ANGLIN CONDEMNED BY A VOTE OF THE HOUSE AS A MALICIOUS LIBELLER.

Upper Secludes Timothy, Costigan Castigates Him, and Opposition Members Repudiate Him—The Exposure and the Shame Strike the Condemned Dumb.

Mr. Anglin would not explain nor leave his seat. Young (Waterloo) said just as strong articles were written by Government supporters. He quoted from articles in the Halifax Express reflecting on members on both sides of the house, the writer being an officer of the House.

Dr. Tupper said as soon as the writer found he had no right to do he resigned his position as clerk of the committee. (Cheers.)

Mr. Daly said the most vile articles against the Government were published in a paper owned by speech.

Dr. Tupper delivered a speech, interrupting the Opposition, on points of order. He said the language of Anglin was the most vile and infamous used towards members of Parliament. It was not a charge against one or more members, but a direct charge that 107 men of the Parliament of Canada were perjurers and so lost to all sense of honor as to sell themselves for a bribe, and beneath the respect of honest men.

It was worse than if such charges were made in the House. Here they could be rebuked. In the press they would be broadcast over the land, and when members of Parliament used the press to degrade themselves and style their members scoundrels it was high time Parliament should take some steps to maintain its power and dignity. (Great cheering.) One sentence in Anglin's paper said these 107 men were no better than convicted criminals in a dock. He (Tupper) appealed to the Opposition if the great majority of Canada's representatives were so much criminals, and ask whether they held the least intercourse with such men. The man who made charges was beneath the contempt of honest men, and he would not charge others with such crimes unless himself were criminal at heart.

Mr. Huntington said he was not afraid of Tupper's eloquence, and he would ask no reference to Anglin's case.

Mr. McDonald (Quebec) showed that Huntington had no right to reflect on him. Huntington had made a charge without advancing proof. The Toronto Globe condemned him for making statements without commenting upon them.

Bergin thought the resolution would not accomplish the object intended. Costigan regretted that Anglin should have so far forgotten himself as to make such outrageous statements. He had commented him as one of the libelled men from New Brunswick. He had worked with Anglin's parties, and would challenge that gentleman to name any instance where he had acted as a perjurer or a criminal. (Cheering.) Mr. Smith, of Westmoreland, was also mentioned among the 107 bribed men. (Costigan) referred to the act of Anglin's sitting in the New Brunswick Government with Mr. Smith, and never having found him to be a dishonest man. Smith had been offered a judgeship but refused. It did not come well from his old colleague to charge him with being a perjured man or a criminal in a dock. He (Costigan) would take an independent course on questions affecting the interests of his constituents, but with the Government he did not want to mix. (Great cheering.)

Mr. Costigan sat down after he had made one of the best speeches on the question.

Forbes, (N.S.) opposition member regretted that the question should have come up. He was not one of the 107, and how's name was dear to the whole people of Nova Scotia and he could be elected to the Government without any opposition vote. (Great cheering.)

Mr. Mackenzie said he would vote against the resolution because such articles should have their legitimate influence. (Groans.)

The vote was taken at midnight on McDonald's resolution and passed. Yes 99, No 76.

The night looked bad, and the members avoided him as though he had the smallpox. The opinion is freely expressed that he should resign.

It was not a charge against one or more members, but a direct charge that 107 men of the Parliament of Canada were perjurers and so lost to all sense of honor as to sell themselves for a bribe, and beneath the respect of honest men.

It was worse than if such charges were made in the House. Here they could be rebuked. In the press they would be broadcast over the land, and when members of Parliament used the press to degrade themselves and style their members scoundrels it was high time Parliament should take some steps to maintain its power and dignity. (Great cheering.) One sentence in Anglin's paper said these 107 men were no better than convicted criminals in a dock. He (Tupper) appealed to the Opposition if the great majority of Canada's representatives were so much criminals, and ask whether they held the least intercourse with such men. The man who made charges was beneath the contempt of honest men, and he would not charge others with such crimes unless himself were criminal at heart.

Mr. Huntington said he was not afraid of Tupper's eloquence, and he would ask no reference to Anglin's case.

Mr. McDonald (Quebec) showed that Huntington had no right to reflect on him. Huntington had made a charge without advancing proof. The Toronto Globe condemned him for making statements without commenting upon them.

Bergin thought the resolution would not accomplish the object intended. Costigan regretted that Anglin should have so far forgotten himself as to make such outrageous statements. He had commented him as one of the libelled men from New Brunswick. He had worked with Anglin's parties, and would challenge that gentleman to name any instance where he had acted as a perjurer or a criminal. (Cheering.)

Mr. Smith, of Westmoreland, was also mentioned among the 107 bribed men. (Costigan) referred to the act of Anglin's sitting in the New Brunswick Government with Mr. Smith, and never having found him to be a dishonest man. Smith had been offered a judgeship but refused. It did not come well from his old colleague to charge him with being a perjured man or a criminal in a dock. He (Costigan) would take an independent course on questions affecting the interests of his constituents, but with the Government he did not want to mix. (Great cheering.)

Mr. Costigan sat down after he had made one of the best speeches on the question.

Forbes, (N.S.) opposition member regretted that the question should have come up. He was not one of the 107, and how's name was dear to the whole people of Nova Scotia and he could be elected to the Government without any opposition vote. (Great cheering.)

Mr. Mackenzie said he would vote against the resolution because such articles should have their legitimate influence. (Groans.)

The vote was taken at midnight on McDonald's resolution and passed. Yes 99, No 76.

The night looked bad, and the members avoided him as though he had the smallpox. The opinion is freely expressed that he should resign.

NEW YORK, April 17. Gold 117 1/2; slight exchange 108 1/2. The continued stringency in the money market has caused some uneasiness, and quite a panic in Wall street.

LONDON, April 17. A rumor from Alexandria, Egypt, says: Sir Samuel Baker and wife were murdered in the interior of Africa by the natives. They were with the expedition up the Nile.

Thunder storms occurred yesterday in Wales. Crops were injured. Several persons were struck by lightning and killed.

Count Von Arnim, the German Ambassador at Paris, will be transferred to London, and Gen. Mantouffil, now commander of the German army of occupation in France, will be appointed his successor, when the evacuation of French territory by the German troops is completed.

Advices from Rome through Catholic sources declare the Pope is rapidly recovering, and no fears of his demise at present are entertained.

NEW YORK, April 18. A BOWING CHALLENGE. William Blakely, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, the principal backer of the Taylor-Finlay ship crew of England, offers to find a four-oared crew to row any other four in the world over the championship course on the River of the North, from £200 to £500 a side, or to back Winslip and partner to row any other two men living over the same course for a like sum.

A DARING THIEF. A New York City constable with the English Police Inspectors and a Bank of England clerk on the steamer Rook Castle, for Havana, and during the voyage attempted to perjure the valuables of the alleged forger in custody at Havana. He was detected and arrested.

THE DOMINION LINE will run its steamers Lord Clive, Peles, tine, and Mississippi between Boston and Liverpool this summer, and will increase its service in the Fall.

ROME, April 17. THE POPE is still suffering and it is known that there is no improvement in his condition. A courier has left the Vatican for Germany with instructions for the guidance of the Roman Catholic Bishops in that country in case of the demise of the Pontiff.
