection. She wore a pink linen one-piece dress with a hobble skirt, but the hobble was about three yards around Indian women, she said, think trousers are very much more modest."

VOTE FAILS TO PUT AN END TO SMOKING

Lovers of Tobacco Are Still Using Cigars and Pipes on the Street Cars of Kansas City.

Kansas City had a referendum last week in which a million and a half votes were cast—not a bad showing for a city less than half the size of Boston. But the referendum had possibilities not yet fully realized in the effort East, says the Boston Herald. It was a referendum on a proposition which a street car controversy which makes the little trouble of the Boston Elevated and its employees seem very tame and old-fashioned.

It was all about smoking on the cars. The company made a virtuous rule forbidding smoking, and vigorously enforced it. The City Council after much controversy, which became a hotbed of political maneuvering, passed an ordinance forbidding smoking on the cars. The company was handsomely sustained in its attitude as there were 907,608 votes against smoking and 607,627 in favor of it. The company, therefore, feels justified in standing pat, and the City Council, backed by the local tobacco interests, is equally firm. So the smoke of battle still obscures the horizon.

Boston has a financial as well as an academic interest in the unique warfare which is giving Kansas City fame. The street car company which is involved is the one against which Boston capitalists, holding bonds of more than \$7,000,000, are now taking steps in foreclosure proceedings.

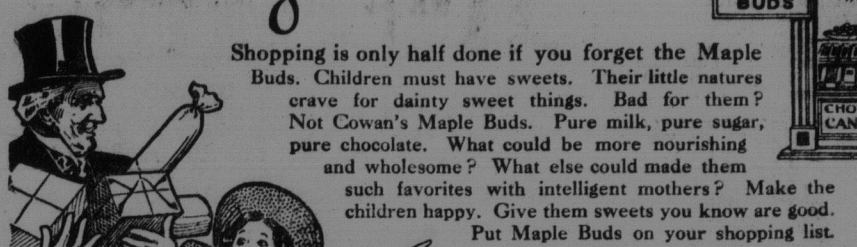

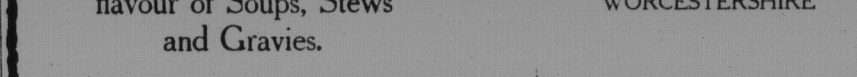

SUDDEN DEATH LAST NIGHT OF WELL KNOWN CLERGYMAN

Rev. W. W. Rainnie, Formerly Pastor of Calvin Presbyterian Church, Passed Away in His Home in Milltown--Death Due to Illness Brought on by Eating Canned Meats.

The sad news reached the city last evening that Rev. William W. Rainnie, one of the best known clergymen in the St. John Presbytery, had died suddenly at his home in Milltown, Charlotte county, Mr. Rainnie had only been ill for a few days, and the news of his death will come as shock to his many friends in St. John.

A Good Man Gone. "In the death of Mr. Rainnie the St. John Presbytery loses a successful pastor, a forceful preacher, and one of the ablest church lawyers in Eastern Canada," said Judge Forbes when informed of the untimely death of the pastor of the Presbyterian church at Milltown.

Mr. Rainnie was born in Glasgow, Scotland, and came to this country as a student missionary. He finished his ministerial course at the Presbyterian college at Halifax, and was ordained in 1892 at St. John, and assumed the pastorate of the Calvin church here. He held that charge till 1908 when he resigned and was shortly afterwards called to the pastorate of St. James church at Milltown.

During his pastorate of Calvin church Mr. Rainnie made many warm friends in St. John, and was known as one of the most forceful preachers in the city. He was a past moderator of the St. John Presbytery, succeeding Dr. Bennett. He was on several occasions a delegate to the General Assembly of the church from the local presbytery.

Mr. Rainnie took a great interest in the St. Andrew's society of St. John, and was largely instrumental in organizing the St. Andrew's society at St. Stephen. He was a great student of Scotch history and character, and was on several occasions called upon to act as orator at the celebrations of the St. Andrew's society in this city.

Mr. Rainnie was a fine preacher and a great lecturer, especially on matters pertaining to Scotch history or character. He was always in demand as an orator at Scotch gatherings and delivered many lectures, both in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
