Combination Long Prominent in Japanese Wooing.

Custom of Utagaki First Mentioned In Fifth Century, Though Believed to Be Much Older—Devoted to Verse Making.

One of the prettiest customs of old der is the Utagaki, or gathering of Japanese young men and women in flower season to compose odes to the forming friendships that often endure through life. It is first mentioned in the time of Emperor Yuryaku in the fifth century, although no doubt much

The Utagaki, or primitive form of woolng, according to which Utagaki was most fashionable, took place at Tsuwakinoichi in Yamato, in the vicinity of Mount Utagaki. At these win the heart of the lady he was bent on winning, the others made a laugh-ing-stock of him and jeered him to indignation. Consequently, suitors were ersevering in order to escape ridi-

This custom of Utagaki continued popular for centuries. Competition in poetry and love was considered wor-thy of emulation. One does not won-

der that it frequently led to war.
As a rule the higher classes did not allow their daughters to go from home unattended; but the Utagaki was always considered an exception to the rule. Nor is it remarkable that we often read in the literature of this period such expressions as "fell in love at first sight," and so on. It was only natural that in time, as civilization advanced, the custom of holding Utagaki should fall into disus

There is a belief in Japan that the custom of holding these poetic love-meetings is as old as the first emperor. It is said that an incident in the life of the imperial house gave rise to the custom of Utagaki. In those far-off days marriage, in 99 cases out of 100, took place by the exchanging of odes, which were expressions of love .-

Make 2,000 Ukeleles a Month. The ukulele, the Hawaiian musical Instrument, which has attained considerable popularity in the United States the last year or two, was first produced by a Portuguese at Honolulu, and it at once made a hit with the natives. It is made chiefly from a native wood known as koa wood. The peculiar tone is obtained only when wellpared and fitted. In the islands the instruments sell at from \$3.75 to \$20 each, according to quality and decoration. In the past year the monthly production of instruments has trebled, that for September amounting to 1,600. many was recently organized at Honolulu to manufacture 2,000 ukuleles a month; it is estimated that the total output in the coming year will be about 40,000.

Will Develop Island Property. Evidently there is one man in Eng-land who is not seriously disturbed by the idea that the ownership of large estates will progressively give way to the division of land into small holdings; at any rate Lord Leverholme has not hesitated to purchase Lewis island, which, next to Great Britain and Ireland, is the largest of the British isles. Lewis island covers some 770 square miles, off the west coast of Scotland, and has a present population of about 30,000 people. This, however, it is said, the new owner regards as quite an inadequate population for his island, which he thinks should reasonable surveys 3000 Miles (Res. 1). ably support 300,000. 

#### FROM GENEVA.

Organizer for League of Red Cross Societies Tells of Need of Europe's Orphans.

"While we at home are intent on industrial expansion and a place in the sun, Europe in its war-weakened condition is fighting for its very existence," said Donald W. Brown. director of the department of organization in the League of Red Cross Societies of the World, which has its headquarters at Geneva, Switzerland. He visited Toronto to learn the peace program of the Canadian Red Cross Society and to establish closer contact between it and the league.

Millions of War Orphans. "While we at home are intent on

Millions of War Orphans.

Having just arrived from Europe Having just arrived from Europe, Mr. Brown was able to give the Canadian Red Cross some first hand information concerning the people of Europe. He called attention particularly to the condition of the children, so many of whom are now orphans. While the exact number who have lost one or both parents during the war cannot be determined, the most conservative estimate places the number at over ten millions. This number at over ten millions. This num ber seems quite consistent with the heavy war casualties among so many nations.

Dependent Upon Charity.

Dependent Upon Charity.

The condition of these children is in most cases very pitiable. Many of them have no homes and they are dependent upon whoever may be charitable and kind enough to help them. But there are few who are able to give guch help for the mass of the people of Russia, Poland, parts of Roumania, Czecho-Slovakia and other countries are so poor that they have not necessaries for themselves. Consequently in the great area between the Baltic, the Black and the Adriatic Seas, there are millions of children who face the next few years, and particularly the coming winter, without hope of proper care unless outside assistance is given them.

In addition to the unhappy condition of the children the adult populations are in the direct of misery on account of disease. Suffering has been accentuated by lack of food and clothing, nursing and medical attention, and tuberculosis, smallpox typhus and dysentery are continuing

unchecked.

Typhus which has so often proved a scourge and menace to the human race is again prevalent, and unless checked will most likely extend its ravages to an alarming degree.

British Empire Appeal. For these urgent reasons, Mr. srown said, the League of Red Cross Societies has made an earnest appeal to the people of the British Empire and he was glad to hear that the cause of the suffering children was being taken used.

Great Britain is willing to surrender her h'storic position of "mistress of the seas." Urder pressure of her own economic and taxation problems, particularly her heavy debt, she is eager for the naval holiday discussion which is attracting so much attention, not only in the United States but in Great Britain and Japan.

Great Britain is not willin,g however, for the United States or any other nation to have a navy superior to hers. The rock bottom point of her willingness to concede is that she will agree to limit her own naval programme to a point where her navy will be precisely equal in power to that of the United States.

This intimation that Britain is will-ing to curtail her building program-me so that the United States' navy will equal it on a specified date is regarded by officials here as of the greatest importance. There is the most intense feeling in favor of the naval holiday.


