License and to the injuries of our own fishermen.

This is the protest of the Board of Trade, and we believe will be endorsed by the fishermen of Newfoundland generally and particularly those interested in the banking voyage. If it is correct as reported that much bait was smuggled to St. Pierre and sold for a song there, while our own bankers could not obtain baitings, the situation created by the slackness of the Government is an outrage. It is feared also that the injury will not be limited to this season's catch, but will act adversely next season. It is feared by one merchant, we are told, that our competitors have already secured a first baiting for next season, and that the injurious effect of this on our trade is incalculable.

It may be remembered that we have criticized the Government's attitude on the Bait Act enforcement many times, and long before the present year. We criticized severely the way the Government were sacrificing bait in the interest of two Americans in the Trestethen and Lord contract. We published also the story of the Corkum incident and the letter of Capt. Young of St. Jacques on the matter. We gave quotations also from American papers expressing the glee of Americans at an extraordinary and exclusive concession of bait and ice to the Booth Fisheries Co. This has been denied by the Government press. But the Government has declined to furnish precise information as to the concessions embodied in the Booth Company contract, and we are forced to wait until next season to see what they are doing.

The wholes of these incident show that the Government are weak in the enforcing of the Bait Act and are by no means willing and ready for a rigid enforcement of the Bait Act. The action of the Board of Trade is timely and will, we have no doubt, meet with the strong endorsement of the country.



**Taken to Task.**

**STRONG PROTEST OF BOARD OF TRADE AGAINST SLACK ENFORCEMENT OF BAIT ACT BY THE GOVERNMENT.**

Last night the Board of Trade met to deal with the Council's Quarterly Report. After some discussion the report was adopted unanimously by the meeting. The main feature of the report is the strong attitude the Council took, which was endorsed unanimously by those present at the meeting last night, on the need of the right enforcement of the Bait Act, and the failure of the Government to live up to the requirements of the trade and the fisheries in this respect. At this stage, it may be well to let the Council speak for itself in its measured and considered judgment of the situation. Here is what the Council reports in this connection:—

"The Council hold the strongest possible views of the importance of a rigid enforcement of the Bait Act. It was, therefore, with extreme regret

that the Council noted that the S.S. Fiona has been taken off the Bait Protection Service on two occasions this summer without any suitable steamer being substituted. On the first occasion, when the Fiona was required for His Excellency the Governor's visitation of our fishing ports of the Colony, after some delay another steamer was placed on the service; she was again taken off in the latter part of August, and was not on again until the first week in October, no steamer being put in her place in the interim. On each occasion the Council has raised its voice in protest to the Government. The excuse has been made that latterly there has been no bait to protect, but the Council is informed that squid bait has been procurable in several places, and that considerable quantities have been smuggled into St. Pierre, but whether much actual harm has been done or not, the Council believes it vitally important to the Colony that the Bait Act should be always most strenuously enforced.

It has come to the knowledge of the Council that Canadian fishing vessels are violating our Bait Act. These vessels catch or purchase cargoes of herring in our territorial waters, but before a Customs clearance can be given permitting their export, the Master of said vessels must first obtain a license under the Bait Act and entering into a bond of at least \$1,000 to our Government, guaranteeing that the herrings or other Bait fishes, so exported are to be used only for food purposes. These herrings are, in many cases, put into cold storage

plants ostensibly for food purposes, but they are also used to supply Bait to Foreign fishing vessels. The Council learn that special inducements and facilities are now being offered by Canadian firms to foreign fishing vessels to supply them with Bait from their enlarged cold storage plants. As these Bait fishes are principally the produce of our fisheries and permission to export them is given by us in good faith on the distinct understanding that they are to be used solely for food purposes, we urge that the Government take steps to prosecute all Masters of vessels who dispose of or deal with any of our Bait fishes otherwise than in accordance with the terms of the affidavit made upon application for a license or with the terms of such license.

The Council are of opinion that Newfoundland's control over her bait supply should not be lessened or impaired by any technical or insidious invasion of her Bait Laws. The Bait supply of this country and the proper enforcement of the Bait Act is, in the judgment of the Council, not only a matter of vital importance to our fishery interests, but it is a matter of Imperial concern as well, because Great Britain's economic control over the fisheries of British North America is largely based on this Colony's supply of Bait fishes. With a view of strengthening Imperial interest in North American waters, we have pointed out to the Government the desirability of requesting the Government of the Dominion of Canada to enact a similar Bait Act to ours, believing that a united policy on the Bait supply of the North American fisheries will prove beneficial to the fishery interests of both countries.

The Council have also been informed that some Magistrates or Customs Officers on the West Coast are very lax in their methods of giving certificates to U.S. vessels as to the origin of the herring cargoes taken by them. All are certified to as being the produce of U.S. fisheries, while a matter of fact nearly the whole have been caught by fishermen of Newfoundland. Steps should be taken to see that these certificates are not loosely given, and copies of all such certificates should be furnished to the Colonial Secretary.

It will be observed that the Council expresses extreme regret at the taking off on two occasions of the s.s. Fiona from the Bait Protection service without substituting a suitable steamer. On the last occasion the steamer was taken off from the latter part of August until the beginning of October, and no steamer put on at all.

It is also pointed out that Canadian vessels are violating the Bait Act with impunity. Bait fishes are obtained for food purposes and in part sold as bait to foreign fishermen in contravention of the bond given by the masters of vessels obtaining a li-

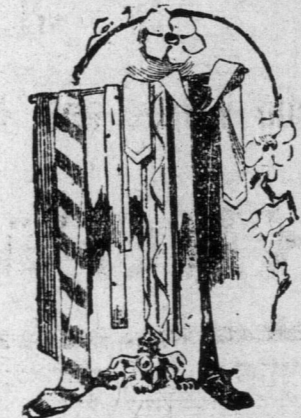

The Fisheries Minister sent a rush reply for further particulars promptly.  
**OFFICERS RETURNED.**—By the schooner train last night officers O'Keefe and O'Flaherty returned from Fox Harbour, where they had been sent to ally some unpleasantness on account of the discharge of the postmistress and operator at that place by the Government. The election of a woman by armed force shows how well the present Government deserves its self-styled name of the "People's Party."

## Strong Protest of Board of Trade

### AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT.

The adjourned meeting of the Board of Trade took place last night, and the Quarterly Report was adopted.

Mr. Parnell moved its adoption.

Hon. John Harvey seconded the motion, and strongly criticized the indifference and apathy of the Government in enforcing the Bait Act the past season. The matter was of vital importance to the staple industry of the country. Next to those in authority, and especially the taking off of the Fiona was a strong inducement to smuggling and bait running. The Act was an old one, and had been enforced for many years, and he thought all present would support fully the Council in its protest against the removal of the cruiser at a time she would be of the utmost service in keeping our bait out of the hands of our foreign competitors. Statements had been made that schooners cleared from Bay of Islands with cargoes of bait under bond and loaded the same aboard of other vessels at Gloucester without landing it. He also referred to the issuing of clearances out of Bay of Islands and along the coast generally. He understood some masters got certificates showing the cargo to be of U. S. product, and that copy being filed. If such were done, and the Government had no record of knowledge of it, it was most objectionable. The practice was of a more serious nature than appeared at first sight and should be remedied at once. If it existed, as he had been led to believe it did. Records should be kept and available by the proper authorities.

Mr. A. H. McDougall was the next speaker. He was of the opinion that the enforcement of the Act had done much good but the question arose whether it would continue in view of the difficulties of its enforcement. Newfoundland fishermen could compare favourably with outsiders and their products as well. The education referred to in the report was a matter of importance. In his opinion such was imparted in outport schools whereby greater interest would be taken in the catching and curing of fish. With reference to the proposed 1913 Fishery Exhibition. He failed to see where people who are making such wonderful progress were going to learn from us. Our fishing operations are practically confined to the shore. Very little is known of the outside banks. The increase in the Norwegian catch is largely due to the use of motor boats. He advocated that a sum of money should be allocated by the Government for the benefit of the Baiters.

**RESERVISTS ON CALYPSO.**—There are now 45 Naval Reservists on the Calypso, and three recruits entered a few days ago.

**STEAMERS SAIL.**—S. S. Stephano sails for Halifax and New York to-morrow night taking in saloon—E. R. Boyd and 5 in steerage. The S. S. Morgenna sails to-morrow morning for Sydney and Montreal. She takes as passengers Mr. A. L. King and 4 in steerage.

**HAND CRUSHED.**—Reservist Squires of Topsail had his hand crushed yesterday between the launch and the Calypso.

**VENT OVERBOARD.**—Yesterday an outboard motor man, who was half seas over, went down on Franklin's wharf and stumbled into the water between his schooner and the pier.

## LATEST War News

### The Collapse of Turkey.

#### TURKS RETREAT ON CONSTANTINOPLE—SHORTEST AND MOST REMARKABLE WAR ON RECORD—TURKEY MAY SUE FOR PEACE

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.  
The four days' battle in Thrace has ended in the triumph of the Bulgarians, commanded in-chief by General Sarrailh, whose skilful strategy has probably brought to a chaos one of the shortest most remarkable wars on record. The great Turkish army, estimated at over two hundred thousand men is defeated and is in retreat to Constantinople. It is believed to be at the mercy of the victorious Bulgarian army. A council sitting at the Porte is discussing the advisability of suing for peace.

Turkey declared war. The first week of the campaign closed with the dramatic fall of Kirk Kilissah. Fully feeling for the first time the disorganization, bad morale, indifferent commissariat of the Turkish army, it is believed a difficult diplomatic problem will be immediately arise as to the division of the spoils of war. Turkey's allies, not only the Greek allies but also Russia, Austria Roumania and possibly other powers. The latter are hurrying warships to the various parts of the country to protect foreign residents. It is believed the total Turkish force numbered 250,000 compared with 150,000 Bulgarians.

It is believed that temperature did not affect the volume of fish, as he knew of a time when large catches were made by traps put down through the ice. On the contrary, often in warm seasons poor catches resulted.

Mr. W. Moore held that the exhibit would lend but little towards a general improvement, while the same price was paid for good and bad fish. Mr. McDougall spoke next, remarking that a great deal of time was lost toing and returning from the Labrador, and in a great many instances "murray returns about the coast without catching a fish. The fish he thought, was due to lack of foresight and knowledge as to where to get the fish. He said fishermen should be educated how to care fish properly. He said the work of charting the coast undertaken by the surveying yacht Ellinor, would be of great value.

Mr. Moore was of the opinion that even the scientists aboard the Ellinor would fail to get an average catch four seasons out of the five.  
Mr. Fearn concluded by saying that the knowledge of the different grounds could be an advantage and a benefit. According, he said, as one was empty another could be filled. He believed that our fishery could be advanced as well as other industries and that the money so spent would be well spent.  
The resolution was then put and carried.

## Dr. Parkins Addresses C.H.E.

Last evening the Secretary of the Rhodes Scholarship Trust addressed the members of the Council of Higher Education on the working of the Trust. He stated that the Trust had been constrained to insist on these valuable scholarships, the greatest monetary value in the world, being assigned to students of at least sophomore standing in Colonial Universities. Newfoundland was the only Colony to which this rule had not yet been applied. Grace had already been extended till 1913, and possibly it might be extended until 1915, as a more temporary expedient was resorted to in the meantime to raise the age and standard of scholarship of our scholars. He claimed that the Trust had found by experience that students of nineteen could not receive from Oxford the benefits Rhodes intended, and that to obtain these advantages maturer men must be sent.

Night Schools.**  
Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—The subject of Higher  
Education has been discussed in the  
papers year after year, and now a new  
phase of the question is receiving the  
attention of our educationalists. We,  
of the everyday class, are disposed to  
look upon it as something unnecessary  
and we have sympathy for the child  
that has to wrestle with the many  
intricate subjects which this type  
of education embraces, because  
for the most part many of the schol-  
ars who go through the ordeal are  
never afforded an opportunity in after  
life to benefit materially by the cram-  
ming which in their school days they  
struggled to digest. People who can  
pay for such education for their child-  
ren are certainly at liberty to do so,  
if they feel like it, but the Govern-  
ment should consider the matter well  
before deciding to expend any further  
money to enlarge on the present fund.  
We have many young men and women  
in this country who had to leave  
school early, because their assistance  
in the support of their homes deman-  
ded that they go to work at an early  
age, and it is only after getting out  
in the world that the boy or girl with  
the scant education realizes what  
great drawbacks they have to strug-  
gle under, and it is only then that  
their appetites become sharpened for  
more knowledge to help them in the  
struggle of life. This, Mr. Editor, is a  
class that should receive assistance  
from the Government, and this could  
be accomplished by starting night-  
schools all over the Island. As most  
of the young men and women who  
would attend these schools would be  
employed at trades and situations  
they would be able to pay a small  
sum to help defray the expense of  
such schools, and therefore once the  
schools were set a-going the cost to  
the Government would be compara-  
tively small. Our people are quick to  
learn and with the proper facilities  
and good teachers, whom I don't think  
would be difficult to secure, we would  
in a few years have thousands of  
young men and women who to-day  
are fumbling along in semi-darkness  
full fledged scholars capable of par-  
ticipating in the endless blessings to  
which such an education leads. I  
paves the way. Such schools could  
be conducted in the winter months  
and would, I feel sure, be largely at-

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, Oct. 31.  
Special dispatches from Constantinople say that the Eastern wing of the Turkish Army, which is now bearing the brunt of the battle, has been reinforced by four Syrian army corps. The centre of the Turkish Army is composed of picked troops, chiefly regulars, as the reserves have been responsible, in the opinion of the Turkish officers, for most of the reverses suffered, because of their liability to panic. It is reported at Constantinople proper, that the Turkish force has crossed the river Maritza in the direction of Demoticka to cover the approach of further troops from the west down the Arda Valley. It is stated that the Turkish Government has decided to send out the fleet with orders to open a passage for Turkish troops through the Aegean Sea to Salonica and Dedeah.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, Oct. 31.  
An Anglo-German conference, composed of hundreds of representatives of commerce between Germany and England, met at the Guild Hall, yesterday. Sir William Mather said that the two countries, if united, would prevent war for evermore from troubling the world. Hermann Hecht of Berlin said England and Germany should stand together to meet any commercial danger, which may come from the great America, where industries are being rapidly developed. Many speakers criticized Lord Roberts for his Manchester speech, in which he said a war between two countries was inevitable, the consensus of opinion being that when England realizes that Germany is not seeking territorial aggrandizement there will be no more talk of war.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, Oct. 31.  
Whatever the result to the great battle which is now being fought in the eastern part of the Balkan Peninsula, its conclusion will probably give occasion for intervention by the Powers. In a despatch from Vienna, it is asserted that the foreign minister of the European Governments have reached a tentative agreement. In any event, the entry of Bulgarian troops into Constantinople will not be tolerated by the Powers. Even Russia is disinclined to permit such an occurrence. It is also understood in diplomatic quarters in the Austrian capital that the Balkan nations have already made it known in an unofficial manner that they are prepared to accept intervention at any moment.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, Oct. 31.  
The Serbian legation received a despatch from Belgrade, giving accounts by returned Serbian officers of the atrocities committed by Turkish troops, before abandoning the country captured by the Serbians. Wherever the Turks passed, says the Serbian despatch, the Serbian Army

LONDON, Oct. 31.  
A News Agency despatch from Sofia says that the Bulgarian Army has completely defeated the Turkish forces, estimated at 200,000 men, at Lule Burgas, (called Lineh Burgas on several maps), after three days of hard fighting. The Bulgarian cavalry is pursuing the retreating army, towards Tchataja. Adrianople is completely hemmed in by the Bulgarian troops.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
BERLIN, Oct. 31.  
Danger of anti-foreign disturbances and, perhaps, massacres of foreigners in Constantinople and Salonica, following the Turkish defeat and the ingress into these towns of demoralized Turkish soldiers, has attracted the attention of the Powers. Protective measures in this connection are under discussion at the German foreign office, where it is said the German Government will take steps to intervene by sending German warships. In case of need of such intervention, it is pointed out that Germany's action will be non-political.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
VANCOUVER, Oct. 31.  
In view of the possibility of a European conflict, members of volunteers and militia in this city have been quietly approached during the last few days, with a view of ascertaining whether they are ready to go out and fight. The canvass has been conducted in the quietest manner possible, much as was done before calling the Colonial forces together at the time of the Boer War.

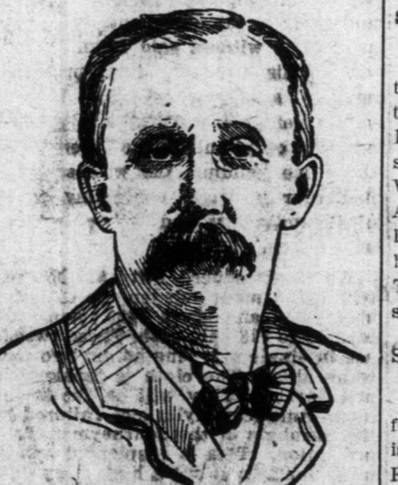

The Bulgarian Army is vigorously pursuing the Turks, who are retreating in disorder and panic towards Serai and Tchoplu. Many guns and large quantities of ammunition have been captured.

**BERLIN, Oct. 31.**  
The opposing armies are well supplied with wireless apparatus, 14 complete equipments having been acquired in Germany shortly before the outbreak of hostilities, 7 by Greece, 5 by Turkish, and 2 by Bulgaria.

### Leader of White Slave Traffic Captured!

**Recent Raid By Inspector O'Keefe and His Morality Squad May Have Far Reaching Result—The Terrible History of Emile Mustique, Wanted in Almost Every Civilized Country for His Leadership in the Terrible Traffic Among Women.**

While slavery in its most revolting form is now rampant in the Dominion of Canada, and Montreal is suffering from the plague as much as any other city.

**An Important Arrest.**  
A short time ago Detective Lajole arrested a man named Birgnoil, now in Quebec awaiting trial for importing girls to Canada for immoral purposes. About the same time two other agents of this man were captured at Quebec and held there for deportation with twenty women.

Then came the raid of last Monday, when 15 houses of ill-fame came under the scrutiny of the local police. There did not seem anything out of the ordinary in the raid of Monday, with the exception that the number of places was large. Out of that roundup came the very thing needed to fasten the power of the law on the man higher up, Emile Mustique, of France, leader and financier of the whole white slave traffic, not only here, but in the United States and France.

**A Terrible History.**  
His history is an open book to Chief McCaskill of the provincial detectives, to the Municipal police at Ottawa and to the secret service men of America, who are prepared to lay hands on him any day within the week. Montreal, Toronto, Quebec, Halifax, Winnipeg, Vancouver, Chicago, Kansas City, Denver, all know him, and there are in that list of cities houses rented from him at enormous profits; furniture brought over from France and sold to fit up these places. He levies tribute for the privilege of his protection. Several times, at least in one city, he bought a house outright and sold it to a woman at a tremendous increase.

It took a large amount of money for this illegal enterprise. In one city he bought a house for \$12,000, paying \$40 a week to the seller, charging the woman who rented \$120 a week, and a big profit for the fittings. At another place a \$10,000 house was purchased on similar terms, and all this time the police of three countries were fastening a drag net around the disappearing and elusive man tantalus with lines stretching from ocean to ocean and beyond.

**The Last Link.**  
All this information is in the hands of the police clerk of Quebec, Mr. Talbot, in documentary form, and is known by every department of police in Canada, provincial and civil, to the heads of the police system in France, and the secret service men in America.

The last link was soldered on Monday by the local police force when Detective O'Keefe on his successful roundup secured three women whose story settled the fate of the one man hunted for years and who have furnished clues that will lead to houses in Montreal bought by his money and filled with women, some of whom were sold outright at prices said to be from \$1,000 to \$3,000. The arrest of Mustique, it is claimed, will sound the death knell of the white slave industry, as this one man alone was responsible for the inglorious calling becoming a flourishing institution, according to the police of many countries.

To Canada is the glory of this culmination coming, and in the long and relentless hunt he was being shadowed by the provincial detectives of this city under Chief McCaskill's scrutiny, who tracked him from a prominent hotel in Halifax by a letter sent to one of his agents, telling him to keep going, and again at Toronto, where he wired his busy agent to send all his letters to Kansas City. This was his undoing as far as evading the police drag net of three countries was concerned.

Washington and Ottawa are acting in harmony with every lower branch of the service, pulling hard on the last round of a spiral sleuthing that for a long time ended where it started, in Paris, France, leading to Emile Mustique, alias Durand, situated in the United States, within a few days of capture, to face the bar of justice in three countries, one after another.—Montreal Standard, Oct. 26.
