Not One Officer of His Staff Knew His Plans, and All the Conference Admiral Nebogatoff Had With Him Lasted Only Fifteen Minutes - No Training En Route, and Demoralization When Battle Began.

Vladivestock, June 13.—A series of interviews which the correspendent of the Associated Press has had with naval efficers who survived the battle of the Sea of Japan has developed a of the Sea of Japan has developed a most sensational story of the causes of the Russian disaster first of all, and the complete demoralization which fol-lowed the sinking of the flagship Kniaz Seuvaroff and the wounding of Admiral

Rojestvensky.
It is explained that not a single of-ficer of the fleet knew the commander-in-chief's plans. The admirals in com-mand of divisions knew no more than mand of divisions knew no more than the sub-lieutenasts, and had to rely only on the signals of the flagship. Admiral Nebogateff, on whom the com-mand devolved, had seen Rejestvensky only once after the juncture of their squadrons, and then only for fifteen

During the entire voyage there was practically no training in gunnery worthy the name, and the big gun practice was confined to three shots per vessel. The men who could

do such things as these are worthy

of honor individually and as a nation.

High above any virtue that the Russians have shown, however, shines the glorious honesty with one another of the little Japs. They, also had their great problems of transport and supply. Every battle, every move in preparation for battle, has gone to prove that the Japs, from the Mikado to the man whos business it was to feed one of the army mules, have done their work in dependable, workmanlike fashion, Not a man among them, apparently, has scamped his work or in any way lied to those who were depending upon the service he was to render. It is not merely that the men who were sent out to get themselves killed did that part of the business effectively-that sort of "grandstand play" has been the choice morsel for the soldier throughout all terations-but the man who was told to carry a bag of rice to a given point must have carried the whole bag to that point, the man who was set to add up columns of figures must have added them up correctly, and so on with every little duty, however unimportant or however easy it may have been for him to shirk with impunity.

The result has been that the men at the head, whose business it was to organize and calculate a victory, have been able to figure closely. The question whether a certain brigade could reach a given point in a given time may have made all the difference. It is evident that every brigade, and every corps, reached the point it was due to reach, that it reached there on schedule time and meady for the work it was to do.

The teachers who brought up the Japs to be honest with one another, are the real victors in this war.





The Valhalla is a vessel of 1,500 tens and 237 feet in length. She is elegantly equipped and has participated in many contasts.

The yacht which the German Emperer would like to see win the cup is the Hamburg. She is owned by a syndicate of 200 German yachtsmes.

London's Underfed Children.

After an investigation of the question the presence in elementary schools large numbers of children who on count of being underfed are unable

of large numbers of children who on account of being underfed are unable to derive proper benefits from the instructions, the Local Government Board has issued an order dealing therewith in the spirit of truly paternal Government.

The order instructs managers and teachers who find children coming to school inadequately fed immediately to notify the overseers of the poor, who will at once supply the requisite relief. This must never be in the form of money, but the actual food needed.

An interesting feature of the order is the fact that complete discretion is vested in the overseers as to whether the relief shall be given as a lean or as poor relief in the ordinary sense. In either case the father will be informed and will have an opportunity to make the necessary provision himself.

If he falls to do this, and in the opinion of the overseers it is a case of neglect, their relief will be regarded as a compulsory loan which they will be able to recover in a County Court. If, however, the parent is considered a bona-fide poor person unable to bear the expense, the burden will fall on the rates, the parent not being disfranchised as is ordinarily the case on receipt of parish relief.

The relief is not continued more than a month on a single application. The Local Government Board suggests that if a second application be made on account of the same child within six months the overseers shall consider whether it is their duty to proceed against the father under the Vagrancy Act or the Prevention of Cruelty to Children Act.

The Dowager Duchess of Abercorn (who was Louisa Jane Russell, daughter of the sixth Duke of Bedford, died recently of gastritis at Coates Castle, Sussex.

Tae Dowager Duchess of Abercorn the "Mother of the Hamiltons," bore the same relation to the British peerage through her family connections as did Queen Victoria to the Royal families of Europe. At the coronation of King Edward and Queen Alexandra seven of her descendants of the third

Last year on her birthday she received the congratulations of 146 of her 205 direct descendants, and she has seen her great great-grandson, the infant son of Lord Douglass. She was married in 1832 to the first Duke of Abercorn, whose Irish estates at Newtown Stewart, County Tyrone, are among the finest in Ireland. She had 14 children, of whom 10 survive, the Marchioness of Lansdowne being one of the daughters. Among her 65 grandchildren are the Duke of Marborough, the Duchess of Leeds, the Marchioness of Waterford, the Marquis of Hamilton, and the Earls of Durham, Dalkeith, Lichfield, and Kerry. She herself was a Russell, the second daughter of John, sixth Puke of Bedford, who was born in 1766.

The family gathering on her birthdays were interesting occasions, as more than once the duchess' descendants assembled to offer their congratulations to the venerable lady, many traveling from distant parts of the globe to file before her, headed by her eldest daughter, the Dowager Duchess of Lichfield, with 13 children and 13 grandchildren, followed by the 13 children and 15 grandchildren fection, not only in her own family, but in the wide spreading circle beyond it, and she continued to the last to enjoy her alert and active qualities, which were enhanced by her powers of bright conversation.

Coates Castie, near Petworth, Sussex, is the dower house belonging to the Dukes of Abercorn, and is a pretty place, where the duchess has chiefly lived since the death of her husband in 1885.

Laidon's Famous Eye Surgeon.

of curing errors of refraction consists in manipulation and directly applied pressure on the affected portion of the eye structure. Describing his methods, he said recently:

"My treatment may be briefly described as a manipulation of the eye, the massage varying with the affection. Myopia is treated in one way, hypermetropia in another, while the various kinds of fastigmatism require special means adequate to each. The process is so genial and gradual that not the least pain offends, and there is never the slightest injurious effect. The patient is treated only a few minutes daily. Some are cured in a few days. Occasionally there is no improvement for two weeks, and then amelioration is rapid."

Growth of the Hair.

It is a curious fact that a boy's hair grows one-half slower than a girl's. In boys the average rate of growth is three feet three inches in six years, being an average of .108 inch a day. During the 21st and 24th years a man's hair grows quicker than at any other period. It takes an eyelsah 20 weeks to reach a length of .429 inch, and then its life is from 100 to 150 days. By means of a camera, the wink of an eyelid has been measured, and it was found that 20 winks can be made in four seconds.

Japan's Population.

The population of Japan totals at least 5,000,000 more than that of Great Britain. If you include Formosa and the other annexations the Japanese people numbered 46,500,000 six years ago, and they were then increasing by nearly 500,000 a year. Japan also has some very big towns. Tokio has a population of about 1,500,000. Osaks between \$00,000 and \$00,000, and there are about 20 others with a population of more than 50,000.

Childs of Philadelphia, to whom the late Sir Philip Cunliffs-Owen offered on behalf of the English Government the sum of \$10,000, so as to complete the collection at South Kensington. But Mr. Childs could not make up his mind to part with the treasure, which either remains in the possession of his widow or else was bequeathed by him to one of the public institutions of Philadelphia. Hong Kong First. The importance of the Far East in

The importance of the Far East in the commerce of the world at the present time is strikingly illustrated by this statement, made by the United States bureau of statistics:

The port at which in 1903 was the largest vessel tonnage movement was Honk Kong. The total amount of the tonnage of the vessels entering and clearing from it was about 20,000,000, or, if Chinese Junks engaged in the foreign trade be included, more than 21,000,000. London is second, with 19,000,000. Followed closely by antwerp. The tonnage of New York in 1904 was 18,000,000. Hong Kong, it may be remembered, is a free port at which many vessels engaged in the Chinese, Japanese and Australasian trade call. London would head the list but for the fact that often its vessels take part of their cargo from another British port, as Cardiff, and receive their foreign clearance at it.

### VENTURESOME SEAMEN.

Travel From England to South Africa In a Nine-Ton Boat.

The two venturesome seamen, Messrs. Napper and Langford, who left Brighton last August in a nine-ton ketch to seek fortune in the South Australian pearl fishery, have found so far plenty of adventures, if very few nearly

australian pearl insiery, have found so far plenty of adventures, if very few pearls.

A letter has recently been received in London from Capt. Napper, whe says that on their arrival at Cape Town, where they were met with an enthusiastic reception, they were approached with a view to working some pearling beds in South Africa. The offer was accepted, and they were then on their way. The voyage from Brighton was accomplished in 105 sailing days, a notable performance, considering that the rudder was lost during a storm, and that the two men had to rely upon the sails for steering. "Soon after leaving St. Vincent," writes Capt. Napper, "we discovered a stowaway concealed under some old sails in the after cockpit; a little woolly-headed Antonio, a native of the is-

ly-headed Antonio, a native of the is-lands, who could not speak English, but gave us to understand he wished to join us. So we made him coek and

to join us. So we made him cook and steward.

"On October 27, five miles south of the Island of Brava, we saw a large whale in deadly combat with a sword-fish and two sharks. In its agony it came straight for our little ship, but when about fifty yards off it expired.

"The saddest event of the whole voyage happened shortly after this. 'Neison,'" the dog, my faithful old comrade, rushed from one end of the vessel te the other, barking loudly, foam flying from his mouth (not for the

RECURD OF A LIFE-SAVER.

Late Charles Nurse of Toronto Said to Have Averaged One Resour a

Charles Nurse, life-saver and 30 years ago one of Canada's most prominent athletes, died the other day at his hotel, Humber Bay, Toronto, of rupture of the muscles of the heart, which commenced to bother him one day when he went to the assistance of a man named Morrison and a team of horses. The team was hauling sand, and it got into the river just mear the bridge. Nurse ran across the bridge with a heavy coil of rope, when he was attacked with very sever pains. At the beginning of December, he was sent to the hospital, where he stayed till the middle of February. He was around for a week or two, and then had to take to his bed again. He has been sinking for the past three weeks. There are probably a score or more of people living in the vicinity of Tohad to take to his bed again. He has been sinking for the past three weeks. There are probably a score or more of people living in the vicinity of Toronto now who owe their lives to the ability of Charles Nurse as a life-saver. During the 40 years Mr. Nurse has been resident at the Humber he has been the here of many thrilling adventures in the uncertain waters of Humber Bay, and has averted many tragedles. His friends estimate that he has saved on an average one life a year. He used to say he couldn't understand the foolhardiness of some of the Humber Bay pleasure-seekers, and he could spot people who seemed to he could spot people who seemed to be going to get into trouble. It was the od fortune of many that his

ful eye had been working.

Mr. Nurse was an eyewitness of several tragedies, and has recovered many bodies. His services were always sought after a drowning accident in the Humber vicinity, and if he could not find the body on the unfortunate no one could.

one could.

Although many of Mr. Nurse's acts of valor were unrecognized, he has many valuable mementoes from people he rescued. For years he has proudly carried a handsome gold watch which was presented to him by Dr. Elifs and Barristers Delamere and Black whom he recoved devices a college. Black, whom he rescued during a gale

Ellis and Barristers Delamere and Black, whom he rescued during a gale soon after he was established at the Humber. Mr. Nurse also has the Royal Humane Society medal and a bronze medal for life-saving, which was presented to him by Lord Dufferin.

Among Mr. Nurse's valued presents is a watch charm, which he has worn for many years. It was presented to him in gratitude by William Fitzgerald and R. Crothers, for his gallant services to them at the great Humber disaster 20 years ago, when by a collision of a freight and passenger train 30 lives were lost. The service rendered by Mr. Nurse in this lamentable disaster in assisting the injured out of the burning carriages and alleviating their suffering was highly complimented.

Referring to the Humber disaster, will Fitzgerald said: "Charley Nurse was the only cool man there that morning."

Charles Nurse was born in Maidstone, Kent, in 1842, so he was 63 years of age. In the old country he was a toolmaker, and was an athleit of some prominence. From his home he went to Brighton, where he received a nautical training that has been of great service to him and of beneat to many others when they were in peril in Toronto waters. He lived in Brighton for eight years, during which time he sof apecial recognition from the Royal-Humans Society for demonstrating the best method of saving life from drewning. This was in a contest open to all comers, A dummy man of about 146 pounds weight was proyided. A strong ring made of India rubber was tightly seen on to the body of the dummy and the ring was attached to a hoop in a piece of iron of sufficient weight to sink the dummy to a Bepth of mins or ten feet below the surface of the water. Each competitor, when he dived for the dummy man, had to unhook it from the iron, otherwise, even if he brought it to the surface, he could not hold it, the additional weight of the iron attached making the whole pre-ternaturally heavy. The start was made from the shore from which there was a swim of about 50 yards to where the dummy was moored; it then had to be dived for and brought to the surface, and swam with to a buoy 75 yards distant, on which the swimmer was to land it. Nurse saelly outclassed all other competitors, which included several old country experts, among them being Prof. Cavill, who had accomplished the stage of wimming the ed all other competitors, which included several old country experts, among them being Prof. Cavill, who had accomplished the feat of swimming the English Channel. From the start to the time of bringing the dummy to the surface, after the first dive, only occupled two minutes, and Nurse then carried the dummy to the landing buoy in 3 minutes and 25 seconds.

The winning of this recognition from the Royal Humane Society is considered a high honor to any natator.

For four years Nurse held the championship for swimming and diving in Brighton.

Mr. Nurse became expert as a foot

pionship for swimming and diving in Brighton.

Mr. Nurse became expert as a foot runner before he came to Canada in 1871. In all his foot races from one to ten miles he was eminently successful. He defeated the running celebrities of the day with ease. In 1873 on the College street cricketg rounds he deteated the famed Indian runner Kerronawa in distance of one, two and four miles. He was a popular athlete and in addition to his running prowess acquired a Colonial reputation as an expert diver, swimmer and oarsman. Many indeed are his trophies, including several handsome pieces of sliverware won in England and many medals won in Canada.

"Be it resolved, that this council, while deploring the publication of such defamatory articles and protesting against the same in the name of the whole body of ratepayers, hereby instruct the city attorneys to institute in connection therewith such civil and criminal proceedings as they may deem advisable, in order that the honor and the dignity of this council may be fully indicated, and to retain council in this connection in the event of the same being deemed advisable."

He holds as clearly indefinable the right of brokers to hypothecate their customers stock to secure their own general indebtedness.

Justice Britton says: "The relationship of broker and client were astablished, the broker is enertied to indemnity as long as he carefully darries out the instructions of his principal. In this case Mr. Commee could have, any time, taken up or sold the stock and closed the account."
