Nothing, as the citizens of Quebec have only too good reason to know, is so diastrous to the interests of a port, and all connected with it, as the perpetually recurring difference between employers and employed, and the condition of instability and uncertainty to which they give rise. This cripples the energies of the shipping companies, and debars them from undertaking progressive improvements which they would otherwie be only too glad for their own sakes to enter on; apart from the loss of earnings during the actual strike, it inflicts inconvenience and pecuniary loss on the 'longshoremen themselve, whose credit with the retail traders is impaired by the uncertainty in the amount and tenure of their earning; and it curtails the business of the retail, and, through them, of the wholesale houses. As in every other walk in life, a condition of uncertainty and instability has consequences



R. and the intelligence and moderation of the 'longshoremen, the port of St. John is about to enter on a period of five years' peace and stability which cannot fail to give it a strong impetus on the road to progress and prosperity. 





A rootless cactus is to be found in the deserts of California. It is a round, compact growth, rolls about the level floor of the desert home for some eight or nine months of the year. tossed hither and thither by the winds which blow with fierceness over all of California's sand beds during those months. When the rains of spring start in, the plant begins business wherever it happens to be located, and begins to put out all around it small shoots, which in turn become cacti, exactly like the parent plant. These young growths increase in size rapidly, sucking the moisture both from the parent plant and from the surrounding earth. The roots do not penetrate the soil deeply, but spread often over a circle whose radius is not less than ten feet. These roots, too, are small. but practically innumerable, and they get every bit of moisture and plant food to be had in the territory thev


