The following Report of the Board for Infirm and Superannuated Ministers was then read and adopted:

During the year that has expired one of our beloved Ministers has been called to his rest above, and the Board, previous to his departure, had the pleasure of removing some of the anxieties which his circumstances involved, by contributing to his earthly wants from the funds of the Society. During the winter and spring which are past, two of our brethren who have been called to pass through severe affliction, which disabled them from discharging their duties among their people for many months, were also relieved from the funds of the Society.

The applications for aid since the society was instituted, and the necessitous circumstances of several of our worthy brethren who have consecrated themselves, at the loss of all things, to the preaching of the Word, place beyond disputation the necessity of such a provision for our infirm ministers.

During the year the Board have been under the necessity of adopting a principle in the distribution of their funds, which is of such importance as to require, if approved, the open and unanimous sanction of this Convention. That principle is this, that no monies should be appropriated to those who were pastors over churches, and upon whom sickness or age, or disability of any kind should have fallen whilst exercising their ministry in the Pastorate, unless a statement should be made by the Deacons of such Church, that its members were either unable or unwilling to supply their Pasto.'s necessities. All of which is respectfully submitted,

The Committee on Sabbath Schools beg leave to report, That the Sabbath Schools for the last year present a very encouraging and pleasing aspect, and are evidently on the increase. The Committee with pleasure report the gratifying intelligence that a large number of those valuable accessions made to our churches during the last year, have been in connection with the Sabbath School, and may be considered as the fruit of their

labors. The Committee therefore recommend that every efficient means continue to be adopted by all the churches in connection with this Convention for the advancement of this institution. We also recommend that the Rev. Samuel Elder be respectfully solicited to address as soon as he conveniently can, the Baptist Churches connected with this Convention in the three Provinces, through the pages of the Christian Visitor and Christian Messenger, on the subject of Sabbath Schools in that manner which he may deem best calculated to arouse the energies of the churches, and awaken the sympathies of the people to a means universally acknowledged as one best adapted to prepare the minds of the rising generation by a knowledge of salvation through the medium of the Scriptures.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATIONS AND COLPORTAGE.

That the diffusion of knowledge through the medium of the Press, is one means of extensive usefulness, which ought not to be neglected

by the Christian Church.

Our duty and responsibility are co-extensive with the facilities we enjoy for doing good: the ingenuity of man has discovered the art of multiplying indefinitely, the instructions of the learned, the know-ledge of ancient and modern times, the sayings of the wise, and the salutary truths of Divine revelation. Here is an instrument which the man of God may use to dispense truth, to expose error, to stimulate the sluggish and inform the ignorant; his duty is to use it thus for God; a heavy responsibility rests upon him if he neglect it; how much more then is this the duty of the combined Church which can accomplish what the unaided effort of an individual christian is wholly unequal to. But this instrument may be weilded by the infidel and vicious man; an additional obligation therefore rests upon the advocates of truth, to avail themselves of so powerful an agent as the Press, in pre-occupying public attention with sound knowledge and counteracting error.

But among other publications, periodical literature occupies a prominent position, its convenient size, the varied information it contains, the regularity, constancy, and freshness of its appearance, render it a medium poculiarly adapted for the instruction of the young and aninformed, make it a welcome guest in every family, adapt it alike for the parlour, the place of merchandize and the public conveyance.

Journals of this description, however necessary, require a large outlay of capital; they involve a serious amount of labour, they demand no inconsiderable measure of ability for their management, and they will amply repay the most lavish expenditure of mental resources. They can, therefore, only be efficiently sustained by a circulation which shall place them above embarrassment, and even render them profitable. Unless subscribers are obtained, and subscriptions paid up, they must necessarily languish and become, instead of a powerful instrument of good, a feeble object of discredit. Impressed with these views, the Committee would earnestly recommend the purchase of books, the circulation of the papers which have the confidence of the denomination in both Provinces, under the conviction that much good is hindered by the limited diffusion of such knowledge as it is the province of these publications to spread.

COLPORTAGE.

Your Committee feel deeply solicitous to impress upon the minds of all connected with this Convention, the importance of the Colpor-

teur system.

Whenever or wherever this system has been employed, a remarkable success has followed. It was Luther's right arm in extending his views and influence over Germany and the adjacent countries, and more recently has been more efficient than perhaps any other, or all other means combined to create that remarkable desire through the countries of Europe for the Scriptures, and for liberty of conscience

to obey the Scriptures in all matters pertaining to religion.

So efficient has this agency proved in the United States, that during the past seven years the American Tract Society has increased their number of Colporteurs from two individuals, to three hundred and ninety-seven, and so apparent has been their success, particularly their efforts amongst Roman Catholics, hundreds of whom have been converted, and also of skeptics who seemed beyond the reach of religious influence otherwise exerted, that the means are most cheerfully and liberally furnished to sustain the work notwithstanding its rapid enlargement.

Our Provinces present a field over which this agency may be extended with as great a prospect of success and profit, as any other territory of similar extent. The vast number of our population, scattered over the Provinces beyond the reach of the regular ministry, and without means for sustaining it, make it imperative upon the Churches to provide some other agency through which the saving

truths of Christianity may be communicated to them.

The experiment has already been tried with most flattering success in New Brunswick, an amount of truth has been disseminated, and families visited which could not have been effected in many years through the ordinary channel. More than 6000 volumes of select religious works have been put in circulation since August of last year, and the demand is constantly increasing, the Colporteur invariably finding his successive visits more and more favourably received.

The Depository at St. John is now assuming a permanent shape, there being some £150 or £200 worth of books always on hand. This might be made a central depot if desirable, or as the communication is now so easy between every Province and the States, Depositories

might be easily established in the other Province for their own

supply.

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The Committee are able from the experience of the Colporteur Committee at St. John, to warrant the expectation that several Colporteurs may cover all the expenses of their agencies by their sales, leaving upon the Churches only the expense of their outfit. The Committee would hope that immediate efforts be made to put several Colporteurs into each Province, to accomplish this desirable work, upon which the welfare of so many depends, and in the benefits of which no church, however favourably situated otherways, can fail to participate. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The arrival of Father T. S. Harding, and Dr. Crawley from Nova Scotia, who had been detained on their passage by inclement weather, was hailed with pleasure by the meeting.

Committee on Union Societies and Quarterly Meetings, presented

the following Report:

The Committee view with much pleasure the success which has attended the operations of the Union Societies, especially in Nova Scotia—a success sufficient to prove the efficiency of such organizations as a means of promoting the interest of the Redeemer's kingdom; and they earnestly recommend the immediate appointment of an agency for the purpose of more widely establishing these societies in New Brunswick, and of bringing into more vigorous action those already formed. They would affectionately urge upon the Churches and Missionary Boards the duty of affording all encouragement to such agency.

Your Committee would also express their gratification at perceiving that the attention of the Pastors and Churches has been recently called up to the necessity of universally holding and sustaining Quarterly Meetings; and recommend to the notice of the Churches the suggestions contained in the Circular Letter of the Eastern Association. They also suggest that the Ministerial Conference usually held in connection with the Quarterly Meetings be more immediately directed to the object of rendering our Baptist ministrations more effective; and, as means of accomplishing this object, advise the preparation of Essays, Sermons, and the practical employment of the rules of scriptural interpretation, together with such other modes of mental and spiritual improvement as may be deemed advisable.

After the operations of the Union Society in Nova Scotia had been detailed, the following Report of the General Union Society of New Brunswick was read, and Officers appointed.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE GENERAL UNION SOCIETY OF THE BAPTIST DENOMINATION OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

The Board having so fully explained the arrangements and objects of the Union, in their previous Reports, they do not consider it necessary, at his time, to go over the same ground, and need therefore do little more than refer to the Treasurer's account, which shows the result of the action

of the Union during the past year.

By the Treasurer's account, it will be seen that a much smaller sum has been received this year than during either of the two previous years of the existence of the Union. This falling off has, doubtless, been occasioned by the extreme scarcity of money, and the pecuniary pressure which has been

so generally felt throughout the Province for some time past.

A considerable expense has been incurred by the employment of Agents; but the Board consider this unavoidable, for without the aid of such Agencies, less would have been effected. If the Local Union Societies, when once organized, would continue their efforts from year to year, the expense of Agencies need not be repeated; but it has been found that those societies, with few exceptions, have become inactive, and unless excited to action by the visits of Agents, would become altogether extinct. The Board believe that the employment of an efficient Agent, whose whole time should be spent on behalf of the Union, would secure the objects contemplated more effectually than any other plan that could be adopted; they have endeavoured, during the past year, to secure the services of such a person, but without success, and have been obliged to depend on the oceasional services of the Rev. Messrs. Francis and M'Donald. The plan of the Union has been, for some time past, before the Denomination in this Province, although it has not been so generally acted upon by the Churches as was anticipated. The Board would therefore refer the matter to the serious cousideration of the Convention, and request such advice and directions as that body may consider best calculated to secure the permanent support of the several highly important objects embraced in our organization.

Resolved, Whereas Education is one of the objects comprised in the Convention, that in the present state of the Provinces, we recognize Acadia College as the College of this Convention, and consequently the College of the three Provinces, represented in this body; and we recommend that Educational Meetings be held in both Provinces, particularly in New Brunswick, during the next year; and that the Professors of Acadia College and the Principal of the Seminary at Fredericton be requested to attend and preside at such meetings. We further advise all young men preparing for a College course, to avail themselves of the preparatory training which is so efficiently afforded by the respective Academies at Fredericton and Horton.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Submitted by the Rev. Dr. Crawley to the Convention.

In once more meeting with the brethren (from whom they receive heir appointment) the Committee would gratefully acknowledge the ind Providence which attends them, and which permits them this pportunity of recording their sense of His favor. Although the past ear has been one of great mercy, it affords little in the way of incident. the mission being still confined to the limit of but one laborer; and hat one being now settled in the quiet sphere in which we trust he vill permanently operate, it cannot be expected that from year to year

uch variety of information will be afforded.

We have, however, the happiness to acknowledge a measure of that hich we all especially desire, and the hope of which has been the nain spring to form and maintain this Society; we allude to the conerting grace of God conferred on the labors of our Missionary. From private letter from Mrs. Burpe, which the Committee were permitted see, they learned, early in the winter, that encouragement was felt the School of the Mission from favorable appearances of seriousness in the minds of several of the children. The Society are aware that n important branch of Missionary labour consists in school teaching The Karens of the villages in the neighborhood of Mergui, or upon The banks of the Tennasarim river, which discharges itself into the sea ear that place, being sensible, to some extent, of the advantages which air ducation offers, permit their children to attend a school in the city uring a portion of the year, and a part of the labours of Mr. Burpe onsists in exciting attention to this important subject on the minds f the Karens when he visits the jungle, at other times these children the prm part of his hearers in the city, or become objects of special atten-11Z0 on in the school, which has also the advantage of being under the ıtly irection of a pious native teacher. We

At the last accounts received from Mergui, for which the Committee gain refer to a private letter from Mrs. Burpe, the hopes which had the een entertained in respect to Karen pupils had been realized. Mr. y all surpe had again visited the jungle, and had enjoyed the high satis-We action of baptizing as many as ten young persons of Karen origin, vall upils of the school in Mergui, and the first fraits of his missionary dod abors. What greatly enhanced the interest of the scene of this solema edication of immortal souls to God, was the circumstance that these ouths were all of them children of converted parents, who, with one

sception, were all present at their baptism.

Our missionaries seldom write without reference to the exceeding

kindness and affectionate attachment of the Karen converts who watch with deep interest every visit of the missionary, and are always ready on his arrival, with their little presents of fowls, or fruit, or rice, as tokens of their love.

It is a high satisfaction and doubtless will be so regarded by the society to learn that Mr. Burpe has so far mastered the difficulties of the native language of the country, as to commence, to some extent public services among the people. He had already, at the time of the most recent accounts, prayed with the natives in their own tongue and was expecting soon to attempt public preaching. In more provate and shorter addresses, he, of course, had previously attempted to extend his usefulness; and Mrs. Burpe was also hoping very soon to be able to conduct social worship amongst her female attendants and such other native females to whom she could obtain access.

Some anxiety rests on the minds of the Board in regard to Brothe Burpe's health, previous to his leaving Akyab for his present static at Mergui, during a visit which he had made to the jungle on the rive Kiladon, he had been affected with a cold which lodged on his ches accompanied with a cough, and had at one time reduced him to a state of considerable weakness; the sea voyage, however, had greatly assists to restore him, and in her last letter Mrs. Burpe states her hope that the cough was almost entirely removed—and this Board trusts that it may be made a matter of special prayer in the Churches and in the social circle that the life and health of one so essential, humanh speaking, to the success of our great enterprize, may be mercifully preserved.

The situation of the mission premises will, as the board hope, contribute to this desirable end; placed on high ground in view of the ocean, though in one of the hottest of tropical climates, the residence of our beloved missionaries daily visited by a sea breeze which tend greatly to impart a measure of that vigor which usually belongs only to more northern climates, Mrs. Burpe and her child have been constantly, by the goodness of God, preserved in the highest health

The society will remember the earnest appeals made by Bro. Burn for an increase in the number of labourers, and that this subject wa warmly pressed on the notice of the society last year. Every day in creased the urgency of this claim. Mergui now resigned to the sing labors of Br. Burpe is a large Province with a widely scattered Kare as well as Burman population. With every advantage of a resident within reach of the salutary air of the ocean, and with every other possible pecaution, a visit to the jungle, must ever expose an Euro pean constitution to danger, and the aid of a coadjutor in case of side ness becomes indispensable. In making the various dispositions are managements too, which must be necessary in any plan for evang lizing a large territory, in finding out the fitness of natives for teacher in or as candidates for baptism, as well as in seizing the opportunities which occur for distributing tracts, for conversing with the vative and for preaching the word, the necessity for the counsel and comfo and aid of a brother seems imperative. If ever the scripture "ty are better than one," or the principal which led to the sending forth

e first preachers of the Gospel two and two was applicable to spi-

tual labours, it must be applicable in the present case.

In this conviction, and with the purpose of carrying out what they ave reason to believe to be the wishes of the churches in general, the oard, ever since the last meeting of the Convention, and indeed long fore that meeting, have been earnestly engaged in looking on every de for a suitable coadjutor to Mr. Burpe. They are not yet able to y that they have found him, but they can say that some circumances that have lately occurred and that appear providential, are now recting their attention to an individual, who, they have reason to hope, ay prove to be the person designed in Providence for this important ork, and whose name, if he should finally be engaged for this service, fill, in due time, be laid before the public.

In the mean while, there seems so much probability that a second lissionary family will be shortly sent to Mergui, that the Board feel emselves not only authorised, but solemnly called upon to arouse tention to the necessity of providing adequate means for their sup-

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A sum of money is on hand which may be considered as somewhat ore, perhaps than is requisite for the outfit of a second missionary; at unless the contributions annually made, shall be considerably inreased, there will not be enough for their permanent support. Four undred pounds at the lowest estimate, ought to be the fund furnishd by the several Provinces engaged in this enterprise, for the suport of two Missionary families, together with the various other exenses of the Mission; and then, there may arrise from time to time, he necessity of occasional outlays in the purchase of property for a esidence and schools; the employment of native teachers; and ther purposes necessarily incident to Missionary labour in heathen ands, which would demand extra contributions.

The Board trust that the brethren in the Provinces will be found peed ready to live up to the demands of the occasion, and in addition to ild heir contributions, will not cease to arouse their hearts to that spirit ur f earnest believing prayer, which is so essential a support to suit our

wa indertaking, as that in which the Society is engaged.

our Missionary Brother and his family have, in the words of the ng evered Carey, "descended into the pit" of heathen darkness. It beare omes their brethren at home, with their prayers and their contribuent ons, "to hold faithfully by the ropes." They will find it a service the hat will abundantly bless the labourer: never was the truth that he un who watereth shall himself be watered, more fully and blessedly relised them in all the attempts which the christian Church has made an p go forth according to the Divine command unto all nations, and to ng reach the Gospel to every nation .- May the Lord give us abundantly her he spirit to obey, and in obedience, that blessing will be found. tie

The following resolutions were thereugon adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention, confiding in the wisdom of the Foty eign Missionary Board, and in the integrity of the Churches of the Denomination to sustain an additional Missionary, hereby authorize he Board to send forth another family to join our beloved brother and sister Burpe at Mergui, as soon as they can make the necessary and

rangement.

Resolved, That this Convention, from the information given by Brethren present, belonging to New Brunswick, feel themselves justified in expressing the assurance that one-third of the expeuse of the Foreign Missions, increased by a second Missionary family, will be contributed by New Brunswick, and do now pledge themselves, on hehalf of the Churches, Union Societies, and other friends of Missions, that the amount of one-third of the expense of the Foreign Missions shall be forthcoming from New Bruswick.

Resolved, That the Minutes of this Convention be printed by the Publisher of the Christian Visttor, and that nine hundred be published for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and six hundred for New

Brunswick.

Resolved, That Elder E. D. Very be requested to publish his Sermon, delivered at the introduction of these Meetings, in the Christian Visitor and Christian Messenger.

Resolved, That the next Convention be held at Bridgetown, and the Elder S. Robinson, of St. John, preach the Introductory Sermon.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be tendered to the friends at Fredericton, for their generous hospitality to the Delegates. The Convention then adjourned, after prayer by the President.
