RECEPTION FOR GEN'L CURRIE AT HALIFAX

Commander of the Canadian Forces Was Presented With a Handsome Piece of Silver Plate and Civic Address.

DISTINGUISHED OFFICER GREATLY IMPRESSED

With Considerable Emotion He Thanks the Citizens of Halifax for Their Expressions of Good Will and Loyal Friendship.

Halifax, August 17.—Sir Arthur Currie was presented with a civic address and handsome piece of sterling silver plate, early this morning, and he left immediately afterwards on the Ocean Liner for Montreal. The crowd present at the ceremony was not large, because of the early hour, but it included many representative citizens and representatives of the army.

General Currie carefully inspected the guard of honor, and following this the presentation took place. The wife of the mayor presented to Lady Currie a handsome bouquet, and she was given for Sir Arthur and Lady Currie, the address to him was replied to by General Currie in a brief speech, in which he displayed considerable emotion. His voice broke as he spoke of his pleasure at being back and of the joy it would be to him to renew old friendships and comradeships.

To Lieutenant General Sir Arthur Currie, G. C. M. G., K. C., commanding Canadian Army Corps:

Sir: On behalf of the corporation and the citizens of the city of Halifax, and as expressing the sentiment of the province of Nova Scotia and the whole Canadian public, we extend to you the warmest welcome on your victorious return to the shores of our Dominion.

Our country counts itself happy in having secured among its own citizens one so eminently qualified for the highest position of command in the Canadian Corps, previously held by British officers distinguished by their enormous as were the responsibilities of your post, they have been bravely and skilfully borne, and we congratulate you on the success which the affection and confidence of your officers, the loyalty of your soldiers, and the admiration of the whole body of your fellow citizens have afforded you.

The devotion with which you performed your duty, the thoroughness with which you completed your preparations, the spirit of hope with which you inspired the troops, and the extraordinary succession of victories that crowned your efforts, have won for you the deepest gratitude and a lasting name in the records of our country.

As step by step you were promoted to positions of increasing responsibility, you never lost sympathy nor regard for the man in the ranks; and your singularly happy faculty of stimulating the power of initiative both in officers and men was no small factor in securing the reputation that our brave Canadians have achieved overseas.

We congratulate you on the recognition you have received from His Majesty the King, and from such eminent soldiers as Marshal Foch and Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig.

We extend our felicitations to Lady Currie. And we ask you to accept the accompanying gift as a memento of the community which first had the honor of welcoming you to Canada on your return from overseas.

PRINCE STROLLS THROUGH PARK AT HALIFAX

The Dragon, Bearing His Royal Highness, Reached Halifax Sunday Forenoon on Cruise from St. John.

ATTENDED SERVICE ABOARD SHIP

Will Lay the Corner Stone of the Women's Residence at Dalhousie Today and Also Corner Stone of Navy Institute.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 17.—The destroyer Dragon, with the Prince of Wales, arrived at 11 o'clock from St. John. The official report given out supplies the chief features of the way the time was spent by His Royal Highness. The British ships in port were brilliantly illuminated tonight and presented a magnificent spectacle. Sir Robert Borden came aboard on the destroyer with the Prince and was warmly greeted by Halifax friends.

The reception at Halifax will begin at ten tomorrow morning, when the Prince will land at the dockyard and proceed to the Provincial Building, where the civic and provincial addresses will be presented. He will visit various institutions, and at 1:30 will lunch at the Waegwille Club. At 3:15 he will lay the corner-stone of the Women's Residence at Dalhousie College, and will visit the Stanley Quoin Club. At 4 p. m. he will lay the corner-stone of the Navy League Institute, and at 4:30 will hold a public reception at the Government House. At 7 p. m. he will dine at the Government House, and thereafter will sail for Charlottetown.

Strolls Through Park.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 17.—The Prince of Wales attended divine services aboard the Dragon at 9 o'clock this morning before entering Halifax harbor, then transferred immediately after landing in civilian clothes at Point Pleasant, and strolled through the park to the head of the Northwest Arm. Then he made a detour through the citadel and embarked from the dockyard at 5 o'clock.

In the evening His Royal Highness gave a dinner of hope with which were invited the Lieutenant-Governor, Prime Minister Sir Robert Borden, Premier George H. Murray, General Thacker, D. C., and others. Sir Robert Borden has joined the Ronova as the guest of the Prince until the official landing at Quebec.

CANADA SHOULD BENEFIT FROM LOWER PRICES

Cost of Living Commissioner Reports a Material Drop in Wholesale Prices of Beef and Consumer Should Have Benefit.

TWELVE MILLION-DOZEN EGGS HELD

Cold Storage Plants Crowded With Eggs, Butter and Cheese, and Hold More Poultry Than Year Ago.

Ottawa, August 16.—The cost of living commissioner's reports concerning the stocks of food in storage in Canada show an increase of approximately 1,250,000 pounds more butter held on August 1 than on the same date one year previous. On August 1, 1919, there were 20,043,391 pounds creamery and 1,486,031 pounds of dairy butter held.

"Moreover," Dr. McFall reports, "from our winter's supply of last year more than six million pounds were commandeered from the fall production, besides the large amounts taken out of wholesale stocks for the British ministry of food in the summer and early fall by the Canada food board."

Eggs and Butter.

Despite high egg prices this year, 1,682 per cent. more were placed in storage than during last year. On August 1, there were 12,444,971 dozen held, which was about the same as during the previous month.

Cheese stocks showed an increase over those of the previous month, and an increase of 23.5 per cent. over the same month one year before.

The total held amounted to 14,697,041 and the commissioner comments: "Now that the British price has dropped for cheese, this leaves a large amount of good food that should be made available for Canadian consumption at reasonable prices."

Oleomargarine stocks showed little change, there being 344,902 pounds, or about one-third of a month's requirements.

In the opinion of Dr. McFall it is time the Canadian consumer benefited from lower beef prices.

Plenty of Beef.

"There has been a material drop in the wholesale prices of beef," he said, "and consumers and retailers should see to it that this is carried out to the consumer's prices." The stocks of beef on August 1 totalled 20,044,417 pounds which was about one-third of the greatest amount recorded as being in storage in Canada at any time during the past two years.

Total stocks of pork on hand amounted to 39,467,704 pounds which is about the average carried for two years.

Mutton and lamb stocks, 1,191,131 pounds, show a decrease of 25.9 per cent. from the holdings one month previous, and 45.73 per cent. less than a year previous.

Poultry.

Poultry in storage amounted to 1,261,384 pounds, which was 27.84 per cent. less than the previous month but 4.33 per cent. more than one year ago. There were 21,044,744 pounds of fish in cold storage and 3,887,743 pounds held other than in cold storage.

Seven firms are reported as having failed to send in their inventory statements for the month.

CARRANZA MAY GET IN BADLY WITH BRITISH

HOPLER WAS LAST REPRESENTATIVE

Understood That Carranza's Action Was the Result of Recent Statements Made in the House of Commons.

Washington, Aug. 16.—William Cummings, British charge d'archives in the city of Mexico, has been ordered to leave the country by President Carranza.

While not specially stated in the dispatches from the Mexican capital which have reached Washington, it was understood that Carranza's action resulted from the statement recently made in the House of Commons by the British under secretary that Great Britain had not recognized the Carranza government and would not do so until there was some guarantee that the Mexican government was able and willing to protect the lives and properties of British citizens in Mexico.

Great Britain has not had an official diplomatic representative in Mexico since Mr. Hopler, who had been acting as charge, was withdrawn soon after Carranza assumed office as president. When Mr. Hopler departed the affairs of the British legation were left in the hands of Mr. Cummings. He was not to act as minister in any sense, but was simply to care for the archives and other properties.

Mr. Cummings, however, has been for many years a resident of Mexico and numbers Carranza himself among his personal friends. Thus he was able, in a personal way, to interfere often with the Mexican president to secure protection for British citizens when they were endangered by the revolutionary movement. In addition he kept his own government informed of the developments in Mexico and acting solely as a medium of communication with outside officials delivered protests against the mistreatment of British citizens and corporations, whenever these seemed necessary.

Berlin, Friday, Aug. 16.—(By The Associated Press)—The new German constitution which was passed by the National Assembly, after months of debate, and which becomes effective this week, is divided into two main parts—the composition and ties of the Empire, and the basic rights and basic duties of Germans. The first part consists of seven sections and the second of five.

The subdivision of the first part are:

The Empire and individual states; the Reichstag; the Imperial President; imperial government; Imperial Council; Imperial Legislation and Imperial administration of justice.

Those of the second part are: Individual community of life; religion and religious societies; education and schools and economic life. The concluding part of the constitution bears the title "Transition Regulations."

Weimar, Saturday, Aug. 16.—(By The Associated Press)—President Ebert will take the oath under the new constitution before the National Assembly on August 20. He has withdrawn the decree which designates the Assembly as "Reichstag" in deference to protests from the Assembly.



Rev. Hamilton Wigle In Carleton Church

Principal of Mount Allison Ladies' College Preached Eloquent Sermons at Both Services in Carleton Methodist Yesterday.

The pulpit of Carleton Methodist church was occupied yesterday by Rev. Hamilton Wigle, D. D., principal of Mount Allison Ladies' College, at both services and delighted the large congregations present. In the morning he spoke on the 23rd Psalm and gave an interpretation of it in the light of David's life and experience. The speaker, who has visited the Holy Land and seen the site where the Psalm is supposed to have been written, the Pool of Solomon, explained the references in the text and then applied it, so far as the interpretation would allow, to modern times. At the evening service his subject was "Love." He referred to the different civilizations of the world, Greek, Roman and British, and stated that Christianity, or Love as taught by Christ, was the crown of all civilizations. He applied it to home, society, church, political and labor difficulties of the times, stating that the application of the Golden Rule, which was only the expression of the teaching of Christ, was the only thing which could bring about a settlement of labor and social difficulties existing today and manifested in the various strikes all over the world. The application of the Golden Rule to the political life of the country would do away with graft of all kinds. Applied to business life it would mean the abolition of the sweatshop, child labor and kidnaped wages. Love as taught by Christ was the one and only answer to the social and industrial unrest of the day.

Rev. McLeod Harvey At Knox Church

Washington Clergyman Last Evening Told the Great Opportunity the War Has Brought to the Christian Church.

The war has brought to the Christian Church the greatest opportunity in all its history, an unexampled opportunity for extending its mission in the world, and demonstrating its power to help humanity solve its difficulties, said Rev. McLeod Harvey, of Washington, D. C., in the course of an interesting sermon delivered in the Knox Presbyterian Church last evening before a fair midsummer congregation. The speaker said the question now was whether the church would prove itself alive to its opportunities, and develop the sources of influence and the spirit of consecration to service which were essential to the many works necessary to the world in the past the church had failed to make the most of its opportunities. If it had lived up to them both China and India would have been Christianized, and possibly other countries, and then when the war broke out and Germany threatened the world, four hundred million Christians in China and fifty million Christians in India would have sprung into the light and simply mopped up Germany.

The preacher spoke of the need of Christian virtues, and said that it was a land of appalling vice, many of which were incited by the religions of the land. He went on to speak of the Christian virtues as brought out by the war, and the meanness with which the people of all the Allied countries at the call to arms consecrated themselves to war effort, the young men going with high heart to fight the Hun, the others lending money or devoting themselves to the many works necessary, while the women saved food, so that it could be sold to the nations of Europe. On all sides the war had brought out unparalleled effort, and things which before the war had been regarded as impossible were done as a matter of course. The preacher referred to the achievements of the people during the war that they were competent to carry on the work which lies ready to the hand of the church if they make up their minds to do so, and develop the right spirit of Christian consecration.

Illustrating the wonderful ways of the Almighty, he told a story of a young soldier who was condemned to be shot for desertion. While waiting in the guard room the deserter prayed that he be spared the ignominy of being shot at a deserter and be given a chance to die for his King and country. The Lord heard his prayer, and the Germans sent over a shell that killed the guard, blew the door off his cell, and set him free. Because he went to the front where a battle was raging and saw the Germans advancing on a trench where his own company were caught without ammunition, and were unable to defend themselves or retire. Then he saw a machine gun, the crew of which had all been killed. He rushed to the machine gun and turned it on the advancing Germans and mowed them down like corn. He saved his company but when a company of Highlanders came up with ammunition and his comrades went over to thank the man who had saved him they found him beside the machine gun with a bullet through his brain.

The preacher said that at the last day Jesus would act as judge and separate the sheep from the goats, one upon the right hand and the other upon the left, and they who had not lived up to their opportunities to serve Christ, and do justice to all created in His image, would be cast into everlasting fire, even though they did not know how they had failed in their duties.

No Reduction in Price of Shoes

While Embargo Placed on Export of Hides Forces Down Price of Leather Manufacturers Hold No Hope of Decline in Prices of Shoes.

While the embargo placed upon the export of hides by the government is forcing down the price of leather in Canada, shoe manufacturers hold out no hope of a decline in the price of shoes, which is probably something they don't hope for anyway. Now they are saying that 60 per cent of the leather used in Canadian shoe factories must be imported from the States, and they point out that if the Washington government retaliates by placing an embargo on the export of hides to Canada, then the shoe will be on the other foot, so to speak, or Canadian will not be able to have shoes, except of very poor quality. The manufacturers say that the Canadian leather is of poor quality, as this being a dairy country, calves are killed very young, and the calf skin is only suitable for the side pieces of shoes. It is admitted that the reduction of the price of leather ought to mean cheaper shoes of the lower grades worn by workmen, but women are advised not to look for lower prices for kid shoes, as all the kids come from the United States. One manufacturer says it is impossible to manufacture sole leather from Canadian hides, but where the paper soles are made is not revealed.

Frank Fitzgerald of Imperial Theatre has sent a special messenger to New York with the undeveloped film on Friday night's train, wires that he saw the complete pictures at a private screening at E. F. Keith's Palace Theatre, Broadway, Saturday night and that they are wonderfully good. They take in all the big events of the two great days.

The Kinogra people, who are represented in this territory by H. H. McArthur of the General Program Film Agency, who are in the city with the aid of a black "changing bag" at 6.35, Friday after they were rushed at great speed from Governor Pugsley's reception agency to the city with their costumes papers ready and on arriving in New York before 5 p. m. Saturday were speeded by taxi to the Kinogram laboratories where the pictures were developed, printed and screened before 9.30 that evening. Fitzgerald hopped the midnight to Boston and arrives today time for the Imperial matinee.

Service Between Canada and Levant

Reported - Furness - Withy Company Propose to Establish the New Service—Object is to Develop Steady Canadian Trade.

In connection with the taking over of the William Thomson and Co.'s shipping agencies in the Levant, the Withy Company interest attaches to a report from England that the big British shipping company proposes to establish a new service between Canada and the Levant. The report says that the new line would not be in connection with the transport of goods to Greece and Roumania, but the account of the Canadian government contracts with those countries, but would make calls at ports in the Levant generally with the object of developing a steady Canadian trade. At present it is said the demand for Canadian products would assure good cargoes from Canada, but the prospect for return cargoes in the near future are not considered very bright.
