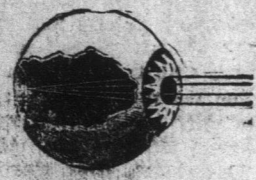

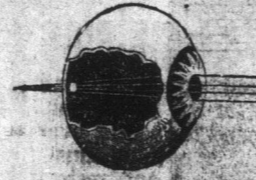

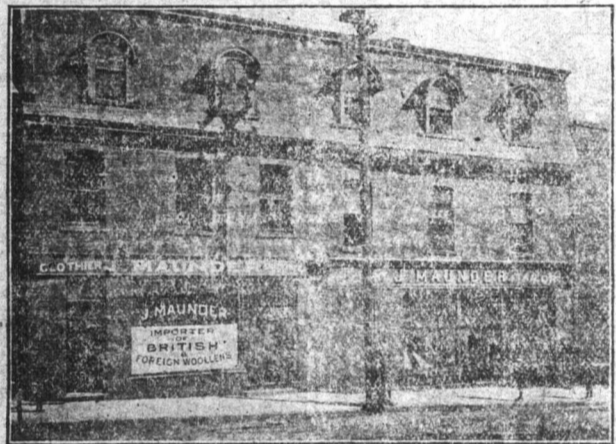

Unless you really like to be in that state of mind in which you are sure that everything is wrong and will never come right again, that nobody loves you and that life is no longer worth living, I think there are plenty of things you can do to help you when you feel the spasm coming on.

Let the old "frutta woman" tell you some of her miseries.

Offer your maid an unexpected afternoon off.

Now, I know you think I'm just preaching, but I'm not. It's really and truly so. Exerting yourself to do a kind deed or say a kind word will often break the strength of a spasm of blues.

And please don't regard this as just a pleasant moral dissertation, but the next time you get into the power of the blue devils really try some of its suggestions.

But first, before you let yourself get into their power, please consider this suggestion:

"If you first sit and sigh

And have the blues,

Why don't you try to realize

That there are sighs and sighs,

And blues and blues,

From which to choose?

They're heavenly blues and blues of

tranquil seas,

Both pleasant—if you have them

pray have these;

## Heavy Undertow.

A very heavy sea ran outside Saturday night and yesterday morning and as a result there was a big undertow in the harbor. The barque Gaspe and the barque Lake Simcoe had to be hauled off in the stream from Baird's and Baine Johnston's premises, and the Florizel, which was moored at Bowring's upper South Side premises, in the racing evident up there burst her moorings and springs, swung out into the dock between Bowring's and the R. N. Co. premises, and Capt. Clarke and his crew had great difficulty in keeping the ship from badly damaging the wharves or being swept up by the tide against the parapets of the Long Bridge. The steel hawsers of the ship snapped like pack thread with the surging of the big ship, gump heads were torn up and Bowring's wharf was considerably damaged. The captains and crews of the tugs D. P. Ingraham and John Greene were called at 5 a.m., and the ship was towed down the harbor and anchored off the King's wharf. Several schooners which were surging against the piers to which they were moored had to be hauled into the stream also.

## Law-Makers as Sportsmen.

The fatal accident which befell the Right Honourable James Tomkinson, who appears in 1910 Whittaker as the latest addition to the Privy Council in 1910 serves to remind us that the British Legislators, Kings, Lords and Commons, are intense lovers of sport. Here we have an old country gentleman, in his seventeenth year, for he was born in 1840, astride the saddle and steeple-racing with the youngest and most vigorous of the members of the two Chambers.

Alfred Lyttleton who was here as a Railway arbitrator was a great all-round athlete. At Cambridge he won his "blue" in Association football, cricket, tennis, racquets, and hammer-throwing, played cricket for Middlesex and "soccer" for England. Mr. Lyttleton is by no means the only famous football player in the House of Commons. Mr. G. W. Agnew played for Cambridge in the first inter-university "Rugger" match; Mr. C. P. Walsh is an old Oxford Blue and Welsh International; Mr. H. J. Craig an old Cambridge forward; Mr. A. Hamerley was also an International; Mr. J. Chambers was President of the Irish Rugby Union; Col. Heath won his blue for rugby and cricket at Oxford; played football for England and cricket for Gloucestershire and Staffordshire. Mr. P. H. Hillingworth was a football player of merit and captain of his College Boat Club. Mr. McKenna, the head of the King's Navy, rowed bow for Trinity Hall, Cambridge, at Henley, and occupied the same position in the Cambridge crew of 1887. Mr. Steel-Maitland and Mr. W. D. Ward are well known oarsmen. Mr. Leaman is a writer and "Varsity" coach on rowing. Mr. Hemmerde won the Diamond Sculls in 1900. Among other prominent oarsmen are Sir Charles Dilke, Major Adams, Mr. Hills, Mr. Armitage, Mr. Roberts and Mr. Fleming.

## At the R. C. Cathedral.

Rev. Father Power, of Harbor Breton, who is here on a visit to his friends, preached at the Cathedral at Vespers, last night. He took his text from the gospel of the day, read at all Masses, "I am the Good Shepherd, the Shepherd who gives his life for His Flock," etc. Father Power in a clear ringing tone of voice, and distinct enunciation, reviewed the Papacy from St. Peter, the first Shepherd, down to the present illustrious Pontiff Pius X. He dwelt particularly on the life and conduct of the good Shepherd who now watches over the flock, who, though malignant and persecuted, would bring the Church triumphant through all her difficulties. They are now long crumbled to dust, while the Papacy lives on, for had not the good Shepherd said, "Behold I am with you all days, even unto the consummation of the world" and "Thou art Peter, upon this rock I will build my Church and give to thee the keys of the kingdom. Feed my lambs, feed my sheep, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." A large congregation was present. Rev. Fr. Power is the son of Ex-Councillor Power, St. John's West.

## Pilots' Good Work.

The new pilot boat recently put in commission demonstrated her utility Saturday morning, and but for her the schr. Laurence C. would have gone on the rocks with the possibility of death for her crew. The pilots were off the Southern Head waiting for the s.s. Hirst when through the fog a boat from the Laurence C. rowed towards them asking for assistance. A mountainous sea ran and the vessel, which was deeply laden, was not alone straining heavily in the tumble but was being quickly dragged ashorewards. The men in the boat took their lives in their hands in rowing for the pilots, but there was nothing else left to be done to avoid destruction. The first line put on board burst in the rough sea, but a second one was bent and the vessel was towed out of danger to port. It was fortunate the pilots were on the scene. In boarding the Hirst yesterday morning Messrs. Jackman, Horwood, Gosse and Furlong, the pilots on the boat, had a difficult time, but successfully accomplished their work.

## Interesting Letter From Magdalen's.

Mrs. O'Brien, wife of Health Inspector O'Brien, had an interesting letter by Saturday's mail from her niece, Miss Emily O'Brien, residing at House Harbour, in the Magdalen's. As the cable was broken and no steamer calling for the winter the people adopted the unique idea of sending their letters to friends on the mainland in a puncheon. The mails were placed in sealed tins and put in the receptacle which was fitted with sails, and with a favourable wind blowing was sent off on its journey on March 13th. A letter of instructions for the finder was placed in the puncheon and it was picked up at Fort Hastings 12 days afterwards and the mails forwarded to their respective destinations. Miss O'Brien, whose letter is dated the 16th March, says that a steamer could have run to the islands all the winter as it was quite mild with little or no ice. As a result of the picking up of the mails the S. S. Minto was despatched to and reached the islands all right. When she wrote the St. John's sealing steamers were off the islands. Sealing schooners had sailed from Amserst, Bryon, Islande, Grindstone, House Harbour, Cape Mull and other places and all expected to do well. These schooners fish on Canadian Labrador each summer and ship their fish to Halifax and Quebec.

**Easter Sunday Festivities.**  
Easter Sunday was a glorious day, the weather being charming and immense crowds of people attended the services at both the Protestant and Catholic Churches.  
The service at St. Patrick's Church was the finest of all the city churches. An embankment of Easter lilies resting on brass stands and tied with purple ribbon extended across the whole length of the Sanctuary. The design was pretty in the extreme and was used for the first time. The main altar was tastefully decorated and beautifully illuminated with colored electric and other lights. The music under the direction of Prof. P. J. Shea was never heard to better advantage. The works of Riga, Gounod and Mendelssohn were interpreted with much precision which showed careful training. The Credo from the "Mass of the Angels," according to the new plain chant, was sung with beautiful effect by the full choir and the chancel choir. The responses of the Mass sung by the special choir of boys in the gallery were sweet and harmonious. After Mass the chancel choir sang a pretty hymn arranged

from Mendelssohn, their youth and rich voices being heard to good advantage. Prof. Shea has earned for himself a lasting reputation as musician second to none in Montreal and as a choirmaster and teacher of boys cannot be excelled. He has demonstrated that with proper training the Irish Catholic boy can hold his own with any class of boys in the singing. Prof. Shea was the first organist of the Irish Catholic parishes to show what a charm was in boys' voices in church services when he was attached to St. Ann's Church, and now he's proving his worth in a broader field of labour at St. Patrick's Church. The Oratorio from Mercaunte given by St. Patrick's Choir on Good Friday evening was the topic in musical circles and the verdict was that its rendition was perfect. A symphony choir of over two hundred voices has been formed by the genial professor, and it has been heard

already in concerts and pronounced a great success.  
Rev. Fr. McShane, P. P., made a move in the right direction when he secured the organist that has a brilliant future before him in the person of P. J. Shea for St. Patrick's Church.  
**New Public School.**  
A new public school to be named "The William Dawson School" is to be built on Christopher Columbus Avenue, St. Denis Ward.  
The building is to be of fireproof construction, thirty-one class rooms to accommodate 1,500 pupils, with all internal fittings to meet the requirements of a modern school building, special regard being given to entrance and exits, with spacious stairways and internal fireproof fire escapes.  
The heating and ventilation will be on the best known system, providing for an abundance of fresh heated air. The boiler house will be in the rear, disconnected from the main building, thus avoiding any danger from fire or smoke, giving parents absolute safety of their children's safety.  
The exterior facades will be in the Jacobean style, and treated in a simple but dignified manner. The plinth or base will be built of dressed limestone, the superstructure of pressed brick with cut sandstone trimmings, this combination lending itself to a harmonious whole.  
The school is to be ready, in part, for the first week of September next.

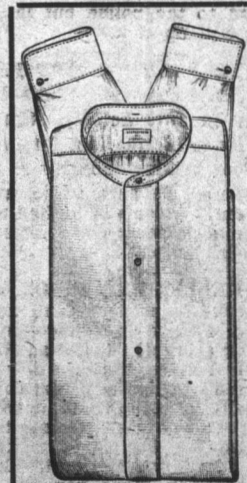

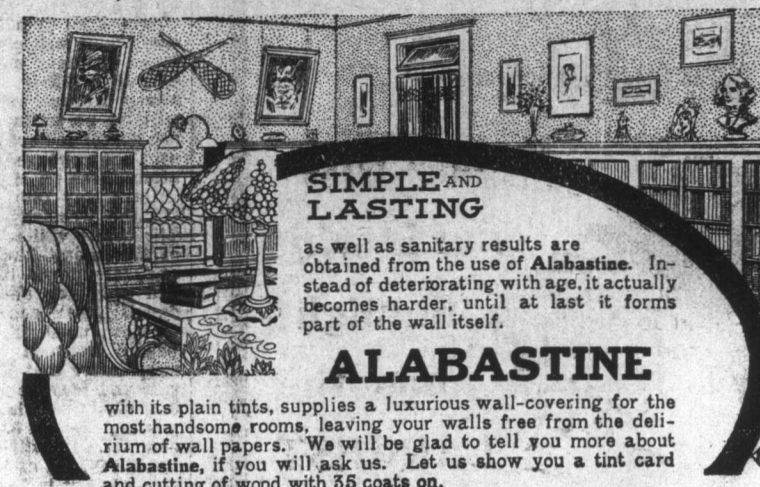

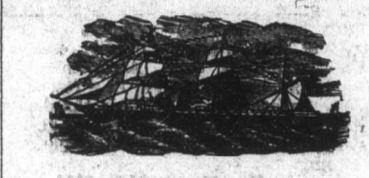
