The apprehension regarding Caucasus was due to the fact that emissaries of the Turks and the Germans had started a propaganda in that region promising the Georgians a reestablishment of the old Georgian kingdom and enlisting Mohammedan sym-

# GERMAN MARCH Servians Set Trap to Inflict Terrific Blow BIG SHIP PLAN

Austrians Routed and in Danger of Annihilation After Two Weeks' Fighting in Little Nation—Serb Strategy Successful.

London, Dec. 11.-12:10 p.m.-The reported rout of the Austrian forces in Servia, the borders of which country they crossed triumpantly just two weeks ago, dominates the war news today. In view of developments the recent Servian retreat now appears to have been strategic, and even the Allies in France are surprised at the tremendous pun-

shment being inflicted on the dual monarchy. The Servians caused to be given out an impression that they were near the end of their resources and retired from Belgrade after having held it easily for nonths. The Austrians were led into a trap and given another crushing efeat. The Servian strategy is regarded as the most effective of the war in defeat.

# CHRISTMAS TRUCE NOT SINCERE SAYS CARNEGIE

Steel King Says It Would Be Immoral To Stop Fighting and Start Again.

Washington, Dec. 11 .- Andrew Carnegie, a White House caller today, expressed decided opposition to a ruce in the European war during Christmas holidays. He declared it would be un-Christianlike and immoral to stop the fighting and then begin it again. He added that he could not believe that any nation which adopted such a suggestion was doing it sincerely.

It is rumored that during his visit he made a definite offer of \$5,000,000, which he afterwards raised to \$6,000,000, for the plant and undertakings of the Canadian Vickers, Limited, an offshoot of the famous English shipbuilding and manufacturing firm of Vickers-Maxim, Limited. Members of the Canadian poard of the Vickers firm are very reticent as to the truth of any of this rumor, but so far it has not been defin-itely denied.

The story is to the effect that, while he was over in England, Mr. Schwab, who has been given huge war orders, including submarines, which he has to complete within twelve months, obtained the consent of the English shareholders, that providing the Canadian directors were agreeable, they would sell out their undertaking. London, Dec. 11 .- The Morning Post's mayal correspondent says: "Admiral Si-Christopher Craddock is avenged—the German ships which sank his squadron have themselves been sunk. The country will receive the news of Admiral Sturdee's action with profound relief, and at the same time it is impossible that gratitude for the victory should not be mingled with the poignant regret that the squadron was not dispatched in time to enable Sir Christopher Craddock to meet the enemy with an ade-

quate force.
"The admiralty must have been aware of the movements of the Gnelsenau and Scharnhorst, that Sir Christopher Crad dock's force was utterly inadequate and no reinforcements were sent. The Canopus, an old and inefficient battleship, was on her way, but had she been present she most surely would have been sunk. British Coast Artillery Frustrates German Attempt On Harbor.

TWO GERMAN CRAFT SUNK

Admiralty Claims To Have No Confirmation of Reported Attack.

Canadian Press. LONDON. Dec. :1.-12:32 a.m.-Half a dozen German submarines made an attempt at 6:20 o'clock Thursday morning to enter the Admiraity harbor, ac-

rding to a Dover dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, and for half an hour the batteries kept up a furious fusillade, firing at least two hundred shots. It is reported that two or three of the submarines were sunk. but no confirmation of this can be ob-

The attempt was made under cover of early morning darkness, and during a neavy rainstorm. The first alarm, says the dispatch, was given by the firing of a naval gun, and soon all the batteries were in action. ### DOVER THROWN INTO EXCITEMENT.

The night was very dark and a heav; rain and haze made searchlight work difficult. Fortunately the forts were put on the alert about 4 o'clock morning by the appearance off the harbor entrance of an unidentified steamer, which refused to stop until a shot was fired across her bow. This vessel then retired. She is believed to have been the tender of the submarines. Half an hour later, it is said, a single submarine was sighted, and one of the heavy guns in the harbor fired at her. This submarine, which evidently was the advance scout, disappeared, but at half-past 6 the observers sighted what they believed to be a fleet of six submarines, several miles

cut in the channel. The channel forts commenced fring the direction of the supposed sub-marines, and kept it up for almost half an hour. At the same time a torpedopoat destroyer flotilla put to sea, where to remained all day.

Large crowds gathered on the waterfront in the early morning hours, and watched the searchlights and the artillery fire. When they saw no results of the shelling many persons expressed the opinion that it was a false alarm. There is no official confirmation that German submarines were seen.
