The miners of the Forest of Dean district have adopted a resolution to return to work on April 1st. The ranks of non-union workers in Scotland have received large accessions. 

One may reasonably ask what is be hind these dark doings? Sir Rober Bond, the Leader of the Opposition pointed out when the Estimates cam up for discussion that no provision had been made for the Elections: tha it would be necessary to provide for the taking of the Voters' List this summer, and that the Government was asking for no money to do so.

On March 15th we commented or these matters in part as follows:

"The Premier, Sir Edward Morris however, declared that it was not th intention of the Government to hav a Revision of the Voters' Lists this summer and that there was no need

to make provision for it this session This announcement puts the Pre mier and his colleagues of the Execu tive Council in an extraordinary posi tion. Is the Premier a dictator who is above the law? Do the members o the Executive Council constitute political oligarchy, which can disre gard a statute laid down for thei guidance? The last Revision of Vot

1889, sets forth that-

The Coal Strike! Demanding Gold!

A Bank is Not Forced to Pay In Yel-

It is told of a Canadian lady that she presented a ten dollar note of a certain bank at one of its branches located in a country town and asked for a gold piece of the same denomi nation in exchange. The manager o fer to, 300,000 miners were paid £15,- the branch informed her that he had 000,000, and in the same time £6,000,- no gold on hand at the moment, bu were paid in royalties. It was that he would send for a coin if she customer, the bank charged ten cents money. About this charge a difference the coal trade in one year. So that of opinion exists. The bank officials considered it right and proper; other wise it would not have been made The customer and others consider that the bank should have made no charge They base their opinion on the belief that the bank should stand ready to pay gold for its notes when gold is demanded. This belief, by the way is widely held. Many people consider that according to Canadian law the banks are under obligation to redeem their notes in gold. But this is entirely wrong, says H. M. P. Eckhardt, in an interesting article in Saturday Night A bank note, while in circulation, represent a debt of the bank. The bank is the debtor; the holder of the note is the creditor. Now, the law has designated certain forms of mon-

ey as "legal tender." It says distinctly, that if any debtor tenders payment of his debt at its maturity in any of these forms of legal tende his creditor is bound to accept the debtor may offer payment of his deb as follows: in the copper or bronz coins of the Dominion of Canada-uj to twenty-five cents; in the silver coins of the Dominion of Canadaup to ten dollars; in Dominion notesup to an unlimited amount; in British gold coins-up to an unlimited amount; and in the United States gold coins -up to an unlimited amount. A bank has the same right or privilege as another debtor. When a creditor presents its notes at a place where they are payable, it can tender pay ment in any of the above forms of legal tender, viz., in silver, up to ten

dollars; in Dominion notes, British gold coins or United States gold coins, If you have been rigid with Lent, to an unlimited amount. So it is it is time to releut. But the law does not require a bank to redeem its notes at all branches. A section of the bank Act reads as follows:

It would not do to have the whole note issue of the bank pay able at a every small office established by it. So, it is clear that the manage of the branch bank referred to at the beginning of this article was under no obligation to pay gold on demand

for a ten dollar note of the bank. If a person desires to force a pay ment of gold he could present the obligation of a bank at one of its branches where such obligation was payable and demand legal tender. He might get gold in the first instance If he was paid in Dominion notes he could present these at an office of the Receiver-General and demand gold .-






