

He drew himself upright and smiled down at her grimly, but she saw that he did not see her; that he was by sheer force of will keeping himself from fainting.

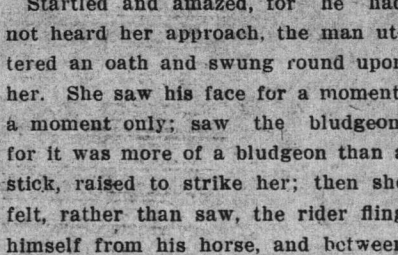
"What shall I do?" she asked of herself more than him. "If I had some water, brandy! Will you come?—do you think you can walk as far as the cottage?"

1039.—A POPULAR STYLISH WRAP.

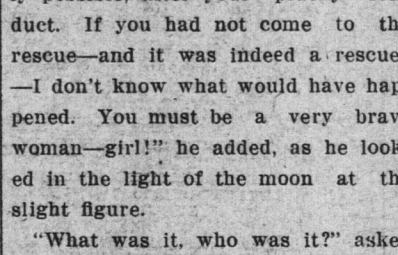


Ladies' Cape Coat.

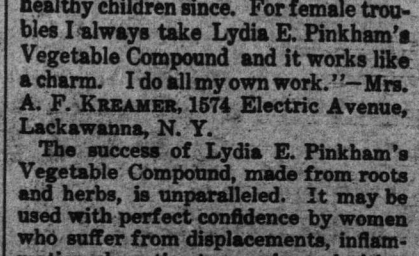

Britain's Army Only Her Advance Guard.

TROOPS STILL AVAILABLE MUST BE COUNTED IN MILLIONS. "WE HAVE HARDLY BEGUN"

London, Oct. 17.—The Times military critic, replying to the Frankfurter Zeitung's statement that Great Britain was unable to raise more than six hundred thousand troops, says:

"We have at the present moment exactly double that number namely one million two hundred thousand men and the number grows almost faster than we can cope with it. This is only the beginning.

"It is our way to begin to raise our arms after war breaks out and to go on raising them until our ultimate end is reached.

"One million two hundred thousand men at home, the army in the field, and the thousands of thousands forming in India, Canada, Australia and elsewhere are merely the nucleus upon which our armies will eventually be built.

It is only a question of time. It stands to reason that an empire of four hundred million can never lack men. This war for us has hardly begun. We have sent merely an advance guard into France. In the spring the remainder of the advance guard will follow and somewhere toward the end of 1915 the main body will begin to come within view.

"We are sorry for the Allies that we are even slower than Russia in making our weight felt, but a year or so hence, when the Allies need a rest, we shall be in a position to make good war.

"Nothing can arrest the steadily ascending figures of our army. Their cost is of little account since Germany will ultimately have to pay—in territory as well as in money.

"Imagine things at their worst. Imagine the last Cossack from the Urals and the last French doorkeeper evicted from Bordeaux. Then we would begin a maritime war against Germany and still be no worse off than when we carried on war against Napoleon at the height of his power."

ADVENTURE LOADING.

The S. S. Adventure which is now loading codfish at Harvey and Co.'s premises for Mediterranean ports, sails some time to-morrow.

Seemingly forgotten by the Germans, they are now reported to have strongly entrenched themselves near the Dutch frontier.

General de Schepper declares that he and his men are determined to resist to the last, and will refuse to surrender to the Germans.

Prisoner of War.

Sergeant Kent, of Placentia, came in by last night's train, bringing along a German named Frederick George Burhardt, who was taken to the Penitentiary as a prisoner of war. The German was a seaman on the schooner May Morris, which had landed fish at Burn and was about to sail for European markets, when he was arrested and put on board the cruiser Fiona, and brought to Placentia.

AFFORD PLENTY OF LABOR.

There is plenty of work these days for longshoremen and teamsters, owing to the unusually large codfish shipments that are being sent to the Mediterranean in steamers. In addition to the cargo sent by the s.s. Boethic on last Saturday week makes a total of over sixty thousand quintals.

Allies Doing Good Work

The news from Northern France and West Flanders is distinctly good. The German invasion of the coast line between Ostend and Dunkirk and the threatening of Calais has terminated in an inglorious and demoralised retreat from the coast. One correspondent speaks of the German rush to the coast as theatrical. Without question there was much killing of England by the mouth, accompanying their advent along the coast. Gun casements were to be set up. Krupp's had fabulous guns ready to place on foundations, in comparison to which the howitzers which had smashed the forts at Leze, Namur and Antwerp were but puppets. Dover was to be smashed by the guns at Calais and the Straits between were to be swept clear by these extraordinary German guns, and a passage kept open for the ever victorious and sable rattling Yonker. But something went wrong with the working of the plan. The allies occupied Ypres and pushed the advancing Germans towards the coast where the Admiralty declares they had some monitors, recently purchased from Brazil, waiting for them. A monitor is a heavily armed, slowly moving ship with revolving turrets. In some respects they may be regarded as movable forts and as these have a shallow draft they can be kept close in even in comparatively shallow water. The Germans were trapped between the allies on the land side and the British monitors at sea and they had a bad time, and were glad to vacate the coast line.

Not only have the Germans been driven from the coast, but the allies are doing great work away from the coast north of Lille and apparently northward to Bruges and Ostend. Judging from the positions from which the Germans have been driven out between Roubaix and Roulers and the statement that the allies are following up the Germans to the east, it does not seem very far fetched to expect that within a month the Belgian capital will be once more in the possession of the allies. The news of the fighting is distinctly good, and it is the best we have heard for the past month. Between Belfort and Verdun the allies seem to be more than holding their own. Between Verdun and Compiègne there is no news of activity, the German attacks in Argonne, around Rheims and Soissons have apparently stopped. Between Compiègne and Arras there is little news, the attacks at Roye and Lassigny seemed to have ceased. It is north of this that the main contests have been waged during the past week, and with distinct and positive successes for the allies.

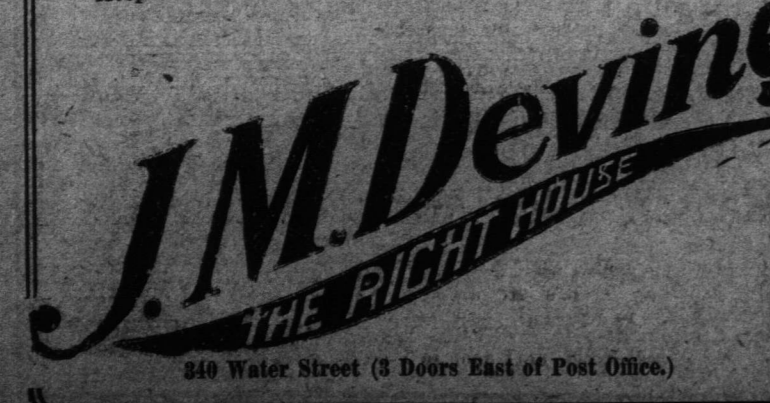

LONDON, To-day. The correspondent of the Times at Boulogne under date of Wednesday describes the desperate fighting of the past week in which the Germans have been driven back from village to village to the outskirts of Lille. He says the destruction has been terrible. Some villages have been shelled by both Allies and Germans and many non-combatants have been killed. A whole family was found dead in one house. In one of the villages 500 Germans were found after the fighting. The cartridges in their possession it was noted were of Old Snider Type with large bullet. During the attack the Allies had only time to make rough trenches a couple of feet deep, and were obliged to lie in them at full length.

NAVAL MARKSMANSHIP SUPERB.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch to the Daily Mail from Dunkirk, says that the British Naval bombardment has utterly destroyed the town of Zeyre, which the Germans held in force. The house occupied by the German headquarters staff was blown to bits. Naval marksmanship, according to the despatch, was superb. A British signal mast in a stationary position was shot by the Germans.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

Official (Midnight).—During yesterday the enemy's attacks were particularly violent on the line of Neuport, Dixmude, La Bassée and were repulsed with extreme violence by the allied armies. Everywhere else the situation is unchanged.

A big battle is being waged on the front between Lille and Ostend. According to news received from this front the situation of the Allies is considered excellent.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, To-day. A French official communication this afternoon, says that during yesterday the attacks of the enemy were particularly violent at Neuport, Dixmude and La Bassée, but were repulsed by the Allies with great energy. At all other points the situation is without any notable change.

GERMAN CASUALTY LIST.

BERLIN, To-day. German casualty list issued to-day contains the names of about 11,500 killed, wounded and missing.

The Uhlans.

By GEORGE FITCH, Author of "At Good Old Swish."

The Uhlans, who are now being used by French and Belgian nurses to frighten the children to sleep, are not a tribe or a lodge, as has been suggested by many puzzled readers. They are not even necessarily German. Russia and Austria also possess Uhlans, but the German brand is by far the most disagreeable to have around. The Uhlans were invented by the Tartars, who came into Central Europe hundreds of years ago from Asia and introduced their justly celebrated spears into the midst of the inhabitants with great industry. At that time the Uhlans wore a stout horse, a sabre and a lance with a red cloth on it. The red cloth was used to frighten the enemy, but of late years it has been found that a press agent is much more effective. Uhlans infested Europe through all the middle ages, but they rose to their greatest fame in 1870, when Prussia sent many thousands of them over into France to rumble through the country. The Uhlans did this with

great success and made themselves so disagreeable that a French cannon would run away without horses at the sight of them. The Uhlans roamed in large squads over, around and through the French infantry, chipping off chunks of it with their heavy swords, burning railroads, capturing cannon, and making themselves as disagreeable as a big boy in a game of marbles. When the war was over, the Uhlans had made their reputation and they have helped keep Europe nervous ever since. In the present ill-feeling the Uhlans have been very busy, as usual, and wherever a French or Belgian village is found inflamed it is reasonably certain that these predatory horsemen have been around. During the first weeks of the war over 100,000 Uhlans were reported killed or captured by the Belgians. However, as there are only about 50,000 of them in the German army, and as traces of Uhlans have been discovered by the coroners in many parts of France since then, it is evident that someone made a mistake in adding up the figures. 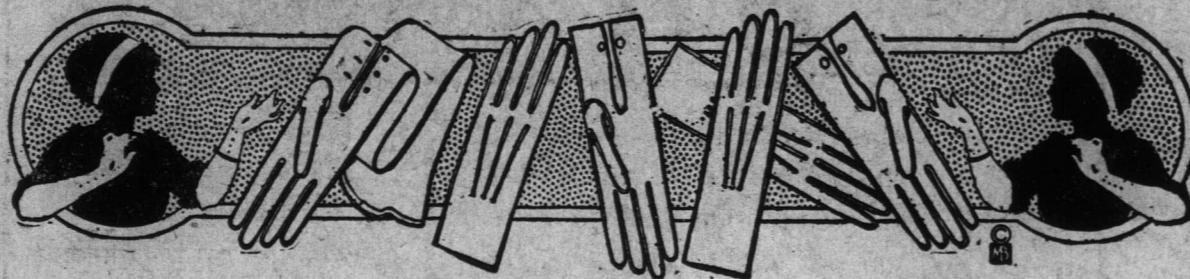

GERMAN FLEET IN BALTIC.
LONDON, To-day.
The Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Telegraph reports a German fleet off Flisterbo, Sweden, in the Baltic Sea.

ENEMY'S CONSIDERABLE LOSSES.
LONDON, To-day.
The Official Press Bureau issued the following statement at midnight: Throughout yesterday the enemy made a vigorous attack against the Allies' front but were beaten back suffering considerable losses. The Belgian army in particular distinguished itself by its spirited and brave defence of its position.

GERMANS RETREAT BEFORE RUSSIANS.
PETROGRAD, To-day.
A Russian official statement says German troops which had occupied the roads leading to Warsaw in the region north of the River Plitza, have been repulsed and now are in full retreat leaving their wounded on the battle field. The Germans have abandoned the positions they had fortified in advance. The Russian troops are energetically advancing along the whole front.

MONITORS DO GOOD WORK.
LONDON, To-day.
The Admiralty announces that the Monitors recently purchased from Brazil, have been engaged in operations on the Belgian coast, firing on the right flank of the German army. Owing to their light draught they have been able to contribute materially to the success of the operations in this district and they have already abundantly justified their acquisition on the outbreak of the war.

THE GERMAN FIASCO.
LONDON, To-day.
A despatch to the Daily Chronicle from the British front says the theatrical excursion of the German army to the North Sea has reached an inglorious conclusion. The attempted raid to Calais has completely failed. Ostend has been evacuated by the Germans. They will make no attempt to hold Bruges. Their retreat is being closely followed up by the Allies.

DRIVEN OUT OF OSTEND.
FOLKESTONE, To-day.
A despatch to the Chronicle says a wounded Belgian soldier who arrived at Folkestone late on Wednesday night declared the Germans had been driven out of Ostend.

GENERAL ADVANCE OF ALLIES.
DUNKIRK, To-day.
Ashmead Bartlett, wiring the London Daily Telegraph, says: A General who is not given to boasting told a friend of mine yesterday that he considered the position of the allied armies better than it ever had been, and that the demoralization of the Germans is growing greater day by day. He added, "we most certainly will be in Brussels under a month. I myself expect it in a fortnight." Yesterday there was a general advance all along the allied line. The army advanced from Roulers and drove back the Germans a considerable distance. Everywhere along this line the Germans are retiring, offering little resistance except with artillery. They are covering half demoralized, half starved infantry by a well sustained artillery fire, and have used heavy guns to great advantage. In fact the only formidable branch of the German army at present seems to be their heavy and field artillery. (See Fourth Page.)

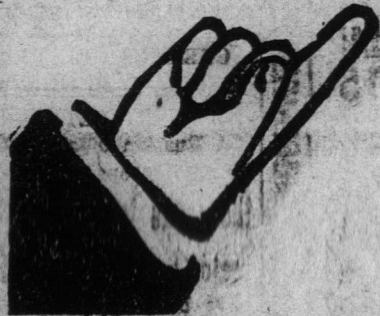

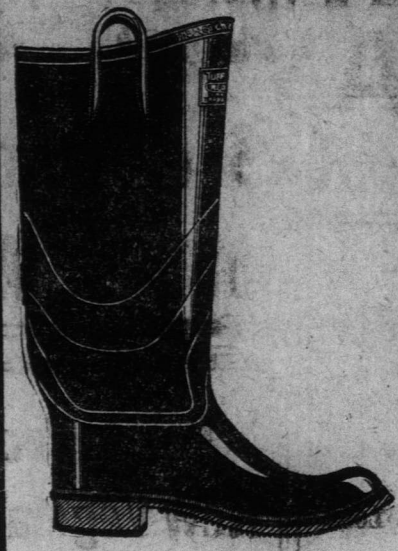

THE WAR—CHAPTER XXI.
I. C. MORRIS.

We have all heard, and made, the familiar remark, that "the sun never sets on the British Empire," and we are so accustomed to the saying, that it is just possible to overlook its real meaning, and therefore lose its full interpretation. Let us enquire therefore what the saying really implies, and see how vast is the compass of its claim.

The sun is always shining. Even when clouds and fog intercept its rays it shines ever the same. At noon we see it rising in the East, when, like some great ball of fire it merges from below the horizon as if awaking from slumber. At noon we watch it, as in clearer rays it ascends the heavens and reaches the glory of its zenith. We then behold it on its westward march across the heavens, and then we see it sink away amid the halo of its own evening splendour.

In its circuit the sun accomplishes its orbit, whereby it encircles the world, and yet in all its course, it sheds light on some part of the British Empire. How vast then must be this Empire, and how great must be its influence in the life and civilization of the world. This is the Empire of which we write, and whose destiny is now hanging in the balance of war—a war that is not of her own making. But this war will stir the Empire up, and will finally open her eyes to her own greatness, and to a wider vision of her future. It will create a clearer conception in the public mind as to what really constitutes the British Empire, and it will increase the interest of every British subject in the stability of the Throne.

With this wider vision on the part of the people a new era of prosperity will dawn, and the Empire will then increase its greatness, by unifying its possessions. All the territory that the Empire has gained has been gained by honourable measures, and even when warfare was necessary, the rules of war were strictly adhered to, and Britain never yet struck an unfair blow. The British Empire contains many of the most beautiful and fertile countries in the world, and these countries are productive enough to support fully five times their present population. The resources of these countries have never yet been fully tested, but with rapid advance of science, and the almost daily increase of locomotion, it cannot be that increased returns will follow as the country grows. War has done its share for the Empire, but the era of warfare will soon be of the past, and then the intelligence of the people, and the enterprise of commerce, will demand a better course.

Britain has ever stood for what is best in Empire, and when she shall have sheathed the sword in this great conflict, she will then clothe herself with renewed vigour and put her house in order. Her household is a varied one, and is representative of many nationalities and tribes of men; hence inasmuch as all men like fair play and desire justice, so will the future of the British Empire become greater than it now is. Its numbers will increase, its trade will advance, and its influence among the other

KAISER REPORTED ILL.
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 21. Kaiser William is reported to be seriously ill.

FRENCH MAKING PROGRESS.
LONDON, Oct. 21. The Paris correspondent of Reuter says that latest information from the front indicates that the French are making marked progress on the right bank of the Meuse, and that the great battle raging in the north is as yet without definite result.

BATTLE RAGING.
BORDEAUX, Oct. 21. A great battle is now raging between Lille and Ostend, according to despatches received here this afternoon. The despatches add that the situation of the Allies is considered eminently satisfactory.

ALLIES SUCCESSFUL.
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 21. The Telegraph learns that the Allies were successful after a bombardment that lasted all night, in taking the town of Roulers, in West Flanders. It is reported that the Allies now occupy the town.

WATCH GERMANS DIGGING TRENCHES.
LONDON, Oct. 21. A newspaper correspondent at Dover sent to London this morning details of the recent operations of the British warships off the coast of Belgium. He says: On Saturday night the ships watched the Germans digging trenches along the coast under a flare of lights. This enabled the British ships to get the exact range, and at daylight they shelled the enemy's positions heavily. An aeroplane was brought down, and later a Zeppelin, and it is declared the guns of the British vessels accounted for 1,000 Germans killed and wounded in addition to putting six batteries out of action. Meantime a German submarine tried to sink the British ships.

A GERMAN REPORT.
BERLIN, Oct. 21. Severe fighting continues on the Yser Canal. The enemy's artillery was supported from the sea to the northwest of Nieuport. The fighting west of Lille continues. Our troops have taken the offensive and have repulsed the enemy at several points. In the eastern theatre of the war no decision has been reached.

THE 'EMDEN' STILL ACTIVE.
LONDON, Oct. 21. The German cruiser Emden, has again been sinking British steamers at a point 150 miles southwest of Cochin, British India. According to a report received by the Admiralty from Colombo, Ceylon, she has sent to the bottom the British steamers Toller, Clan Grant, Beumohl and Dredger, bound for Tasmania, and have captured the Exford.

GRAND ASSAULT OCTOBER 30.
PARIS, Oct. 21. The Tokio correspondent of the Math, wires that the Japanese have set October 30th, the Emperor's birthday, as the date of a "grand" assault against the German fortress at Tsing Tao.

GERMAN STATEMENT UNFOUNDED.
LONDON, Oct. 21. The statement from German sources that there has been a rebellion in British Somaliland and that Berbera, with all the British officials has been taken, is entirely without foundation.

The situation remains unchanged since the outbreak of the war.

CHURCHILL IN THE TRENCHES.
LONDON, Oct. 21. Winston Churchill, the First Lord of the Admiralty, who accompanied the British Naval Brigade and Marines to Antwerp, was, according to one of the latter, with them in the trenches practically all of the time. Just before the order was given to retire, he urged the men to hold out for twenty-four hours longer when the big guns would arrive. One day he reconnoitered the position of the Germans in an aeroplane.

REFUGEES RETURNING.
THE HAGUE, via London, Oct. 21. Cardinal Mercier, Archbishop of Malines, who took refuge in Holland some weeks ago, has now returned to his native city. He has advised all Catholic refugees to follow his example. The Nieuwe Rotterdamsche Courant declares that 20,000 Belgian refugees passed through Rosendale on the way home during the past two days. It is rumored that Namur has been occupied by the Allies, but this report lacks confirmation. It is believed improbable.

THEY HAVE TO GO.
LONDON, Oct. 21. The police throughout England began to-day to round up all Germans and Austrians between 17 and 50 years of age. They will be sent to detention camps.

IMMIGRATION OFFICER SHOT.
VANCOUVER, Oct. 21. M. C. Hopkinson, the assistant to the Immigration Inspector, was shot and killed here this afternoon by a Hindu.

HOLDING THEIR GROUND.
PARIS, Oct. 22.—(Official.) A violent battle continues on the left wing with the allied forces holding their ground everywhere.

OSTEND REPORTED BOMBARDED.
LONDON, Oct. 22. A despatch from Berlin to-night by the Marconi Wireless Co. says: It is reported that Ostend is being bombarded by the British fleet.

ALLIES DOING GOOD WORK.
From the Battle Front, via Paris, Oct. 22. The Belgian army, with the English Channel on its extreme wing, is showing a marvellous fighting spirit, despite its long and arduous campaigning and the bitterness of the loss at Antwerp and other large cities. In a terrific open struggle which has been in progress along the frontier for several days, the Belgians with the Allied French and British forces have repulsed with the greatest energy the incessant German attacks. Yesterday like the previous day, the German heavy artillery poured a heavy bombardment on the Allied positions, but the Belgians delivered counter attacks and forced the invaders to retire nearly five miles. Further down the line on the Lys, the French were closely engaged, with general success. Three French sharpshooters performed a brilliant feat in defending a bridge, the possession of which was of the greatest importance to both armies. The Germans made a cavalry dash in an effort to seize a passage, but the Frenchmen from behind a mill 75 yards away, poured a magazine fire into the Germans, until the latter retired, leaving the bridge in the hands of the Allies. Rice and Bullets.

(Related by a corporal of the Gloucester Regiment, now in hospital.)

Those who say the British Army is losing its grit don't know what they're talking about. I was at the front for six weeks before I got wounded, and in that time I saw deeds that could not have been equalled for heroism in any age.

In one of our fights it was necessary to give orders to a battalion holding an exposed position to retire. Bugle calls were no good, and the only thing was for men to risk their lives by rushing across an open space of 400 yards at least under a hellish fire.

Volunteers were asked for from the Royal Irish Fusiliers, and though every man knew that he was taking his life in his hand the whole lot volunteered. They couldn't all go, so they tossed for it in files, the man who couldn't guess the way the coin came down at least once out of three times being selected.

Just as the wounded man and his mate were within a few yards of safety and we were cheering him for all we knew, there was a perfectly

checked volley from the Germans, and both of them collapsed. We dragged them in but it was too late. Both were dead.

The fourth man kept up his race against death and seemed to bear a charmed life, but in the last lap as you might say he went down like a felled ox.

He was seen from the trenches to which the message was being taken, and half a dozen men ran out to his aid, the Germans renewing their fire with greater fierceness.

The whole of the little party was shot down, but the wounded Fusilier continued to crawl to the trenches with his message. Another party came out and carried him in, as well as seeing to the others.

Later the battalion holding the advance position was able to fall back in good order, but it wasn't the least bit too soon, and had it not been for those brave chaps, who risked their lives to carry that message, there would have been a battalion less to fight our battles that day, as the Germans were working round unknown to the officer in command, and would have cut it off as sure as I'm a soldier.

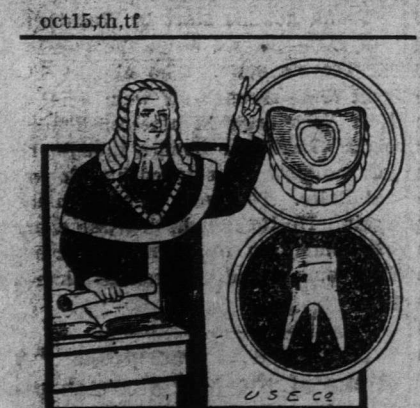

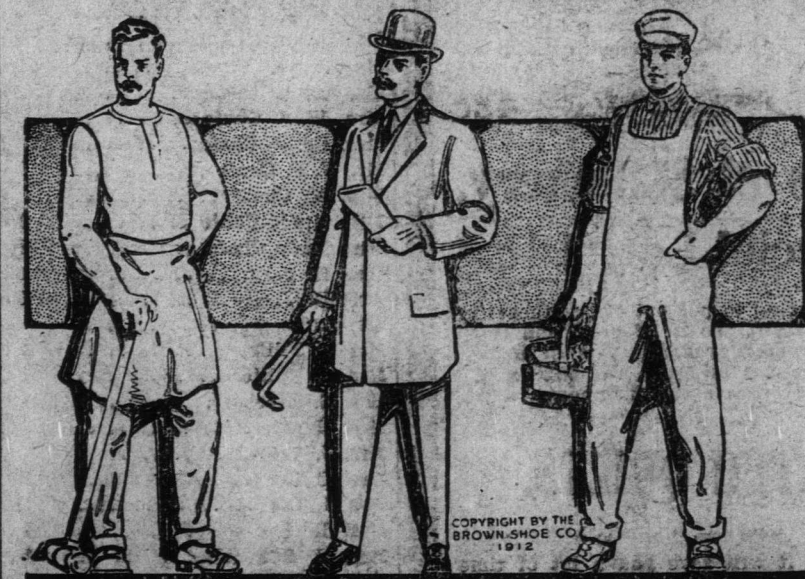

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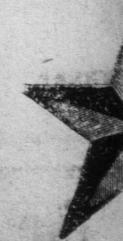
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
