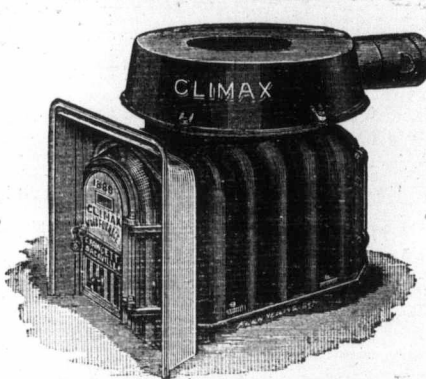

THE FRESHET.—The recent heavy rains have done little damage to crops in this vicinity. At Botsford Mr. Chas. A. Oulton's mill dam was broken by the rush of water. This rushed down the stream and carried away the dam of Robt. Allen. About 20 tons of hay swept away.

The two mile bridge and the three mile bridge between Dorchester and Sackville on the main road were both swept away on Wednesday night.

The culvert on the I. C. R. at Freely's house which has been being repaired for some weeks past, was badly injured by the rains. A large pumping engine which was used to keep the water clear of the work was undermined and slid partly into the stream.

At Point du Dute considerable hay was lost. Hiram Trenholm lost about 25 tons by being washed away besides more which was thoroughly soaked. Mr. Jas. Colpitts also lost some. At Midgie about 150 tons of hay were lost and about 150 washed into Bay Lake.

As there had been no fire in the mill some time ago the exact origin of the fire is a mystery, but it is supposed that on account of the unusual head of water occasioned by the freshet, the trimmer of the mill was started, and the fire was a result of a hot journal. About four o'clock in the day, two men reported that the circular saw was running and a few hours afterwards the building was seen in flames. About 25,000 deals were destroyed. Mr. Wheaton's loss will be \$3000; no insurance.

A CONTEMPTABLE ACT.—In another column will be found notice of a reward, which will be paid for the apprehension of the parties who shamefully disgraced the premises of Mr. Allison, at Crane's corner. Against such a public opinion has expressed itself on previous occasions, and it is earnestly hoped that the perpetrator of this act will not be allowed to remain longer at large. It was done with premeditation as the wires were cut with instruments that are not all common and which no person is liable to carry about with him.

EXCITING MOOSE HUNT.—On Friday afternoon last, some children playing around Morice's pond, saw a moose leaping swiftly from the shore in the direction of the opposite side of the pond. The moose however, did not seem to be concerned by these attractions as it kept on swimming never deviating from its course and paying no attention to the numerous shots which were being fired at it.
