





JERUSALEM'S PUBLIC OVENS. One Cave-like Vaults Running Be-low Street Level.

In the country of the country of the public baker of the public ovens. These are to be found in almost every street. They are cave-like vaults, running down below the street level. At the back of each vault is the oven, with a sort of well before its open door. In the well stands the baker, with a long paddle in his hand, upon which he puts in and takes out the loaves. The oven floor is marked out in blocks, so that the baking of each family is put on a separate block. The loaves, which are about an inch thick, are of the size of a tea plate and have a hole in the centre. The baker makes them from the dough, baker them, and returns them hot from the oven to the customer. He receives two cents for each half dozen loaves, or he may instead take a toil of one loaf for each dozen. Before starting the baking he greases the floor of the oven with olive oil.





Canada and Great Britain.

Mr. Richard Grigg, His Majesty's Trade Commissioner to the Dominicon of Canada, has some interesting things to say about the development of commercial relations of the Domininon and the Mother Country.

The promotion of closer trade between Canada and Great Britain depends solely on the efforts of the Dritish producer. It is obvious that a certain responsibility rests also upon the merchants and the community at large in the Dominion. If British trade with Canada is to increase until it occupies the position which a true conception of Imperial interests seems to demand, it is necessary that from the Canadian side every opportunity should be afforded which equitable legislation and a sympathetic public opinion can offer. It is therefore incorrect to speak as it the problem before us were one which the unaided efforts of the British trader could scive. It must be remembered, especially in Canada where there is a tendency to complain of the conservative methods of the British producer, that at the present time very strenuous efforts are being made in financial and industrial circles in the United States to control and indeed to dominate, not only the trace, but the whole commercial life of the Dominion. If these efforts are to be combated it cannot be done merely by arousing the British merchant to greater efforts, but it must depend to some extent on the amount of co-operation afforded him by the importers and consumers of the Doninion.

New Invention to Test Runners as They Run Around the Track.

They Run Around the Track.

A novel invention in the chape of an apparatus for automatically taking measurements of the work of track athletes at all points in a race has just been installed on the running track in the Robinson gymnasium, Kansas University.

The machine, which is the first of its kind, and the invention of Dr. Naismith, director of physical culture, consists of small bamboo sticks, located along the track so as to divide the course into quarters.

The sticks project over the track and are touched by the breast of the runner as he passes. The bamboos are connected to a make-and-break electrical machine, which transmits the touch of the runner to a kymograph, which holds a lampblacked paper on which marks are mach. A clock is used in connection with the kymograph for purposes of timing.


