

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

1. In this the Sixth Annual Report of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, it will be observed that the number of Affiliated Associations were "seventeen" against seven in 1872.

2. The aid accorded by Government on former occasions was again granted this year, and the following sums were paid to

The two latter provinces having affiliated with the parent association this year.

Grants in aid of County and other Rifle Associations for the year ending 30th June, 1873, were made through the Department of Militia and Defence.

3. It will be observed by the Report of the Secretary that the Annual Prize Meeting of the Association took place at Ottawa for the first time, commencing on the 16th September. The proceedings were opened by Lady Macdonald firing the first shot, and passed off most satisfactorily.

The excellent shooting at this meeting is fully recorded in this report, a number of the best marksmen from the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick having attended the competition. The Ranges at Ottawa, though few in number, had been carefully prepared under the superintendence of a local Committee of the Council of the Association.

The Council entertain a hope that means may be provided for still greater improvement in the Rideau Ranges for next year's meeting, by extending the area, and increasing the number of Ranges.

4. The sum of \$1,110 was distributed in money prizes, and prizes in kind to the value of \$1,550, which includes "the Mac-Dougall Cup," "the Merchants of London Cup." "Senate and House of Commons Prize," and a Cup presented by J. M. Currier, Esq, M.P., together with three medals, Gold, Silver and Bronze presented by His Excellency the Governor General, the Silver Medal of the National Rifle Association, and the Gold, Silver and Bronze Medals of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

5. The Council have again much pleasure in recording the fact that no accidents occurred during the competitions at Ottawa.

6. The Council refer to the Secretary's Report, and the detailed returns of the various matches which will be found in the appendix.

7. The liberality of the Railway and Steamboat Companies in carrying competitors to and from their homes at reduced rates is acknowledged with thanks.

8. In submitting the accompanying Report from Lieut.-Colonel Peters, the officer commanding the Wimbledon Team for this year, the Council have great pleasure and satisfaction in referring to the performance of the Team, though the "Kolapore Cups" were not included in the list of the Prizes won by the Team on that occasion, yet a large number of individual prizes were won; and for the first time since Canada has been represented at Wimbledon, the name of one of the Canadian Team has obtained a place in thé 2nd Stage of the "Queen's Prize."

The reception of the Team at Wimbledon under the able charge of Lieut.-Col. Peters and Major Otter, was most hearty, while the selection of Lieut.-Col. Peters as umpire in the International Trophy Match, is considered a graceful compliment and honor to the Association. The Council join in the hope expressed on all sides at Wimbledon that Canada may be again represented by a Team of Canadian Marksmen at the meeting next year, and be successful in again winning the great "Kolapore" prize.

9. The Council gratefully acknowledge the continued liberal support of the Government of the Dominion, through the Honorable the Minister of Militia and Defence, in aiding the funds of the Association, as well as for the assistance by grants of movey to the various Provincial Associations

10. The support received by the Association from His Excellency the Governor General evidences the great interest taken by His Excellency in the progress of Rifle Shooting in the Dominion. The liberality extended by His Excellency in offering prizes for competition is thankfully acknowledged.

11. The Council have to acknowledge the valuable services rendered to the Association by the Treasurer and Secretary.

FINANCE.

For a full account of the Finances of the Association the Council refer to the statement of the Treasurer to which is attached the Auditor's Report for the period from the 8th March, 1873, to 10th November, 1873.

The Balance Sheet exhibits the total income from all sources for that period, to have been \$9,377.85, while the expenditure amounted to \$10,089.66 showing an excess of expenditure over income of \$711.81—this amount being deducted from the balance of \$1,483.25 carried forward from last year's financial statement, leaves a balance in favour of the Association of \$771.44.

The principal expenditure during the year was incurred in connection with the Wimbledon Team of 1873 A detailed statement of the disbursements made under this head by the officer commanding the Team, Lieut.-Colonel Peters, will be found in the appendix. The receipts from subscribers and affiliated associations show a small increase over last year. The number of annual subscribers of \$2 during the year being "77," and affiliated associations.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

OF THE

DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

In accordance with the decision of the Council of the Association, the annual Prize Meeting for the year 1873, took place at the Rideau Ranges, Ottawa, on the 16th September and four following days.

The arrangements for the Meeting were carried out under the management of a Local Committee of the Council of the Association, of which Lieut.-Col. Ross, Governor General's Foot Guards, was Chairman.

Great alterations and improvements had to be carried out upon the Rideau Ranges to render them suitable for the meeting. Three additional Butts, with marker's pits, and firing points up to 600 yards had to be provided, giving the total number of targets available for 600 yards "seven" and only one for distances beyond that number.

The want of a more extended Range at Ottawa, with greater facilities for carrying out in a short time competitions where a large number are engaged, was much felt. On this occasion it required five days to complete the competition.

The aid granted towards the funds of the Association by the Government was \$6,400, but as a large portion of that amount had to be expended in connection with the expenses of the Wimbledon Team for 1873, only the sum of \$1,110 was available for cash prizes.

His Excellency the Governor General presented 3 medals for competition, viz. :--

A Gold Medal, which was won by Sergt. McMullin, 10th Batt. A Silver ""Baillie 47th " A Bronze ""Ensign Trihey, G. T. R., and J. M. Currier, Esq., M. P., a Silver Cup.

The MacDougall Challenge Cup, competed for, for the fifth time, was won by Private Mitchell, 13th Battalion, with a score of 33 points.

The London Merchants' Cup was a new feature in the prize list for this year, introduced in lieu of the Provincial Match, under somewhat similar conditions, and was won this year by the Province of Quebec, the five competitors scoring a total of 279 points.

WIMBLEDON TEAM, 1873.

REPORT OF LIEUT.-COLONEL LESTER PETERS, OFFICER COMMANDING THE CANADIAN TEAM AT WIMBLE-DON, 1873.

TO LIEUT.-COLONEL GZOWSKI :

President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

SIR,—I have the honour to report the proceedings of the Canadian Team selected to represent the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association at the annual competition of the National Rifle Association held at Wimbledon, England, in the month of July, A.D., 1873.

On Friday, the 20th of June, I was joined at Quebec by Major Otter, of the "Queen's Own Rifles," Toronto, the officer appointed as second in command; and at noon on the same day the men who had been chosen to constitute the team reported themselves at the Brigade Office, Quebec, and duly signed the agreement and regulations prepared for their government.

His Excellency the Governor General of Canada having intimated his intention of visiting the team at the steamship "Prussian" before the time of sailing, I ordered the detachment to parade on board in uniform at 9 o'clock on the morning of Saturday, the 21st of June. His Excellency expressed the warmest interest in the team, enquired the names of the members and the localities of the Dominion represented, and addressing the men with words of encouragement and advice was pleased to express his confidence that they would do credit to themselves and to the Dominion Rifle Association; and said that Her Excellency the Countess of Dufferin would present a gold medal to that member of the team who at the close of the competitions should be found to have made the highest aggregate score during the meeting at Wimbledon. This medal was won by Assistant Surgeon Vail, 74th Canada, of New Brunswick, with a score of 285 marks, in competitions entered into by the whole team at Wimbledon.

Captain Tilton, one of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association, met us at Quebec, and to his considerate arrangements we were greatly indebted for our comfort and accommodation on the passage.

We sailed from Quebec on the 21st of June, and enjoyed a favorable and speedy voyage, arriving at Liverpool ou the morning of Tuesday, the first of July. During the passage we received the greatest kindness and attention from Captain Dutton and the other officers of the steamship "Prussian." On Tuesday morning, the 1st of July, at 7 a.m., the team landed from the SS. "Prussian," at Liverpool, in good health; marched to the Railway Station, and went by rail at 9.15 to Hightown, a short distance from Liverpool, near the Altcar rifle range, and put up at the Hightown Hotel, where arrangements were made for the accommodation of the team until Saturday the day of leaving for Wimbledon. Major Otter accompanied me to the Altcar rifle range, which was at once placed at our disposal by the non-commissioned officer in charge for practice during all the time of our stay at Hightown.

In the afternoon of the same day the team entered on their competitive practice at 300, 500 and 600 yards. Seven shots at each distance. I gave directions for seven shots at each distance, without sighting shots, because I found that the rules for this year at Wimbledon exclude sighting shots, but provide that seven thots be fired instead of, as formerly; two sighting shots and five shots. The day was bright with light wind from the right, and the average good.

On that evening, leaving Major Otter in charge of the team, I started for London, to communicate with Captain St. John-Mildmay, Secretary of the National Rifle Association, and deliver your letters of introduction. I arrived in London on the morning of Wednesday, the 2nd, but found the office of the National Rifle Association closed there, and that it had been removed temporarily to Wimbledon.

On Thursday Sir Peter Tait went with me to Wimbledon where I was received with the most hearty welcome by Captain St. John-Mildmay, who at once offered to afford me every information, and expressed his great pleasure that a team had arrived from Canada to take part in the Wimbledon competition. Captain Salmond, R.E., the engineer in charge accompanied us to lay out the ground for the Canadian camp. We found the place that was appropriated for the purpose last year close to the " iron house"—occupied by a large flag staff, erected by the London Scottish Volunteers, whose ordinary practice range is near that part of the Common. Captain Salmond, however staked out a most advantageous and pleasantly situated piece of ground in the immed ate neighbourhood; and Sir Peter Tait kindly undertook to visit the grounds again and see that the tents were pitched and in readiness for us on Saturday afternoon, at which time it was arranged that we should come into camp.

On Friday morning I went again to Wimbledon to complete arrangements at Captain Costin's department,—the Executive Range officer—for the entries of the team, and was most courteously afforded all necessary information, no charge being made for "post" entries in any of the competitions.

On the afternoon of Friday I returned to Liverpool, arriving at Hightewn at eight o'clock in the evening, and received report from Major Otter that the practice of the team had continued regularly twice a day, and that a friendly match had been contested on this evening at five o'clock, between the Liverpool Rifle Brigade and the Canadian team, on challenge of the Liverpool Rifle Brigade, at 200, 500 and 600 yards, seven shots at each range. Prize—a "Pewter," value 20s, to be the property of the man making the highest score on the winning side. The competition resulted in favour of the Canadian team by twelve points. Colour-Sergeant Omand, Ontario, making the highest score—61. Major Otter also informed me that he and the whole team had received the greatest kindness from the Lancashire Volunteers there, and that ammunition had been generously supplied to the team.

On Saturday morning, the 5th July, we left Hightown at six o'clock and Liverpool at 9.45 for Wimbledon, arriving at the Putney Station about 4 p.m., where we were met by Sir Peter Tait, who accompanied us to the Camp, about two miles from the station. We found the tents pitched and all things in readiness for us, and that under Sir Peter Tait's direction the grounds within our encampment had been tastefully set out with plants and shrubs.

The arrangement for this year includes the cost of ammunition for the Snider competitions in the entrance fee.

On Monday morning, July 7th, the competitions began.

The first competition was for the "Alfred Prize," distance 200 yards. Graham, Coutu, Shaw, Power and Boyd scored 25 each. It was found that there were 125 who were ties at that score, and it was first ordered that the ties should meet and draw lots for prizes, as there was no time to shoot off. This, however, creating great disatisfaction among the volunteers in camp, it was afterwards decided by the Council that the moneys distributable should be equally divided, and so our five came in for 18s. 6d. each. Average of team, 22¹/₂.

"Alexandria," 500 yards; the 600 yards distance remaining over for Thursday.

"First Series Extra Prizes," distance 200 yards. In this competition EATON, of Nova Scotia, took the seventh prize, being one of seven who scored 26; two scoring 27 out of a possible 28. He chose a "Kent" Rifle, value £10. Average of team, $22\frac{1}{3}$.

Tuesday, 8th July. This day began with the competition for the "Queen's," first distance 200 yards.

"Second Series Extra Prizes," distance 500 yards. Assistant-Surgeon Vail, New Brunswick, won the first prize, score 27; and having first choice on the prize list, selected an Aneroid Barometer in gilt vase and marble stand, under glass shade, value £12. Average of team 20-08.

Wednesday, 9th July. "Queen's" continued—second distance 500 yards. Our team making average 221.

Thursday, 10th July. "Queen's" concluded—third distance 600 yards. Assistant-Surgeon Vail won himself the 9th place in the first "sixty," making 69 points at the three ranges, winning the National Rifle Association Badge and £12. Lieut. Anderson, Ontario, and Sergt. Harris, Nova Scotia, won £2 each, making 61 points; giving us one in the "sixty" and two prize men.

"Windmill," first distance 500 yards. Average good.

"Alexandra," second distance 600 yards. In this competition at 500 and 600 yards, Boyd, Grand Trunk Engineers, won £9; Harris, • Nova Scotia, £2 8s.; and Omand, Ontario, 11s. 6d.

Friday, 11th July. "Windmill" continued—distance 200 yards. In this competition at 200 and 500 yards, no prize won, but the average shooting of the team was good.

"St. George's," distance 500 yards. In this competition Omand made 25 points, but did not come in for a prize.

"Martin's," distance 600 yards. Kiddy, Nova Scotia; and Loggie, New Brunswick, won £2, 2s. 10d. each-making 24.

"H.R.H. the Prince of Wales' Prize," restricted to winners of the N. R.A. silver and bronze medals. For this competition I entered Capt. White, Ontario, winner of silver medal at Ontario for 1872, and Corporal Hickey, of Nova Scotia, a winner for 1871, who had not competed on that medal at a Wimbledon meeting. Distances 200, 500 and 600 yards. In this competition Capt. White won £5.

Friday, the 11th, closed the competition of or which I had entered or team, and on examination of the scores made in these competitions there was much cause for congratulation. The average shooting was good, many prizes were won, and we have a high place among the first "sixty," in the Queen's. Assistant-Surgeon Vail, of New Brunswick, having won this distinction not hitherto attained by a Dominion marksman.

I received a request from the 1st Cheshire Volunteers, with whom the team of last year had a competition at Altcar, and who did not meet us there this year, that we would have a friendly contest at Wimbledon; to this I readily consented, but as the rules of the camp do not admit of arrangements for such a private competition, it was agreed that we should take the scores at the "Queen's" as a test, they furnishing the names beforehand of twenty men of their corps whose scores were to be compared at the close of the first stage of the "Queen's," with the scores of our team. In this contest the Canadian team was successful, leading by 59 points. The Prize, a "Pewter," value £1 1s, to be the property of the man making the highest score in the winning team, was won by Assistant-Surgeon Vail.

Immediately after arrival in camp I transmitted to the Earl of Ducie the resolutions of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, entrusted to me, relating to the presentation to him of a Moose head and horns, and two Cariboo Deer heads and horns, in acknowledgement of his kindness to the Canadian Team of 1872, and waited on Lord Ducie to ascertain his pleasure as to the time and place for the presentation, when he appointed Saturday evening the 12th, at the "Cottage," his residence in camp. I ordered the team to parade in full uniform on that evening. The heads were mounted on a shield covered with scarlet cloth, so made and supported as to show them to advantage. The Moose head above, and the Deer heads one on each side below on the shield. This was carried by six of the team, the others forming an escort, and we marched from the camp to the lawn in front of the residence of Lord Ducie. The trophy was then placed in position. We found a large party assembled at Lord Ducie's: Her Royal Highness the Princess Mary, Duchess of Teck, the Duke of Teck, the Lord Chancellor and Lady Selborne, the Marquis Ripon and other distinguished persons. We had the honor of being presented to Her Royal Highness the Princess Mary, after which I read the resolution of the Council of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, and in your name, as President, expressed the thanks of the Council of the Association to Lord Ducie for the kindness shown by him, as Chairman of the National Rifle Association, to the Canadian Team at Wimbledon, in 1872, and requested that he would accept the gift in accordance with the resolution of the Association. Lord Ducie said that it gave him great rleasure to receive the resolution and accept the gift, and he requested me to convey to you, as President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, his thanks for a present which he said was so peculiarly valuable to him as he had a large collection of horns of various animals that had from time to time, during many years, been brought together, and that these would be a most interesting addition to his collection.

During the week we received many distinguished visitors. On Thursday, Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise with the Marquis of Lorne, the Earl and Countess of Ducie, the Commandant and Staff Officers of the Camp, honored the Canadian camp with their presence. The team paraded to receive Her Royal Highness who expressed her great interest in the success o' the Canadian marksmen. On Wednesday, Lieut.-General Sir Hastings Doyle, formerly Lieut.-Governor of New Brunswick, and lately of Nova Scotia, visited the camp, and addressing the team referred to the great pleasure he had in seeing the Dominion of Canada represented at Wimbledon. Among the visitors were the Right Honorable Mr. Cardwell, Secretary of State for War, General Macdougall and many others, who especially expressed their interest in our team.

On Saturday the 12th, at the request of the Capta is of the English, Scotch and Irish "twenties," I had the honor of acting as umpire in the competition for the "International Challenge Trophy" As I considered it a compliment to the Canadian team, that their Captain should be requested to act as umpire in this match, I had great satisfaction in accepting the position. The responsibility was practically nominal, as the competition was in all respects conducted so strictly according to rule and so courteously between the Captains of the "twenties," that no questions arose for the decision of the umpire. The English team won.

The eight to represent the mother country at the competition for the Rajah of Kolapore's Imperial Challenge Cup are selected from these twenties—three from the winning twenty—three from the second—and two from the third. This will serve to show that the Colonial teams in competing for the Kolapore Cups are brought in competition with the best shots at Wimbledon.

During the early days of the second week, the members of the team were principally engaged in competitions for which they made individual entries, and at Pool and Carton Targets.

The team competitions for this week were a sum of one hundred pounds sterling offered in prizes for competition among the Canadian team by several London merchants, who subscribed to a fund for that purpose, and the Rajah of Kolapore's Imperial Challenge Cup. Thursday was the day named for these competitions.

The selections of the "eight" for the Kolapore competition was a matter of much anxious consideration. Our team had been shooting with such varied success as individuals and yet on such good average as a team that the selection became a somewhat difficult matter, where there were so many who stood near each other and might fairly claim to be considered in the selection. After a comparison of the scores with Major Otter, I concluded to take the eight who had made the best shooting at all the competitions and competive practices in which the team had been engaged together, and so they were selected. I desire to add that Major Otter concurred with me in the mode of selection and in the choice made of the team, and although the responsibility was entirely my own, yet it is and will always be a satisfaction to me to know that an officer of such judgment and experience as Major Otter was of opinion with me, that the selection was on the proper basis, whatever might be the result of the competition.

The first competition on Thursday the 17th, was for £100 in prizes offered for competition among the team. Divided in two prizes of £25, two of £10, four of £5, three of £3 6s Sd. Distance, 500 yards, at noon.

The winners were Omand and Kiddy, for the first two. Loggie and Morgan, next. Then Boyd, Morris, Power and Mitchell; and Harris, Baxter and Marsh, for the last three. The average shooting fair.

In the afternoon the competition for the Rajah of Kolapore's Imperial Challenge Cup was held. The weather was most unfortunate, a high changing wind, not blowing steadily, but with unequal and gusty violence across and down the range. At the close of the first distance, 200 yards, we had made 160, the team from the mother country 150, and we were leading 10. At 500 vards, one of our team, who during all the competitions had held good place, and who at this distance had hitherto made good shooting; in the violent gusts of wind went off the target and could not get it again at this range, scoring only 3. Some of the others did not come up to their usual score, and we fell behind so much that the chance of our winning was gone for this year. At 600 yards, which we consider our most trying range, the team shot well, but the loss at 500 was too great to be recovered, and the Kolapore cups were won by the united team from the mother country. Their score being 437—ours, 412—majority, 25.

It is certainly no discredit to any team to be beaten by marksmen chosen, as the eight opposed to us are, from the highest scores in the International Challenge Trophy competition, and representing, therefore, as they do, the best shots at Wimbledon. Yet our loss on this occasion was attributable to the mis-chance of the hour, which threw one of our team—an acknowledged good shot—out, and lost us the score of one man at the 500 yard range. At the close of the competition while congratulating the winners on their success, I took occasion to promise that they would have to contend another year with a team from Canada, and weuld not be permitted to rest on their laurels without an effort on the part of a Canadian team to regain the prize.

With this day's proceedings our part as a team in the competition, at Wimbledon for this year was over, and with the single exception of not having won again the Kolapore Cups, the team met with marked success, having carried off a fair share of prizes, besides enjoying

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the enviable distinction of having a representative ninth among the sixty for the second stage of the Queen's. In that second stage, the distances were 800, 900, and 1000 yards. More practice must be had at these ranges before Canadian marksmen can expect to win the Queen's prize; but from what I saw of the generous rivalry on all hands at Wimbledon, I am confident that should a Canadian representative carry of, in any future year, that great prize, his success would be hailed with general and cordial satisfaction.

The amount of prize money distributed among the team, according to the regulation, is £230, 6s. 8d. sterling; giving to each man £11 10s. 4d. as his share of the sum.

On Saturday afternoon the prizes were distributed by Her Royal Highness the Princess Mary, Duchess of Teck. The team paraded in full uniform, and each received from the hands of Her Royal Highness the Wimbledon Badge, a special distinction extended to the Canadians. The purse of £80 given by the National Rifle Association in connection with the Kolapore competition to the Colonial team, was also presented.

I cannot close this part of my report without acknowledging the very great kindness extended to us by Lord Ducie, Chairman of the National Rifle Association. Also the valuable information and assistance received from Captain St. John-Mildmay, Captain Costin, Captain Neville, and indeed from all the Executive Officers connected with the competition.

The hospitality at Wimbledon was unbounded, and from the Volunteer Corps in Camp we received the most marked courtesy and attention. Special entertainment was given to the whole team by the "Victoria Rifles" and the "London Scottish;" and the Officers of the team enjoyed the hospitality of the "Queen's Westminster," and we were on three occasions the guests of the "1st Surrey." In fact all united to make our stay at Wimbledon enjoyable, and our recollection of the camp most pleasant.

The allowance for subsistence of the team in camp, 5s. sterling per man, was paid each day.

On the application of eight members of the team I procured for them return tickets by the "Allan" line of steamers from Liverpool to Halifax instead of to Quebec, as I found that the expenses of travel from Quebec to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia would largely exceed the additional daily allowance to them in England between the dates of sailing of steamships for Quebec and for Halifax.

On the 11th of July I received through C. W. Eddy, Esg., Honorary Secretary of the "Royal Colonial Institute," an invitation for the officers and members of the team to attend a public dinner to be given in honor of the team by the members of the Royal Colonial Institute and their friends on Monday, the 21st July, after the breaking up of the camp. I had pleasure in accepting the invitation for the team. The dinner which took place at Richmond was a sumptuous entertainment. Lord Bury, whose warm interest in the Colonies is universally known and acknowledged, occupied the chair. Many distinguished persons were present, and a large party composed of members of the Coloninl Institute and others interested in Canada. The most cordial greeting was extended to the team, with hearty congratulations on their general success at Wimbledon, and the speakers of the evening vied with each other in kind and eloquent words of welcome.

On Monday, the 21st July, before breaking camp the members of the team received their equal distribution of prize money amounting to \pounds 11 10s. 4d. sterling (\$56.04) each, and signed the Acquittance Roll which I have the honour to transmit herewith.

In closing my report I have pleasure in recording the great satisfaction I had in the command of the team, the valuable assistance rendered at all times by Major Otter, and the general good conduct of the team.

I have the honour to submit herewith the scores of the competitions, and the statement in detail of expenditure on account of the team.

## RULES.

- 1.—That this Association be denominated "The Dominion of Canada RIFLE Association."
- 2.—Any person being a subscriber of \$2.00 per annum shall become a member of the Association.
- 3.—Donors of \$40.00 at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a Prize of not less value, to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association.
- 4.—Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$40.00 annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion not less than \$20.00 annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships in the proportion of one to every Dollar thus subscribed. Each subscribing Association is to elect from its members the persons to hold such memberships, and return their names and addresses, when elected, to the Secretary of the Dominion Rifle Association, to be registered by him one month previous to the Match.
- 5.—There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons named by the Council. The Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron."
- 6 -There shall be a President.
- 7 .- There shall be Vice-Presidents.
- 8.—There shall be a Council of Fifty-two Members, who shall be elected in the following proportions :

of whom four shall form a quorum, and who shall be elected, primarily, by the delegates now assembled at Ottawa, and hereafter at the Annual Meeting,—and the General Meetings of the Council shall be held at the Capital of the Dominion.

- 9.—The Council shall choose from the members elected the President of the Association.
- 10.—There shall be a Vice-President from each Province, selected from among the Members of the Association, and who shall be elected by the Council.
- 11.-The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Militia Staff Officers in

charge of the several Militia Districts of the Dominion, being members thereof, shall be *ex-officio* Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.

- 12.—There shall be a Treasurer, and there shall be a paid Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.
- 13.—The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do, all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
- 14 —The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such Bylaws as may from time to time be enacted by them ;—no By-law being in any case altered, or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.
- 15.—The Annual Prize Meetings shall be held at Ottawa at such times as may be determined on by the Council.
- 16.—The Prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such Regulations as may be passed by the Council from time to time.
- 17.—An Annual Report, embracing the audited account of the Finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the Prize Meeting as may be found practicable.
- 18.—There shall be an Annual Meeting, to be held at such time as shall be selected by the Council.

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# BY-LAWS.

Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after the assembling of the General Session of the Parliament of the Dominion.

Meetings of Council.

There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. The first of which shall be held on the day after the Annual Meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.

Extraordinary Meetings. Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary if required by any six of the members of the Council,—notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such Meeting,—and the requisition for the Meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meeting.

The Co nell The Council shall keep Minutes of its proceedings at all to keep Meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that all proceed- purpose by the Secretary,—and open to the inspection of any members of the Council.

Finance There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three Committee. of the Council.

Treasurer to The Treasurer is authorized to deposit from time to deposit sums time in the Savings Department of the Ontario Bank all savings sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Associa-tion.

Expenditure of sums for current expenses.

All expenditure of sums for current expenses which may be required by the Secretary must be authorized by the signature of the President of the Association, or in his absence by some member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Expenditures of a general nature. Annual accounts. Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditure shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer-(Adopted April 2, 1868.)
