## STRIKE ORDER AT POWER HOUSE

Engineers and Firemen Not Satisfied With Increases Granted.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. Those present were Messrs. McKay, Campbell, Ingram, Dickie and Bissett.

The minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

A letter was read from the New Brunswick Advertising Co. re advertising in "Who's Who" in Automobiles. The letter laid on the table.

Another letter was read from the firemen at Electric Light Station informing the Council that if their demands for a raise of fifty cents per day was not granted they would go on strike at 4 o'clock on Feb. 25th.

Coun. Bissett said that as he understood it the men were not satisfied with the award of the council. He thought that the Council made a mistake in not passing the manager's recommendation. The men recommended for an increase were the ones entitled to such a raise.

Coun. Ingram thought that it was time to fire the whole bunch. They had been given two increases and an eight hour day since the present Council came into power. They were hard to please.

Coun. Dickie said that it was written their letter had been received by the Council's action, and surely would not walk out before notifying the Council.

Coun. Bissett moved that Robinson and Larsen be given an increase of five dollars per month. No second.

Coun. Bissett moved that the resolution adopted at the last meeting of the Council, granting increases of salaries to the employees at the Electric Light Station be rescinded and that the manager's recommendation increasing Engineer Robertson's salary to \$115.00 and Fireman Larsen's to \$105.00 be adopted. Motion lost.

Coun. McKay moved that letter from employees at Electric Light Station be placed on file.—Carried.

Coun. McKay thought that the chairman of the committee should let the Council know if there was any possibility of getting along with them. He thought this was a holdup and the Council should not stand for it. These employees had been fairly dealt with by this Council.

A communication from the Alice Chalmers Co. re agreement for temporary motor to drive pump, was read.

Coun. McKay moved that the Mayor and Town Clerk be authorized to execute the above contract, with a clause protecting the interests of the Town.—Carried.

The information was given that the Alice Chalmers Co. had not shipped the pump on the 14th inst. as promised but would not ship until the 23rd inst. The clerk read a letter from Mr. Belyea, re accounting system, also asking for payment of \$250.00 on account.

Coun. Ingram moved that Mr. Belyea be paid \$250.00 on account.—Carried.

Departmental reports were read and accounts ordered paid.

The annual reports of the Electric Light, Water & Sewerage, Public Charities, Public Property & Streets departments were read and ordered received, placed on file, and printed in the annual town report.

Coun. McKay moved that Mr. H. J. Currie, Chairman of the School Board was granted an opportunity of addressing the Council.

Chairman Currie addressed the Council in reference to finances of the School Board. He showed that the amount assessed for school purpose last year, \$25,000 was not sufficient. That on Feb. 1st the Board had spent including overdraft at beginning of year \$18,812 which left only a little over 5,000 to carry on the work for the balance of the year. The pay roll alone would be \$5,358.75, besides other expenses. On account of the fire at the upper school and the providing of additional rooms together with the heating additional expenses has been entailed. He asked for an additional grant of \$8,500.00 for school purposes.

Coun. McKay said that the Council was glad to have Mr. Currie come and explain school matters. In the past the School Board had asked for so much money and it had been granted without a question. Was glad that all this information had come up. He did not see how the Council could at this time make an additional grant. Could the Board not carry on until after the next assessment?

Mr. Currie thought that if an overdraft was to be carried it should be carried by the Town, not the School Board.

Coun. Dickie favored the Council taking charge of overdraft.

Coun. Ingram thought that the Council should have some time to think the matter over.

Coun. Dickie moved that the Finance Committee consult with the Town Solicitor in this matter and bring in a report at next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. McKay submitted the following resolution:

That application be made to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick at its next session to secure legislation to amend section 70, 51 Victoria, Chapter 81 as amended.

## DELEGATION SEES SUPT. L. S. BROWN

Improved Car Service at Once and Will Recommend Daily Express.

A large and influential delegation consisting of members of the Campbellton Board of Trade and representative business men from along the I.N.R. went to Moncton on Sunday to interview Supt. L. S. Brown upon matters relating to the train services on the I.N.R. branch of the Canadian National Railway.

On Monday they met Supt. Brown in his office and the whole matter was presented to him.

After hearing the statement of various members of the delegation Supt. Brown promised that so far as conditions of the cars were concerned he would give orders to have this remedied and make provision for additional cars when traffic was heavy.

With reference to a daily express train service he said he could not give a definite answer, but would make a strong recommendation for same to headquarters.

The members of the delegation have decided that they will go direct to Mr. Brady and press this matter, and will also approach the Post Office department for a daily mail service.

The delegation was composed of Messrs. D. A. Stewart, P. M. Shannon, Campbellton; J. H. Gagnon, L. Malenfant, R. Lynch, J. F. Michaud, A. Burgeron, J. E. Michaud, Jos. Chénard, Patrick Jean and others of I.N.R. points.

Newcastle, Feb. 24.—The pulp mill at Millerton has been bought by a new syndicate of capitalists among whom is a local paper man of valuable experience.

The new owners will shortly put the mill into condition to resume operations.

Rumors are also abundant respecting another large milling property in this vicinity.

## NEW POST OFFICE.

A new post office has been established at Rocky Gulch on the I.N.R. Mr. Claud Davidson received his appointment as postmaster Monday evening and the office is no doubt now open for business.

Since the Martineau Lumber Company commenced operations there quite a settlement has grown up and a lot of mail is daily received at the Campbellton office for that point.

ed, so as to make it necessary to submit any proposition for exemptions as therein provided, to the ratemakers of the Town of Campbellton for approval before the same be granted; and for the amendment of section 16, 51 Victoria, Chapter 81 so as to provide for the holding of the annual election on the third Tuesday in January in each year instead of the third Tuesday in April, also for the amendment of section 18, 4 Geo. 7, Chap. 69, to provide for denominations of Fire Station Debentures in amounts of \$50.00 and upwards, with rate of interest on same not exceeding six per cent. per annum.

Coun. Ingram was in favor of the change. He thought that something should be put in this legislation so that only half of the Council should retire each year.

Coun. McKay's resolution was carried unanimously.

The council adjourned.

CITY FRANCHISE TO WOMEN.

It had been in operation at this point for a number of years and is one of three owned by that company which is operating on what is known as the Alexander limits.

### A TOWN MANAGER.

So many citizens have expressed a desire for more information in reference to the town manager plan that we reproduce the following from a recent publication.

"The town manager plan of town government means government by the Mayor and Councilors elected by the ratepayers, representative, supervisory and legislative in function; and a chief executive called a town manager appointed by the Council solely by reason of his knowledge of municipal affairs and administrative ability, to have control of the work of administrative departments.

It enables the people to elect for consideration of representation only for it abandons all attempts to choose good administrators by election.

The people's representatives, the Councilors, have power to remove the manager at any time if he is incompetent or insubordinate.

Men of ability will be attracted to the position of councillor because such positions offer opportunities for great usefulness without interfering with private business.

The town manager plan provides efficient and expert municipal administration because it creates a simple administrative organization with a single executive head.

There is continuity of policy and stability in the administration, because the tenure of the town manager is comparatively permanent.

The above are a few of the advantages of such a system of town management. There are others which will be given in subsequent issues.

### HAPS HONOR BRITISH SAILOR

Still Revered Memory of William Adams, Who Led Expedition to Their Country in 1690.

Two industrial stone lanterns near the Japanese port of Yokosuka are the people's tribute to the memory of William Adams, an English sailor who was the first of his countrymen to settle in Japan, and who is credited with opening the way for commerce between Britain and Japan. In 1600 Adams led a trading expedition bound for the West Indies. His fleet consisted of five vessels symbolically named Faith, Hope, Charity, Fidelity and Good News. The expedition met with many misfortunes of weather and sickness. Their adventures included the loss of eight men who were eaten by cannibals on one of the Pacific islands.

The ship carrying Adams finally reached the coast of Borneo, in the eastern part of Kyushu, Japan. The Englishmen and their families were welcomed until the arrival of some Portuguese Jesuits who told the Japanese rulers that the English were pirates and had them imprisoned. The emperor heard of their plight, and had them brought to his palace at Osaka. The ruler finally decided that the men were harmless and released them, retaining Adams at court to teach shipbuilding and other arts to the natives. In 1613 another English sea captain arrived in Japan with letters from the king of England to the emperor of Japan. Through Adams' influence the Englishmen and the emperor signed a treaty giving Britain the perpetual right to enter any ports of the empire and trade freely throughout the country.

### CANADIAN MILLING INDUSTRY

The Canadian milling industry has since 1914, made progressive strides and flour exports between that year and 1919 increased nearly five times. Today this business has an annual capacity of slightly more than 35,000,000 barrels a year and new mills are being continually added. In 1919 Canada exported 116,099 barrels of flour valued at \$23,382. By 1919 this had increased to 3,064,128 barrels valued at about \$15,000,000. In the fiscal year of 1919, 3,185,866 barrels were milled at a value of \$34,356,934.

Great Britain has been by far, Canada's best customer for flour, her imports from the Dominion of that commodity, for the last fiscal year, being equal to about 60 per cent of the total, or 55,000,000 out of nearly 100,000,000.

Exports by countries for the last year were as follows:—Great Britain 55,270,225; United States 39,794; British South Africa 17,309; Newfoundland 24,147,327; British West Indies 55,329,527; Other countries 34,147,750.

The Trade returns for the present fiscal year show that, as yet, the exports of flour are holding their own, though the European countries are again engaged in grain growing and milling. In the last available period of five months 4,928,164 barrels of flour were exported, as compared with 4,461,312 in the same period in 1918. Of these 3,912,765 barrels went to the United Kingdom; 88,423 to British Guiana; 146,596 to the British West Indies; 297,845 to France; 100,182 to Greece; 55,735 to Italy; 72,190 to Newfoundland; and 235,084 barrels to other countries. Great Britain took a little more than 1,000,000 more barrels than she did during the same period in 1918, and 1,700,000 more than in 1917. Other departments of the milling industry boom large also, as the following figures show: oatmeal, 34,075,527; cereal, 34,247,249; bran, etc., 31,502,812.

Walled on account of the change in conditions in Europe, the export trade may fall off considerably, the Canadian milling industry by reason of the activity produced during the war, is in a very strong position and should be able to hold its own in the period of competition which is undoubtedly ahead.

### Protecting Airplane Propellers.

An aluminum plating for airplane propellers has been devised for the purpose of protecting the wood from the influence of the weather. It has been a serious problem heretofore. The plating is a thin leaf which is incorporated in the finish of the propellers, and the forest products laboratory at Madison, Wis., and placed in production by the war department. The process is practically 100 per cent effective in preventing absorption of water, particularly in the storage stage. A French authority states that 80 per cent of the French propellers produced are rejected by the pilots mainly because they are out of balance. This difficulty is due largely to unequal absorption or distribution of moisture and can be greatly reduced by an effective water-proofing coating.

Stopping a Great Waste.  
Millions of dollars' worth of fruit have been wasted in Florida during the quarter of a century hereafter nothing will be wasted as the drops, cuts and rips will all be utilized by new processes of the citrus-clove chemist and scientist. The growers and the public generally will be helped by these processes, as the former will reap a benefit from the sale of their waste products and the latter will have the benefits of the manufactured products which are greatly in demand.

### Electrocute Leopard to Save Pelt.

A leopard used by a motion-picture camera to look to victims which made him a disagreeable companion for the actors in the jungle scenes, according to Popular Mechanics Magazine. Shooting him with a high-powered rifle was first considered, but was objected to, as it would disfigure the valuable pelt. To avoid this, electrocution was decided upon, using power from a near-by station.





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


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
