Unhappily, there is in his case the uncertain element of jungle fever lurking always in the background. That fever never quite leaves a man who has once been its victim, but Mr. Stanley friends are at last genuinely hopeful.

HAD ENOUGH OF SOUTH AFRICA. London, July 14.-Mr. John Hays Hammond, the American mining engineer, whose connection with the Johannesburg reform committee brought upon him sentence of death, but was for modification of the amendments pardoned by President Kruger, is in this city, and has been interviewed by a London newspaper correspondent. Mr. Hammond says that he will not return to Johannesburg, and will try to divert British capital to the United States. Being questioned on the subject of the raid, Mr. Hammond said: "I shall not testify at the trial of Dr. Jameson unless Jameson should make the statement that it was the wish of the people of Johannesburg that he should come to rescue them. ANDREE'S AIRSHIP.

London, July 14.-It is learned from Tromsoe, Norway, that Arnold Pike's steamer Victoria has arrived there after having visited the Swedish aeronaut, Herr 'Andree, at Dan's Island. Andree expected to be ready to start on his aerial voyage towards the North Pole early in the present month. Be-fore starting, however, it was the intention of the aeronaut to test his balloon thoroughly by sending it up attached to ropes and by telephone to the steamer Virgo, which vessel conveyed Andree and his companions and their outfit. On the way from Spitzbergen the steamer Victoria called at Advent Bay, on June 29, where it was learned that the members of the Martin-Conway party and of the Swedish Gooring-Knooring expedition were at that time at Advent Bay, which was full of ice.

Large Forces of Turkish Troops Ordered to the Greek and Macedonian Frontiers.

Buluwayo, July 14.-News of the utmost gravity has reached this place from the Mangwe and Tati districts. It is to the effect that a rebel impi has taken up a position on the Tati road, about 25 miles south of Buluwayo. Faka, one of the most noted of the native chiefs, has joined the rebels, with reinforcements, and ordered the construction of forts on the Tati road. The Makalagas are already in great force in the northwestern part of the Tati concession.

Fighting is expected to take place immediately. Salonica, July 14.-Twenty battalions of Redifs have been called out, and ordered to join the third army corps. Six battalions, it is stated. will proceed at once to the Greek frontier, and the remainder of the levy will be distributed along the Macedonian frontier. Its Leading Measures Being Modified or Abandoned.

London, July 14 .- The political situation has been only partially relieved by the yielding of Mr. Gerald Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland, to the pressure directed by Mr. T. W. Russell, member for the south division of Tyrone, and Mr. Jos. Chamberlain. to the Irish Land Bill. There is a continuance today of the demands of Mr. Russell and others for further modifications of the measure, while the press and people generally are giving expression to sentiments of extreme disgust at the feebleness displayed by the Government. Many Conservatives admit that if it were not for the divisions that exist between the Liberals and Radicals, the Government would be in a serious plight, as the Land Bill is the second Government measure of supreme importance introduced at this session of Parliament, which is now being wrecked on lines faid down by the Government. A few more bills like the Educational Bill and the Irish Land Bill, if wrecked by pressure within the party, will be sure to bring the Conservative party to such a difficult pass as will necessitate the reconstruction of the Ministry, an end to which Mr. Chamberlain, who supplies the real force of the present pressure, would not object.

Mr. T. P. O'Connor, discussing the subject in his paper, the Sun, writes: The plain truth is that, though Mr. Russell was the outward agent of this collapse, the whole affair was a personal triumph for Mr. Chamberlain and the landlord ring. The Cabinet would have paid little attention to Russell's protests, as with their large majority in the House of Commons they could easily afford to disregard the clamor of a few Ulster men. But Russell is Joe's protege and follower, and Balfour, who would smile at the idea of being disconcerted by Russell, retires from the lists before a salaried official. As Joe cannot afford to lose a supporter, he has cunningly seized the chance to as-

Two Bailway Disasters.

Picnic Train Wrecked and Five Persons Killed.


Collision at Kingston, Ja.-Eleven Dead and Forty Badly Hurt.

Chicago, July 14 .- A picnic special train on the Wisconsin Central road ran into a siding at Altenheim cemetery, ten miles from this city. The train consisted of 13 cars, heavily loaded, and was returning from Schiller Park. Five people were killed and many injured.

Dead—Charles Samuel, Frederick Kertell, Frank Koch, Mary Arnold, Lena Hubert. All of the killed were standing on the front platform of the first coach, and were crushed to death against the baggage car. The train was running only at ten miles an hour, but the force of the collision was sufficient to partially

telescope the first coach. Kingston, Jamaica, July 14 .- A working train on the Port Antonio Railway became unmanageable on a sharp decline and dashed down the track at a speed of at least sixty miles an hour. At the foot of the decline the train struck a stationary engine, causing a terrible wreck.



### EXHIBITION DAIRY PRODUCTS.

some Advice to Factorymen, With Special Reference to Fall Fairs.

(By J. W. Wheaton.) During the first fifteen days of August, dairy products are usually prepared for the fall fairs. Contemplating exhibitors will do well to note the fol-

1. No important prize was ever won by chance, and especially is this the case with any manufactured article such as butter and cheese. Every cheese and butter maker, therefore, should have some definite object in view in preparing his product for exhibition, and should endeavor to put his best skill and intelligence to work in turning out a perfect article.

2. Take the patrons into your confidence and induce them to take particular care of the milk on the day when the exhibition product is to be made, and when good milk is secured let the product from it be a reflection of your perfect workmanship and intimate knowledge of the best methods to adopt in making a fine quality of pheese and butter.

3. Be very careful how a package of cheese and butter is finished. A badly finished cheese or an untidy package of butter does not stand much of a show for winning a prize, and will indicate the maker's slovenly and untidy habit of doing things.

4. Aside from the intrinsic worth of

the prizes won, all exhibitions have a high educational value. If a maker is successful in winning the prize he has the satisfaction of knowing that he was in a position to put a little more skill and intelligence into his work than his competitors, and by knowing the methods adopted he will be able to put them into practice in his work during the year. The educational value is just as great for the maker who does not win the prize. On receipt of his score card he will find in what points of quality his exhibit is lacking, and by the knowledge thus obtained he will be in a position to adopt better methods in his work during the year. 5. The dairy industry of Canada is an important one, and our dairymen should remember that the dairy ex-hibits at the leading fairs should indicate to visitors from abroad not only its extent, but also that we make an article of the very finest quality.



### Worse Than Bullets!

Yellow Fever in Cuba Lays Many a Soldier Low

Panic Seizes on the Spanish Troops-40 Per Cent of the Cases Prove Fatal.

Key West, Fla., July 14.-Advices

from Havana state that a panic prevails in the Spanish army in consequence of the terrible increase of yellow fever in the last few days. estimated that fully 40 per cent of the cases prove fatal. In Santiago de Cuba there are 4,500 soldiers in the hospitals. Major-Gen. Linarez is stricken and his life is despaired of. The physicians and nurses are utterly incapable of coping with the disease. The epidemic is also very serious all along the trocha. In some cases entire companies have been stricken. Gen. Arelaz and nearly every member of his staff are ill. Capt.-Gen. Weyler has ordered the construction of low hospitals along the trocha, and will send to Spain for additional physicians. In Barcoa, Holguin, and other places in Eastern Cuba, the fever is raging with great virulence, and it is spreading to the central points. From Matanzas come most distressing tables. In that city it is said the mortality is about 60 per cent, and it is becoming difficult to bury the dead. The hospitals of Havana contain nearly six thousand patients, and every day the numbe is being increased.

EIGHTY FEET HIGH!

Appalling Dimensions of Japan's Great Tidal Wave-More Than 50,000 Lives

San Francisco, Cal., July 14.—The steamship Doric, from Yokohama, brings news up to June 25. Estimates of the loss of life from the great tidal wave reach as high as 50. 000, and this number is believed to be far below the mark.

The tidal wave was 80 feet in height and swept inland a distance of two and a half miles along 200 miles of coast. Thousands of acres of land under cultivation were devastated, and the inhabitants of the flooded districts are suffering from famine.



July 27, For the Purpose of Dividing the County

Judges Bell and Doyle to Meet on

Into Electoral Divisions. County Clerk Robson has received notification that on July 27 Judge Bell, of dividing the county of Middlesex into electoral divisions in accordance with the act passed by the Ontario Legislature at its last session, reducing the number of councilors. By this act, county councilors will be elected. by the people instead of by the municipal councils. They will be elected on the same day as municipal councilors. but will be entirely a separate body. No municipal councilor is eligible to sit on the county board. There are at present in the County Council some 48 members, and by this act these have been reduced to about sixteen members. The basis upon which this division is made, sections 2 and 3, is chapter 52, of the R. S. O., as follows: 1. If the population of the county is 25,000 or less, it shall have not less than eight or more than ten members. 2. If the population is more than 25,-000, but less than 40,000, not less than ten or more than twelve members. 3. If the population of the county is

40,000 or more, but less than 60,000, not less than twelve or more than fourteen members. 4. If the population is 60,000 or more not less than sixteen nor more than

eighteen members. For the purpose of this act, each county shall be divided into districts or divisions which shall be known as "county council divisions" as follows: 1. If the population of the county is 25,000 or less, into not less than four and not more than five divisions. 2. If the population is more than 25,-000, but less than 40,000, into not less than five and not more than six divi-

3. If the population is 40 000 or more but less than 60,000, into not less than six or more than seven divisions. 4. And if the population is 60,000 or more, into not less than eight or more than nine divisions.
