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

BIG DEMONSTRATION IN BERLIN SUNDAY.

BERLIN, April 10.—At least 120,000
Socialists and Radicals took part tooday in the most impressive demonstration ever held in Berlin in favour of Suffrage Reform in Prussia. Owing to the recent outspoken criticism of the police methods, in the repression of popular expressions of will, the Police Commissioner had withdrawn his former prohibitions on assurance from the Socialists leaders that no disturbances would occur, and that traffic would not be disturbed. Men and women gathered at the dis-trict headquarters of the Socialists at an early hour and from there marched in groups of one hundred under con-trol of stewards wearing red arm badges toward the allotted meeting places. There was no shouting or singing as the crowds passed along the streets from which the police seemed to have disappeared as if by


