Another Battle BOMBARDMENT OF CAIMANER Cape Haytien, Hayti, June 8, 6:10 p.m.—It is reported here that a great battle has taken place at Caimanera, on the Bay of Guantanamo. At halfpast five yesterday morning (Tuesday) five ships of the American squadron opened a heavy bombardment of the fortifications of the town. There was a perfect hail of bombs in the bay, striking and demolishing many houses beyond the fortifications. 



Last year there were in this work 28 pastors and ordained missionaries, 17 evangelists, colporteurs and students and 20 teachers, 37 mission fields and 93 mission stations occupied, with a Sabbath attendance of 2,415; 928 families under the care of the committee, with 1,079 church members and 990 pupils attending Sabbath schools and Bible classes. During the year 153 members were added to the church. Of the to tal amount contributed to the work the converts provided \$6,000.


