WINTERING SHEEP.

To carry a good sized flock of sheep through the winter with real

economy is an achievement of sheep husbandry worth any amount of trouble to be put in to it at all times, a healthy appetite, to prevent a waste of food; to induce every member of the flock to consume, digest and assimilate as much of the food best adapted to their wants, as is possible; to maintain in them an uniform temperature of such a degree that shall prevent any unnecessary waste of food material, without affecting their health by an unnatural, artificial warmth, is an attainment worth striving and studying for.

One of the first requisites in preparing a flock for wintering is to separate them into lots to feed to the best advantage. No matter how large a flock a farmer may have, it is doubtful whether over fifty head should ever be fed in the same lot, even of the same sex, while of the middle and long wooled breeds fifty are too many. Sheep are great animals for crowding, bawling together, and will make a rush for the first feed thrown out to them. On account of this disposition to crowd, it is a good plan to excite them from the sheds yards while food or grain is being dealt out to them.

Another requisite in the successful wintering of sheep is to so sort them that every flock shall contain sheep of about equal strength and powers of endurance; otherwise the weaker certainly will be crowded away from their just share of the food. Keep the lambs by themselves and give them a better chance. Under such treatment they may come out the best in the spring.

A good shelter is important for sheep, but it is not best for them to be kept in too warm houses. They have known them to run under a low shed, the back, legs and ends constructed of logs, and the covering consisting of straw, two or three feet thick, and we have seen ewes that they were altogether too warm.
