A New Underkround Electrical Railway in London—Warning to Colonists—The Enfield Rife To Be Retained in the British Army.

London, Nov. 5. The Prince of Wales presided yesterday over the ceremonies attendant on the ope ing of the new underground electrical railway, which runs about two miles under the city, ending in South London. The road is 50 feet under the Surface, and the tunnel passes under the Thames. The usual English plan of dividing the traffic into three classes at different rates of fare is abandoned in this case, there being a uniform charge and but one tyle of accommodation for all passengers.

New Railroad Facilities in Europe.
LONDON, NOV. 5.—A great improvement in the railway service between London and the continent came in force to-day with the inauguration of a club train service, by which it is now possible to leave this city at 3:15 in the afternoon and reach Cologne at 7 o'clock the next morning, and Berlin at 5:30 that afternoon. There is also a new service extending to the south of France and Italy, by which Monte Carlo may be reached in 28 hours and Rome in 39 hours.

Was the Will Stolen?

ROME, NOV. 5.—A short time ago Signora Aldimira Meis, a wealthy Italian woman, died, leaving, according to her own promises and the testimony of persons who witnessed her will, the aum of 5,000,000 lirs to the Pope. Her relatives and other presumable legatees were preparing to hear the will read bequeathing this large sum to the Pontiff, but no will can be found. As a result the entire property reverts to the State, and it is freely charged that the document has been stolen by persons acting for the Crown. The persons who witnessed the will are ready to testify that they were made aware of the contents of the document before signing it.

A Wedding Feast Ends in Murder.
GLASGOW, Oct. 5.—A wedding feast in the Italian colony here Monday night was broken up by a murder. While the feast was progressing, an Italian named Lorenzo Marc Antonio made his appearance in the room. He had received no invitation to attend and was ejected. In a short time he returned and the bridegroom and a number of the guests attempted to again drive him out. Antonio resisted and during the scuffle that ensued he drew a knife and piunged it into the breast of the bridegroom, who fell to the floor a corpse, while the bride uttered a wild shriek and fell upon his body unconscious. One of the guests who had attempted to eject Antonio also received a knife thrust from the murderer. A Fresco of the "Last Supper."

London, Nov. 5.—A discovery of great artistic importance has just been made at Milan. While some workmen were engaged in scraping the wall of one of the hospitals in the city they came upon evidences of a fresco, and reporting the matter to the foreman they were ordered to proceed with a great deal of care. They were rewarded by discovering a copy of the famous "Last Supper," by Leonardo. Da Vinci, which was painted in oil on the wall of the refectory of the Milanese convent of Santa Maria delle Gracie.

The newly-found fresco seems to be an exact replica of the composition as it was originally painted by Ea Vinci, and contains details which have disappeared from the original owing to its mattereatment and the partial restorations that have been made, notably in some of the partyl legible names and inscriptions which are traced on the border of the drapories.

PRESBYTERIANS "AT HOME."

Successful Entertainment in St. Andrew's Church.

The Church Officials Tender a Reception to the Congregation—Friendly and En-couraging Speeches by Leading City

Ceuraging Speeches by Leading City Clergymen

On no occasion in its instery has St. Andrew's Church presented a more invitaing and home-like appearance than it wore last evening, when the members of the Session and Board of Managers, assisted by their wives, tendered the members and adherents of the church an "at home. From the schoolropons in the basement to the organ and choir gallery the whole building was made resplendent with tasty decorations, colored shades, and foliage and flowers. The church officials and their wives were each adorned with hadges and bouquets, and appeared to greatly enjoy the work of making all strangers acquainted and at home. The large audience that accepted the management's invitation was perhaps the most representative Presbyterian assembly that has been held in London for some time, friends from every sister church in the city being present. At the guests of the evening arrived they were ushered into the school-room, where they were committed to the mercice of the ladies. After being subjected to an hour's solicitation in the forms of "take a piece of this" or "just try some of this," the satisfied were piloted back into the church by the ushers, and when all had been served with retreshments the speech-making was commenced.

On the platform were seated Mr. James MoSween, chairman of the Board of Managers (in the whair), Rev. Messra. J. Allister Murray, James Gordon, W. M. Roger, M. P. Talling, W. J. Clark, Robert Stevenson, James Ballantyne and George Boyd. The chairman opened the proceedings with a brief speech. The object of the promoters of the social was, he said, to make the members of the congregation better acquainted among themselves, and to promote good feeling among the membership of all the Presbyterian churches, Ht was convinced that thro object would be attained, and its attainment was reward sufficient for the corps of enthusiastic workers who had provided the entertainment.

Rev. J. A. Murray, pastor of the church, welcomed, in the name of the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, all who had found it convenient to attend. Christianity, he said, was a magnificent republic, and he was pleased to notice in the audience Methodiats, Baptists and Congregationalists, as well as Presbyterians. The brotherly part of the church's nature was, he thought, sometimes neglected when it should be industriously cultivated. The Presbyterian churches were frequently aredited with coldness more than they merited, but the speaker trusted that before the evening was closed their church would be released from all such odium.

Rev. W. M. Roger followed Mr. Murray, He spoke in the same strain as his predecessor, and characterized Christian affection as the most beautiful of blossoms. He concluded his remarks with the hope that the spirit of church union would grow until all the Christian churches would be bound together.

"If," he said, "the same success attends the history of the mission you have started in the north end as has attended that of Knox Church, its presperity is assured."

Rev. W. J. Clark, of the First Presbyterian Church, followed Mr. Ballantyne, He expressed himself as thankful for so large a gathering. "We are a' John Tamson's bairns on this occasion," he said, "including even Rev. G. Boyd, who, although he is a Methodist, has been nourished, I am sure, on oateake and the shorter catechism." The meeting was an evidence that the Presbyterians of London were undivided, and the same could be said of the church throughout the country.



A large portion of the public school trustees and teachers have also favored it. There can be no doubt that it is a step in the right direction. It has been felt that in the right direction. It has been felt that the constant preparation for examinations incident to the present system has been detrimental to the interests of both pupils and teachers in the public schools, while rendering it impossible for the teachers in high schools to do their best work. With only one entrance examination—that before the midsummer holidays—the expectation is that much improvement can be effected.
