The nomination at 1 o'clock 'this morning of Mr. Carling as opponent to Charles S. Hyman, the popular representative for London, is a chapter in probably the most remarkable series of political maneuvres that have ever taken place in a

Canadian city.

It is due to Advertiser readers, and they embrace citizens of every political predilection and rank in life, to be made predilection and rank in life, to be made fully aware of what has been going on. When it was proposed that a petition should be lodged against the return of Mr. Hyman, M. P.-elect, many Conservatives opposed the project, except on one condition, and that was that the evidences of corruption should be such as Se disquality Mr. Hyman and disgrace his supporters. "Under any other circumstances," they contended, "we cannot hope to defeat so able a representative as Mr. Hyman has proved to be, so popular a representative of all classes as he undoubtedly is." The objectors further argued representative of all classes as he undoubtedly is." The objectors further argued that in a bye-election under any other circumstances they would be handicapped by the opposition of business men who object to bye-elections because they disturbinate. To these cautious objectors the reply of the coterie who were determined to have a protest was that there was evidence to unseat, disqualify and disgrace Mr. Hyman, provided the money was uper industrial was the wholesale libeling of leading citizens in the "bill of particulars," and the subsequent retraction libeling of leading citizens in the "bill of particulars," and the subsequent retraction of the Free Frees. That was a bad augury of what was in store. But the trial was even more disappointing to the adventurers. For days they worked hunting for evidence to discredit Mr. Hyman and his associates, and finally they offered to withdraw the personal charges and thus save further expense to either party to the protest if one irregularity were confessed. In this way the election was voided.

It was at this stage that the troubles of the manipulators really began. They had Mr. Hyman unseated, but with no tarnish on his fair fame, and they had to meet the men who had opposed these extreme proceedings on the ground that action against Mr. Hyman was useless unless the evidence Mr. Hyman was useless unless the evidence was conclusively damaging to him personally. How did they proceed to do it? First, they tried to unload Mr. Carling on East Middlesex. A select circle got the old man to go to Dorchester, where they attempted to boom him. The bait took, and when the convention assembled the delegates were asked to adopt him as a candidate. Mr. Carling grasped at the opportunity, but the attempt to foist him upon East Middlesex was resented by the yeomen, and the movement came to nothing. Then they fell back on the city, and called a meeting of their friends on the evening of Thursday week, it having been previously given out that Mr. Carling would be unanimously re-nominated. At that meeting, however, it became evident that the men who had worked so hard to get a case against Mr. Hyman had no longer confidence in Mr. Carling's ability to carry the city. They reached the conclusion that a new deal must be had, or they were lost, and they did not hesitate to say so in meeting. Nevertheless, the bosses managed to have it declared at the elose of the meeting that Mr. Carling was the unanimous choice of the assemblage, which was stated to be thoroughly representative, and a mass meeting of the electors was called for Monday evening last to ratify the choice. On the following day (Friday) the anti-Carling forces were largely augmented, and in the evening a large meeting under their suspices was held in Westlake's rooms, Dundas street. There the utmost indignation was expressed that Mr. Carling would not stand aside in favor of a younger and more popular man. OUR PRESENT AND FUTURE. pessimistic spirit is, we think, as

nateful to us as to the most sanguine of our eaders, remarks the Toronto Week, but we find it, nevertheless, quite impossible to be satisfied with the logic of a certain species of argument which is being made to do yeoman duty on many platforms and in many newspaper articles. The object is to prove that Canadians ought to be reason ably content with their present circum stances because their people, the farmers for instance, are man for man at least as comfortably off as their neighbors in the United States, which is beyond all question one of the most prosperous nations on the

globe. Now we believe that the premises are correct, but we cannot accept the conlusion. We see no reason to doubt that on the average there is as little destitution among us as among our neighbors, that in proportion to population the numbers of the unemployed may be as few with us as with them. But before we can be satisfied with this as an argument which should bring us content we feel constrained to look into the circumstances of the two cases and see whether the con-ditions are such as to make the comparison just. Very much depends of course upon the point of view. What is a reason able and right ambition for a young country situated as is our own and possessing its admittedly vast resources? Ought it to be content with remaining virtually stationary with respect to population, so long as its 5,000,000 or so of inhabitants are able o maintain themselves in tolerable comfort? Again, it is beyond all question that aundreds of thousands of Canadian citizens by birth or adoption have left the country and gone to the great republic within the last few years. What would have been the present condition of the country had all these remained in it? Most of them left no doubt because of their inability to find remunerative employment at home. Ought a young country with magnificent resources to be content so long as it is unable to retain its own citizens and find room in addition for goodly number of immigrants? Sir John Thompson said at Halifax that the countr could never have a policy which would prevent our people leaving to try fortune in other countries. Are we to understand that this magnificent Dominion, with its almost unlimited sources of wealth in soil, forest, mine and sea, is to be content if by natural increase and immigra-tion combined she is able to a little more than counterbalance her immigration? Are we, in a word, to be content with a comfort and prosperity which result largely from the fact that we have at our doors a great nation, able and willing to receive and absorb the surplus and overflow of our population from year to year? Or is it not rather the part of true patriotism to cherish a determined discontent with ourelves and our position so long as things are as they are, and to take no rest until the

remedy, for a remedy there surely must be applied? These utterances are the deliberate co clusions of a journal that cannot be claimed as an exponent of party policy or party desires. They have, however, good founda-tion, and no true Canadian can read them and cavil with their spirit. It is certain that the country needs a change. 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



Mr. Taylor, in advocating reciprocity, advocates for the electors of East Middlesex the same terms which are granted to the oatimeal millers, flour millers and the distillers of Canada, who can run the whole year round, on American corn, oats and wheat without paying one cent of duty; and the distillers are enabled through their waste corn, for which they do not pay I cent of duty, and are enabled to feed from 7,000 to 10,000 head of cattle, which is nearly as many as are fed by the farmers of the Province of Ontario during the winter season, and go over on the same vessels as the farmers' cattle, and are sold on the same market at the same price, the millers' cattle being cattle, and are sold on the same market at the same price, the millers' cattle being fed on free corn, while the farmers' are having to pay 20 per cent. duty on their corn, which they import to feed to their cattle, and the result has been that the farmers could not pay the 20 per cent. duty for their feed and sell in the same market as the millers and distillers do with free corn, and the Americans who also have free corn. The Canadian farmers have, therefore, been compelled to send out to England in 1891 some 70,000 lean cattle to be fed there on free corn imported from the United States, and I will here note that the shipments of corn last week from New York to England were 220,000 bushels. The greater part of it I believe goes to feed our 70,000 Canadian cattle bought from us last season.

Now, by this exchanging of bariey for corn, we would gain enough corn to fatten one half of all the cattle we ex-112 pounds. Now, by this exchanging of barley for corn, we would gain enough corn to fatten one half of all the cattle we export to England every year, and the balance of the corn we would need to fatten the other one half of our cattle. We would get it at the same price as the distiller and the Americans, which we must have if we want to sell with them on the same market. Now, Mr. Taylor, in voting for reciprocity will vote that farmers of East Middlesex, who have been the making up of the county in which they live, shall have the same rights and privileges as they do. To those using cotton seed meal, flax seed and corn for starch, which all come in free of duty, also the same privileges such as are given to catmeal millers, flour mills and all our distillers. Now our 70,000 cattle at Montreal are worth about \$35 or \$40 per head, and are the poorest cattle that go to England from any country sending cattle there, while the American cattle at New York are worth from \$30 to \$35 per head and are the best cattle that go to England from any country. The ratepayers should vote for Mr. Taylor, for in doing so they will vote for one who will vote for free corn to enable the farmers to obtain \$80 or \$90 per head for their cattle having to go to England to stand in the lowest class of all foreign cattle they will stand in the front ranks, taking second place to none.
