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THE ULTIMATE ISSUE OF THE STRUGGLE

The Question Should be Fairly Asked Before the People, And Canada Should not be Jockeyed into Annexation under False Pretences.

LONDON, February 19.—The latest issue of the "Standard" is called in London by the revolution of treachery contained in Sir John's speech in Toronto. Extensive reports are given prominent positions in the chief journals of the country. The charge of Sir John Macdonald that a party of Canadian politicians is intriguing for the annexation of the Dominion of Canada, to the United States coupled with the fact that Mr. Farver, editor of the Toronto Globe, the chief liberal organ, had written the Standard, created a tremendous sensation, and the matter is the chief topic of conversation in the clubs, among politicians, and those who have an interest, pecuniary or otherwise, in the Dominion. Farver's course is recently condemned and his explanations are regarded as very weak indeed. The statement he makes that a copy of the pamphlet was sent to England has excited some comment, and considerable conjectures are indulged in as to what was the real object of the Standard. Leading journals of all shades of opinion in London and throughout the country devote their chief editorials to the subject and the matter is discussed in all its bearings.

Will Not Sell Their Country.

Former Prominent Liberals and Active Workers.

WHO WILL NOT FOLLOW CANTONMENT AND LAUREL, THE EX-LEADER, HON. EDWARD BLAKE, AMONG THE YOUNG, WHO WOULD SELL REVOLVING HEADS.

The list of great dissidents from the annexationist policy of the party is large and influential. Here are some of them:— Hon. EDWARD BLAKE, whose letter of withdrawal from the party does not publish. Hon. ALEX. MACGREGOR, who says he is opposed to a Zolnerin and customs discrimination against Great Britain. Hon. W. MACDONALD, whom U. E. blood revolts against the degrading policy of his party. Mr. C. N. SENEKER, ex-M. P., who has reasonable grounds for his withdrawal from the Conservative Standard in St. John. Dr. SEAS ALWARD, M. L. A., of St. John, who openly supports the policy of his old opponents. Mr. D. G. SMITH, of Northumberland, an old supporter of Hon. Mr. Mitchell. Mr. EDGAR JONES, of Montreal, who regards his party's policy as unwise and unparliamentary. Mr. GORDON BROWN, of Toronto, former manager of the Toronto Globe. Ex-AM. STRAHAN, of Halifax, former president of the M. L. A., M. P. P., of Hon. Mr. TROTT, solicitor-general of New Brunswick, who appears on Mr. Foster's platform. The HUSBANDS GRANTER, which says that the Standard and Laurier do not represent the Liberal party. The CHRYSLER, N. B. ADVANCE, which refuses to support Hon. Mr. Mitchell on his commercial union platform. ALVA MORGAN, of Halifax, N. B., a lifelong Liberal who is now working enthusiastically against the Utrian Rivalry. E. L. WILSON, A. A. FREEST, and E. J. JOHNSON, heretofore active gritters, who have taken the platform against Mr. Jones in Halifax. Hon. JOHN HOSMER, Premier of Manitoba and counted by the gritters as one of themselves, has declared himself opposed to unrestricted reciprocity. Three of the most prominent Liberals of St. Jerome, in Hon. Mr. CHAPMAN's constituency, signed the requisition to the Secretary of State. Mr. JAMES BOON, a life long gritter, says the only line of safety for a loyal Canadian is to support Sir John Macdonald. H. A. MCKINNEY, M. P. P., formerly a prominent young Liberal in St. John, has renounced the party and is supporting the Conservative candidate. Senator GLASSER, of Sanbury, N. B., an old time Liberal, is supporting Mr. Wilnot, the conservative candidate. In this contest; also his son, A. GLASSER, and his brother, Mr. GLASSER, all powers in the country. Mayor FOURNIER, of Sadyburg, Algoma, (Ontario) was an active gritter worker up to June last. On Saturday night he took the platform in the interest of the Conservative candidate at a Gritter meeting, carried the audience with him, passed a resolution endorsing the Conservative policy, and is into the fight to the end in support of the old flag for Canada. Mr. J. P. WELLES, a leading resident of Montreal, assisted at Sir Donald Smith's nomination. Mr. A. M. SMITH, ex-president of the Toronto Board of Trade. Mr. ALEX. GIBSON, the lumber king of New Brunswick, and a long time gritter, whose name is on Mr. Tump's nomination paper in York. HOWARD THOMP, shipowner, Mr. PENNER, horse and mail manufacturer, Mr. ELKIE, shipping merchant, and a host of others in St. John. PONTIAC, QUEBEC, ADVANCE, comes out strongly against unrestricted reciprocity. The CANTONMENT, N. B. PROMER is supporting the Conservatives. CHAS. MAIR, the well known author, endorsed the gritters nomination at Sadyburg, N. B., and declines on that ground to be jockeyed into annexation by false pretences.
