Judges Appointed: Ottawa, April 5.—At yesterday's cabinet meeting Mr. John Winchester, master-in-chambers at Osgoode Hall, was appointed Senior County Judge of York in succession to the late Judge McDougall.

Mr. Winchester is a native of the township of Sydenham, county of Grey, and practised law for several years at Owen Sound. He was formerly a partner of Mr. A. G. Mackay, M.P.

Mr. Winchester was born in Elgin, Scotland, Aug. 27, 1849, educated at Toronto Grammar School, admitted attorney in 1871, and called to the bar in 1877. He practised in Toronto until October, 1882, when he was appointed registrar of the Queen's Bench division of the High Court of Justice. This office he resigned in June, 1883, when he was appointed Inspector of Legal Offices, to which appointment were added in March, 1884, that of Official Referee under the Ontario Judicature act, and in August, 1902, Master-in-Chambers of the High Court of Ontario.

Mr. Winchester has also taken a deep interest in civic affairs, having at one time been an alderman and a trustee of the collegiate institute, and in 1881 was mayor of Brockton. He is an elder of the Presbyterian church.

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TO MAKE AERIAL TRIP

Man Will Cross Cable Shortly

In Bo'n's Chair for Purpose of Greasing Cable—Boat Being Dug Out of Ice.

Captain Jack Hebrich, of the cable ferry, is actively engaged getting the ice surrounding his boat and what is being imbedded in the ice at the foot of Queen street all water removed so that in case danger arises from the ice or high water this spring he can haul them higher up on the bank to a place of safety.

Not only does the ice surround his boat on the outside but on the inside as well. The place where his landing is built is just below the opening of the Queen street sewer and as one foot from the sewer last fall after the boat had been put into winter quarters it had both boat and crew used as a landing place full of water and reuse and there it has remained the entire winter frozen solid.

Mr. Hebrich made a complaint to the city council and asked that he be given assistance in cleaning out his boat. His request was granted by the city fathers and today the engine has been at work chawing out the ice.

Mr. Hebrich has made a thorough examination of his cable and anchor and says that everything has come through the winter in the most satisfactory manner. The anchor is as solid as the day it was put a and there has only been a shrinkage of the cable of 16 inches. The cable according to Mr. Hebrich, will be approximately at present used will last for a great many years.

The travellers used are of copper with 9 per cent nickel added at cause no wear at all on the cable. If iron travellers were used they would wear the cable out in three or four years.

Mr. Hebrich has built several cable ferries of a similar nature on the outside and has put all the experience taught by other experiences into his Dawson structure and has considered a perfect arrangement.

Within a short time an engine of Mr. Hebrich will take a trip out of cable to give it a greasing. It is quite a dizzy height for traveling on that account there will not be much of an element of pleasure connected with the trip.

The same man made the trip last year and considerable interest was taken in it. He is seated in a chair suspended from the cable with four for his arms and legs to hang through there is no danger of his being overturned. The chair slides along a pulley and is pulled across by means of a rope attached to the boat and reaching to the ice below where a man walks along pulling the chair with him.
