Household Notes.

Clean plaster of paris ornaments with wet starch brushed off when dry. When washing glassware slip it into the hot water sidewise to avoid breaking. If a new silk skirt is pressed with a hot iron before wearing it will prevent it from cracking. Clear black coffee diluted with water and containing a little ammonia will clean and restore black clothes. Hot cinders and the like can quickly be removed by sweeping the eye with a small goose-feather dipped in oil. When the windows refuse to slip up and down easily, take a small piece of soap and rub it along the groove. Remove grass stains with cream of tartar and water or alcohol; the latter never stains the most delicate color. To lessen the odor of wet paint, put bowls of hot water in the rooms. The water has the effect of absorbing the paint odors. Feathers that have grown grimy may be given a bath in alcohol, after which they should be shaken over heat or in the hot sun until dry. Burns are best treated with olive oil on antiseptic cotton applied as hot as can be borne. This is also the best treatment for a discolored eye. Put a handful of coarse oatmeal in



When the pie is ready for the oven pour cold water over the top and draw it up at once into a hot oven and it will bake a rich, brown glossy surface and the crust will be much flakier.

Always dry white silk gloves or stockings in the dark if one would not have them turn yellow. On this account many wear these articles at night so that they may be dry before daylight.

A couple of tablespoonfuls of borax in the water required for washing about five pairs of light-colored hose will remove all traces of stains from the leather that they may have in them.

Compulsory Fly Screens

Chicago Physician Would Force Landlords to Provide Them. Dr. Thomas S. Crowe, of Chicago, official physician of Cook County, Ill., advocates a law that would compel landlords to provide fly screens for all doors and windows. In urging his reform Dr. Crowe says: "If the ravages of the house fly were minimized we would have a city and county with less disease and fewer deaths, and taxpayers would be saved in dollars and cents. We maintain county hospitals to take care of those whom the fly has laid low, but we take no step, however simple to cheat the fly of its victims. Other ordinances, impelled by the laws of hygiene and sanitation are thrown about poor people for their protection against disease, but when all these health ordinances are scanned, it seems to me that little has been done toward the protection of the people in summer time against the greatest carrier of all diseases, namely, the fly."

Surprising Simpson.

David R. Forgan, the well-known banker, has a dry Scotch humour. Speaking of the danger of being puff'd up by sudden honours, Mr. Forgan told this story of Simpson, the great Scotch physician. "Dr. Simpson had been absent from his class for some time, and on his return he announced that a great professional honour had been conferred upon him," said Mr. Forgan. "I am happy to inform you young gentlemen that a very great honour has come to me since last we met here," said Professor Simpson, his eye beaming with honest pride. "I have just received notification that I have been appointed physician-in-ordinary to Her Majesty Victoria."

I., July 18. — An unusual method of committing suicide was adopted by Samuel Hambley, 40 years old, who was found dead to-day in his cell at the Kent county jail, Hambley, a mill operative of Conant, had rubbed his neck back and forth on the sharp edge of his bed in the cell until he had cut his throat. He was committed to the jail on Saturday to work out a fine of \$2 and costs for intoxication.

To Clinch the Proof of His Theory That the Island of Newfoundland was Once Connected with New England by a Widespread Land Bridge...

As one of the pioneers in studying the plants of Newfoundland and Labrador, Professor Fernald has made this part of Harvard's collection famous, and with the work he now has in hand to be finished probably this summer he will give the world for the first time a thorough catalogue of the green and growing things in a land that has been too often dismissed as sterile and barren.

Apart from the interest awakened by his strong proofs of the old-time connection between Newfoundland and New England back in the age immediately following the great glacial period, he has shown that some parts of Newfoundland are as well adapted to profitable agriculture as the famous potato district of Aroostook county, Maine. Also his explorations have already disclosed tracts and still standing stumps of great forests that once covered what are now barren bogs and plains in Newfoundland.

Traversing the Wilderness. With Professor Fernald on his present expedition are Professor Karl M. Wiegand of Wellesley College, Edwin B. Bartram and Bayard Long of the Philadelphia Academy of Sciences and Henry T. Darling, a graduate student in botany at Harvard.

They are making their way through the wilderness to Grand Falls on the Exploits River, and there in the clear cool days that prevail at this season in Newfoundland they are collecting further specimens to prove the similarity in the flora of the indigenous plants of Newfoundland and the American coast country as far south as New Jersey.

Of 783 plants that Professor Fernald has examined in Newfoundland he says:—

The striking feature of this analysis is the fact that of the indigenous plants of Newfoundland 94 1/2 per cent are identical either with species found to the north of the Straits of Belle Isle or with plants which occur along the Atlantic seaboard to the south-west, while only 3 1/2 per cent are typically Canadian plants which of the continent find their greatest development in latitudes and climatic zones parallel with those of central and southern Newfoundland. A very large proportion of the plants which abound on the continent at the western edge of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and which we should expect to find in appropriate habitats in Newfoundland seem to be quite absent from the island.

Professor Fernald has carefully studied the various possibilities whereby the seeds of the plants might have been carried from New England to Newfoundland by wind or tides in the ocean and of his findings thus far he says:—

"The indigenous flora of Newfoundland consists primarily of plants which occur to the north, in Labrador or to the southwest, chiefly along the Atlantic seaboard or the coastal plain, the typical Canadian plants, unless their northerly range extends to the north side of the Straits of Belle Isle being essentially absent from the island."

"The distance between Newfoundland and Labrador is not sufficiently great to prevent ready interchange of species across the Straits of Belle Isle, but the distance between Newfoundland and Cape Breton is so

great that the plants of the latter region rarely if ever span it.

"Birds, ocean currents, drifting logs and ice, and winds prove to be ineffective in carrying to Newfoundland the plants from the southwest, so that an ancient land bridge is suggested. This is the more demanded from the presence in Newfoundland of a mole and a muskrat, mammals closely related to species of our coast. The amount of water withdrawn

### The Tories De- nounce Asquith.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day.

The past 24 hours have brought small change in the political situation. The Unionist party newspapers join in a chorus of hot denunciation of Asquith for what they term a violation of parliamentary decencies. The majority of the Conservative party in London and the provinces advise the leaders to submit to Asquith's ultimatum as the lesser of two evils. A small but important minority exhort the peers to rally to Chamberlain's watchword, "Right to death." The only uncertain factor in the affair is how many Lords will follow Halsbury in the fight to the death. The Prime Minister has notified the peers he would not send the Veto Bill back from the Commons to them unless assured they will support it. Meantime interest centres in the meeting of the Commons to-day when Asquith is expected to make a more explicit statement of his program.

### Had a History.

The s.s. Amethyst, which was lost at Cape Mutton on Saturday, had a rather historic career. She was owned by F. J. L. Fitz, of Eastern H.R. Shediac, N.S., and was one of the vessels which Lieut. Hobson sunk in the channel at the entrance to Santiago Harbor, Cuba, when he tried to bottle up Admiral Cervera's Spanish squadron there during the Hispano-American conflict. The Assistant Collector had the following message from Inspector O'Reilly of the Flona, dated Trepassay, Saturday night:—"Amethyst's decks awash, vessel total wreck. Cargo of 1,500 brls. flour, greater part saved; 1,000 sacks oats all under water; 65 head of cattle, some saved, many drowned. Five horses, 53 sheep, 3 calves, 2 pigs saved and landed at Trepassay. Some ashore at Cape Mutton."

### No More Need of That Terrible Nausea Af- ter an Operation.

Toledo Surgeon Devises Great Boon to Kille Victims Who "Come Out From Under" Free From Nausea Turbulence.

Toledo, Ohio, July 1.—Two little gas bags attached to a simple contrivance have robbed ether of its sickening terrors—and its dangers.

The discovery of the anesthetic value of the apparatus is hailed as a wonderful boon to humanity sixty years ago, but it remained a boon of bitter memory to all who took it.

The old way of giving ether is to pour it on a sponge over the patient's nose. He is half asphyxiated and while he is conscious he is as sick as that he's sorry he ever came to at all. Then follow terrible hours of nausea and thirst. The victim mustn't have water, because water induces vomiting and that sometimes bursts out stitches.

**Eliminates Ether Sickness.**

Sometimes the patient never comes to.

The new way eliminates ether sickness and the danger of asphyxia. It makes ether as safe as laughing gas and as pleasant, without entailing the enormous expense involved in using that anesthetic for long operations.

Dr. John S. Pyle, a Toledo surgeon, is the inventor. It has been used in many operations, major and minor, and its success has been fully demonstrated.

Dr. Pyle's anesthetic is a "mixture" through which the patient breathes air, vaporized ether (or chloroform), nitrous oxide (laughing gas), or oxygen, either singly or in any desired combination or proportion.

The apparatus consists of a glass globe, or mixing chamber, to which are connected three atomizers, one for the gas, one for the ether, and one for the pure oxygen. Layers of gauze in the mixing chamber insure the perfect mixing of the gases.

Patent comes to himself Pink and Warm.

Pertume is sprayed on a piece of gauze in the mask before it is strapped to the patient's face. His mouth is white with ether. The odorless laughing gas is turned into the globe. When that subtle-anesthetic has done its work ether is substituted. The patient, already happily asleep, breathes the fumes of ether till the operation is over, and never knows the difference. Then he is given pure oxygen till the ether has been driven from his lungs.

The surgeon has the patient under perfect control. If he sees a sign of collapse, the anesthetic is cut off and oxygen substituted until the patient rallies. The use of oxygen after the operation restores normal respiration. The patient comes to himself pink and warm, instead of blue and cold.

This application of concentrated oxygen following ether or chloroform brings the patient out of his sleep free from the dreadful nausea so long the bane of surgery.

Dr. Pyle won an international reputation twenty years ago by devising a safe method of operating for the removal of the prostate gland.

### One of Tallest Officers.

Lieutenant-General J. M. Grierson has had a long and varied career in the army, and is generally regarded as one of the best of what may be described as our younger generation of soldiers. His abilities were first discovered by Sir Evelyn Wood, whose right hand on Salisbury Plain he was for some years. Since General Grierson is one of the tallest soldiers in the army at the present day, and Sir Evelyn Wood is, to put it mildly, below the middle height, the contrast between the two, when standing side by side, used to be "most amusing, and the name of 'Dignity and Impudence' was bestowed upon them by some of the younger officers in the command. General Grierson had a very nice wit, and on one occasion, during manoeuvres, a Howitzer was fired before the sponge stick—the rod used for cleaning the weapons out after a shot had been fired—had been removed. The result was that the stick went sailing through the air, to fall to the ground some distance away. "One of the best shots I ever saw to 'green' the infantry in front of you," was General Grierson's smiling remark to the officer in charge of the gun. It is considered probable that he will be given the command in India before the end of the year, and if this is so will recall one of his aphorisms to the effect that "India is a mighty convenient place to send soldiers, whose presence is not desired at home."

### Killed by Shock When Answering Tele- phone.

Rockville, Conn., July 18.—Arthur H. Ramage of Hartford, 25 years old, was killed by an electric shock as he stood at a telephone early to-day in the local sub-station of the Connecticut company through which high-power wires run. It is supposed that the wires became crossed with those of the telephone so that when the young man answered the bell he received the heavy current. Charles Lerner, a trolley conductor, who went to his assistance, received a shock which threw him across the room, but from which he suffered no serious harm.

### Yacht Arrives Here.

At 4.30 p.m. Saturday the yacht Sir Hugh Allan arrived here after a run of 9 days from Queenstown, Ireland, and after taking in a supply of bunkers coal left for Montreal at 10.30 p.m. Saturday. The ship was visited by large numbers of people Saturday afternoon and night as she lay at A. J. Harvey & Co.'s premises. She was built for the Commissioners of the Harbour of Montreal by Vickers Sons & Maxim in the order of the Canadian Government and was launched last February. She can do 15 knots and proved herself to be a fine sea boat on the run across the Atlantic. She is lit with electricity, and is 125 feet long, 27 ft. beam and 12 ft. deep. Capt. English brought her out to be delivered to her owners.


